Schenkel golf tournament to be televised this year

Georgia Southern College and Alcam Enterprises of Savannah have signed an agreement allowing Alcam and WJCL-TV (Channel 22, Savannah) to televise the 12th annual Chris Schenkel Invitational Golf Tournament April 23-25 at Forest Heights Country Club.

Eighteen of the finest college golf teams in the nation will be competing in the tournament.


Besides the nature of team golf, Statesboro fans will have an opportunity to watch two of the finest amateur golfers in the country. Nathaniel Crosby, the defending U.S. Amateur champion, of the University of Miami and Georgia Southern's Jodie Mudd, the two-time defending U.S. Public Links champion and Amateur Golfer of the Year, have already filed entries.

A one-hour program featuring the first two days of

the tournament will be aired on TV 22 Saturday night, April 25, from 7 to 8 p.m. A second one-hour program featuring the final holes of play on the final day will be shown Monday evening, April 26. Both shows will include actual play and interviews with players and coaches.

Besides the two local programs, a one-hour special on the Schenkel will be shown on a national cable network and a Chicago closed circuit network.

Frank Black, Savannah sportscaster, will host the two programs and will be joined on the microphone by two professional golfers, John Leach, Director of Golf of Savannah Inn and Country Club, and Tim Moss, Director of Golf of Moss Creek Plantation on Hilton Head, S.C.

Coaches Claim Anyone Capable Of Winning Schenkel Invitational

STATESBORO — Just ask a college golf coach how well his team's playing. The answer you get is about as straight as his number-five man's drives.

At least that's the tune of the guys who have a chance to win. One never wants to be boastful — might get the competition stirred up, as any student of the Vince Dooley School of Poormouth knows.

So the consensus of coaches at the 12th annual Chris Schenkel Intercollegiate Invitational is that most anyone is capable of winning. The CSI will be contested over 54 holes of stroke play, with a field of 18 teams, at the 6,860-yard Forest Heights Country Club today through Sunday.

Sure, Oklahoma State is seeded No.1, and it's the defending champion, but everyone is quick to point out that the Cowboys are playing without one of their top golfers, Tommy Moore, who is competing at the New Orleans Open PGA tournament this weekend. Tommy was missing last year when OSU, though.

So the tournament is "wide open," according to most everyone.

Alabama Coach Conrad Rehling and host Georgia Southern Coach Doug Gordin were taking a few putts prior to Thursday's coach's blitz, and ruminating on the upcoming event.

"Florida, State, Florida, N.C. State, Alabama, Tennessee — they're all strong," said Gordin. "I've been watching this region for four years, and it's as balanced as I've ever seen it."

Rehling reiterated Gordin's sentiments.

"Shoot, anyone can win. It's just a matter of who gets hot on a particular weekend," said the veteran Alabama coach. "It's as wide open as I've seen it in a long time."

Among the 18 teams competing, 11 of the top 12 in the Southeast are competing, a region traditionally strong in golf.

Of course, Oklahoma State comes from the southwest, which is a different region and throws a monkey wrench into the seedings.

Perhaps the hottest regional bunch right now is FSU, which has won the last three tournaments that went the

distance (they did not win one that was washed out after 18 holes).

"We've been playing well lately, but you know how golf is," said FSU Coach Don Veller. "We won our own tournament, the Junior-Senior at Still Waters (Alabama), and the Southeastern in Montgomery two weeks ago. But we had a different low man in every tournament, so that's kind of unusual."

One of those guys was a Welchman, Jonathan Morow. He shot a 63 in the first round with winds in the 40 mph range and eventually won the tournament.

"It was funny, but that was the first tournament he played in," said Veller. "He qualified fifth on the team."

Veller's other top scorers have been Mike Keymont and Steve Keppler of London, England.

Georgia, the No.2 seed, has not been quite up to snuff lately.

"We've been playing fair so far," said Bulldog Coach Dick Copas. "Not near as good as we're capable of, but we won the Gator in Gainesville, had a couple of seconds, a couple of fifths — stuff like that. But we've got an awful lot of talent. Maybe this could be the week."

Some of the individuals to watch include Oklahoma State's Willie Wood, who two weeks ago made the cut in the Masters. Steve Lowry of Alabama and Stewart Smith of Tennessee. Also, John Inman of N.C. State won the ACC Tournament last week, where Clemson scored an upset to take the team title.

