

Seminole golfers fourth

STATESBORO, Ga.—Florida State's golf team stroked past an elite field and positioned itself in fourth place after the first round of the prestigious Schenkel Invitational Golf Tournament here Friday.

The Seminoles were tied for fourth with LSU with a team score of 354. Georgia Southern, the host team, took advantage of the home course advantage and stroked into the lead with a 336 total.

The University of Georgia followed with a 347 total while defending national champion Wake Forest was third at 350.

The Seminoles found themselves ahead of such notables as Florida, which was seventh at 359, Alabama and Auburn in the 18-team field.

Kenny Knox paced the Tribe by firing a three-under par 69 while Terry Anton had 70, Chip Curley and Richard Jeffers had 71's, Tom Anton a 73 and Kenny Szuch shot 75.

FSU golfers drop to fifth

STATESBORO, Ga. — Florida State's golf team dropped a notch to fifth after the second round of the Schenkel Invitational tournament here Saturday.

Georgia Southern leads the 18-team field with a 697 total, followed by Wake Forest at 702, Georgia at 705, LSU at 711, and FSU at 716.

Florida is sixth with a 719 total, while Auburn had a 720 and Alabama a 724.

Chip Curley had FSU's best round of the day, a two-under-par 70.

Curley's 70 gave him a two-day total of 141, best on the Seminole squad. Terry Anton fired a 72 Saturday, bringing his two-round total to 142.

Kenny Knox, who had a 69 in Friday's opening round, ballooned to a 74 Saturday and stands at 143. Other FSU scores are Richard Jeffers 71-72—143; Tommy Anton 73-74—147; and Kenny Szuch 75-73—148.

FSU golfers 5th in Schenkel

STATESBORO, Ga. — Florida State's golf team finished fifth in the Schenkel Invitational tournament that finished Sunday.

The prestigious 18-team tourney was won by defending NCAA champion Wake Forest with a score of 1,058. LSU was second with 1,061, followed by Georgia Southern (1,065), Georgia (1,069) and FSU (1,079).

The Seminoles again defeated seventh place Florida, this time by seven

strokes, despite a 10-under-par performance from individual champion Phil Hancock, a Gator All-American.

Among other strong teams beaten by the Seminoles were Auburn, Alabama, Indiana, East Tennessee and N.C. State.

Kenny Knox and Chip Curley turned in the best performances for FSU with 214 totals, followed by Terry Anton and Richard Jeffers at 215, Tom Anton at 221 and Kenny Szuch at 223.
