WARRICK DUNN Football




His is one of the most recognized names to wear the


garnet and gold. Warrick Dunn's phenomenal running style and dominating performances just didn't seem to mesh with his soft-spoken, humble, yet mature demeanor. He was a fighter and a survivor who entered Florida State as one of the top 10 high school football players in Louisiana.

In his first year at FSU, the running back earned Freshman All-American honors as he helped lead the Seminoles to their first National Championship in 1993. The Baton Rouge native went on to become the first two-time 1,000 yard rusher in Florida State history, a preseason Playboy All-American, MVP of the 1994 Sugar Bowl and still holds the career rushing record of nearly 4,000 yards. Dunn became a two-sport All-American after a standout spring season with the Seminole track team.

Warrick was a first round draft pick for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers where he had two 1,000 yard rushing seasons and two Pro-Bowl invites. He closed out his career with Tampa in second place on the all-time rushing lists and ranks fifth on the all-time list for receptions. This season, Dunn will put on an Atlanta Falcons uniform where he is sure to continue his successful career.

Off the field, the former Seminole set up a Home for the Holidays program awarding single working mothers a down payment for a furnished home. Dunn has been recognized for his service to the community by receiving the Florida Sustained Service Award presented in Tampa and the Giants Step Award presented by former president Bill Clinton. Sixteen mothers and over 40 children have been placed in new homes through Dunn's program.





LEANDER McKenzie


Men's Track

Leander was a name known to the track world in the

mid-1980s. As a junior at Godby, under track coach and FSU All-American and Hall of Famer ('81) Jesse Forbes, McKenzie was ranked the nation's top hurdler. He held the state's fastest time in the 800 his senior year while being recruited by FSU's then track coach Dick Roberts.

Leander entered Florida State determined to see his name etched in the record books. He was ranked as the number one junior hurdler in the world and captured Metro titles in high hurdles, the intermediate hurdles and one from FSU's 1,600 meter relay team. The relay team went on to place 12th at the NCAA Championship; and as an individual, Leander became a national qualifier in the 400 meter hurdles. After the season, McKenzie branched out to the national ranks and won titles at the USA Junior National Championship and the Junior Pan American Games.

After sitting out a season with injuries, Leander rebounded strong his sophomore year. In 1984, he was listed as the 10th best intermediate hurdler in the United States and ran his personal best at the Olympic trials. At the NCAA Championship in Oregon, Leander placed




Leander McKenzie never lost an individual Metro conference race and helped lead the Seminoles to 4 of 14 consecutive Metro titles. While wearing the garnet and gold, he was a six time All-American in the 400 hurdles and the 4x400. He was the only Metro athlete to win four consecutive MVP honors. Leander's school record in the 400 hurdles which he set at the USA Championship held for 10 years until it was broken in 1995.





DOUG MIENTKIEWICZ


Baseball




athletics at his high school Westminster Christian. An All-State football and baseball player who was also named All-City in basketball, he helped lead his prep team to a National Championship his senior season. Though he was a 12th round draft pick out of high school, Doug elected to sign with Florida State and leave his hometown of Miami to become a Seminole.

Mientkiewicz had three very successful seasons at Florida State and led the team in batting each year. He played for Team USA in 1994 and received the Fighting Spirit Award by the All-Japan University Baseball League. In Doug's final season at FSU, he was named the MVP of the Atlantic I Regional after his three homers helped lead the 'Noles to their 14th trip to the College World Series. He led the Seminoles with a .371 batting average, 19 home runs and 80 RBIs for the year. The left-handed first baseman was later named to the College World Series' All-Decade Team of the 1990s.

In 1995, Doug was drafted by the Minnesota Twins where he spent a successful five seasons playing for the Twins minor leagues. He racked up numerous honors including the Eastern League Player of the Week, Class AA All-Star Team, Best Defensive First Baseman in Pacific Coast League and the Sherry Robertson Award as Twins' Minor League



In 2001, the former Seminole, who moved to a more permanent role with the Twins, was rated the third best defensive first baseman in the American League. Doug also received the first ever Rawlings Gold Glove Award and was named the Most Valuable Twin.





SHAMALENE WILSON BRONER

Softball

Shamalene Wilson entered Florida State as a four-time All-

Conference selection, MVP of the North-South All-Stars and Player of the Year for her prep team at Pasco Comprehensive High. The Dade City, FL native wasted no time making her impact on the Seminole softball team and was named ACC Freshman of the Year in 1993.


The outfielder's steady pace continued throughout her career as a Lady Seminole. She was a three-time All-American, a three-time All-South Region selection and ACC Player of the Year. She left her name in the record books in 11 categories where she is still listed in eight. Wilson helped lead the Tribe to three ACC Championships, four Regional berths and a trip to the College World Series while accumulating numerous All-ACC and Player of the Week honors.

Her efforts off the field were also recognized. In 1995, Shama received the Arthur Ashe Jr. Sports Scholar Award and in 1996 was the recipient of the Florida State ACC Senior Scholar Athlete of the Year along with Seminole quarterback Danny Kanell.



After graduating with a degree in criminal justice in 1997, Shamalene spent two seasons with a professional fastpitch team, the Georgia Pride. Her second year, Shama was named Defensive Player of the Year and selected to play in the All-Star game in Akron, Ohio.

Wilson returned home in 1998 and later married fellow Dade City native, Poncho Broner. She currently works for her alma mater, Pasco High and she and Poncho have two beautiful children, Kiara and Kobe.

GENE DECKERHOFF MOORE-STONE AWARD

Gene Deckerhoff is the Voice of the

Seminoles and there is no one else like him. Fans look forward to hearing Gene's play-by-play every Saturday and even if they're sitting in the stands, you will see most with their headsets tuned into Gene.

For nearly 30 years, Deckerhoff has been hosting coaches shows and serving as the on-air talent for the Tribe. In 1989, he added the Tampa Bay Buccaneers to his weekend schedule and has also served as the play-by-play announcer for AFL teams, the Tampa Bay Storm and the Orlando Predators.

Deckerhoff is a nine-time winner of the Florida Sportscaster of the Year Award, an 18-time winner of the best play-by-play announcer for college and pro ball and in 2000, was inducted into the Florida Sports Hall of Fame. Gene also received an ADDY award for the best regional TV promo for "The Bobby Bowden Show" in 1986 and in 1991 won a silver medal award from the American Advertising Association.

Gene has been married to the lovely Ann Deckerhoff for over 37 years and they have three sons, Emerson, Dennis and Eric and six grandchildren. In the off-season, Gene enjoys traveling with his family, woodworking, photography and cooking.
