BLACKSBURG, Va. — Florida State came back Friday night to jump from third place to first place in the men's Metro swimming and diving championships.

Although Florida State won only two of Friday's six finals, they had swimmers in all of the championship events.

FSU's first place finishes were turned in by Keith McConnell in the 100 Backstroke, with a new Metro meet record time of 52.047 and by Martin Perry in the 100 Breaststroke with a time of 58.495.

The Seminoles won only two of the final night's events Saturday, but with swimmers in every final, they only had to compete to add to their lead.

FSÚ's Keith McConnell took the 200-yard backstroke while Craig Lindell won the three-meter diving with a score of 500.65, a new Metro meet record.

Helping built the Seminole score Saturday were Jim Hamilton with a second in the 200 backstroke and Nelson Simmons with a third in the 200 breaststroke.

McConnell was named the meet's Outstanding Swimmer on the basis of his victories in the 100 and 200 backstroke.
