By calling themselves Seminoles, members of the FSU community are engaging in a tradition of tribute for a people whose indomitable spirit is one that is deserving of honor.

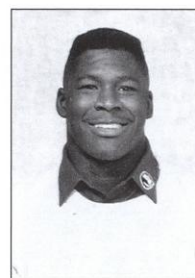
It is in keeping with our university's rich history that

EDGAR BENNETT

Football

Edgar Bennett was one of the most versatile fullbacks in FSU history whose career all-purpose yardage totaled more than 2300 yards on 389 plays for 20 touchdowns. He was an all-around player who ran a 4.5 40 and caught 93 passes for over 1000 yards. In April of 1992, the Green Bay Packers selected him in the 4th round of NFL draft.

Over his five seasons in the Packer uniform, #34 gained 3,352 yards and in 1995 became only the sixth player in the team's history to rush for 1,000 yards in a season. In 1996, Edgar was the leading rusher when the Packers won the Super Bowl and he continues to hold the club single-season record for receptions by a running back with 78.

In 2001, Bennett was named Director of Player Development for the Packers, a position that helps players become acclimated to their roles as Green Bay Packers, both on and off the field. Bennett's efforts in this area were recognized in 2003 as the Packers' Player Development Department was named best in the National Football Conference.

Bennett is currently beginning his first season as the running backs coach for the Packers. On July 23, 2005, the Jacksonville native was inducted in the Green Bay Packers Hall of Fame.

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LISA DAVIDSON DURAN

Softball

Signing with the Florida State Seminoles was an impressive accomplishment for Lisa Davidson. Having only played slow pitch and transitioning to a fast-pitch team at the caliber of the Lady Seminoles was even more impressive. As a freshman, she stepped in and led the team with a .341 batting average.

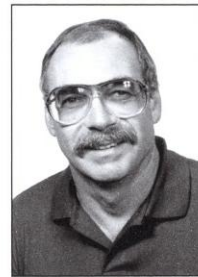
The Lady Seminoles were transitioning as well, into a new conference, the ACC. The Florida State Seminole team claimed the first ACC title in any sport. Lisa dominated the conference as well, leading the ACC in triples and was ranked in the league's top 10 in five other categories. She was voted the ACC Tournament's Most

Valuable Player in 1993 and was an all-tournament selection at the UNC Invitational.

Davidson was only the second player to be named an All-American for the Lady Seminoles and finished her career with four consecutive ACC Championships and three World Series appearances. She was a two-time All-ACC selection and a two-time all-region pick.

In 2003, nearly 10 years after her graduation from Florida State, Davidson was again honored for her days as a Seminole when the ACC put out a 50th Anniversary team for each sport and Lisa was one of 24 FSU softball players named to the squad.

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TERRY LONG

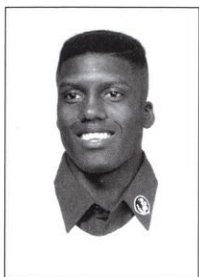
Track and Field

A successful collegiate career was only the beginning of Terry Long's legacy. Long joined the Seminoles as a student-athlete and lettered for the Tribe for four seasons. During his career, Terry set new school records in 220 low hurdles and 120 high hurdles as well as running on the record setting 4x100, 4x200 and Spring Medley relay teams.

After completing his degree in 1963, Terry spent four years as a high school coach in Delray Beach and Lakeland then 16 years building his reputation as one of the nation's finest coaches at the junior college level.

In 1985, Long returned to his roots and rejoined the Seminoles as the head women's coach and coordinator for the cross country team. In 1988, Long became the coach for both the men's and the women's teams where he led the Seminoles for 15 seasons. Terry continued a strong tradition of track success with 82 individuals earning All-America honors. His athletes set over 30 new school records and won 10 conference championships while he was named conference or region coach of the year 14 times. Long produced 272 all-conference athletes, nine Olympians and most impressive, 325 graduates.

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KEZ MCCORVEY

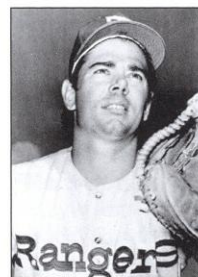
Football

Kez McCorvey was well known as the favorite target of Heisman Trophy winner Charlie Ward, making 74 receptions for 966 yards during the '93 National Championship season. He was listed 13th best in the NCAA in receptions per game and 26th in the nation as he moved up the charts in the Seminole history book. The 74 catches in a season was only surpassed by 86 catches made by Hall of Famer Ron Sellers in 1968.

The 6-1 wide receiver was a two-time All-ACC selection, UPI All-American, Scripps Howard All-American, a Biletnikoff Award Semi-finalist, named ACC Player of the Week and played in the Senior Bowl.

In 1995 after receiving his degree in Sociology, the 180-pound wide receiver was drafted in the fifth round by Detroit. After three seasons with the Lions, a brief stint with the Carolina Panthers and NFL Europe, McCorvey enjoyed a 25 game career in the Canadian Football League with the Edmonton Eskimos. In his last season in the CFL, Kez racked up 72 catches and 962 yards and was tied for the top spot as the CFL's touchdown receptions with 15.

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KEN SUAREZ

Baseball

Ken Suarez was a major impact player for the Seminoles in the 1960's. He proved his playing ability on the field in Tallahassee along with in the basin league where he was named the league's most popular player. Ken's junior year in 1964, he led the Seminoles in runs, hits, home runs, total bases, bases on balls and runs batted in. He had 44 hits, six home runs, totaled 67 bases and drove in 30 runs on his way to the prestigious honor of being named All-American. One of Ken's most memorable moments was getting a hit at the 1963 College World Series.

Suarez was named to the 1964 United States Olympic Baseball Team that competed in Japan and Korea, making Suarez the first Seminole to ever participate in the Olympics. After three seasons with the 'Noles, the 5-8 catcher decided to sign with the Kansas City Athletics.

Ken enjoyed nine years of professional baseball, including three years with Kansas City, four years with the Cleveland Indians and two seasons with the Texas Rangers.
