

FSU stands fifth in golf tourney

ATHENS, Ga. (AP)—Georgia, led by medalist Chip Beck's five-under-par 67, carries a seven-shot team lead into today's second round of the Southern Intercollegiate Golf Tournament.

The Bulldogs had a seven-under-par 281 total over the 6,850-yard, par 72 Athens Country Club course Thursday. North Carolina was alone in second place at 288, followed by North Texas State and Houston at 299.

Trailing the top four in team competition were East Tennessee 291, Florida State 292, Georgia "B" and Georgia Southern 293, Tennessee and Ohio State 297, Jacksonville, Fla., Georgia Tech and Texas A&M 298; Indiana 299; East Carolina 300; Middle Tennessee 302; Furman, Duke and Memphis State 304; Miami of Ohio 307; Miami of Florida 309; Austin Peay 314; Georgia State 321; Valdosta State 326 and South Alabama 343.

Beck was tied with Rob Jackson of Indiana with a two-day total of 139, two strokes ahead of the rest of the field in the competition or a medal in the 54-hole tournament.

Joe Walter and Tim Simpson, both of Georgia, were tied at 141 for second and Keith Fergus of Houston and Keith Hiller of East Carolina were tied at 142 for third.

Trailing the top four in team competition were Texas A&M 588, Tennessee 589, North Carolina 589, North Texas State 589, Georgia "B" team 593, Memphis State 595, Florida State 598, Furman 599, Indiana 599, Duke 599, Georgia Tech 599 and Ohio State 600.

Seminole golfers are 11th

ATHENS, Ga. (AP)—Georgia's Chip Beck fired an even-par 72 Friday to lead Georgia to a 20-stroke team lead in the second round of the Southern Intercollegiate Golf Tournament.

The Bulldogs had a 10-underpar 544 total after 18 holes over the 6,850-yard, par-72 Athens Country Club course. East Tennessee followed in second place at 586 and Georgia Southern and Houston were tied for third at 587.

Georgia wins Southern golf

ATHENS, Ga. (UPI) — Georgia defeated Houston by 25 strokes to handily win the Southern Intercollegiate Golf Championship Saturday, and Georgia's Chip Beck edged Indiana's Rob Jackson in a playoff for the individual title.

Georgia won the 54-hole tourney with a 851 team score. Houston was second with 876 and North Carolina, third, with 881. North Texas State was fourth at 883, followed by East Tennessee, 886.

Georgia Southern and Tennessee finished regulation tied at 887 but Georgia Southern then won a playoff for sixth place.

Other team scores were: Ohio State, 890; Memphis State, 892; Texas A&M, and Furman, both 894; Georgia (2), 899; Georgia Tech, 901; Indiana, the defending champ, 904; and Duke and Florida State, both 905.
