SEATTLE, Wash. -- Curtis Genders, Florida State's All-America diving whiz from Sarasota, capped a brilliant career by winning the national collegiate low-board diving championship here last night.



Before a packed house at the University of Washington pool, Genders bested seven of the nation's finest divers in the onemeter finals of the 38th NCAA championships.

Leading through the preliminary and semifinal competition, Genders went through a near-flawless performance in last night's final round of dives. He succeeds Ohio State's Sam Hall, the 1960 champion, and broke a three-year reign on the one-meter crown by Ohio State divers.

Genders, who plans to enter law school after graduation from FSU this semester, is the first Southern diver to win the low-board title since Skippy Browning of Texas won it in 1952.

Genders will compete for the high-board (three-meter) crown today.

Two other Seminole stars saw action. Senior All-America Buck Hiles finished 10th in the 200-yard butterfly finals with a school-record time of 2:07.3.

Tallahassean Paul Thompson placed 13th in the 220-yard freestyle finals with a 2:05.8 time, a school record.

Hiles will compete in the 100 butterfly and Thompson in the 440-yard freestyle in the final day of competition today.
