

## FSU Tennis Team Bids in Nationals

PRINCETON, N. J. —

Florida State's tennis team will make its first bid for the NCAA title here this week. The Seminoles, who in the past have had only individuals represented, will have four singles and two doubles teams entered.

Senior Dave Danielson, who played the No. 1 spot most of this season, leads the group.

"If he is right," Coach Lex Wood, "Danielson is capable of winning several matches here. They will be playing on clay

courts here, and that is to his liking."

Earlier in the year Danielson showed his potential when he defeated the nationally fourth ranked collegiate player, Danny O'Bryant of Trinity College, at the Pan-American Intercollegiate Tournament.

"Dave was at his best early," said Wood, "but he tired toward the end of the season and his game fell off. He appears to be rested and back in top form again."

Herb Rapp, Bob Marcher and Randy Jobson complete the entries.

Rapp and Marcher could be especially strong in the doubles. They combined this year in the Jacksonville International and reached the finals after beating several highly regarded teams, including Nicky Kalo-Gardner-Maloy and Mike Belkin-Lee Steele.

"Defeating people like that is extremely lucky," said Wood, "but it does show that this team has potential."

"Almost everything depends on the draw in a tournament like this. If we can get a good draw for one or two of our entries and then can take advantage of it, we will be in good shape."

"I think every one of our boys are capable of moving right on up if he plays up to his potential and gets a break on the draw."

The tourney is single elimination.

# Tribe Netters Win Matches
