

Givens wins gold for U.S.

EDMONTON, Alberta — Tennis player Richard Galien and Florida State sprinter Randy Givens won the United States' seventh and eighth gold medals in the XII World University Games on Sunday.

Galien, a 22-year-old from Pepperdine University, defeated Dan Goldie, 19, of Stanford 6-1, 6-4, 7-6 for the men's singles championship.

Givens edged her FSU teammate, Marita Payne, in the women's 200 meters. Givens was clocked in 22.47 seconds. Payne, who ran with Givens on the Seminoles' NCAA record-setting 400-meter relay team this year, did a 22.62.

On the 10th and next-to-last day of the games, the Soviet Union had 52 gold medals and 96 total medals, easily retaining the team title it won in 1981 in Bucharest.

The United States, meanwhile, owned seven golds and 44 total medals. Canada and the Peoples Republic of China had captured six golds apiece.

Greg Louganis of the United States was heavily favored to win his second gold. He led the platform preliminaries into the final rounds Sunday night.

Orville Peterson of Campbell (N.C.) College, the first-day leader in the men's decathlon, suffered a leg injury while pole vaulting Sunday night and was forced to withdraw after eight of the sport's 10 events. The new leader was Canadian Dave Steen with 67.11 points.
