PETER BOULWARE Football

Peter Boulware went to high school at Spring Valley in Columbia, South Carolina where he participated in football and track. He was named a Blue Chip All-American in football, High School Player of the Year and participated in the Shrine Bowl. The Atlanta Journal- Constitution also named Peter one of the Top 50 athletes.

The 6-5, 255 lb. defensive end came in as a redshirt in 1993 and got a taste of success on the national championship team. His freshman season, he had 37 tackles and three sacks. As a sophomore he led the ACC with 10 sacks despite starting only two of 11 games. His standout junior year included 12 quarterback sacks, and 151 tackles which led him to make the decision to declare eligibility in the NFL draft.

After being named a consensus All-American, National Defensive Player of the Year, All-ACC and smashing Ron Simmons 1977 record of 12 sacks in a season with an astounding 19 sacks, Peter's career as a Seminole would come to a happy end. He was selected with the 4th overall pick in the first round of the '97 draft by the Baltimore Ravens.

His premiere season as a Baltimore Raven was just as impressive, earning Defensive Rookie of the Year honors and being named to the All-Rookie Team. In seven seasons, Boulware has made three Pro Bowl appearances and garnishes a Super Bowl ring from the 2001 Championship Game when the Ravens beat the Giants to take the world title.

SAM CASSELL
Basketball

Sam Cassell enjoyed an outstanding high school career at Dunbar, including being named Baltimore Player of the Year. He averaged 22 points and nine assists per game and earned all-conference and all-city honors. His junior college career at San Jacinto was also impressive. He was named JC All-American, the Best Junior College Player by Hoop Scoop and the top JC prospect at any position by Dick Vitale's Basketball Magazine.

Sam signed with the Seminoles his junior year, proving to be every bit the star basketball experts predicted. Cassell went on to lead the Seminoles to the NCAA Sweet Sixteen in 1992 and Elite Eight in 1993. As a senior, he set a school record with 97 steals and dished out 170 assists. He averaged over 18 points, nearly five assists, 4.3 rebounds and over two steals a game. Sam was named to the All-ACC second team twice and checks in at #19 on the all-time FSU scoring list after just two seasons wearing the garnet and gold.

The 6-3 guard was drafted by the Houston Rockets in the first round of the 1993 NBA draft. He quickly made his mark in the NBA, making several clutch baskets and averaging over nine points per game in the playoffs which aided Houston in taking the Championship title in seven games. The following year, Cassell was again a pivotal performer as the Rockets rallied from series deficits against Utah and Phoenix before ultimately sweeping Orlando in the NBA Championship Series.

After three seasons and two championship rings with Houston, Sam was traded several times before settling in Milwaukee for five years. He is currently with the Minnesota Timerberwolves. In 11 NBA seasons, the Baltimore native averages over 16 points and six assists per game and was named to the NBA All Star team in 2004.



BRENDON DEDEKIND Swimming

At the ACC Championship his freshman vear, Brendon Dedekind won the 50 and 100 free and was on the record setting 200 free relay team. He went on to be named the ACC Rookie of the Year, qualified for the NCAA's in Texas and he was just getting started. When he realized he might have a shot at the '96 Olympics, he returned home and qualified for a spot on the South African Olympic team. At the Olympics, Dedekind surprised his country and fellow swimmers as he qualified for the finals of the 50 free and finished fifth.

The next season, Dedekind made it to the '97 NCAA Championships at the University of Minnesota. He qualified for the 50 and 100-free and the 100-breast and made it his goal not only to make the finals, but also to win the events. Dedekind became the first swimmer in FSU history that night, to garner three All-American honors in the same year with his top-five finishes in

three events. Brendon also swam the fastest heat of the 50-free in NCAA history at that meet. The next season, the South African became only the second swimmer in FSU history to win an individual NCAA title taking first in the 50-free. And in his senior year as a Seminole, Dedekind took another NCAA title but this time in the 100-breast.

Brendon's international accolades include gold medalist at the Goodwill games, Pan Pacific Swimming Championship and 7th All Africa Games. He also won many silver and bronze medals from the international meets. He completed his FSU career as the only Seminole to ever reach the finals of three individual events at one NCAA competition and the only FSU swimmer to ever finish in the Top 10 individual scorers.

The 21-time All-American completed his degree in engineering from FSU in 1999 while maintaining a dean's list status.