Georgia Southern is seeded ninth, but the Eagles are still suffering the loss of All-American Jodie Mudd, who turned pro after the top 24 finish in the Masters and a high finish in the Heritage. The Eagles will field a team of Tripp Kunkle, Billy Booze, Rusty Hawkins, Danny Eckles and Steve Smart.


The tournament will be telecast by Alcam Enterprises of Savannah, which will tape a couple of highlight shows. They will be broadcast locally on WJCL TV Saturday at 7 p.m. and Monday at 7 p.m.

Eagles face strong field as Schenkel opens

Host Georgia Southern finds itself uncharacteristically seeded in the middle of the field as the 1982 Chris Schenkel Intercollegiate Golf tournament, which carries the informal title, "The Championship of the East", gets underway today at the Forest Heights Country Club here.

The Schenkel, which is played on the par 72, 6,860 yard course, will include 11 of the top 12 teams in the Southeast, according to the most recent rankings, plus two other clubs ranked high in the nation.

"I hope we can play up to our seed," said Doug Gordin, coach of the eighth seeded Eagles. "Our performances in our last few tournaments have not been that strong."

The Eagle coach is not resigned to his squad placing in the middle of the field, however.

"It is not unrealistic to think we could place in the top five," said Gordin. "But to do that, we will have to have all five golfers playing their best in every round."

Gordin will field his "most experienced" line-up in terms of matches played this year. The five-man squad will consist of Tripp Kuhlke, Billy Booé, Danny Eckles, Steve Smart and Rusty Hawkins.

Of that group, only Kuhlke, with a 74.9 average, is below 76 strokes a round this spring. Smart is averaging 76.4 and Booé 76.5, while Eckles and Hawkins are at 77.0.

Things could be better this weekend, however, as the Eagles play the course they are most familiar with.

An indication of how things may go is the play of Eckles, who last weekend played the Southeastern Invitational at the FHCC and shot a three round average of 74. The Statesboro senior has grown up on this course and has shot some very low numbers here. If he gets hot, he

could give the Eagles a big lift.

"Danny has been playing a lot better in the last two weeks," said Gordin. "If he keeps it up and plays this course like he knows how to, then he could do very well."

Gordin also feels the entire Eagle contingent is picking up in its game.

"Everyone has been playing better, if we can continue to peak, we will have a good shot at a higher finish."

Oklahoma State is seeded in the number one spot and has been installed as the pre-tournament favorite. The Cowboys, who have ventured east for the Schenkel only twice, have come away winners both times.

They should receive strong challenges from Georgia, Florida, Wake Forest and Florida State, who round out the top five seeded teams.

The remaining competitors which round out the 18-team field are Tennessee, Ohio State, North Carolina, Georgia Southern, Alabama, Auburn, Louisiana State, South Carolina, North Carolina State, Miami, Centenary, Marshall and Georgia Tech.

"This field is so strong and so competitive, it is very difficult to pick a winner," said Gordin. "Any of those five could win it, but probably there are another five with just about as strong a shot also."

Allcam Enterprises of Savannah is originating a first for the Schenkel, producing one and two hour TV packages. The tournament will be shown Saturday and Monday nights on WJCL-TV 22 in Savannah.

One hour packages will be shown in Augusta (WATV), Columbus (WLTZ), and Macon (WCWB) in Georgia. Florida stations in Gainesville (WJCB), Tallahassee (WELA), and Tampa (WFTF) will also air the event as well as a station in Columbia, S.C. (WLTX).

Golfers without Mudd in annual Schenkel Tournament

The twelfth annual Chris Schenkel Intercollegiate Invitational Golf Tournament is on tap for this weekend. The tournament is to be played at Statesboro's own Forest Heights Country Club.

An 18-team field will participate in the tourney, highlighted by defending Schenkel Champion Oklahoma State. The Cowboys have captured the top spot the past two years and they are favored to take the championship again.

Top golfers eye Schenkel

An 18 team field, including several of the nation's top collegiate golfers, highlights the 12th Annual Chris Schenkel Intercollegiate Invitational Golf tournament to be played at Forest Heights Country Club April 23-25. The Schenkel, which carries the informal title "The Championship of the East," includes 11 of the top 12 teams in the Southeast, according to the most recent rankings, plus two other clubs ranked high in the nation.

