Seminoles 12th in NCAA golf

Tenth-ranked Florida State stood 12th, 17 strokes off the lead, after the first round of the 72-hole national NCAA golf championships at Winston-Salem, N.C.

With Grant Turner carding an even par 72, the Seminoles posted a four-man team score of 303 on

Wednesday.

North Carolina took the lead with a 286. Houston stood second at 294.

Allan Menne had a 75 for the Seminoles, while Jeff Sluman carded a 77 and Paul Downs a 79.

Oklahoma St. leading golf

WINSTON-SALEM, N.C. (AP) — Oktahoma State's Bob Tway dropped a 15-foot birdie putt on the 18th hole Friday to give the Cowboys a 1-stroke lead over Brigham Young after three rounds of the NCAA Golf Tournament.

Florida State, meanwhile, finished the third round in 18th place and miss the cut for the final round of competition among the 15 top teams. FSU's Grant Turner kept his hopes alive for individual honors. His three-round total of 223 put in a tie for 20th place, nine strokes behind the leader, Gary Hallberg of Wake Forest.

With sophomore Tway and senior Britt Harrison both shooting 1-under par 71s in the face of winds that gusted to 30 mph, Oklahoma State shot a team total of 294, 6 over par.

That gave the Cowboys an 884 total for the tournament, 1 shot ahead of the Cougars and 4 shots ahead of

host Wake Forest.

The Deacons Gary Hallberg maintained his lead in the individual standings at 214, 2 under par, but his third-round 76 left him only 1 shot ahead of Louisiana State's Wayne De-Francesco, Brigham Young's Bobby Clampett and Ohio State's Joey Sindelar.

Sindelar had the best round of the day, with a bogey-free, 4-under-par 68.

Clampett and DeFranc\$co both collected birdies on 18 to shoot 74 and 71, respectively.

North Carolina, the team leader after two rounds, suffered through 80s by openinground leader Kevin King and teammate Joey Sadowski and fell 8 strokes behind Oklahoma State. The Tar Heels are tied for fifth with Ohio State, 1 stroke behind New Mexico.

"We lost our composure more than I-would have expected," said North Carolina Coach Devon Brouse. "I'd like to think it wasn't pressure. I thought we'd add to the lead today. Obviously, I was wrong. We'll just have to put this round behind us."

Tway, who shot 1-under 71s in the final two rounds in last year's tournament to spark the Cowboys to the team championship, seemed undaunted by the winds that swirled around Bermuda Run Golf Club's 7,023 yards.

"We've been in this position all year. There will be pressure, but we know how to handle it," Tway said

Hallberg, who set a competetive course record Thursday with a 6-under-par 66, was bothered by the wind and had only two birdies.

"It was hard to get my distances down with the wind blowing," the Wake Forest junior said. "The 76 came awfully fast. If it blows tomorrow, I'll be prepared for it." From the Tallahassee Democrat May 27, 1979 Page 62

Ohio State wins NCAA golf crown

WINSTON-SALEM, N. C. — Ohio State rallied from five places behind to capture the 82nd NCAA Golf Championships Saturday at the Bermuda Run Golf and Country Club.

Wake Forest golfer Gary Hallberg took individual honors by shooting a final-round 73 for a four-day total of

287.

Florida State's Grant Turner wound up 12th in the individual standings, with a final round 76 to follow rounds of 72, 77 and 74 for a 299 total. Grant was the only FSU golfer in the final round, after the Seminoles missed the cut Friday.

The Buckeyes, in winning their first championship since 1945, finished with a combined score of 1,189, or 37 strokes over team par. Defending champion Oklahoma State, which led after three rounds of play, took second with a score of 1191.

Wake Forest started the day in third and finished in the same spot with 1196. Brigham Young took fourth place at 1198. New Mexico dropped from fourth to finish fifth at 1202.

Oral Roberts and North Carolina tied for sixth with scores of 1206. The Tar Heels led the tournament through the first two rounds but fell into a tie for fifth with the Buckeyes at the end of Friday's play.

Hallberg, a junior from Barrington, Ill., fired the low round of the day. Bobby Clampett of Brigham Young finished three strokes behind Hallberg at 290. He fired a 75 on the day.

Ohio State's Rick Borg, a junior from Columbus, Ohio, shared low round honors with Hallberg, also shooting a 73. He finished at 303.

Mike Bender of California State-Stanislaus, playing as an independent, tied for third with Wayne De-Francesco of LSU. Both men finished at 295.

Four golfers were tied for fifth, including Bob Tway of Oklahoma State, Britt Harrison of Oklahoma State, Joey Sindelar of Ohio State and John McGough of North Carolina. All shot 297

"I just wanted to play as solid as I Hallberg said once he learned the team's status while he was on the course, he tried harder for the team than for himself. He added that when he knew he had a chance to wrap up the individual crown, he bogeyed his last two holes.
