

FSU is Fourth In Miami Golf

MIAMI (AP) — The University of Florida had four golfers in the top seven Friday at the end of the third round of the University of Miami Invitational Tournament.

With 40 schools and 250 golfers participating in the tourney, largest of its type in the United States, Florida was out in front with a score of 858. Florida Atlantic trailed in second place with 886 points, followed by the host school with 889, Florida State 898 and the University of South Florida's 910 points.

Craig Scott, a Florida Atlantic golfer, held down first place individual honors with a 66-74-210 score, but four Florida men were right behind him.

Gary Koch and Andy Dean were tied for second place at 214, with Kevin Morris and Phil Hancock deadlocked at 216. John Bodin, of Georgia State, was alone in the fourth spot and Ken Hummell of Miami, held the fifth place spot with 220 points.

The tournament, being played on the Miami Biltmore and Coreal Gables LeJeune courses, ends Saturday.

FSU 4th At Miami

MIAMI (AP) — Florida's Andy Bean stroked a 69 Saturday to finish with a four round total of 283 and win the individual competition in the Miami Invitational Golf Tournament by one stroke.

In second place was Craig Scott of Florida Atlantic University who shot a three-over par 74 in the final round to wind up in a tie with Gary Koch of Florida at 284.

More than 350 golfers from 45 schools competed in the four-day event that saw the University of Florida dominate in individual and school competition.

Florida finished with a 1,144 team total while host Miami placed second with 1,184. Florida Atlantic was third two strokes behind the Hurricanes. Next in order came Florida State, South Florida, Princeton, Georgia State, Tennessee Tech, Michigan, Wooster, Georgia Tech, and Bowling Green.

Andy Bean Captures UM Golf

From the moment Florida Atlantic's Craig Scott took a four-stroke lead Friday in the University of Miami Invitational golf, Florida's Andy Bean and Cary Koch kept reminding each other, "one of us is going to get him."

Bean came blasting out of the sand on the final two holes at Biltmore Saturday to "get" Scott, who had led through all three previous rounds.

The Gator sophomore from Lakeland fired a two-under 69 for a one-stroke victory margin over Scott.

And Koch, the defending champion, caught Scott by shooting a final-round 70 while the Florida Atlantic shotmaker was skying to 74.

BEAN finished with 283. Scott and Koch at 284 wound up five strokes ahead of Florida's Kevin Morris. Florida's Phil Hancock was next at 292 followed by Miami's Ken Hummell and FSD's Jim Ihnot, 293.

The team title chase, of course, was no contest. The Gators won it for the fifth straight year with a team total of 1144. Host Miami was runnerup for the second year with 1184, two strokes less than third-place Florida Atlantic.

"It didn't matter which one of us won," Bean said, "but Gary and I never quit bugging each other about one of us having to do it."
