

## BOB BRAMAN COACHES 2000-2024

The head coach of Florida State's cross country teams beginning in 2000, Bob Braman took over as head coach of the perennially powerful track and field programs as well in 2004 and, over his 24-year tenure, elevated the Seminoles to elite status.

Braman led men's teams to NCAA Outdoor National Championships in 2006 and 2008, and he was voted USTFCCA National Coach of the Year in 2006, 2007 and 2008. He led 30 teams to NCAA Top 10 finishes.

FSU won 35 team ACC Championships under Braman, and he was voted ACC Coach of the Year 34 times.

Two Seminole athletes, triple-jumper Ngoni Makusha and hurdler Trey Cunningham, won Bowerman trophies under Braman. He coached 25 NCAA National Champions at FSU (19 men and 6 women) and 187 All-Americans (100 men and 87 women) over his career. 49 Seminoles (27 men and 22 women) became Olympians.

Before FSU, Braman enjoyed 17 years of success at USF where he began his career as the men's cross country assistant in 1983, was promoted to head coach in 1985 and launched the women's program in 1986. He was named USF's first track & field coach in 1991.



## RASHAD GREENE FOOTBALL 2011-2014

Over his sensational four-year career, Rashad Greene set the FSU record for receptions with 270, receiving yards with 3,830, which is also the ACC record, and had a stunning 43 consecutive games with a reception.

Greene also holds FSU's single-season record for receptions with 99 as a senior in 2014, and his 1,365 receiving yards that season is the second-highest total ever by a Seminole. He led the ACC in receptions, yards, receptions per game (7.1) and yards per game (97.5) that year and ranked in the Top 15 nationally in five categories. In addition, he ranked second in the league and 18th nationally with a 10.7 punt return average.

Greene capped his freshman season in 2011 with MVP honors in the Champs Sports Bowl and, despite missing four games with an injury, he still led FSU in catches (38), yards (596), touchdown receptions (7) and yards per game (66.2) on his way to earning Freshman All-America honors.

As a sophomore, Greene again led FSU in all receiving categories with 57 catches for 741 yards and six touchdowns. He ranked third nationally in punt return average at 15.4 per return.

Greene's team-leading 76 receptions, including nine for touchdowns, as a junior on FSU's 2013 National Championship team were the second most in school history at the time, and he was named All-ACC following the season.

Greene was drafted by the Jacksonville Jaguars and played four seasons there.



## BRYAN HENRY BASEBALL 2005-2007


Tallahassee's own Bryan Henry is one of the finest pitchers in the storied history of Florida State baseball. A semifinalist for the 2007 Roger Clemens Award, he was named a First Team All-American and the ACC Pitcher of the Year as a senior.

Henry became the first Seminole ever voted first team All-ACC for three seasons, and he posted a career record of 32-9 with an ERA of 2.60. He pitched 322.1 innings for the Seminoles, striking out 273 with only 75 walks, and opponents averaged just .231 against him over his career.

Henry had a 14-game winning streak during his senior season in which he led the nation in wins (13) over the regular season and became just the eighth pitcher since FSU joined the ACC in 1992 to record 13 wins in a season.

In 2005, his sophomore campaign surged after beating two top-seven teams. He finished his first year at FSU with a 9-3 record. The next season, he continued his dominance with a 9-4 record, a stingy 2.88 ERA, and a memorable streak of 27 consecutive scoreless innings, again securing First Team All-ACC honors.

Henry was drafted in the 12th round by Arizona, where he played professionally for seven seasons.



## TERRY HORNER SWIMMING & DIVING 2007-2010

A four-year letterman for FSU from Orlando, Florida, Terry Horner etched his name into Seminoles history with a glittering collegiate diving career.

In his freshman season (2007), he captured the NCAA Championship on the one meter board with a school record score of 399.35—the first national diving title for FSU in 36 years—earning ACC Diver and Freshman of the Year honors and All American distinction on both one meter (1st) and three meter (8th).

Horner dominated the ACC earning All-Conference honors all four years and winning ACC titles on the one meter three times and once on the three meter. In 2008, he captured the U.S. National Championship on the one meter and claimed third in the nation (bronze) on one meter at the NCAA Championships, while earning honorable mention All-American on three meter.

His NCAA finishes show remarkable consistency: one meter: 1st (2007), 3rd (2008), 11th (2009), 2nd (2010); three meter: 8th, 16th, 5th and 5th.

