## Florida State Highlights

Florida State 85, Wake Forest 28

At a double dual meet in Durham, N.C., the Seminoles won every event against Wake Forest and easily swam to an 85-28 win over the ACC school.

Florida State 71, Duke 42

In the second portion of that double dual meet in Durham, N.C., Florida State won eight of 13 events while coasting to a 71-42 win over Duke. Steve Allbritton set a new school record in the 50 freestyle with a time of 20.701 seconds.

Florida State 75, Tulane 38

The Seminoles defeated their only Metro 7 opponent of the season, 75-38. Keith McConnell swam a 1:55 in the 200 backstroke and Brad Stetson raced to a 16:09 in the 1650 freestyle.

Florida State 69, South Carolina 44

FSU avenged last year's loss to the Gamecock's of South Carolina, 69-44, by winning the medley relay, taking second in the 1000 freestyle, placing one-two in the 200 freestyle and winning the 50 freestyle and the individual medley.

Florida 85, Florida State 28

Cold weather prevented fast times but not the excitement. Rival Florida, with clearly a stronger team, dumped the Tribe 85-28 in Tallahassee. Florida lost the medley relay by 1/10th of a second which was the only race of six, within 4/10ths of a second, that Florida State won.

Florida State 69, Georgia 44

Florida State wasted little time getting back on the winning trail by defeating Georgia 69-44. Freshman Barry Griffin swam a school record 9:34.5 in the 1000 freestyle while sprinter Steve Allbritton and diver Craig Lindell took two wins each.

Steve Albritton, Freestyle, Sophomore, Clearwater, Fla.--Holds school record in the 50 freestyle with a 20.701 time...has led the Top 10 college teams for three straight weeks this year in the 50 freestyle and is ranked in the Top 10 in the 100 freestyle.

Keith McConnell, Backstroke, Sophomore, Tampa, Fla.—Holds school records in the 100 yard backstroke (52.29) and the 200 yard backstroke (1:54.37)...was an NCAA qualifier as a freshman...one of the most highly-sought high school swimmers in the state.

Barry Griffin, Freestyle, Freshman, Jacksonville, Fla.—Broke school mark in the 1000 freestyle with a time of 9:34.5...also swims the 500 freestyle...combines with Brad Stetson to make a tough one-two punch in the distance events.

Brad Stetson, Freestyle, Junior, Glenview, Ill.--Holds Florida State records in the 1650 freestyle with a time of 15:54 and the 1000 freestyle at 9:34.90 set in '77...one of the most consistent performers...qualified for NCAA last year.

Doug Schlak, Freestyle, Senior, Arlington Heights, Ill.--Member of the record breaking 800 freestyle relay team that won the 1977 National Independent Championships...set FSU mark of 6:47.77 with Steve Meisel, Bob Gordon and Steve Collins.

Kevin Marshburn, Breaststroke, Senior, Winter Haven, Fla.—Holds Seminole record in the 100 breaststroke with a 58.06 time and shares the record as a member of the 400 medley relay team...Florida State's top contender for national honors... a National AAU finalist last season.

Kevin Connell, Individual Medley and Breaststroke, Junior, Poughkeepsie, N.Y.—set school record in the 200 breaststroke in 1977 with a time of 2:06.62... a strong candidate for NCAA honors in that event this season...plays key role in 200 IM event.... finalist in 1975 National Junior Olympics.
