MONTGOMERY, Ala. (AP) Florida State won first and second in the final event, the pole vault, and walked away with the championship for the fourth year in a row in the Coliseum Indoor Relays here Saturday.

Georgia Tech, the runner-up, had a lead over Florida State until the pole vault was finished. Bill Jackson, breaking his old record by six inches. won the pole vault at 15 feet 7 inches, and his Florida State teammate, Jay Young, was second. Both cleared the same height but Jackson awarded first place on fewer misses.

For Young, it was his best effort ever, by a full foot and an inch. His best up to this point had been 14-6 and his best this year 14-0. Jackson's best Leap previously this year had been 15-0.

Florida State finished the day with 45 points. Georgia Tech had 38. Brevard of North Carolina was third with 22 and Tulane had 18.

Voted the outstanding performer was Brevard's miler, Reginald McAfee. His 4:08.5 performance clipped almost four seconds off the old record of 4:12.2 set by Andy Russell of Lipscomb in 1969.

Records also fell in the 60yard dash, the 880-yard run, the mile relay and the triple jump.

Florida State's Jack Wise won the 1,000-yard run with a time of 2:16.5, while Ken Misner was third in the mile run, George Kaiser third in the 880 and Barry Smith fourth and Jim Brown fifth in the 60-high hurdles.

The Seminoles competing in the meet without of their outstanding runners, 440-ace Joel Garren who suffered a spike wound Thursday just before the team left Tallahassee for

Montgomery.

Florida A&M's Ray Robinson was second, Joe Ramsey third and Michial Gordan fifth in the 60-yard dash which was won by James Batie of Troy State in record-tying time of 6.1 seconds. Batie and Robinson had set that record Friday night in separate qualifying heats.
