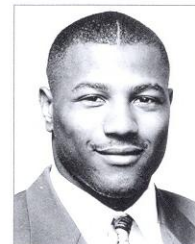

MOORE STONE AWARD
ANDY HAGGARD

Andy Haggard has served as National Chairman of the Seminole Boosters in 1988 and is known as a tireless leader who also chaired the School of Arts and Sciences Leadership Council, served on the Presidential Search Committee in 1993, as well as the Board of Directors of the FSU Research Foundation and Orange Bowl Committee. He was awarded with the FSU Alumni Associations Circle of Gold award and was recently re-appointed to the FSU Board of Trustees by Governor Charlie Crist.

The Golden Chief has spent many years supporting the Seminole Club of Greater Miami and he and Carole have endowed a scholarship with the Seminole Boosters. Being big fans of baseball, Andy took a major leadership role in spearheading the fund-raising efforts for the state-of-the art expansion of Dick Howser Stadium. The entry plaza that fronts the baseball stadium, Haggard Plaza, is named in honor of Andy and Carole for their tireless efforts of fund-raising and their personal generous donation.



CLIFTON ABRAHAM
Football

Clifton Abraham was a quick study at FSU and saw action almost immediately after redshirting as a true freshman. He became the starter as a sophomore and held the position for three years, and as a senior in 1994 became the fifth consecutive FSU cornerback to earn All-America honors.

Abraham would pick off eight passes over his career, but his opportunities for picks diminished as his career blossomed. By mid-way through his junior year,

opposing teams had all but given up on trying to throw to whomever he was covering. He was twice named first team All-ACC and finished his career as consensus All-American, rare even in FSU's great history, and as one of three finalists for the 1994 Jim Thorpe Trophy which signifies the nation's top defensive back.

Clifton spent three seasons in the NFL and two in the Canadian Football League. He currently resides in Dallas, Texas.



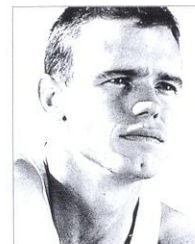
DOUG EDWARDS
Basketball

In only three seasons, Doug Edwards became the first player in FSU history to score 500 points in three consecutive seasons from 1991-1993. He also still ranks sixth in career rebounding, grabbing 788 (8.5 per game) career boards. He recorded 18 double-doubles over his three seasons, which ranks tied for seventh all-time and only six players in FSU started more than the 93 games he did.

The consummate team player that played with both ease and grace that belied his determination to win, Edwards played on FSU teams that finished 21-11

in 1991, 22-10 in 1992 and 25-10 in 1993. FSU beat Louisville to win the Metro Tournament in dramatic fashion his sophomore year, which was FSU's last in the league. Over his last two years, FSU set basketball rich Tobacco Road on its ear finishing second in the ACC. The Seminole starting lineup of Edwards, Charlie Ward, Sam Cassell, Bob Sura and Rodney Dobard featured four NBA first round draft picks.

Edwards was selected in the first round of the 1993 NBA draft and was the 15th overall pick by the Atlanta Hawks.



JOHN POSTON
Track and Field

One of the original Seminole Track and Field superstar sprinters, John Poston set school records in the 100-yard dash, the 220-yard dash and was a member of the record-setting mile relay team in 1951. The team also set five new conference marks while winning the Dixie Conference Championship.

The 1952 season saw FSU compete for the first time ever indoors and over that season, Poston led the Seminoles in scoring during historic wins over Georgia, Georgia Tech and Miami.

As a senior, Poston broke his own records in the 100 and 220-yard dash. His time of 9.6 seconds in the 100 and 20.8 seconds in the 220 were the second and third fastest times in those events for all colleges and universities in the United States in 1952. John's final meet of the season was the Georgia AAU meet. The mile relay team took first place, setting a new Georgia AAU record and FSU record.



JAN SIKES

Softball

In 1981 and 1982, Jan Sikes was a star and led the Seminoles to back-to-back National Championships. All university women's programs competed under the AIAW (Association for Intercollegiate Athletics for Women) in those days and softball was slow-pitch at the time. Sikes played second base for the Seminoles under legendary head coach JoAnne Graf, and dominated with her glove and bat.

Sikes led the Seminoles in hitting with a .471 average as a senior and was one of only two Seminoles to

play in all 64 games. Her 89 hits and 60 RBI both ranked second on the team, while her 66 runs scored were third. She earned All-America honors as well as AIAW All-Region and All-State honors. FSU cemented its position as the nation's best softball program with a 9-4 win over Florida for the 1982 national title. One of Jan's most memorable moments at FSU was turning a double play with fellow FSU Hall of Famer Darby Cottle to win the back-to-back title.



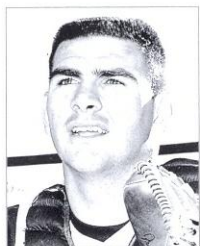
NADIA STE-MARIE

Women's Golf

Nadia Ste-Marie won five individual tournaments and had 14 Top-10 finishes over her career as a Seminole. As a junior in 1988, she was the individual tournament champion at the Beacon Woods Invitational, The Lady Seminole Invitational and Metro Conference Championship. She led her FSU team to first place finishes at the LSU-Fairwood Invitational and the Metro Conference Championships that same year and also played in the 1988 U.S. Open Championship and the U.S. Amateur.

As senior in 1989, Ste-Marie took another individual medalist honor at the Lady Gator Invitational. She capped her fantastic college career with her selection as a first team All-American and qualified as an individual competitor in the 1989 NCAA Golf Championship.

Ste-Marie was named the LPGA Tour Rookie of the Year in 1990 after graduating from FSU with a degree in sociology. She played professionally for 10 years on the LPGA Tour, European Tour, Asian Tour, Canadian PGA and the Futures Tour.



BUD TEAGLE

Baseball

The 1963 baseball guide says Buddy Teagle had one of the strongest arms in college baseball. He played for FSU coach Danny Litwhiler and became the second Seminole to be named first team All-American, the first being Howser. Over his career, Teagle averaged over .300 batting, played in 100 games and had eight home runs. He helped lead FSU to the NCAA Tournament all three

seasons he was a Seminole. Bud's greatest memories at Florida State were the back-to-back appearances in the College World Series in 1962 and 1963. The Seminoles were 21-7 and finished ranked 17th in the country his freshman year, 23-14 and ranked fourth nationally following the College World Series his junior year and 27-13 and sixth nationally his senior season in 1963.



CLAUDE THIGPEN

Coaches and Administration

In the 1950's, Claude Thigpen began a career at the FSU Athletic Department that would see him serve in a variety of positions over the years, including ticket manager, accountant, and business manager where he supervised the business office personnel. He handled seating assignments, ticket sellers and takers, parking and promotions. From 1978 until his formal retirement in 1989, he held the title of Assistant Athletic Director

and handled game-day operations for football in addition to handling the travel arrangements for the football team and the University's official party.

His "retirement" in 1989 hardly slowed him down, as he has remained the coordinator of the university's courtesy car program since that time. He has the distinction of having worked under all 13 athletic directors at Florida State.
