

FSU in first after record rounds

GREENVILLE S.C. — Michelle Guilbault shot a course-record 69 Thursday to pace the Florida State women's golf team to the first round lead of the Lady Paladin Invitational.

Led by Guilbault and Marla Anderson, who tied with Martha Zimmerman of Miami-Dade South for second place with a round of 70, FSU carded a four-player total of 292. Though four strokes over par, the FSU total established the one-round record for the tournament.

In second place of the 24-team tournament is Georgia (296) followed by North Carolina (301). Miami is in fourth (304), with Florida back in ninth (308). The host school Furman is in 14th place (315).

The most recent issue of Golf World ranks Miami, Georgia and FSU as the top three teams in the nation. For FSU, which has won three of the previous six tournaments it entered this year, the ranking represents its highest ever.

Other FSU players in the tournament include Jane Geddes who shot a 75, Lisa Young (78) and Paula Slivinsky (82).

The tournament continues through Saturday.

FSU women win golf tourney

FURMAN, S.C. — Florida State's women's golf team shot a 300 total Saturday to win the Lady Paladin Invitational by 14 strokes.

FSU, which finished at 887, broke the course record. Tulsa was second at 901, followed by Georgia (905) and Miami (906). Florida finished eighth at 929.

FSU's Michelle Guilbault had a 75 to finish with a three-day winning total of 214. She broke Nancy Lopez's and Betsy King's 54-hole tournament record of 219.

FSU's Marla Anderson was third at 218.

Other FSU scores were Jane Geddes (227), Lisa Young (229) and Paula Bunkowski (240).

Guilbault lifts FSU to 11-stroke lead

GREENVILLE, S.C. — The Florida State women's golf team continued its record-setting ways Friday as it pushed to an 11-stroke lead after two rounds of the 24-team Lady Paladin Invitational.

FSU's Michelle Guilbault, who shot a course-record 69 Thursday, still leads the tournament. She fired a 70, leaving her five under-par overall.

Guilbault needs a 79 in today's final round to set a 54-hole tournament record beating Nancy Lopez and Betsy King, who fired three-over par 219's in 1976 and 1977 respectively.

The Lady Seminoles shot a four-player 295 that, coupled with Thursday's 292, established a two-round tournament record of 587.

Georgia, which trailed by four strokes Thursday, is second at 598. Tulsa is third (602), followed by Miami (605) and North Carolina (612).

FSU's Marla Anderson is tied for second with Miami's Penni Hamel at 143.
