RYAN BARTHELEMY

BASEBALL 1999-2002

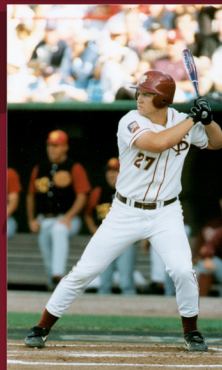
A graduate of Killian High School in Miami, Barthelemy was an immediate contributor as a true freshman in 1999. He played 51 games with 20 starts for a team that reached the College World Series. He posted a .343 batting average with five home runs and 24 RBI as a rookie. Over his next three seasons, Barthelemy would start all but one game.

As a sophomore in 2000, Barthelemy hit 14 home runs and 71 RBI. He was voted second-team All-ACC and helped lead the Seminoles to a second straight College World Series.

A first-team All-ACC selection as a junior, Barthelemy hit .343 with 14 home runs and 72 RBI, and as a senior in 2002, he led the team in home runs (17) and RBI (94) while posting a .357 batting average. He earned first-team All-America honors and repeated as a member of the All-ACC first team and was the ACC Tournament MVP.

Barthelemy's 260 career games played still stand among the Top 10 in FSU history and his 321 career hits, 261 RBI and 948 career at-bats rank among the Top 5 all-time.

Drafted by the Phillies, Barthelemy played five seasons of professional baseball.



ANQUAN BOLDIN

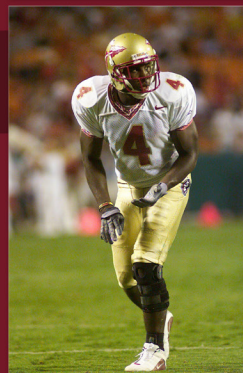
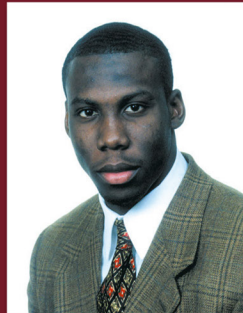
FOOTBALL 1999-2002

Anquan Boldin was the 1999 3A Florida HS player of the year, a USA Today All-USA selection and was the nation's 7th-ranked prospect as a quarterback at Pahokee High.

Boldin earned playing time as a true freshman receiver in 1999 finishing with 12 catches for 115 yards on the Seminoles' National Championship team. As a sophomore in 2000, Boldin had 41 catches and six touchdowns for the Seminole team that reached its third straight national title game.

He began spring practice his junior season in 2001 locked in a battle for the starting quarterback position but suffered a serious knee injury and missed the entire season. As a senior, Boldin led FSU with 65 catches for 1,011 yards and scored a team-high 13 touchdowns, which tied for the fourth-best in ACC history. Ironically, he would play his last game for the Seminoles back at quarterback against Georgia in the Sugar Bowl.

Over a 14-year NFL career, Boldin earned NFL Rookie of the Year honors, made three Pro Bowls, won a Super Bowl and was voted Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year. He had 1,076 receptions for 13,779 yards and 82 TDs over his NFL career.

CASEY HUNTER

SOFTBALL 2002-2005

Casey Hunter signed with FSU's heralded softball program as a pitcher out of Millstadt, Illinois and would help lead the Noles to two College World Series.

As a freshman in 2002, Hunter saw playing time almost immediately and pitched in 11 games posting a 2.10 era. She emerged on the national scene in 2003 as a sophomore earning first-team All-ACC and All-ACC Tournament honors. She had a 27-6 record with a .67 era and pitched over 208 innings in 31 starts.

Her breakout season came as a junior in 2004 when she had a record of 33-4 with 14 shutouts. Her .63 ERA was third nationally and she had a 21-game winning streak. Along with repeating as first-team All-ACC and All-ACC Tournament, Hunter was voted MVP of the ACC Tournament. She earned first-team All-America honors by Easton and second-team honors by the NFCA.

Hunter was 21-17 as a senior with 47 appearances, including 36 starts, and posted a 1.67 ERA with 338 strikeouts. She was named All-ACC second team and finished her Hall of Fame career with an 85-27 record and 1.40 ERA with 36 shutouts and 893 career strikeouts.



LAMARCUS JOYNER

FOOTBALL 2010-2013

An electric athlete at St. Thomas Aquinas in Ft. Lauderdale, Joyner was the 2010 USA Today National Defensive Player of the Year.

Joyner played in all 14 games at safety as a true freshman in 2010 recording 23 tackles and an interception. As a sophomore in 2011, Joyner started every game and earned All-ACC second-team honors after grabbing four interceptions and breaking up three passes.

