BRIANNA BARRY VOLLEYBALL 2006 - 2009


Brianna Barry was a star on and off the volleyball court from her freshman season in 2006 through her senior year when she became the first Seminole ever named ACC Player of the Year.

Barry led the Seminoles as a rookie with 109 blocks and was fourth in the ACC and Top 100 nationally with a .325 hitting percentage. She led the team in blocks again as a sophomore (97) and was third on the team with 325 kills.

As a junior, she ranked 51st in the NCAA with a .349 hitting percentage and was named to the Academic All-District team. She averaged 2.83 kills, 0.91 blocks and 3.51 points per set and earned Academic All-ACC honors for a third straight season.

Barry's senior year elevated her to a place among FSU's all-time elite athletes. She was the 2009 ACC Player of the Year, earned AVCA All-America Second Team honors, and was AVCA All-Region after helping lead FSU to the Elite Eight in the 2009 NCAA Tournament, a 31-3 record and final ranking of 11th. At the time of her induction, Brianna still held the record for the best hitting percentage in school history (0.371) and remains in FSU's top 10 in blocks and points.

An assistant coach at George Washington University, Brianna was inducted posthumously.









JONAS BLIXT GOLF 2004-2008

Jonas Blixt came to Tallahassee from Hammaro, Sweden, and he ignited a Seminole run to national prominence in the sport.

As a freshman, he earned his first collegiate win at the Gator Invitational, then lowered his scoring average by nearly a full stroke as a sophomore when he shot 73.19 over the 2005-06 season.

Blixt became a star during his junior and senior years. He led FSU to its first-ever ACC Championship in 2007 earning second team All-America honors. He won two tournaments in that season including winning the ACC Individual Championship.

In his senior year, Blixt earned eight Top 10 finishes and was a First Team All-America selection. He was named to the Ping All-Southeast Region team and was an All-Nicklaus honoree. He repeated as an All-ACC selection and had four tournament wins while becoming just the third first-team All-American in program history

Blixt joined the PGA Tour in 2012, and he has three tour victories to date along with a second place finish in his first Masters in 2014.









TONEY DOUGLAS

BASKETBALL 2007-2009


Toney Douglas transferred from Auburn in 2006 where he was a Freshman All-American.

As as a sophomore, Douglas was FSU's second-leading scorer (12.7 ppg) starting 28 games at point guard for the 2007 team that finished 22-13. As a junior, he led the 2008 team in scoring averaging 15.4 points per game and led the ACC in both assists and steals per game. He was named to the All-ACC Defensive Team and was an All-ACC Third-Team selection.

Toney's senior season was one of the best in FSU history. He led FSU to its first-ever berth in the ACC Championship game, a 25-10 record and No. 16 final ranking. He was named All-America Third Team and was a finalist for the Bob Cousy Award as the nation's best point guard. He led the ACC in scoring, averaging 21.5 points per game, and was the 2009 ACC Defensive Player of the Year, and a first-team All-ACC and All-ACC Defensive team selection. His 1,665 career points ranked fifth in school history and he is among the Top-10 in seven different categories.

Douglas was the first round selection of the NBA's Los Angeles Lakers and traded to the New York Knicks on draft night in 2009, which started his very successful professional career.





BECKY EDWARDS SOCCER 2006 - 2009

Becky Edwards signed with FSU in 2006 out of Downington, Pa., and became one of the best soccer players in school history.

Edwards started 25 games as a freshman and her eight assists and five game-winning assists led the Noles. She was part of a defensive backline that set FSU's single-season record for shutouts (14) and GAA (0.67). Edwards was named to the ACC All-Freshman Team and the Top Drawer Soccer National All-Freshman Team. She started all 27 games as a sophomore, scoring three goals and assisting on three more en route to being named to the NSCAA All-Region First Team and the CoSIDA/ESPN Academic All-District First Team.


She was named an NSCAA First Team All-American following her junior year and led FSU to its third straight NCAA Elite Eight appearance as the Seminoles made the College Cup the previous two years. She repeated as an All-American as a senior and started 25 games, assisted on eight goals while scoring five of her own. She was also named an NSCAA First Team Scholar All-American in 2009. Over her four years at Florida State, she was part of a defense that recorded 50 shutouts in 102 games.

After a successful professional career, Becky went in to coaching and was an assistant coach at Penn at the time of her hall of fame induction.









GRAHAM GANO


FOOTBALL 2005-2008

Graham Gano signed in 2005 out of Tate High School in Pensacola and became one of the greatest special teams players in Seminole and ACC football history.


Gano handled kickoffs for the Seminoles as a freshman in 2005 and was FSU's starting punter and kickoff specialist as a sophomore and junior. He averaged 40.8 yards per punt as a sophomore in 2006 and posted his career-high average of 43.4 yards as a junior with 16 punts over 50 yards.

