An inspired Florida State track team fought tough odds and a solid University of Tennessee team Monday in Knoxville, and came out with a 75-70 in a meet decided in the final event.

The win, coming as it did over the Southeastern Conference indoor champ (by virtue of winning the 1964 Coliseum Relays at Montgomery, Ala in January), and on the heels of an equally - close 74-71 victory over Florida Saturday, capped what FSU Coach Mike Long termed 'probably the greatest track weekend we've eyer had in my time at FSU."

Tennessee, rising in Southern brack cicles, swept through the distance events and threatened to upset the favored Seminole field events specialists. But 240 - pound senior Al Williams turned in a double win in the shot put and discus, to tie the meet in the last field event.

Williams put the shot only 46.
feet, six and three eighths inches, but it was good enough to win. All times and distances were below par. Rain in Knoxville had been so heavy that the meet was switched from the UT track to a local high school oval.

Williams added a winning discus throw of 146 feet, six and one - fourth inches. FSU's Mile Relay team came bome in 3:26 flat in the event that decided the issue. Doug Ferry, quarter—mile runner—up behind McDaniel, teamed with Tom Houston, McDaniel, and Hank Raehn to win the last event of the day.

The Seminoles, missing injured miler Dick Roberts, had driven to Knoxville on the day of the meet. And they had defeated Florida in a dual meet Saturday, giving them one day's rest. Long said afterwards that, strangely enough, FSU participants in the Tennessee meet appeared fresher than the UT runners.
