Head Coach ≡ *JoAnne Graf*

During the first five years of her seven-year tenure at Florida State, softball coach JoAnne Graf achieved national recognition as one of the top slow-pitch collegiate coaches in the nation as she guided her team to back-to-back national championships in 1981 and 1982.

When Florida State made the switch to fast-pitch softball in 1984, many wondered whether a top slow-pitch coach could successfully lead a fast-pitch program. In the past two years, Graf has silenced the critics and shown her expertise in the fast-pitch arena.

Her two fast-pitch squads have amassed over 90 victories and five tournament championships and in 1985 added a state championship to the growing list of FSU fast-pitch successess.

As if that isn't enough, since picking up the fast-pitch game in 1984, a Florida State pitcher has led the nation in strikeouts each year while the FSU team earned run average has ranked in the top six in the country.

Over the past six years, Graf has led her teams to state, region and national crowns. Graf-coached slow-pitch teams won state championships in 1979-80-81-82 and region titles in 1981 and 82. In both those years, FSU went on from the regionals to win the national championship.

Graf's record for seven years stands at 310-70-4 for a winning percentage of .813. Since moving to the fast-pitch game, her record is an outstanding 91-17-4.

In 1981, Graf was named Florida AIAW Softball Coach-of-the-Year, but she is not the only member of the softball program to gather accolades. Twenty-seven of Graf's players have been named to all-state teams and 14 earned spots on all-region teams, including seven fast-pitch players.

Following FSU's second softball national championship in 1982, five players made first team All-American and in the two national championship tournaments, 16 FSU players were named to all-championship squads. Overall, more than 70 players have been named to post-season teams under Graf.

A 1975 graduate of Florida State, Graf returned to her alma mater after two years at the University of North Carolina at Greensboro where she earned her master's degree in physical education. Graf also worked in the athletic department as head coach for the university's men's and women's swim teams and assistant softball coach.

During her undergraduate days at Florida State, Graf was a member of both the tennis and softball teams. She co-captained the 1974 and 1975 softball squads that finished second in state tournament.

Graf, who serves as director of the Florida State softball camp each summer, is a former president of the Florida Collegiate Athletic Association. She is also a member of the NCAA Softball Committee and chairwomen of the NCAA softball advisory committee for the South region.

She is presently seeking her doctorate in administration and needs only her dissertation to complete the requirements.

Assistant Coach Winnie Dodgion

As assistant coach, Winnie Dodgion plays a vital role in the successes of the Florida State softball team each year and was made a full-time member of the women's athletic staff in 1985. In addition to her on-the-field coaching duties, Dodgion heads FSU's recruiting efforts. Several other administrative duties come under her jurisdiction as does the task of coaching Seminole outfielders.

Dodgion came to Tallahassee in 1982 with experience as both a coach and as a player. Prior to joining the Tribe team, she taught physical education and coached the softball team at Liberty Junior High School in Orlando.

While teaching and coaching at Liberty, she was assistant softball coach at the University of Central Florida in Orlando in 1979 and again in 1981.

Dodgion graduated from Central Florida in 1979. During college, whe was a varsity softball player from 1975 to 1978 and from 1974-75. She also served as head softball coach at Boone High School.

Following graduation, Dodgion played for the "Dots" slow-pitch softball team in Miami. In 1979, the squad won the national open championship. Dodgion was a member of another title-winning team in 1981 as a player coach for the Orlando Stars. She was named Most Valuable Player of the national tournament that year. She also received the Golden Glove award in the regional tournament.

Her playing career has not stopped since coming to Tallahassee. In 1983 she was named second team ASA All-American at the Class "A" national tournament in Sacramento, CA. Dodgion earned first team All-American honors once again in 1984 at the national championship tournament in Midland, Texas.

Tina Kyler, Florida State's top pitcher over the past two seasons, remains with the program in 1986 as its pitching coach.

Her credentials for the job are impressive. Kyler pitched her way into NCAA record books since coming to Florida State. from Huntington Beach, Ca. She led the nation in strikeouts her junior season, averaging 11.6 per game. Following her senior year, she ranked ninth in the nation in strikeouts and 13th in earned run average.

During her two years at FSU, the Seminole pitching staff ranked fifth and sixth in the nation in earned run average. Kyler's career record of 33-10-2 includes 30 shutouts, seven one-hitters and a no-hitter.

Kyler was named Most Valuable Player of FSU's inaugural fastpitch team in 1984 and also made two appearances on the NCAA-South All-region team. She was named to three all-tournament teams during her playing days.