"The Southeast generally has the largest group of top ranked teams," said Southern golf coach Doug Gordin, "so our selection committee does

not have to venture very far to get a highly competitive field."

Heading the prestigious field will be defending Schenkel champion Oklahoma State. The Cowboys have ventured east for the Schenkel only twice, but have come away winners both times. Cowboy coach Mike Holder makes no secret of the fact he likes to have his club meet the stern competition the Schenkel has to offer.

Oklahoma State is another of the outside teams coming into the field which usually does quite well. Schenkel teams from the South Top Ten, as compiled by the NCAA Southeastern advisory committee and published in the April 9 issue of the Carolina Golf Reporter, include Alabama (tied for 11th in the rankings), Auburn (10th), Florida State (1st), Florida (7th), Georgia (3rd), Miami (9th), North Carolina State (4th), North Carolina (5th), South Carolina (tied, 11th), Tennessee (2nd) and Wake Forest (6th).

Teams rounding out the field include Centenary, Georgia Southern, Georgia Tech, Louisiana State and Marshall. Oklahoma State, to the surprise of very few, is the top seeded team in the Schenkel. Seedings for the event were set Golf World Magazine and are used by the tournament officials to set the opening day pairings. Georgia, Florida and Wake Forest, teams which usually play very well here, are placed right behind State. Florida State, which is ranked as the best team in the South right now, drew the fifth seed, followed by second ranked Tennessee.

The other half starts with Alabama's tenth seed, then comes Auburn, Louisiana State, South Carolina, North Carolina State, Miami, Centenary, Marshall and rounding out the 18-team field is Georgia Tech. The Schenkel is played on the par 72, 6,860 yard Forest Heights course and will be televised for the first time this season as cameras will pick up the final four holes of play on Saturday and Sunday.

The action will be edited into two one-hour highlight packages to be shown on WJCL-TV in Savannah, Ga. Saturday night at 7 p.m. and Monday night at 7 p.m. Also, the Schenkel scoreline (912-764-4430) will be open to give complete tournament results daily.

Georgia Second In Schenkel

Walton sparks Oklahoma State to first-round lead in Schenkel

Oklahoma State's Philip Walton turned in a 4-under-par 68 over a windswept Forest Heights Country Club course to lead the Cowboys to a five-stroke lead over Georgia in the opening round of the 12th annual Chris Schenkel Invitational golf tournament here Friday.

Walton's sizzling round provided the difference for Oklahoma State in the opening round, with Georgia getting a remarkably consistent performance throughout its team to post a 1-over 289, five shots off the Cowboys' 4-under 284 first-round total.

Oklahoma State, shooting for its third straight championship in one of collegiate golf's most prestigious annual events, also got a 1-under 71 from Andy Dillard, an even-par 72 from Tracy Phillips and a 1-over 73 from Masters participant Willie Wood.

Host Georgia Southern, playing its first tournament with the official absence of All-American Jodie Mudd, produced a solid, though not at 10-over 298.

Six teams came in at the "popular" 298 total, including Florida State, North Carolina,

Eckles-led Eagles finish first round in 7th-place logjam

The most intriguing—and disappointing—round of the day belonged to Ashwander, who played the back nine first and made the turn at a sensational 5-under 31, but then saw his score mushroom over the front nine to a 4-over 40 for his opening-round 71.

Ten players were tied for eighth at even-par 72, including three Georgia golfers, Mike Cook, Wayne Smith and Louis Brown. Georgia's fourth score came from Madden Hatcher, who finished at 1-over 73.

Statesboro native Danny Eckles turned in Georgia Southern's top score of the day, a 1-over 73. Billy Booze turned around a 39 on the front nine to finish at 2-over 74, and Tripp Kuhlike rebounded from a 40 at the turn to finish at 3-over 75, while Rusty Hawkins came in at 4-over 76 and Steve Smart finished at 5-over 77.

Eckles started strong in his round, going 2-under for the first six holes before struggling around the turn, bogeying 7, 8, 10 and 11 to go 2-over. The Eagle golfer came back to 1-over when he birdied the 18th hole. "I'm satisfied with my day," said Eckles. "Anything around par is okay on a day like this, when the wind is up."

