

GAINESVILLE (AP)—The twin-kle-toed Styron twins faststepped Northeast Louisiana State's track team to four record performances and domination of the 19th annual Florida Relays Saturday.

For the second time in three years the Kearney-Raybun trophy for the outstanding individual of the day went to Don and Dave Styron. They surpassed a great performance which won them the award in 1960.

Northeast Louisiana won the unofficial team title with 48½ points—well ahead of second place Alabama with 33.

Florida State finished in third place with 30½ points. For the Seminoles, Terry Long finished second in the 250 hurdles, Craig Johnson finished third in the 100, Jeff Clark was third in the shot put and fifth in the discus, and Ed Hayes was in a 6-way tie for second in the pole vault.

The 2-mile relay team of Dick Roberts, Leon Smith, Jack Brocksmith and Bill Davis set a new school record of 7:40.0, while finishing third.

FSU's mile relay team was second, the sprint medley unit was fourth and the 440 relay team was tied for fifth.

The only record the Styrons didn't take part in of five new ones set this afternoon was the two mile run. Jerry Nourse of Duke established a mark of 9 minutes 5.4 seconds that wiped out a record set in 1958 by Leonard Edelen of Minnesota at 9:10.5.

Nourse lapped several men in his eighth trips around the asphalt-based track and was way ahead of his competitors.

Don Styron lowered the 120-yard high hurdles record to 13.8 seconds. With his brother Dave he helped Northeast set marks in the quartermile, sprint medley and mile relays.

Dave Styron won the 100-yard dash in near record time of 9.6 seconds to round out a great performance by the twins.

A blustery wind blew through a gray afternoon and rained threatened but never came.

An official wind gauge at track level showed zero at the time. Nevertheless the Styrons said they were well aware that they were bucking a strong breeze.

In Northeast Louisiana's record quartermile relay performance, Charles McDonald and Owen Owen joined the Styron twins with a time of 41.7 seconds. It bettered the 1960 record by Northeast Lou-

isiana—also paced by the Styron brothers—of 41.6.

In the record sprint medley performance Don Styron and Dave Styron each ran 220 and gave a narrow lead to Don Eiland for the closing half mile.

Eiland met and threw off the

challenge of Auburn's Jim Dozier down the stretch and the relay time of 3 minutes, 23.1 seconds erased an old mark 3.24.6 by Florida State in 1958.

In the closing event, the mile relay, the Styrons each ran a quarter mile along with John Baker and Walker for a record time of 3 minutes 11.9 seconds. This surpassed the mark set by the Styron-led Northeast Louisiana foursome of 1960.

The college freshmen and junior college division provided one of the highlights of the relays when Malcolm Robinson, a 26-year-old Englishman who is a freshman at the University of Southwestern Louisiana, ran the anchor leg of the distance medley relay and pulled from fifth to first.

Robinson was unofficially timed at 4 minutes 14 seconds for the mile he ran.
