

**ATHENS, Ga. (AP)**—Miami's Jerry Potter carried a one-stroke lead into the second round of the 27th annual Southern Intercollegiate Golf Tournament today after posting a three-under par 69 in the first round.

Georgia led the team competition in both the SIC and Southeastern Conference play, which are held simultaneously. The Bulldogs fired a 289, three strokes ahead of second place Wake Forest.

Three SEC golfers, Richard Williams of Georgia, Maury Finkelstein of Louisiana State and Bert Greene, fired 70s for a second place tie in the SIC. They were tied for the SEC lead.

Johnny Lamey of Alabama followed with a 71. The list thickened at par 72 including Bob

**Wolfe of Middle Tennessee State, Rich Karkl of Florida State, Dennis Milne of Wake Forest, Vinny Giles of Georgia and Dwight Nevil of North Texas State.**

The defending SIC team champion, North Texas State, was in fifth place with a 299. Louisiana State was third at 296, and Florida State fourth at 297. Twenty-nine of the expected 32 teams competed.

Six players are entered from each team with the low four counting in the team totals.

Georgia's low shooters include Williams 70, Giles 72, Oliver 74, and Tommy Malone 73.

After 18 holes today the field will be cut to the top 40 and ties for Saturday's finals 36 holes. Tournament director Howell Hollis said he expects lower scores today since weekend rains had slowed the 6,745-yard Athens Country Club Course.

**ATHENS, Ga. (AP) —** Wake Forest overcame a three-shot Georgia lead Friday to win its second Southern Intercollegiate Golf Tournament. One of its players, Ken Folkes, shot a sizzling 68 to gain a tie for the individual lead at 141 after two days of play.

The members of the winning team which had a score of 578, are Jay Sigel, Folkes, Don Hedrick, and Dennis Milne. Sigel and Folkes gave the Deacons the surge they needed to overcome Georgia which finished at 581 for second place.

The Bulldogs total was good enough for a fourth straight Southeastern Conference title. Georgia now has won 11 conference championships since the tournament began in 1937.

Tennessee's Bert Green started the day with a rash of birdies and an eagle for a front nine score of 31, but took 40 strokes on the backside for a one-under-par 71. This tied him with Folkes at 141.

Green's score gives him the individual lead for the Southeastern Conference as both the SIC and SEC individual champions will be determined after 36 holes of play Saturday.

Folkes had five birdies and one bogey in his round which was the best of the day and the best in the tournament so far. First day leader Jerry Potter of Miami finished with 73 and a 142 score, while Georgia's Vinnie Giles had the same total with a second-day two-under-par 70.

Two strokes back at 144 and even par were Richard Williams of Georgia who had a 74, Dennis Milne of Wake Forest, 72, Steve Lyles of Mississippi State with a 69 and Sigel with

a 71. Lyles' 69 was the second best individual score Friday.

Richard Kar of Florida State had 145 and 146 was shared by John Denteloon of Florida State, A. B. Saco of Austin Peay, Denny Lyons of FSU, Dwight Nevil of North Texas State and Robbie Braske of Georgia Tech. Tom Malone of Georgia and Richard Lockett of Florida had 147s while Maury Finkelstein of LSU and defending SEC champion Jack Oliver of Georgia had 148s.

Florida State was third in the team total with 592, followed by LSU with 602, North Texas State with 605 and Mississippi State with 609. LSU's score was good enough for runner-up in the SEC division.

After the Bengals came Mississippi State with 609, Tennessee with 610 and Florida with 612.

The cutoff was set at 153 with the low field of 40 qualifying for Saturday.
