PHILADELPHIA, Pa.—Senior Jerry Henderson set a new school record in the javelin to pace a strong Florida State effort in the Penn Relays here yesterday.

Villanova was the outstanding team in the meet, winning three relays, the sprint medley, the distance medley and the mile.

The "race of the century" in the 100-yard dash between Duke's Dave Sime and Abilene Christian's Bobby Morrow failed to come off as Morrow didn't run because of a pulled leg muscle. Sime won the race in 9.7.

Henderson fired the javelin 217 feet, four inches to break his own school mark of 215 feet, six and a half inches, set two weeks ago against Florida.

State's sprint medley team finished second in that event, while setting another school record. The Seminole quartet of Jim Casteel, Doyle Ruff, Jack Terwilliger and Mike Conley finished about five yards behind Villanova in an unofficial time of 3:24.0.

The FSU mile relay team, composed of the same four men, was forced to drop out of the race after Ruff collided with another runner on the second lap and pulled a leg muscle.

State was running third at the time of Ruff's collision, with about 10 teams entered in the race.

The other Seminole entry, junior Dick Elwood, pole vaulted 13 feet, but failed to place. There was a three-way tie for first in the event, at 14 feet, four inches.

"I thought our boys did very good," commented Seminole coach Mike Long. "When you get a boy hurt it sort of puts a damper on it and gives you a let down."

"Up until the time that Ruff was hurt, FSU was performing very well. We would have given them a good race in the mile if Ruff hadn't gotten hurt. We were in as good a position as could be expected that early in the race," Long asserted.

A crowd of 35-40,000 witnessed the meet, one of the outstanding track events of the year in the east.