Horner was a six time All-American (plus two honorable mentions), three time ACC one meter champion, and two time ACC three meter champion amassing 100 NCAA Championship points, third most in FSU history.





## COLLEEN QUIGLEY TRACK/CROSS COUNTRY 2012-15

Colleen Quigley not only became one of Florida State's greatest athletes ever over her career on the track and the cross country trails, but was equally accomplished academically.

A nine-time All-American over the course of her career, Quigley won the steeplechase at the 2015 NCAA Outdoor Championship in her final collegiate race. She was the 2015 USTFCCA Women's Outdoor Track National Scholar Athlete of the Year as a senior and earned ACC Scholar-Athlete of the Year honors in cross country, indoor and outdoor track and field.

Quigley had immediate success at FSU, winning ACC Freshman of the Year and finishing fifth in the 2012 NCAA steeplechase. She was runner-up for the NCAA Championship in the steeplechase as a sophomore, setting a school and ACC record in the process.

After sweeping ACC Cross Country Performer of the Year, Scholar-Athlete of the Year and finishing sixth at the NCAA Championships in 2014, her junior outdoor season was cut short by injury, but she still won a second consecutive ACC Championship in the steeplechase.

Her career-capping NCAA Championship as a senior in 2015 was the third-fastest time in college history, and she also took home the bronze medal in the mile at the NAAs. She was voted the ACC Outdoor Track Performer of the Year for 2015.

Quigley competed for the USA at the 2016 Olympic Games in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil.



## LACEY WALDROP SOFTBALL 2012-15

One of the finest pitchers in collegiate softball history, Lacey Waldrop became FSU's all-time wins leader with 109 over her career and was among FSU's all-time top five in four different categories – total wins, appearances (170–2nd), strikeouts (917–3rd), and saves (7–4th).

The 2014 USA Softball National Player of the Year, Waldrop was a three-time All-American, two-time ACC Pitcher of the Year (2014-15) and three-time All-ACC.

Waldrop had immediate success as a freshman, posting a 19-5 record and an ACC-leading 1.33 ERA. As a sophomore in 2013, she repeated as an All-ACC team selection and was 24-10, and her 1.53 ERA once again led the conference.

Her historic junior season saw her lead the nation with an FSU record 38 wins. She ranked in the Top 25 nationally in ERA, strikeouts and shutouts and allowed more than one earned run in just 10 of her 48 appearances on the season.

In addition to her remarkable stats as a senior that include a 28-7 record, 1.52 ERA with 232 strikeouts, she earned her third NFCA All-America honor and was named the 2015 national CLASS Award winner for her achievements on and off the field.

Waldrop was the No. 3 pick in the 2015 National Pro Fastpitch draft by the Chicago Bandits.



## JAMEIS WINSTON FOOTBALL 2013-2014

The youngest player ever to win the Heisman Trophy, Jameis Winston completed his 27-game career as one of the greatest quarterbacks in Florida State, ACC and college football history.

Winston won his first 26 starts – a feat unmatched by major NCAA Division I quarterbacks all-time - and famously led Florida State to a national championship in 2013 as well as the first-ever College Football Playoff Semifinal at the Rose Bowl in 2014.

Winston captured countless honors over his two-year FSU career, including the Heisman Trophy, Davey O'Brien Award, Manning Award and consensus All-America honors in 2013.

His career pass efficiency mark (163.28) ranks 10th in college football history (since 1956) and is an ACC and FSU record. His 2013 pass efficiency mark of 184.84 is the fourth-best in college football history and is also an ACC and FSU record. Among the records he holds is the ACC career record for passing yards per game (295.0) and touchdown passes per game (2.41). He holds the FSU career record for throwing a touchdown passes in 27 consecutive games and yards per attempt (9.4), and tied with Chris Weinke for most 300-yard games (14) despite playing only two seasons.

Winston ranks second in FSU history in touchdown passes (65) and completion percentage (66.0), and fourth in FSU history in passing yards (7,964) and seventh in career completions (562). He holds FSU single-season records for completions (305 in 2014), touchdown passes (40 in 2013), yards per attempt (10.6 in 2013) and tied the record for 300-yard games with seven in in each of his two seasons.

Winston also earned two letters on the Florida State baseball team, helping the Seminoles grab the No. 5 national seed as the closer in 2014 and the No. 7 national seed as a reliever, outfielder and designated hitter in 2013.

Winston was the No. 1 overall pick in the 2015 NFL draft by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers and is still playing in the NFL.