HOLLY KELLY THOMPSON

Track and Field

When Holly Kelly graduated from Palmetto

High School in Miami, Florida, she was one of the most coveted signees in the state's history of track and field. The three-time prep All-American surpassed the NCAA qualifying standard and finished ninth in the voting for Track and Field News' High School Athlete of the Year. As a prep, Holly was named to several national teams, including the '86 Pan Am Junior and the '86 World Junior Championship teams, and earned state champion titles in the high jump for three consecutive years. Along with her dominance in the high jump, Kelly held a state title in the 800m and was runner up in the 300m hurdles making her all-around skills a perfect fit for the Florida State Seminoles.

Holly's freshman season, she won three outdoor events while qualifying for the NCAA's and took titles at the Eastern Airlines Invitational and the Seminole Twilight. She went on to become a four-time All-American in the high jump and a four-time Metro Champion. Kelly was also a member of the US Olympic

Festival team and competed in three Olympic trials. In her senior season in 1991, Holly broke the Florida State record in the high jump. Both marks are still etched in the FSU Track and Field record books today.

Since completing her degree in physical education in 1991, Holly continued her career as a high jumper. She went home to Miami and trained and traveled internationally competing for the Goldwin and Nike Track Clubs. She also worked as an assistant at Miami, coaching the high jumpers to two Big East Championships and two runners up. Holly was also working as a teacher and Assistant AD at Coral Gables High School. After receiving her master's degree in Educational Leadership and Management, Holly took a position with the MF Athletic Company as the Southeast Sales Manager. She has authored three books and four videos on the high jump and continues to lecture at clinics. She serves on the committee for the Florida Track and Field Hall of Fame and hosts free clinics for high school students each year through out the Southeast.



ANDRE WADSWORTH Football

Andre Wasdworth moved to Miami from St. Croix when he was five years old. He played basketball and started football in the 8th grade. By his senior season, he was named MVP in both sports and honored as All-Dade County. He did not receive any Division I scholarship offers, so Coach Chuck Amato invited Wadsworth to walk on to the Seminoles squad.

After a redshirt season, #85 went on to have four successful years wearing the garnet and gold and became one of the greatest pass rushers in FSU and college football history. He was one of four finalists for the Lombardi Award, ACC Player of the Year, ACC Defensive Player of the Year and All-ACC First team. The All-American was the recipient of the \$10,000 Burger King College Football Scholarship in 1997 and led the ACC with 16 sacks his senior season. He was also named the CBS SportsLine Defensive player of the Year,

Defensive Linemen of the Year from the Touchdown Club of Columbus, an Outland Trophy finalist and named one of the 30 Greatest ACC Players by College Football News.

Andre received his degree in business after his junior season and began his graduate work in Sports Administration while playing his last year at FSU. In the spring of 1998, the Arizona Cardinals selected Andre with the No. 3 pick, making him the highest FSU player to go in the NFL draft.

Wadsworth spent three seasons with Arizona and enjoyed a successful, but injury plagued career. He had four knee surgeries in just 15 months between November 1999 and January 2001. He totaled 119 tackles, 65 solo, and 8 quarterback sacks. He made three fumbles recoveries and one interception in 36 appearances, 30 of which he started.

JIM SMITH MOORE-STONE AWARD

Jim Smith has held many positions in Florida Government including Secretary of State, Chief of Staff for the Governor, Attorney General, member of the Board of Regents and currently Vice Chairman of the Board of Trustees at Florida State University. But the position that we like most is supporter and friend of the Florida State Seminoles.

Jim arrived at Florida State in 1958 and tried out for the basket-ball team. He pledged the ATO fraternity with the encouragement of senior starter Jim Savage. Savage also did him another favor by introducing him to his cousin, Carole Clark. Jim and Carole later married and Smith went on to attend law school at Stetson.

Jim was on the fast track at the Department of State and eventually landed as an executive assistant to his friend Governor Reubin Askew. Even while building his agricultural business, a law practice, a political career and a family, Jim stayed very active in Florida State Athletics. He

became disturbed by the decline in support for the football team. With only 10,000 fans in the stands, Smith felt it was time to take action. He approached FSU President Stan Marshall and tactfully broached the subject of finding funding to bring in a new coach. The money was raised and several potential candidates came in for a visit. The coach that won the job and hearts of Seminole fans was, of course, Bobby Bowden. Needless to say, the rest is history.

Jim and Carole have continued to support Florida State University in many ways. They have always known and understood the important relationship athletics has served in the development of the university. Jim has served as President of the FSU National Alumni Association, and among his many awards he has received ODK's Grads Made Good Award, FSU's Bernie Sliger Award and an honorary degree of Humane Letters from FSU.
