

U-M Aquatic Team Second In AAU Meet

ATLANTA — (AP)—Georgia Tech captured the final event, the 400-yard freestyle relay, to dethrone the University of Miami in the Southeastern AAU swimming championships Saturday night with a total of 41 points. Miami had 38 points.

A new record was established in seven races of the eight-event program. Bill Dudley, U. S. Olympic team member representing the New Orleans Athletic club, won the 200-yard and 100-yard freestyle events for a total of 12 points, good enough for sixth place in team competition.

Northwestern State college (Louisiana) took third place with 17 points, six of them by Carl Quaintance, winner of the diving competition.

Emory and Georgia tied for fourth place with 16 points. Other team scoring: New Orleans Athletic club, 12 points; Florida State, 6; Georgia Military Academy, 2, and Sewanee Military Academy, 1.
