**ATHENS, Ga.**—Three Florida State University golfers were grouped around 75 and one was well off the torrid early pace set by the North Texas State stars Don January and Billy Maxwell as the Southern Intercollegiate moved into its second day of play today.

Seminole ace Sonny Tinney and Tom Cumble had 75s yesterday. Former footballer Tommy Brown

checked in with 76 and Jude Dunfee had an 86.

A bad second nine hurt Tinney, and Cumble who both went out in 36, but needed 39 strokes coming back.

Brown, hot the front nine with a 35, found the back side even rougher and skidded all the way to a 41 after the turn. Dunfee had 43-43 for his 86.

**ATHENS, Ga., AP** — Golfers of North Texas State—the class of the college crowd—today were on their way to what looks like an encore of 1949-50-51.

If anything, they might be better than ever. In three previous years they have shown well here and gone on to win high national honors.

The Texans rate first in team play in the Southern Intercollegiate Tournament and have their No. 3 man—Don January, Dallas—in first place for Southern individual honors.

January made par of 36-36—72 on the Athens Country Club course look like standard for a duffer Thursday when he shot a 67.

That was good by two strokes to put the slim, 22-year-old ahead of the brightest name in amateur golf—Billy Maxwell, the national amateur champion and a North Texas teammate.

His 67 also outranked Billy Key's 69. Key, a Columbus, Ga., golfer, attends Rollins College.

Tied for fourth were Ray Terry, Sewanee, and Dick Tiddy, Wake Forest.

**ATHENS, Ga., (AP)**—National Amateur Champion Billy Maxwell showed a stretch run of golf, which no other main challenger could match Saturday to win the second Southern Intercollegiate and give the impression this meet was just a tune-up for bigger ones to come.

The game shot by the 23-year-old from North Texas State College which clinched his second straight college title was a 70 for a 72-hole total of 283.

Hillman Robbins of Memphis State College, came in with par 72 for a 285 total to tie Buster Reed, North Texas, for second.
