

# FSU Golf Squad Leaves For NCAA

Florida State University's state intercollegiate golf champions left today to compete in the National Collegiate meet at Colorado Springs, Colo.

The NCAA meet begins Sunday over the spacious Broadmoor Country club and will continue through the following Tuesday.

The five members of the FSU team are Ed Jenkins of Jacksonville, Bob Shave of Cleveland, Ohio, Harry Shoemaker of Signal Mountain, Tenn., Dave Morris of Tallahassee and Billy Shelton of Anniston, Ala.

Two other Seminole golfers—Bunk Berry of Tallahassee and Jack Veghte of Gloversville, N.Y.—are forced to sit out the meet because of the NCAA's three-year competition restriction.

Jenkins, the team captain, will represent FSU in the annual East-West team match on Sunday.

Last year, Florida State finished in a surprising fifth place,

just five strokes behind winning Houston.

The NCAA meet will be the last for FSU Coach Don Vetter who has resigned his position to dedicate full time to academic work. He is being replaced by Bill Odeneal, former Volleyball coach.

Florida State has won the state intercollegiate championship the past two years in succession and has lost only one dual meet in almost three years.

Ed Jenkins, captain of the five-man FSU squad, represented the southeast on the All-Star East squad. He was also on the team last year.

The four golfers competing for Florida State in addition to Jenkins are Dave Morris of Tallahassee, Bob Shave of Cleveland, O., Billy Shelton of Anniston, Ala., and Harry Shoemaker of Signal Mountain, Tenn.

# FSU Golfers Fourth At Colorado Springs

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. (AP)—Florida State University's golf team was in four place in team competition with a 304 when the dust settled on the first qualifying round of the 60th annual NCAA Golf Tournament here yesterday.

Surprising Arizona State and always tough North Texas State finish with totals of 302 to lead the team play.

Iowa University was third with 303 and defending champion Houston was in fifth spot with a 305.

Leading the pack in individual play was Warren Simmons, Syracuse University's 1957 Eastern collegiate champ, who fired a sizzling three-under-par 69 in yesterday's opening qualifying play to set a course record.

The low 64 golfers at the conclusion of the second round begin individual match play tomorrow. The tourney ends Saturday.

Prior to Simmons' 34-35-69, Bob Brue, University of Miami, fired a 35-35-70, which also broke the course record of 71, established in 1936 during the Colorado Springs Invitational by Fred Brown of Los

Angeles and Dr. Glenn Foust of Denver.

## Bauer Plans Prosecution

NEW YORK (AP)—Hank Bauer, New York Yankee outfielder and an ex-Marine planned to take the legal offensive today against charges he slugged a festive bowler in a New York night spot.

Sidney O. Friedman, Bauer's lawyer, said yesterday Bauer would sue the delicatessen owner who caused his arrest for "compensatory and punitive damages."

The lawyer disclosed the rugged outfielder's plans after Bauer fared better with a New York County grand jury than he did with the management of his own ball club.

The grand jury heard 15 witnesses testify on the charges against Bauer, 34, in a two-hour session. Then it voted "no bill," throwing the case out of court.

# FSU FINISHES 4TH IN NCAA GOLF TOURNEY

## Shave Leads Way; Match Play Starts

**COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo.** — Florida State University's golf team wound up in fourth place in the National Collegiate golf tournament here yesterday, just five strokes behind victorious Houston.

The Seminoles, playing with what FSU Coach Don Vetter described as a "patched-up" lineup, posted a team score of 607. Houston, repeat winner of last year, had a 602 total.

Stanford finished second with a 603 total and North Texas State barely edged out FSU for third place with a 606 aggregate.

### JUST MISSED

Florida State's Harry Shoemaker, the national left-handed champion the past two years, had two putts rim and fail to drop on the final hole. They would have given the Seminoles third place.

According to Coach Vetter, FSU would have won the tourney "hands down" if the Seminole golfers had been up to par.

Team captain Ed Jenkins of Jacksonville blew two rounds of 82 and 75—his highest since entering FSU three years ago. Jenkins' scores were not counted in the FSU total, since only the low four scores on a team qualify.

Low man for the Seminoles was junior Bob Shave of Cleveland, O., with rounds of 75-71 for a 146 total. Shave is the third low man in tourney play and is regarded a prime contender for the NCAA individual championship.

Other FSU scores were: Shoemaker, 75-73—148; Billy Shelton, 77-79—156 and Dave Morris, 77-80—157.

### THREE QUALIFY

Individual match play begins today and will wind up on Saturday. Shave, Shoemaker and Shelton qualified to represent FSU in match play.

Morris, of Tallahassee, missed qualifying by only one stroke.

The 64 finalists in the tourney represent survivors from an original field of 196. Medalists, with 36-hole totals of 142, were Roger Rubendall of Wisconsin and Warren Simmons of Syracuse.

# Shave Wins NCAA Test

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. — Bob Shave, Florida State's bright sophomore star, moved into the second round of the National Collegiate golf tournament with a 1-up victory here yesterday over Southern Methodist's Tom Brown.

But Florida State's other two qualifiers in the match-play tournament got bumped.

Harry Shoemaker, the Signal Mountain, Tenn., boy who only last week won his second suc-

cessive National Lefthanded Golfers championship, went down before SMU's capable Jerry Pittman, 1-up.

Billy Shelton, former Alabama prep champion from Anniston, was dropped by Fresno State's Rickey Baird, 2 and 1.

Probably the most promising golfer on FSU's outstanding squad, Shave is being accorded a good chance to win the individual crown over this windy, hilly layout.

In two days of medal play for team titles, Shave was third among a field of 185 with a 145 total. FSU's team finished fourth.

Shoemaker never led in his match with Pittman. He evened the match, however, with a birdie on the 17th hole as Pittman took a bogey. But Pittman, the Southwest Conference champion, got his approach shot within 20 feet of the pin on the 18th and closed out the match with two putts. Shoemaker's shot missed the green and it