"As a team I wish we'd done a little better, but it's not a bad start," Kuhlike, who had to turn around his day completely on the final nine holes, said he was happy to have finished as strong as he did.

team standings after the opening day were fourth-seeded Wake Forest and third-seeded Florida, which got off to disappointing starts and came in at 300 and 301, respectively, for 14th and 15th place in the 18-team field.

Following the six-team logjam at seventh were Miami, 13th at 299; Wake Forest and Florida; Marshall, 16th at 304; Centenary, 17th at 305; and Georgia Tech, 18th at 316.

Walton's 68 sends him into the second round with a one-shot lead over Ohio State's Chris Perry, who fired a 3-under 69.

Only five other golfers in the 90-player field managed to break par in the opening round, and all of those—Auburn's Walton Ashwander, LSU's Roy Biancalana, Oklahoma State's Andy Dillard, Tennessee's Kevin Janiga and Alabama's Steve Lowery—were tied for third at 1-under 71.

urned me around." Both Eagle golfers said the consciousness of Mudd, who passed up eis annual quarter of collegiate golf and made his pro debut last week in Tallahassee, adds pressure to the eagles' play.

Southern has played four tournaments without Mudd already this season while the Amateur Golfer of the Year prepared for and played in the Heritage Classic and the Masters, where he was low amateur. "We knew he was gone," said Jodieuhlike. "But it does put more pressure on you to be playing without him. You take off our top score and add Jodie's normal 70-72, and you're talking about a five- or six-stroke difference every day...."


Eckles agreed. "With Jodie on the team you knew if you had a really good day and shot an 80 or something, there was somebody there who could shoot a 67 and balancing it out. Now when you shoot that 80 you know you're hurting the team."

Cowboys Leading Schenkel

STATESBORO — When Oklahoma State golf coach Mike Holder was writing in his stat book, after totaling up all the scores, he put down a note on playing conditions. "Breezy," said Holder.

For everyone else, it was downright windy. And the gusty "breezes" took their toll on most folks.

The OSU Cowboys, who have won the Chris Schenkel Intercollegiate Invitational the last two years, vaulted into the lead with a 4-under par 284 over the 6,860-yard Forest Heights Country Club. For the Schenkel, five players compete for each team and the top four scores count each day.

Two-time winner University of Georgia was second at 289, with Ohio State and Auburn at 293.

Host Georgia Southern was tied for seventh at 298.

Oklahoma State's Philip Walton led the individual race with a 4-under par 68. Ohio State's Chris Perry was second with 69, with Walton Ashwander of Auburn, Kevin Janiga of Tennessee, Andy Dillard of Oklahoma State, Roy Biancalana of LSU and Steve Lowery of Alabama all tied at 1-under par 71.

Forest Heights was playing a little tough because of the wind, but it was nothing compared to what the Cowboys played in last week.

"At Wichita, Kansas, last week, one day the wind was out of south at 25 miles an hour and the next day it was out of the north at 30," said Holder. "It would blow you down."

Playing out there in Oklahoma, where the wind really howls, has to be an advantage, too.

For Friday's round, Walton wrote six birdies down on his card, offsetting a couple of bogeys for his number. He's not the average freshman at Oklahoma State. He's from Dublin, Ireland.

"It was 50-50 for me getting a scholarship," said Walton. "I played well in the Walker Cup, and I think that made the difference." And though he shot 68, he

wasn't all that happy with his game.

"I didn't hit the ball all that well," said Walton, "but I only had 26 putts. I've been playing pretty steady lately, but this is the first time I've been under 70."

Contrarily, Wells' number was solid all the way.

"I'm hitting the ball pretty good right now," said Wells, a sophomore. "And I'm putting pretty well. I shot 66 in the practice round. The greens here are great — they're smooth, and you can make a bold stroke at the hole without it going four or five feet by."

Ashwander had potentially a great round going. He started on the back nine and shot 5-under par 31; but lost it coming in.

"All in all, I'm pleased with the score," said Ashwander. "I eagled my second hole with a chip-in from about 60." He then birdied at Nos. 3, 8 and 9, but began losing strokes at the 11th.

"I hit the ball real solid for 13 holes, then the wind came up and I got a little nervous. Then all the things I was doing right before, I started doing wrong," said Ashwander.