He entered his senior season slated to become the first player in school history to handle all kicking duties (punt, KOs and field goals), but a preseason injury forced coaches to limit him to field goals. Even though he missed the first two games, he became the best kicker in the country, winning the 2008 Lou Groza Award. He led the FBS in field goals with 24, field goals of 50 yards or more (5), and field goal percentage (92.3). He capped his career as the Most Valuable Player in FSU's Champs Sports Bowl win over Wisconsin when he added punting duties and kept the Badgers pinned all day, dropping four punts inside their 10.

Gano is in his 13th season as one of the premier kickers in the NFL.









LEONARD HAMILTON

BASKETBALL 2002 - PRESENT

Leonard Hamilton is the Seminoles' all-time winningest coach and the fifth all-time winningest coach in ACC history. He is a five-time National Coach of the Year winner, three-time ACC Coach of the Year honoree and two-time Big East Coach of the Year selection.


Under Hamilton, FSU won its first ACC Championship in 2012 and finished first in the ACC regular-season for the first time in 2020. He has won at least 20 games in 12 of his 20 years at Florida State and has led FSU into the postseason 16 times. He has a 394-240 record at FSU and 594-450 in 34 seasons as a collegiate head coach.

Hamilton's 2019 FSU team, which advanced to the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament, set several FSU records including the most wins in a single season with 29. Coupled with an appearance in the 2018 NCAA Elite Eight, the 2019 season marked the second time in history that the Seminoles advanced to at least the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament in consecutive seasons.

Hamilton's commitment to the academic and personal success of his players is unmatched. Since the start of the 2003 season, 71 of his 73 players (97.3 %) who played through their senior year earned their degrees.









NGONI MAKUSHA

TRACK & FIELD 2008-2011

Ngoni Makusha's path to FSU's Hall of Fame started before he arrived when he represented his home country of Zimbabwe in the 2008 Olympics finishing fourth in the long jump. He never let up after that en route to becoming one of the greatest collegiate track athletes of all time.

Over his historic FSU career from 2008-2011, Makusha won seven NCAA titles in the long jump, 100m and as a member of FSU's 4x100 relay team, six ACC Championships, and played a key role on the Seminoles' 2008 NCAA National Championship team.

The eight-time All-American set an NCAA and ACC record in the 100m in 2011. His five NCAA individual titles rank as the second-most ever for an FSU male track athlete, and his eight All-America honors rank as the sixth most.

He won the Bowerman Award and was named NCAA Male Track Athlete of the Year as a senior when his performance at the NCAA Outdoors was heralded as one of the greatest ever. He won the 100-meter in a record 9.89, added a long jump crowin, then combined with teammates to win the 4x100-meter relay, which made him just the fourth man in history to claim those three golds, joining legends Jesse Owens and Carl Lewis.


RANDY ORAVETZ ADMINISTRATION 1979-2010

Randy Oravetz worked under legendary athletic trainer Don Fauls beginning in 1979 before taking over as Director of Sports Medicine in 1986 and he served in that capacity until 2010.

He supervised a staff that oversaw the medical care of over 500 student-athletes in 19 varsity sports and served as the primary liaison between the FSU team doctors and the coaching staff. In addition, he was directly responsible for the daily care and treatment of the football team.

During Oravetz's tenure, five FSU football players earned the Piccolo Award, which is given annually by the ACC to the "Most Courageous Player" in the league. Honorees, Dan Footman (1992), Sam Cowart (1997), Corey Simon (1998), Chris Weinke (1999) and Anquan Boldin (2002) all battled back from injury to excel at the collegiate level but also in the NFL. The award is a tribute to not only the hard work and character of the winners but also the professionalism and dedication of the athletic trainers and medical staff who assist them.

In 2007 Oravetz was named to the Athletic Trainers' Association of Florida Hall of Fame. Oravetz was honored by the National Association of Athletic Trainers in 1988 when he was named the National Service Award winner and again in 2000 when he received the Distinguished Athletic Trainer Award.







KIMBERLY WILLIAMS TRACK & FIELD 2008-2011

Kimberly Williams took the collegiate track and field world by storm as a freshman in 2008, earning both the ACC's Indoor and Outdoor Freshman of the Year honors. She would leave three years later as the most decorated women's track and field athlete in FSU history.

The world-class jumper rewrote the FSU record book on her way to winning five NCAA individual championships, the most for any female in the history of the program. She won triple jump and long jump national championships as a sophomore in 2008 and won three consecutive indoor triple jump NCAA Championships from 2009-11. An 11-time All-American, she was the Women's Outdoor Field Athlete of the Year in 2009.

Williams won 12 individual ACC titles - the most for any Seminole male or female. She was also a two-time CoSIDA Academic All-American, three-time USTFCCCA All-Academic honoree, and a 2012 nominee for the NCAA Woman of the Year. She was awarded the prestigious Weaver-James-Corrigan ACC Postgraduate Scholarship following her senior year.

She is a three-time Olympian competing for Jamaica in London (2012), Rio de Janeiro (2016) and Tokyo (2020).
