

**OCALA**—Defending champion Frank Beard of Florida and FSU's Frank Malara appeared to be the men-to-beat heading into today's 36 holes of the Florida Intercollegiate golf tournament.

Beard shot a 36-34—70 in yesterday's opening round over the 6,430-yard par 71 Ocala municipal course. Malara, runner-up to Beard here last year, matched par with a 36-35—71. Jay Dolan of Rollins was third at 72.

The Florida team, after its third straight title, was ahead at 291. FSU's No. 1 varsity team was second, seven strokes back. The low four out of six individual scores count in team standings.

Other team members on the Seminoles' No. 1 entry are Dave Onstad (73), Downing Gray (74), Rock Fraleigh (80), Dick Dunlap (81) and Wayne Timberman (83).

FSU's No. 2 team stands sixth with 316 strokes. Scores included John Fraleigh's 76, Phil Fagan's 77, Chuck Keating's 82, Mike Blauffer's 84, and Dick Shulman's 82.

FSU's freshman entry posted a first-round total of 325. Comprising the Baby Seminole entry are Roger Kennedy (79), Ed Wong (80), Dick Ross (81), and Ray Daley (85).

High winds prevailed during the first round. The final 18 holes in the 72-hole tournament are scheduled for tomorrow.

**OCALA** (AP)—Jay Parks, University of Florida junior, shot a four-under-par 67 Saturday and beat out teammate Frank Beard as state intercollegiate golf champion.

Parks had 284 for the 72 holes and Beard finished with 286.

The Gators also claimed the team championship with a score of 1,171, five strokes better than their title winning total in last year's tournament.

Parks, from Jacksonville, had a 217 at the start of today's round, three strokes back of the leading Beard. He shot 34-33 over the 6,430-yard, par 71 Ocala Municipal course for the best round in the tourney. Beard had 72 in the last round.

Jay Dolan of Rollins, who was one stroke back of Beard going into the final 18 holes, had a 75 and finished third at 290. His teammate, Dick Diversi, was fourth with 292 after matching par 71 in the last round.

Next came Joe Hamby of Florida Southern at 293, Skip Stigger of Florida and Dick Harrell of Southern at 300 each. Dave Onstead of Florida State

and Jim Parker of Florida at 301 each and Galen Skramstead of Miami and Downing Gray of FSU at 303 each.

FSU finished second to Florida in the team competition with 1,219.

Rollins was third at 1,220; Southern fourth at 1,212; FSU No. 2 team fifth at 1,255; Miami sixth at 1,247 and Sutton seventh at 1,270.

Florida won the freshman division for two-man teams. Harry

Root and Marien Vestupped 605. Miami was second with 612.

FSU's Frank Malara, who was leading his team's individuals after three rounds, was forced to pass up yesterday's semifinals with a high fever.

The Seminole's Onstead won two special events, capturing the long-drive and putting contests.

Florida State Coach Bill Odenal won the special match for coaches of participating teams.