She will earn her bachelor's degree from Florida State in 1986. Kyler will work extensively with the Lady Seminoles pitching staff and will also assist Graf with other coaching duties.

1986 SEASON SUMMARY

At the beginning of the 1986 season, Lady Seminole Head Coach JoAnne Graf announced that Florida State had come on quickly as a fast-pitch team after only two years playing the game. She added that FSU must start winning one-run games and beat Top 20 teams to become a national contender.

In the 1986 season the Lady Seminoles have a 12-1 record in one-run games and are 7-1 against teams who at one time have been in the Top 20 coaches poll.

The Lady Seminoles began their 1986 season in late February and played host to a variety of northern teams on their spring breaks during March. For many of the teams it was their first game of the season, and at times it showed.

"The northern teams had their ups and downs," said coach Graf.
"There were good teams and weak teams. But they helped us get into the groove and get our team together."

Florida State went into the Lady Seminole Invitational with a 21-1 record. In the past they had made a tradition of winning their own tournament. But this year was no so. FSU was eliminated in the semi-final round with a 6-4 loss to Western Illinois. A team Florida State had beaten 11-0 only four days earlier.

About the loss in the tournament coach Graf said, "we let our emotions get away from us. The loss actually helped us because we learned alot from it."

The Lady Seminoles then bounced back the next weekend and made an impressive second place showing in the Houston Classic. The Lady Seminoles came up short in a 2-0 loss in the championship game against Arizona State. Graf said that the Houston Classic really propelled the Florida State team as well as the program. "The kids really enjoyed the challenge of playing top teams. Now they know they can play with anyone."

Following the Houston outing the Lady Seminoles moved into the Top 20, for the first time since switching to fast-pitch, landing in the 12th spot which they still occupy.

The Lady Seminoles closed out their regular season with a tournament title at the South Carolina Invitational. After losing the first game 1-0 to Furman the Lady Seminoles stormed back with four consecutive shutouts. The final coming in the championship game. Julie Larsen no-hit the South Florida Lady Bulls and FSU moved closer to a chance at post season play.

In the playoff series Graf looks to the seniors of the team as the key to victory. "If the seniors pull up and rally to help the others, we should have it made in the shade," she said.

Coach Graf looks for the playoff series to come down to who hits the opposition's pitching first, since both teams feature fine pitching.

Overall the Lady Seminoles are excited about the chance of going to the women's College World Series. With everyone healthy and ready to go the chance looks good.

TALLAHASSEE, Fla.--The Florida State Lady Seminole Softball team will make its first appearance in NCAA post-season play when it meets the Louisiana Tech Lady Techsters in a best of three playoff series this weekend in Ruston, La.

The Lady Seminoles are currently ranked 12th in the NCAA coaches poll with a 42-5 record. The Lady Techsters are ranked second with a 43-9 record.

'We're obviously excited about the bid," said Lady Seminole head coach JoAnne Graf. 'Louisiana Tech is ranked second and they will have the home field advantage. But we've played well away from home, everybody is healthy and we're ready to go."

The Lady Seminoles made a strong move towards the NCAA bid by capturing the University of South Carolina Invitational title. The Lady Seminoles dropped their first game of the tournament to Furman to a 1-0 pitcher's duel. The Lady Seminoles stormed back to record four consecutive shutouts, with the final win coming in the championship game against South Florida. Sophomore pitcher hurled a no-hit shutout against the Lady Bulls while the Lady Seminoles cruised to a 3-0 victory. Larsen was named tournament MVP after compiling a 3-1 tournament record. She and teammate Barbara Gillespie were named to the all-tournament team.

Going into the NCAA playoff Julie Larsen continues to build on her already impressive statistics. She owns a 25-4 record with an ERA of 0.23. Even more impressive is her 265 strikeouts in 211 innings pitched. Senior Roxanne Hantelmann is the perfect complement to Larsen. She currently has a 17-1 record with a 0.62 ERA. The two have combined for 27 shutouts with Larsen pitching 6 no-hit games. Both have pitched perfect games.

The Seminole offensive attack has been led by junior catcher Carolyn Fiero. Fiero leads the Lady Seminoles in almost every offensive category. She is currently hitting .356 with 6 homerums and 25 RBIs. Larsen continues to be an asset at the plate also, she is hitting .291 batting only in the games she pitches. Semior left-fielder Karyn Palgut is hitting .306 and is always a threat on the base paths.

A playoff victory would send the Lady Seminoles to the Women's College World Series to be played in Omaha, Nebraska May 21-25.



