

COLUMBUS, Ohio — Florida State was ten strokes off the pace as the second round of the National Collegiate Golf Championships got underway here today.

The four-man Seminole squad posted a 307 in the opening round yesterday. Powerful North Texas State finished with a 297.

Oklahoma A&M and Southern California were in second place with 304 totals and Houston and Notre Dame in third with 305s.

Playing the rugged, 7,130-yard Ohio State University course, scores soared the opening day. Only two golfers were able to match the par 72—Rudy Boyd of Northwestern and Bill Redding of Purdue.

Jack Veghte posted the best Seminole score with a 76. Ed Jenkins, Billy Shelton and Bobby Dunn finished with 77s.

Don Veller, the Seminole mentor, remarked "These are better scores than they appear to be. The course is very tough, the greens fast, and the pins are placed in impossible positions."

Veller said he was "certain" the FSU scores would be improved today.

Jenkins represented FSU on the 12-man East squad in the East-West All-Star match Sunday. He teamed with Thomas Watrus of the University of Detroit to defeat Richards of the University of Kansas and Wharton of Houston.

However, the West won the all-star match, 8-4.

Team play continues in the tourney through Thursday with the low 64 scores competing for national individual honors on Friday and Saturday.

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP)—Rex Baxter shot a five-under-par 67 to spark Houston University to the team title in the National Intercollegiate golf championships here yesterday.

Bobby Dunn of Florida State fired a 69 to become the only other player to break par since

the tournament opened Sunday.

Houston's team total was 601. Purdue and North Texas State tied for second at 602. Oklahoma A&M was fourth at 605 and Florida State fifth at 606.

Dunn, Ed Jenkins and Billy Shelton will represent Florida State in individual match play today through Saturday. Jenkins shot a 74 yesterday, Shelton a 76.

Oddly, Jack Shoemaker—FSU's best golfer as far as averages go—missed the match play finals. He had a 79 yesterday.

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP)—Two Florida State University players were among the 32 out of an original field of 264 still in the running for the National Intercollegiate golf championship today.

Ed Jenkins trounced Ron Pawlak of Southern California, 7-6, and Bobby Dunn downed Bob Richards of Kansas, 3-1. As match play opened yesterday.

SHELTON BOWS

Billy Shelton, the third FSU golfer who qualified for individual match play, lost a tough match to Ken Rodewald of Michigan State, 1-up on the 19th hole.

Two rounds of 18-hole matches were due to cut the field to eight by nightfall. And, by day's end, either medalist Rex Baxter Jr. of Houston or defending champion Joe Campbell of Purdue — perhaps both — will be sidelined.

If the two stalwarts survive

the morning round, they'll tangle in the afternoon. Baxter, who smothered the field by six strokes in the qualifier, has the big problem as he goes against Tom Beard of LSU, who fired a 71—with four threes on the last six holes—to oust Texas Tech's classy John Cain yesterday.

Most of the favorites came through the first round over Ohio State's 7,120-yard par 72 course, but there were only two

one-sided matches. Three went extra holes, six ended on the 18th, 10 on the 17th and 7 on the 16th, so tenacious were the losers.

FOUR FROM A&M

Campbell, who was two under par in defeating Ernie George of San Jose in the first round, faced Don Sechrest, one of four survivors from Oklahoma A&M, this morning.

John Garrett of Rice, last year's runner-up, smothered Fred Wilt of Ohio U., 7-6, in the opening round. He had threes on four of the last five holes of the front nine. Garrett had Frank Wharton of Houston, a 74 shooter, as his opening opposition today.

Double 18-hole rounds are scheduled tomorrow, with the 36-hole final Saturday.

COLUMBUS, Ohio — Florida State University's two remaining hopefuls were eliminated here yesterday from the National Collegiate Individual Golf championships.

Edwin Jenkins of Jacksonville lost in a morning round to Jay Pittman of Southern Methodist, 4 and 3. According to FSU coach Don Veller, the usually consistent Jenkins was "off his game."

Bobby Dunn of Camilla, Ga., swept past John Marshall of the University of Iowa 3 and 2 in a morning round, but was elimi-

nated in the afternoon by Rick Jones of Ohio State, one-up.

Jones, playing his home course, was sinking putts from every angle while Dunn had strokes run in and out on four of the final nine holes.

Rick Jones, ever-smiling Ohio Stater, is the North's last hope as the final match play begins today.

By nightfall only two will be left. Arrayed against the Buck-eye sharpshooter are four Texans and single entrants from Oklahoma, California and North Carolina.
