The setting was different, but the results were the same . . . Florida State broke in its new Olympic-sized swimming pool with a 66-29 victory over an outmanned Georgia team yesterday.

A crowd of 1500 — largest ever to see a swimming meet in Tallahassee — watched the Seminoles win their second dual meet of the season.

Except for a brief showing in the opening event. Bim Stults kept his horses reined in, and relative unknowns saw most of the action.

Five meet records were set, two by Georgia's Roy Hall, who won the 200-yard—individual medley and the 200-yard back-stroke to become the meet's only dual winner.

The Seminoles led with their aces and backstroker Dick Acosta, breaststroker Doug Kruger, flyer Dick Abbott and freestyler Mike Blouin coasted home in the 400-yard medley relay in meet record time of 3:48.8. The time however, is six seconds off the school record set by virtually the same group last year.

John Rangeley swam the freestyle leg for the school record. which was set at the NGAA Championships 1 as t spring. Rangeley, a senior from Birminghum, Ala., won the 50-yard freestyle yesterday.

Distance man Gene Dayfon a consistant winner for the past two years — broke his own meet record in the 500-yard freestyle event with a time of 5:22.3.

One performance which brought a smile to Stults' face was sophomore Tom Lloyd's first place finish in the 200-yard freestyle. Loyd's meet record was 1:56.3.

Other FSU winners were Don-Hartke in the 200 yard butterfly, Charles Robertson in the 100 freestyle, and Ed Helquist in the 200 breaststroke.

Three meter diving was held for the first time at FSU, and Larry Profumo adapted well to the new height, showing no ill effects from a shoulder injury which had him on the doubtful list this season.

Teammate Neal Allen, probably the foremost diver in the south, was held-out of competition, but soph Bob Cruickshank finished third behind Georgia Dan Gartiez. The Seminoles travel to Gainesville Saturday for the traditional meet with Florida's Gators, the defending Southeastern Conference champions.

One of the few coaches at Florida State which holds an edge over the Gators. Stults has won 12, lost five and tied one in competition with Florida.