He earned first-team All-ACC honors following his junior year after recording 51 tackles, an interception and five passes broken up while emerging as one of the most respected leaders on the team. Moving to cornerback as a senior, he recorded 67 tackles in 2013, 5.5 quarterback sacks, two interceptions and four pass breakups. His play in the win over Auburn for the BCS National Championship was the stuff of legends. He was voted a unanimous 1st team All-American.

His FSU career stats included 197 tackles, 10.5 tackles for loss, 6.5 quarterback sacks and eight interceptions. He also returned 52 kickoffs for 1,260 yards.

Joyner played nine years in the NFL with the Rams, Raiders and Jets.

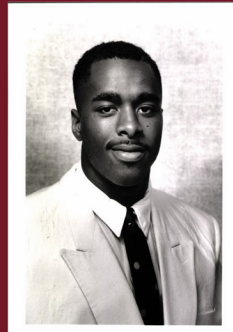
PHILLIP RILEY M. TRACK & FIELD

Phillip Riley came to Florida State in 1993 as a sophomore after graduating from Jones High School in Orlando. During his rookie season, Riley won the 55-meter hurdles in two of the four meets before injuries ended his season.

Riley's junior season would see him earn MVP and All-ACC honors at the 1994 ACC Indoor Championships after winning the 60-meters and 55-meter hurdles. He won the silver medal at the NCAA Indoor National Championship in the 55-meter hurdles. He also dominated the outdoor season winning the ACC Championship in the 110-meters and repeating as an All-ACC honoree.

Riley capped a fantastic junior season by winning the 1995 NCAA Indoor National Championship in the 55-meter hurdles. And while only competing outdoors as a senior, he won the ACC Championship in the hurdles, the fourth of his career. He finished fifth at the NCAA Championships in the 110 and sixth as a member of the 4x100 meter relay team making him a four-time All-American.

As a receiver on the football team, Riley played in 26 games and would go on to play the 1996 season with the N.Y. Jets.



KATIE RYBAKOVA W. TENNIS 2008-11

Katie Rybakova was born in Moscow, Russia and moved to the U.S. at the age of one. She signed with FSU after graduating from Broward Virtual High School in Coral Springs, Fla.

Rybakova not only immediately moved into the lineup as a true freshman in the fall of 2007, she played at the No. 1 position posting an 18-7 record in dual matches and No. 33 national ranking in doubles. She earned All-ACC honors in the spring and capped her first year with a berth in singles play in the NCAA Tournament.

Rybakova repeated as an All-ACC selection in 2009 and once again earned a spot in the NCAA singles championship. She posted a 26-17 dual match record over her sophomore year and played No. 1 doubles.

Rybakova was All-ACC for a third consecutive season and again reached the NCAA singles championship after posting a 16-12 record as a junior, and her senior season was simply one of the finest in FSU history. She won a school-record 28 singles matches in 2011 and became a four-time All-ACC honoree.

She remains second on FSU's career singles wins list with 103 and fifth for career doubles wins with 70.

BERNIE WAXMAN ADMINISTRATION 1974-2019

Two years before Bobby Bowden was hired and six years before Mike Martin Sr. took over the baseball program, Bernie Waxman was hired to direct FSU's intramural programs. And 45 years later, a beloved Bernie Waxman retired after having led intramurals for 17 years before becoming the director of facilities and operations for Seminole Athletics for 28 years.

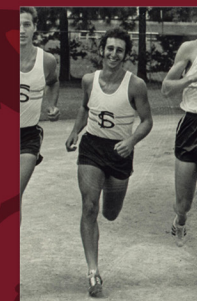
Waxman's association and clear love of all things FSU, started while earning three letters from 1970-72 as a track and field athlete and serving as team captain in 1972.

Few have seen more change at FSU than Waxman who was there when the Seminoles' fledgling women's softball program played on an intramural field with no fences.

Bernie oversaw a staggering upgrade of facilities over his tenure including the dramatic expansion and improvement of Doak Campbell Stadium; planning and construction of the soccer/softball complex, basketball training center, indoor and outdoor tennis complexes, the Morcom Aquatics Center and the McIntosh Building at Mike Long track.

Waxman was there from the very start as FSU Athletics overhauled the Moore Athletic Center, and the golf facilities look nothing like those that he played as a student and employee for nearly 50 years.

Waxman also oversaw numerous sports over his time at FSU building lasting bonds with student-athletes, coaches and staff spanning nearly three decades.
