

# Moses, Lewis win trial heats

LOS ANGELES - Edwin Moses extended his winning streak to 101 races in the men's 400-meter intermediate hurdles and Carl Lewis, the world's top-ranked men's 100-meter sprinter, powered his way into Sunday night's final at the U.S. Olympic Track and Field Trials with an impressive semi-final victory.

Former Florida State athlete Walter McCoy finished second in his heat of the men's 400 with a 45.39 clocking. FSU's Brenda Cliette ran a 51.92 for third in her heat of the women's 400. Michelle Finn of FSU took a third in the 100 with 11.6 and fifth in the 200 with 11.6, and FSU's Randy Givens finished third in a women's 200-meter heat an 11.4.

Moses got off to his usual flawless start, opened a commanding lead, then slowed the pace, finishing in 47.58 seconds.

In finishing second, Iowa State freshman Danny Harris lowered his world junior record from 48.81 to 48.02.

Tranel Hawkins won the other semifinal in 48.52, and was followed by Phillips (49.20), Bart Williams (49.41) and Bernie Holloway (49.82).

Lewis, running into a strong headwind of 2.1 meters per second, beat a powerful field with a sparkling time of 10.15 seconds, despite easing up at the finish.

Kirk Baptiste closed fast to take second place in 10.28 seconds, a step ahead of world-record holder Calvin Smith, timed in 10.29.

Mel Lattany, owner of the fastest time in the world this year and the fastest ever at sea level, claimed the other final spot in that heat, finishing fourth in 10.37.

In the other semifinal heat, Ron Brown was the winner in 10.18, followed by NCAA and national champion Sam Graddy of the University of Tennessee in 10.19, two-time Olympian Harvey Glance in

10.22 and Emmitt King in 10.30.

Earlier, Evelyn Ashford, the world record holder in the women's 100-meter dash, rallied from a relatively slow start to win her first-round heat.

Ashford, the 1979 and 1981 World Cup champion, with a best clocking of 10.79 seconds last year at Colorado Springs, Colo., was timed in 11.29 in advancing into Sunday night's second round. The 100 semifinals and final will be held today.

Alice Brown, winner of the 1980 Olympic Trials, had the fastest time in the four first-round heats of the women's 100, clocking 11.25.

The other heat winners were Jeanette Bolden (11.32) and Kathrene Wallace (11.47).

Another world-record holder, Tom Petranoff, easily moved through the qualifying of the men's javelin throw and into today's final.

The leading javelin qualifier was Bob Roggy, the former American record holder, at 280-8.

Valerie Brisco-Hooks, the American record holder in the women's 400, cruised to victory in her second-round heat, clocking 51.77.

Chandra Cheeseborough, the former national record holder, had the fastest time in the three heats, 50.87, while sisters Denean and Sherri Howard finished 1-2 in the other heat in 51.83 and 51.84, respectively.

The semifinals will be held today.

## Givens misses U.S. team by .01 second

LOS ANGELES - Florida State's Randy Givens finished fifth in the women's 100-meter final Monday night at the U.S. Olympic Track and Field Trials, missing a spot on the U.S. 400-meter relay team by .01 second.

Givens, the NCAA 100-meter champion, ran 11.35, just behind Diane Williams who earned a place on the relay team with a time of 11.34.

Givens' chances for an Olympic berth now hinge on the 200-meter dash, with the first heats on Thursday and the finals Friday.

Evelyn Ashford, the world record holder in the 100,

nipped 1980 Olympic Trials champion Alice Brown to win Monday's race in 11.18.

Ashford, not exhibiting her usual acceleration through the entire race, held on to win. Brown was the runner-up in 11.20 and Jeanette Bolden finished third in 11.24.

Carl Lewis, the world record holder in the long jump, easily qualified for the event's final, clearing a modest 27 feet, 6½ inches Monday in the U.S. Olympic Track and Field Trials.

In Monday night's first final, the men's javelin throw, veteran Duncan Atwood got off the best toss of his career, 306 feet, 7 inches, in easily winning the event — and a berth on the U.S. Olympic team.

Tom Petranoff, the world record holder at 327-2,

finished second at 278-4, and lightly regarded Steve Roller grabbed the final spot on the team, finishing third at 272-4.

Earlier, Greg Foster, the world champion in the men's 110-meter high hurdles, smashed two records and ran the fastest time in the world this year in winning his opening-round heat.

His clocking shattered the Olympic Trials record of 13.26 set by Renaldo Nehemiah in 1980 and broke the Los Angeles Coliseum mark of 13.20 established by Foster last year during the United States-East German dual meet.

Meanwhile, Karin Smith, the four-time national champion in the women's javelin, uncorked the longest throw by an American this year, 203 feet, 8 inches.

### Randy Givens breaks Olympics trials record twice

LOS ANGELES — Florida State's Randy Givens twice broke the Olympic trials 200-meter dash record on Thursday, running the event in 22.67.

Givens broke the old record of 22.92 with a clocking of 22.91 in her first heat and then came back and broke her own mark.

Givens, Brenda Cliette and Janet Davis have all advanced to the 200-meter semifinals today. Cliette ran a 23.12 in the 200 meters, good enough for third place in her heat, and Davis finished fifth in her heat with a time of 23.85.

Angie Wright, a 1983 graduate of FSU, made the Olympic team in the 400-meter hurdles with a time of 55.33. She finished second overall.

Meanwhile, American record holder Evelyn Ashford pulled up during a heat of the 200-meter dash in the trials and discus thrower Mac Wilkins, the 1976 Olympic champion, said he probably would quit after this season.

Ashford won the Olympic Trials 100-meter dash Monday night, after injuring her right hamstring during a semifinal heat.

### McCoy is Olympic alternate

Former Florida State track star Walter McCoy has made the United States Olympic track team as an alternate in the 400 meters and will run on the 4x100 relay team during a preliminary heat in the 1984 Games.

FSU track coach Dick Roberts said on Friday that coaches for the U.S. track team have designated the top six finishers in Thursday's 400-meter final as the U.S. delegation in the event.

McCoy finished fifth in the 400-meter final in 45.51, after posting the third fastest time, 45.06, during qualifying rounds.

Florida State qualified two in the women's 200-meter dash on Friday. Randy Givens and Brenda Cliette each advanced to the final by finishing 1-2 in their semifinal heat. Givens won the heat in 22.66, and Cliette finished second at 23.04. Janet Davis failed to qualify for the finals.
