FSU CAPTURES SECOND STRAIGHT SOUTHERN JR.-SR. TITLE
SONNY LONG

DADEVILLE, Ala.—The Florida State Seminoles held off the second round charge of the University of Georgia to capture the 1982 Southern Junior-Senior intercollegiate golf championship at Still Waters Resort.

It was the second consecutive Southern title for FSU which outdistanced Georgia, 884 to 894. The Seminoles opened the tournament with a seven stroke lead over the Bulldogs. Georgia cut the lead to two strokes after the second round, but shot 309 in the last round. FSU shot 301.

In the junior college division, Alexander City State Junior College ran away with the top spot with a three round total of 894. McLennan (Tex.) finished second at 910.

Individually, Georgia's Mike Cook shot a one over par 73 for the second day in a row to capture the senior division title with a 213 (67-73-73). The only other golfer in the tournament to break par was second place Mike Keymont of FSU at 215 (65-76-74)

Rounding out the top five scorers in the senior division were Alabama's Steve Lowery (73-69-75-217), Ball State's Kirk Schooley (74-72-71-217), and Georgia's Wayne Smith (72-73-73-218).

In the junior college division Alexander teammates Chip Holcombe (74-72-73-219), Gene Sauers (76-72-72-220) and Greg Fleischer (69-76-77-222) finished at the top of the individual standings.

Fleischer's first round 69 was the only sub-70 score in the junior college division. In the senior college division, FSU's Mike Keymont tied a course record with a first round 65. Cook of Georgia had a first round 67, Carter Mize had a first round 68 and Lowery of Alabama managed a second round 69.

The chill and winds finally took their toll on the final day as only three par or better scores were recorded on the intimidating Still Waters course. Schooley of Ball State had the low round with a one under par 71. Kentucky's Buddy Bryant and Alex City's Gene Sauers shot par 72 on the day.

The tournament featured nine Southeastern Conference teams and four of them made a last round scramble for the third spot along with Ball State. Auburn was third after the first round at 289 followed by Mississippi at 295, Florida at 297, Ball State at 298 and Tennessee at 299.

After the second round Auburn, Mississippi and Ball State were tied at 595. Florida stood at 597 and Tennessee at 598. The third round settled the third place issue. Mississippi finished at 898 (295-300-303), followed by Tennessee (299-299-302-900), Ball State (298-297-306-901) Florida (297-300-308-905) and Auburn (289-306-316-911). Alabama finished eighth at 916 (310-297-309).

Despite the high scores in the third round, there was an individual highlight. Tennessee's Kevin Janiga fired a hole-in-one on the par three seventh hole. The course got its revenge though as Janiga finished with a three over 75 on the day.

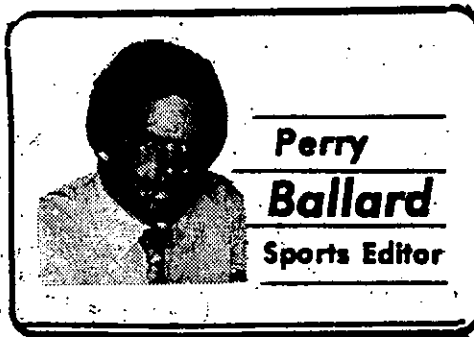

Jr.-Sr. Unique College Tournament

STILL WATERS—It started out as one man's dream for a "different" kind of collegiate golf tournament. Today, it is not only one of the most unique college tournaments around, but one of the most popular. And in the future? Well, the future for the Junior-Senior Invitational is an exciting one.

The 12th Junior-Senior is being played this weekend at this beautiful resort near Dadeville and Camp Hill. Of the 12, this is probably the best, since its biggest field ever—28 teams—includes some of its best visiting teams ever.

The senior division includes eight Southeastern Conference schools and several strong independents. The junior division's field is matched by only one other junior college tournament all year, the national championships.

If it was a senior tournament alone, or exclusively a junior college tournament, it would still be an attractive event.

But Maxie Boles, golf coach at Alex City JC, and the originator of the tournament, says he doesn't know of another tournament around the country that pairs senior college and junior colleges in the same field.

"It is a one-of-a-kind event," says Boles. "It is natural. This is the best in golf among the southern four-year colleges, and the best in the nation among the junior colleges. The field speaks for itself."

"Every year it has grown and gotten better. The future looks great. We're no longer having to go out and get people to play in the tournament; teams are coming to us."