"But basically I'm pleased. I got it under par and that boosts

my confidence," said Ashwander.

Holder was pleased with his team and especially pleased for Walton.

"Philip's a good player, and he finally showed what he could do. This is the first time he's broken 70, and I think he was more worried about it than I was. This has to help his confidence from here on in."

"And I'll take even par from here on in," said Holder of the team standings. "We're usually behind after the first day, but if you'll look back, we've won here with six or seven over par for the tournament. I'm very pleased with the team's play."

Hard-riding Cowboys Lead Chris Schenkel

STATESBORO — The Oklahoma State Cowboys are riding hard at the Chris Schenkel Intercollegiate invitational.

The 'Pokes lassoed a 10-shot lead over Georgia through 36 holes over the Forest Heights Country Club by cutting out a 290 for the day and a 574 total. They are threatening to leave everybody else riding drag.

The big pack eating the dust included Georgia (295—584), Ohio State (293—586), North Carolina State (290—587) and Tennessee (291—587).

The competition was attempting to have Oklahoma State player Willie Wood's putting iron declared illegal. He had it in the fire and was draining putts like a rustler with a running iron. Wood, who competed in and made the cut at the Masters two weeks ago, shot 68 Saturday and has a 1-shot lead over teammate Philip Walton, Ohio State's Chris Perry and Steve Lowery of Alabama.

But Cowboy Coach Mike Holder isn't putting the trophy over fireplace yet. He has a young team, and anything is possible.

"We can be unpredictable," said Holder. "We've had some disappointing final rounds before," said Holder, who's actually from

Odessa, Texas. "At Houston, we led by nine shots after two rounds, by going into the last round and were even going into the last hole. We lost by five. I'm playing two freshmen and a sophomore, so we don't have a lot of experience at some positions.

"Today, Willie played super, but no one else really played that well. It's just that no other team did either," said Holder.

But he's not really unhappy with his position.

"We played fairly solid," said Holder. "We managed to make to in some bad situations. There are still quite a few teams in it. Anything could happen, depending the weather or how they set the pin positions — there were a couple of brutal ones out there today."

Indeed, the chasers are running in a herd. Only 14 shots separate No. 2 Georgia with No. 13 Georgia Southern, the host school. "A lot could happen in here," said GSC Coach Doug Gordin, pointing out the meager spread between the Eagles and those in front. "These positions could change quite a bit on Sunday." STATESBORO — The best score that some of the top college golfers in the Southeast could post in the 12th annual Chris Schenkel Intercollegiate Invitational golf tournament was 4-under par 68 over the Forest Heights Country Club.

Oklahoma State had all three of those 68s, and all three by different people. That's balance, said that's why the Cowboys won the Schenkel for the third straight year.

OSU posted a three-day total of 860 and beat a fast-closing Tennessee team by 13 shots. Both schools shot 2-under par 288 under adverse conditions Sunday. The rain was coming down, it was cool and it was windy.

Cowboy All-American Willie Wood ducked his way through the weather for a final-round 71, good for a 54-hole score of 4-under par 212 for the individual title. He was third last year behind teammate Bob Twy and Ohio State's Joey Sindelar, who have since finished their eligibility.

A taped highlight show of the Schenkel will be presented on WJCL-TV, Channel 22, at 7 p.m. tonight.

"I just tried to keep the ball around the green and make pars, taking birdies if they came," said Wood, who earlier this year won the Pan American Intercollegiate in Monterrey, Mexico.

"I was pleased with the way we played," said Holder. "I was especially pleased with Dillard and Walton. It was nip and tuck as to who would play in our last two tournaments (the Big Eight Championship and the NCAAs), and they won spots on the squad. I hate to not have Jeff McMillian play, since he's a senior, but Philip and Andy won spots legitimately."

Wood made nine straight pars on the front, birdied the par-5 11th, but bogeyed the 12th. He came into 17th tied with Dillard, who had already finished.

At 17, Wood knocked his second to 10 feet for birdie, then saved par after a fat third shot at the par-5 18th.

"I actually played much better today than I did yesterday when I shot 68," said Wood. "I drove the ball real good, but I just didn't have as many putts fall."

