Seminoles 3rd in Golf

PINE MOUNTAIN, Ga. (AP)
— Georgia Southern has captured the first Southern Independent Intercollegiate Golf championship, led by Jim Ferrelle who sank four birdies on the final round to claim individual honors.

Georgia Southern finished the three-day tournament with a total of 1,131, 16 strokes ahead of runner-up Jackson-ville, which finished with 1,147, and 27 strokes ahead of third-place Florida State which finished with a total of 1,158.

Following in order were South Carolina, 1,131; Memphis State, 1,169; Virginia Tech, 1,192; Southern Mississippi, 1,207; South Alabama, 1,215 and Georgia State, 1,221.

Ferrelle's closing round of 70 gave him a three-day total of 221 and allowed him to nose out teammate Buddy Alexander who finished at 222.

R o b e r t Robb of Georgia State took third place at 223, followed by Scott Frye of Jacksonville at 225 and Bill Mitchell of Georgia Southern at 226.

During the tourney, coaches from the 10 schools formed an organization called the Southern Independent Golf Association and elected Jim Cook of Memphis State as president.

The coaches voted to hold the tournament each May at Callway Gardens, the site of this year's play.

Georgia Southern is ranked ninth nationally by Golf World Magazine.
