MICKEY DILLARD

Basketball

Mickey Dillard was a lightning-quick guard from Dania, Florida who went on to become one of the most prolific offensive players in Seminole basketball history.

Dillard was the first player off the bench as a freshman during the 1976-77 season, playing in 25 of FSU's 27 games. He scored 19 points against Kentucky as a rookie foreshadowing a trait of playing his best in the biggest games that held true throughout his career. He was FSU's second-leading scorer as a sophomore averaging 13.7 points per game for an FSU team that finished 12-1 in the Metro Conference and ranked as high as ninth in the country.

Dillard became an All-America contender as a junior after leading the Seminoles in scoring in 1979-80 with an average of 20.4 points per game. He repeated as an All-Metro Conference selection his senior year when he once again led the team in scoring averaging 18.4 points per game while leading FSU to a 22-9 record and the NCAA Tournament.

At the time of his induction, Dillard still ranked fourth in school history with 1,734 career points nearly 40 years after his career ended in 1981. He was ranked third in school history for career field goals (643) and free throws made (448) and tied for ninth in steals (165).



SUSAN KUIJKEN Cross Country/Track & Field

Susan Kuijken arrived at Florida State in January of 2006 from The Netherlands and proved to be the catalyst behind the most successful women's cross country and distance era in program history.

By the time she closed her career at the end of the 2009 cross country season, Kuijken was a nine-time All-American and FSU's only four-time cross country All-American. With NCAA individual titles on the track in the 3000-meter and 1500-meter runs, Kuijken cemented her legacy as the most decorated distance athlete in program history.

A natural leader who represented The Netherlands on the World and European stage nine times as a youth and junior runner, she elevated her new teammates to unprecedented heights.

SUSAN KUIJKEN continued

With Kuijken finishing no worse than third individually, she led the Noles to three consecutive top-three NCAA Cross Country Championship finishes (2007-09). FSU also hoisted the ACC Championship trophy for the first three times in program history, and in 2008-09 won the ACC Triple Crown with cross country, indoor and outdoor track & field titles.

An outstanding student, she earned Academic All-American honors as a senior.

Kuijken represented The Netherlands in the 5000- and 10,000-meter runs at the 2016 Rio Olympic Games.



MIKE MARTIN


Baseball

A legend if there ever was one, Mike Martin is not only the winningest coach in college baseball history with 2,029 victories but also the winningest coach in NCAA history in any sport.

Martin starred for the Seminoles as a player in 1965-66 and was an assistant coach from 1975-79 before taking over as head coach for the next 40 seasons. Already inducted into the College Baseball Hall of Fame, Martin took the Seminoles to the College World Series a record 17 times. FSU reached 40 or more wins and made the NCAA Tournament every year under Martin, and he led the Noles into the NCAA Tournament each season.

Martin never wavered in his love and dedication to the University, serving as an ambassador for FSU through his final game. He bookended his career with College World Series appearances and reached Omaha 19 times as a player, assistant and head coach. In his final season, Martin was named the Baseball America Coach of the Year for the second time in his career and first since 2012.

He coached 18 first-round draft picks, four Golden Spikes winners, two Dick Howser Trophy winners, 94 All-Americans, and 141 All-ACC selections. Fifty-one former players reached the Major Leagues.



DICK NICHOLS

Baseball

Dick Nichols was one of the finest all-around high school athletes in Jacksonville, Florida, and were it not for a knee injury three games into his senior season at Wolfson High; he may have never found his way to Tallahassee.

FSU baseball coach Fred Hatfield offered Nichols a spot on the roster in May of 1966, which he accepted after his injury cost him a football scholarship to Georgia Tech and admission to the U.S. Military Academy.

Nichols made the most of the opportunity, rising from walk-on to All-American and leading the Seminoles to the 1970 College World Series Championship game.

A three-year letter winner and two-year starter, he led the Seminoles in batting as a junior (.336) and senior (.338), when he was the leadoff hitter on the team that lost 2-1 in 16 innings to USC in the championship game.

Nichols was a first-team All-America selection by The Sporting News, and a second-team selection by the American Baseball Coaches Association in 1970. The second baseman led the team in hits (80), doubles (17), triples (6), stolen bases (34) and on-base percentage (.442).

He signed with the Boston Red Sox after FSU and played two years in the minor leagues before returning to school to earn a master's degree in economics from Michigan State.



RICK STOCKSTILL

Football

Rick Stockstill was a football and baseball star at Fernandina Beach High School who Bobby Bowden saw as the kind of hard-nosed quarterback who could eventually lead his early FSU teams.

While not seeing much game action over his first three seasons, Stockstill gained the respect of teammates and coaches putting him in perfect position to take over the offense in 1980. He started every game for the Seminoles over the sensational 1980 season leading FSU to a 10-1 regular-season record and ranking of No. 2 in the country. Included in those wins was perhaps the most significant one in FSU history when Stockstill, who was named an All-American following the season, and the Seminoles upset No. 4 Nebraska on the road and the program emerged on the national stage.

RICK STOCKSTILL continued

The Seminoles probably could have kept the moment going in 1981 were it not for arguably the toughest schedule in college football history. Stockstill not only led FSU in consecutive road games at Nebraska, Ohio State, Notre Dame, Pitt and LSU, but also against traditional rivals Miami and Florida. By the time the Florida game rolled around, the Seminoles were flat worn out. However, the team's eagerness in tackling the schedule and the wins notched at Ohio State, Notre Dame and LSU earned Florida State the reputation for toughness that still exists today.

Stockstill remains among FSU's Top 25 career leaders for touchdown passes (26), passing yards (2,834) and total offense (2,616) among others.



CAROLINE WESTRUP

Considered by many to be Florida State's greatest women's golfer, Caroline Westrup is the only four-time All-American and the only four-time All-ACC selection in school history.

Westrup enters the Florida State Athletics Hall of Fame ranked sixth in school history with a career stoke average of 73.23. She is ranked second in school history with five individual tournament victories and she helped the Seminoles win five tournament championships during her career. She earned All-America First-Team honors in 2006 and 2007 by the National Golf Coaches' Association and GolfWeek Magazine, All-America Second-Team honors in 2008 by the NGCA and GolfWeek and All-American Honorable Mention by GolfWeek in 2009.

Westrup was Florida State's top individual finisher in 27 events during her career, ranks second in school history with 18 top-10 finishes, shot her career-best single-round score of 66 five times and counted .98.6 percent of her rounds (108.5 of 110) toward the team score during her career and is tied for fifth in school history with 42 rounds scored at par or better.

Westrup competed in the NCAA Championship finals three times and won the individual championship at the 2006 World Amateur Championships. She is also only six players in school history to earn All-American Scholar Athlete honors as named by the National Golf Coaches' Association of American three times.