This is Florida State:



Florida State University, a coeducational institution with an enrollment of 21,500 students, is located in Tallahassee, the capital of Florida.

The beautiful 345-acre campus is wrapped in greenery that combines the blossoms of camellias, azaleas and dogwoods with palm trees and moss-hung oaks. The campus looks enough like Ivy League schools, particularly around its older, Gothic buildings, that several times each winter New York

advertising agencies fake summer scenes supposedly shot at Princeton or Harvard. On the west side of campus, the scene is dominated by the contemporary, high-rise science complex.

There are more than 1,300 faculty including four members of the National Academy of Sciences. Florida State is one of only five universities in the nation to have its own supercomputer.

Academic programs in the sciences (notably physics, chemistry, biology and meterology) and the performing arts (music, theater, visual arts and dance) have high national rankings. Other strong departments among the 15 schools and colleges include criminology, hospitality administration, accounting, statistics and interior design. FSU's pre-med program has a much higher than average medical school placement rate for its graduates.

Today, FSU offers students the opportunity to choose from more than 100 career options in arts and sciences, business, communication, criminology, education, home economics, law, library and information studies, music, nursing, social sciences, social work, theater, visual arts and engineering, which operates in cooperation with Florida A&M University. The most popular majors at FSU are business, biology, computer science and communication.

Florida State has honors programs for its top students. Overseas study program in fields ranging from law to hotel and restaurant administration are offered in Florence, Italy; Oxford and London, England; Switzerland, Costa Rica, Yugoslavia and the Panama Canal Zone.

Social life for many centers around 24 fraternities and 20 sororities. Wind surfing, swimming and sunning are among the activities to be enjoyed at FSU's convenient lakeside "Reservation" or along the sandy beaches of nearby coasts.

A unique extracurricular activity is the Flying High Circus, the nations only all-collegiate circus. Students from every academic major can become stars on the flying trapeze, on the highwire or in clown acts.

Fine entertainment is provided year-round by the FSU Schools of Music and Theater and the Department of Dance.

Student Campus Entertainment presents concerts, movies, lectures and other activities throughout the year and the Artist Series brings professional entertainers to campus.

Student government at FSU is one of the most powerful in the country. Elected students spend an annual budget of about \$1.7 million. Student government funds intramurals, activities at the Student Union and more than 200 interest organizations.



C.W. "HOOTIE" INGRAM Athletic Director

Cecil Ingram, known to most of his friends and associates as simply "Hootie," has headed the Florida State athletic department since 1981 after serving as associate commissioner of the Southeastern Conference for eight years.

Since his arrival in Tallahassee, Ingram has initiated a \$10 million dollar building program for athletic facilities, including the Moore Athletic Center - home of Florida State athletics.

A native of Tuscaloosa, Ala., Ingram played for the Crimson Tide from 1951 to 1954 and led the nation in interceptions as a sophomore. He also lettered in baseball as an infielder. Following a stint in the army, Ingram turned to coaching. After several years of high school coaching, Ingram moved into collegiate athletics; making assistant coaching stops at Wake Forest, Virginia Tech, Georgia and Arkansas.



BOB GOINAssociate Athletic Director

A member of the Florida State athletic staff since 1981, Bob Goin begins his fifth full year as Associate Athletic Director.

All men's non-revenue coaches report to Goin and he also assists in the day-to-day operations of the department. A large portion of football, basketball and baseball game-day operations fall under his leadership.

A 1959 graduate of Bethany College, Goin received his master's degree from West Virginia in 1961. From 1960-76, Goin served Bethany in several administrative and coaching capacities before moving on to West Virginia as an assistant athletic director. He was named athletic director at California (Pa.) State College in 1980, where he formed that institution's first scholarship fund for athletics and the college's first booster



CHARLES W. EHRHARDT Faculty Athletic Committee Chairman

A Florida State University professor of law, Charles W. Ehrhardt is in his second year as Chairman of the Athletic Committee.

He is currently in his second stint on the committee, having served 1969-71 and then being reappointed to the board in 1983. As chairman, Ehrhardt succeeded Dr. James Jones, who held that position since 1980. Ehrhardt becomes Florida State's representative to the NCAA and was also president of the Metro Conference in 1984-85.

A native of Elkander, Iowa, Ehrhardt received his bachelor's degree from Iowa in 1962 before earning a law degree at Iowa State two years later. He came to Florida State in 1967,

A widely respected expert in the field of Evidence, Erhardt is frequently called on to lecture on the subject by lawyers and judges nationwide.
