## FSU Wins Two-Mile In Relays

Special to the Democrat GAINESVILLE - Florida State posted a 7:28.7 to edge Florida in the 2 - mile relay here yesterday in the annual Florida Relays.

The Seminoles, boasting poss i b l y their best track team ever, had juniors Bob Fleming, Bob Brooks, Tyrone Frederick and sophomore Wes Koenig in the winning relay.

Florida ran a 7:29.8 and Furman was third at 7:33.2.

Florida A&M took second in the 880 - yard relay with a 1:25.2. Memphis State won it at 1:24.0.

In the high school events, Jefferson County of Monticello set two new meet records. The Class 2 - A powerhouse ran an 8:14.4 to win the two - mile relay and a 3:25.7 to capture the mile relay.

## Forbes Wins 100 Again At the Florida Relays

Special to the Democrat GAINESVILLE - Tallahassee's two universities came away without any winners in the Florida Relays Saturday, but Leon High's Jesse Forbes held up the city's standards by walking away with the 100-yard dash in his division for the second year in a row

Forbes, who has signed a football - track grant - in - aid with Florida State, ran 9.7 in the finals of the event. He won with the same time last year.

In the university division Florida State finished second in three events and third in two, while Florida A&M was second in one and third in one.

Mike Lee and Jeff Nedimyer of FSU were second and third in the high jump. Lee tied Nedimyer's school record with a 6-10 leap, while the latter had to settle for 6-8 this time. The winner, Bill Hancock of Southern Illinois, also had 6-10, but had fewer misses.

Danny Smith was second in the 129-yard high hurdles and his 13.6 time also tied that of winner Charles Foster of North Carolina Central.

FSU's other second-place finish was in the sprint medley relay with a 3:19.4 time.

FAMU's 440 · yard relay team ran 40.5 for second in that event, while Rey Robinson was third in the 100 - yard dash with 9.8 and FSU's Osborn Brown third in the shot put with a heave of 53 - feet, four inches.

Phil Southerland, a professor in the FSU law school, placed second in the marathon run with a time of two hours, 42:24.3.