Dillard, who posted his best finish of the year in a major college event, finished at 213. Stuart Smith of Tennessee finished fast with a 69 that included five birdies, winding up in third with 214. There was a

Wood, Cowboys cruise to third Schenkel title

Oklahoma State's golfers must be beginning to enjoy their trips to Statesboro more and more.

For the third straight year, the Cowboys came to the Chris Schenkel Invitational, and for the third straight year they took home the championship trophy.

And for the second straight year Oklahoma State also took home the individual title, with Willie Wood staying off a last-round charge by teammate Andy Dillard to take the individual title Sunday at the Forest Heights Country Club course.

"I don't know what to say," said Oklahoma State coach Mike Holder. "We just always seem to play well on this course."

Holder's Cowboys had to battle the wind and swirling rains Sunday to nail down the championship after holding the lead from start to finish.

With Philip Walton's 4-under 68 leading the Cowboys to a five-stroke lead over Georgia in the opening round and Wood's 68 enabling them to stretch the lead to 10 strokes over the Bulldogs in the second round Saturday, Oklahoma State again got a 4-under 68 round from one of its

players Sunday to take the win.

Sunday it was Dillard who put together the top round for the Cowboys, reeling off a 68 to put the pressure on Wood, who was tied with Dillard through 16 holes but managed to sink a 10-foot birdie putt on the 17th hole to take the one-stroke win with a 4-under 212.

Dillard finished the tournament at 3-under 213, while Tennessee's Stuart Smith, leading the Vols in a final-round charge into second place, carded a 3-under 69 Sunday to finish third in the individual race with a 2-under 214.

Three golfers—Georgia's Mike Cook, Alabama's Steve Lowery and Oklahoma State's Walton—wound up tied for fourth at 1-under 215, while North Carolina's John Inman was seventh at even-par 216. Wake Forest's Jerry Haas eighth at 217 and Tennessee's Kevin Janiga and Ohio State's Chris Perry tied for ninth at 218.

Statesboro native Danny Eckles of Georgia Southern led the Eagles with three straight 1-over 73 rounds to finish in a six-player tie for 11th at 3-over 215.

Georgia Southern opened the tournament fairly strong with a 10-over 288 that left the Eagles tied with five other teams for seventh place, but the Eagles faded to a 300 Saturday and a 304 Sunday to finish a whopping 42 strokes off Oklahoma State's pace, tied for 13th in the 18-team field with South Carolina.

Other Eagle scores included Tripp Kublak at 75-73-74—222, Steve Smart at 77-76-77—230, Rusty Hawkins at 76-78-80—234 and Billy Boede at 74-78-83—235.

Tennessee's Vols finished the opening round in fifth place and crepted up to fourth after the second round, but then mounted a strong charge behind Smith and Janiga Sunday that matched the Cowboys stroke for stroke.

While the Vols were unable to make up any ground on the Cowboys with their 2-under 286 Sunday, they were able to vault into a second-place finish, 13 strokes behind the Cowboys, but four shots ahead of third-place North Carolina State and six shots ahead of fourth-place North Carolina.

Georgia, seeded second in the tournament and maintaining that stature through the first two rounds, faded with an 8-over 296 Sunday to drop into fifth place at 16-over 880. 20 shots behind the Cowboys the Bulldogs had been chasing throughout the tournament.

Ohio State and Wake Forest were tied for sixth at 285, with Miami eighth at 890 and Alabama and Auburn tied for ninth at 895. Rounding out the field were Florida, 896; Florida State, 888; Georgia Southern and South Carolina, 902; Louisiana State, 905; Marshall, 911; Centenary, 912; and Georgia Tech, 928.

Most of Sunday's scores were sent soaring by the wind and rain that grew worse as the day went on. Oklahoma State, though, played as though the sun were shining brightly.

"I'm very pleased with the way we played," said Holder, who saw his Cowboys win their fourth tournament of the season.

"I'm especially happy with the way Andy (Dillard) and Philip (Walton) played."

Holder said Walton's play was the most surprising. "I knew he could play this well," said the Oklahoma State coach, "but he just hadn't done it all year."

The Cowboys' coach said he couldn't explain his team's stranglehold on the Schenkel.

"Some of the teams we were able to beat in this tournament beat us soundly a month ago at Guadalajara," said Holder. "I don't know—I've been really happy to get invited to this tournament three straight years; I never really thought we'd win it all three years."


