Wood, the fourth ranking player in his home country, the Union of South Africa, had to come from behind to defeat Paul Kantrowich_of_Army, 5-7, 6-1, 6-3. Second = seeded Charles Shaffer a North Carolina basketball as well as tennis player, and third - seeded Walter Ochriein of Army were eliminated.

the quarter - fina after alimb nating eighth - ranked Mark Rose of Rochester, 6-2, 6-4 earlier in the day.

John Harrison of North Carolina had an easy time defeating Ochrlein 6-2, 6-2.

The other semi - finalist is Ochrlein's older brother, Dick, also of Army, The elder Ochry iein, who was not ranked, defeated Paul Bennett of Florida State, 6-0, 6-0.

Ochriein will face Wood and Harrison will play Caton in the semi-final round tomorrow.

The varsity singles and doubles finals are scheduled for Saturday.

The FSU duo outlasted another stubborn pair from North Carolina, Charlie Shaffer and Keith Stoneman, 7-9, 6-3, 11-9 in a semifinal match.

Harrison and Hoehn qualified by nudging brothers Walt and Dick Ochrlein of Army, 8-6, 9-7.

In other action yesterday, sec-ond-seeded Walter Johnson of Georgia Tech upset top-ranked Bill Dixon of Michigan 6-1, 6-2, b to win the freshman singles title.

After a 45-minute rest, Wood
paired with Don Caton for a
match with Harrison and Ted
Hoehn of North Carolina in the
doubles finals. The Tar Heels
won 10-8, 2-6, 9-7, 2-6, 6-3 in a
marathon 3½ hour match.

Rain, which had delayed the finals for a day, ended Sunday, but the sun's rays caused some more difficulty. Wood's gold medal magnified the rays, set fire to a plastic case — and discolored the medal. It will be replaced, efficials said.
