

Tribe netters gain victories

CORPUS CHRISTI, Tex. — Florida State compiled three points during first round action here Monday in the NCAA national tennis championships with a pair of singles victories and one in the doubles.

Gordon Jones and Enrique Andrade posted the singles victories and the doubles team of Zeca Schmidt and Dave Calvert won its way into the second round.

Jones defeated Clint Hubbard of SMU 6-3, 6-2, while Andrade turned back Doug Austin of Long Beach State 1-6, 6-3, 6-3.

Schmidt and Calvert eliminated Tom Masser and Bill Clark of Arizona 6-4, 6-3 in the doubles.

The Seminoles' pair of Schmidt and Clive Rothwell were cut down in the singles and the doubles team of Roth-

well and Jones was eliminated.

Schmidt was eliminated by Brian Mitchell of Missouri 7-6, 6-1 and Rothwell was cut out by Dave King of Trinity 5-7, 6-3, 6-1.

FSU's Jones puts scare in top-seed

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CORPUS CHRISTI, Tex. — Florida State's Gordon Jones put a scare into top-seeded Billy Martin here today before falling 6-4, 7-5 in the fourth round of the Men's NCAA tennis tournament.

The unseeded Seminole was leading the UCLA freshman 5-3 in the second set and it appeared as if he was going to force Martin into three sets.

But Martin rallied and broke service at 5-3, held service to tie the set at five, broke service again and then held service for the match that eliminates Jones, the sole surviving Seminole.

Tuesday Jones defeated Georgia's Tim Delaney and the University of Florida's Juan Diaz. Delaney fell in a morning match 7-6, 6-2 while Diaz, the SEC's net champion, was eliminated in the afternoon 3-6, 6-2, 6-3. Diaz had defeated Jones when the two schools met earlier this year.

The final FSU doubles team remaining was upended Tuesday by Princeton's Bill Dutton and Robert Fisher. Zeca Schmidt and Dave Calvert were 2-6, 6-3, 6-2 victims in second round play.

The Seminoles were far back in the pack in team standings and with Jones the only player remaining through Tuesday, stood no chance of finishing in the top five.

UCLA leads the race with 14 points followed by the University of Miami and Trinity with 13 points and SMU, Stanford and San Jose State with 11.
