

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Durable distance ace Vic Zwolak anchored Villanova to victories Friday in the only two relay finals—the four-mile and distance medleys—in the 70th Penn Relays.

Jerry McDaniel, Florida State, was second man in the special 220 heap, striding the distance in 21.2.4 against the 22.2 mark set by Henry Carr, of Arizona State in a field of five.

Florida State also was among the University 440 relay qualifiers. Southern Methodist set the best time of 41.0 against additional competition from Oklahoma, Illinois, Houston, and Iowa.

Individual champions crowned in this first of two days of competition were Ernie Soundek of Michigan, with a 175-3 toss in the discus; Norman Tate of North Carolina College, 24-11 in the broad jump; Olney Croasdale of Harvard, with a 179-10 hammer throw, and Vin McCandle of Manhattan, 51.5 in the 400-meter hurdles.

Other finals are scheduled Saturday, with Villanova the team to beat in the vast field of more than 5,000 athletes.

In addition to the relays proper, former Yale captain Jay Luck, now running for the New Haven Track Club, set a carnival record 51.2 in the Olympic development 400-meter hurdles.

The event is one of 15 special events on the program for athletes attempting to win a spot on the team that will represent the United States in Tokyo this fall.

Zwolak, the NCAA and IC4A cross country champion, ran the anchor mile on each of the winning Wildcat relay teams. His 4:07.3 anchor propelled Villanova to a 16:50.7 four-mile relay.

His 4:13.7 effort two hours later held off a gallant try by Georgetown in 9:55.8. Georgetown was timed in 9:58.4. LaSalle, running in the second of three sections with the winner determined by time, took third place with a time of 10:02.6.

Tommy Sullivan, who ran the third leg on both winners, was the key to the distance medley decision. He increased the Villanova lead from three yards to about 25 on his 3:03.1 three-quarter of a mile. Zwolak then held off Georgetown's Joe Lynch.

In the four-mile, Zwolak pulled away from a two-yard lead over Seton Hall to about 40 yards and won it going away. Defending champion Fordham was a distant third, another 60 yards back.

Two other returning champions were shorn of their crowns. Bob Moreland of Michigan State failed to qualify for Saturday's finals in the 100-yard dash and John Bakkenesen of Harvard in the discus.

Moreland ran fifth in his qualifying heat, won by Odell Barry of Findlay in 9.9. Bakkenesen's discus throw of 166-10 was second to Soudek's winning effort of 175-3.

Probably one of the most outstanding individual shows, was Wendell Mottley's brilliant 46.9 quarter-mile that anchored Yale to a 3:17 victory in the Heptagonal Games Association mile relay.

Luck's 400-meter record trimmed 6-10ths of a second off his own carnival record for the distance, but is two full seconds off the world mark.