The evolution of a 28-team, 140-man tournament has been a slow one. The first tournament, hosted by Alex City and Columbus College in 1971, included only six senior division teams—Columbus, Georgia, Auburn, Georgia Tech, Miss. State and Valdosta State—and six junior division teams—Alex City, Marion, Chipola, Pensacola, Middle Georgia and South Georgia. It was played at Willow Point in Alex City.

The tournament remained at Willow Point for four years. By the time a young and growing Still Waters Resort picked up the tournament in 1975, with Auburn becoming the senior college host, there were 10 teams in each division. It grew to 24 teams in 1977, and 26 teams in 1978. By 1980, Dragoin had lured nine of the 10 SEC schools into the field, and Boles was attracting junior colleges from as far away as New Mexico.

The tournament had arrived.

"When I think back to the way it was the first couple of years, and the way it is now, I'm a little surprised," said Boles. "I didn't know how it would work out. It's hard to get some things off the ground. When we started, collegiate golf in the south was just on the rise. Now some of the best collegiate golf teams in the nation are in the south. So as golf has grown, so has the tournament."

Picking up Auburn as the senior college host meant picking up a number of established golf powers that hadn't played in the Junior-Senior before. And after Boles was named president of the National Junior College Coaches' Association several years back, he established enough contacts to lure the best two-year schools in the country to Still Waters.

"The last three winners of the national junior college tournament have also been the last three winners here," he said. "That says a lot. The junior college coaches like this tournament because they can get a preview of the national tournament. The four-year college coaches like it because this is a natural recruiting tool for them. They get a look at some of the best junior college players in the nation."

The tournament's relationship with Still Waters has also worked out well. "The folks here have been super," Boles said. "They give up a lot. The golf course is always in excellent condition. I guess nobody's been complaining much because most of the teams are back year after year."

Plans For Future

IT IS THE PLANS for the tournament's future by the folks at Still Waters that has a lot of people excited.

Firmly committed to the tournament's future, the resort plans to expand its format in the future. It is almost a necessary step.

As it stands right now, Still Waters surrenders quite a bit of itself during a prime tourist season. If the tournament weren't held this weekend, the resort would be booked to the roof with guests from Ohio, Indiana, Pennsylvania and other northern states, lured by a warmer climate and a golf course that isn't digging out from the winter's snowstorms.

Still Waters takes a considerable loss in boarding and feeding the collegiate teams for the week-end. It is a sacrifice that Still Waters' director Cecil Duffee, himself a college golf advocate, has chosen to make ever since the tournament was moved here.

Still Waters' plans for the future include

money-making ideas that will not only help the resort in recovering its losses, but in the future, perhaps give back some money to the teams who participate.

Under the direction of Public Relations Director Bud Watts, the future plans for the event rival that of the Barbara Mandrell Weekend, or the George Lindsay Celebrity Tournament.

"Beginning in '83, we'd like to put on something of a celebrity-amateur tournament the day before the Junior-Senior tournament," Watts said. "There are some very influential people who are also very interested in collegiate golf who should be willing to attend. Right off hand, people like Bear Bryant, Pat Dye and Johnny Majors come to mind, and there are others. By pairing these people with amateurs from around the area, or around the country, you've got a nice little tournament on your hands.

"Almost every big tournament like that has a nice

program to go along with it, and a good program can put something between \$10-15,000 into the pot.

We're also looking into getting a big-name nationally known celebrity or entertainer to put on a show during the weekend in Auburn, as we did for the Mandrell Weekend a while back," Watts continued.

"You put all of that together, and you've got a package that is good for the communities around here, good for the teams, good for college golf, and good for Still Waters.

"We had a tremendous amount of cooperation from the Auburn-Opelika area when the Mandrell Weekend was held here. And since there is a lot of interest there in collegiate golf, we feel like we could get that area interested in the future of this tournament."

Watts is hard at work now, lining up the backing for such an expanded event. He has already found some interested contributors. More should line later.

"I wouldn't expect this thing to really get off the ground for several years," he said, "but it should go over. In a few more years, we hope to be able to put some money in some of the college's travel accounts."

That idea gets no disagreement from the teams in the tournament. "If we get into a situation where teams get something BACK from playing in a tournament like this," Boles said, "you'll get anybody in the country to come down here and play."

That's a far cry from 1971, when a dozen golf teams played in the inaugural Junior-Senior. Then, it was just another tournament. It's come a long way since.
