SEAN GILMARTIN BASEBALL 2009-2011

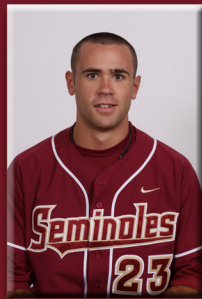
Sean Gilmartin was one of the nation's top recruits out of Moorpark, CA, and became one of college baseball's finest starting pitchers over his three-year career.

Gilmartin posted a 12-3 record with a 3.49 ERA with 83 strikeouts in 15 starts over a remarkable rookie season. He was named to either Second or Third Team All-America teams by every publication and was a consensus First Team Freshman All-American. He was voted First Team All-ACC on FSU's 2009 team that finished 9th nationally in Baseball America's poll following a 45-18 season.

His workhorse sophomore campaign saw him start a team-high 18 games on the 2010 team that reached the College World Series and finished the season ranked 6th after posting a 48-20 record. He got the start in the opening game of both the NCAA Super Regional and the College World Series.

Gilmartin's junior year was one of the finest seasons in FSU and college baseball history. He earned First Team All-America and All-ACC honors, and posted a 12-2 record with a stunning 2.09 ERA.

Selected in the first round of the MLB draft by the Atlanta Braves following his junior year, he played six years in the major leagues for the Mets, Orioles and Rays.



DAVE HART ATHLETICS DIRECTOR 1994-2007

Dave Hart served as Director of Athletics from the 1994-1995 season through 2007 and is considered one of the finest administrators to have served in intercollegiate athletics.

Hart is credited with leading Florida State to unprecedented success over his tenure, which included expansive improvement in all aspects of the program. Under his leadership, the Seminoles won National Championships in football (1999) and two in men's track and field, along with 33 ACC Championships. He elevated FSU programs to perennial rankings among the nation's Top 25 most successful.

Hart took a leadership role in the athletics department's first-ever major Capital Campaign, in concert with Seminole Boosters, which raised over \$75 million for athletics facilities and endowed athletics scholarships for all sports at Florida State. Hart worked closely with Seminole Boosters, Inc. to double the athletic budget over his tenure, as well as planning and guiding the development and implementation of an extensive and comprehensive facilities master plan for athletics.

He initiated a multi-faceted Student Development and Life Skills program for all student-athletes at FSU, which was recognized nationally as a "Program of Excellence" by the Division I-A Athletics Directors' Association and became a model nationally.

KASSEY KALLMAN SOCCER 2010-2013

Kassey Kallman was a prized defensive player coming out of Woodbury, MN and her impact on the Florida State program as a four-year starter was monumental.

Kallman earned a spot on Soccer America's First Team Freshman All-America team in 2010, along with Second Team honors from TopDrawerSoccer.com, along with Second Team All-ACC and All-ACC Freshman Team honors.

A First Team All-ACC selection as a junior, Kallman was named to TopDrawerSoccer.com's First Team. She was recognized throughout her career for her outstanding academic achievements, including earning Second Team Academic All-America honors as a junior.

Kallman was a finalist for the MAC Hermann Trophy and Honda Award following her sensational senior season. She was the ACC Defensive Player of the Year and was voted the ACC Tournament Most Valuable Player. In addition, she was a Consensus All-America selection.

Over her FSU career, Kallman led Seminole defenses that posted 57 shutouts and finished fifth, third, third and runner-up in the NCAA Tournament. In addition to her world-class defensive skills, she scored 10 career goals, including four game-winning goals.



MAURICE MITCHELL TRACK & FIELD 2009-2012

A sprinter from Kansas City, MO, Mitchell won the NCAA National Championship in the 200-meters in both 2011 and 2012 and won a third NCAA gold medal as a member of FSU's 4x100 Relay Team in 2011. He was a 13-time All-American over his storied career.

Mitchell was a 14-time ACC Champion, including winning eight individual events. He was voted the ACC Indoor Track Performer of the Year three times and the Outdoor ACC Track Performer of the Year twice. He was the ACC Freshman of the Year in 2009.

Mitchell earned his first All-America honor as a sophomore in the indoor 200-meters and 60-meters. In addition to his three national championships, Mitchell finished second in the indoor 200-meters as a sophomore, third in the 60-meters and 100 meters in 2011, as well as the 100-meters his senior year. In addition, he posted finishes among the nation's top seven in three other events.

Florida State was runner-up for NCAA outdoor National Championships in Mitchell's freshman and junior seasons. FSU was third at the 2009 NCAA Indoors and fifth in 2011. The Seminoles were ACC Champions in six of the eight meets over Mitchell's career.

Mitchell represented the United States at the 2012 Olympic Games in London.



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NICK O'LEARY FOOTBALL 2011-2014

Nick O'Leary became FSU's first-ever John Mackey Award winner, given to the nation's top tight end, as a senior in 2014 and over his career became the Seminoles' all-time leader among tight ends in receptions (114), yards (1,591) and total touchdowns with 18.

O'Leary earned Honorable Mention Freshman All-America honors from College Football News in 2011 following a season in which he played in every game. He was selected Honorable Mention All-ACC as a sophomore when he moved into the starting position.

He was a finalist for the Mackey Award after his junior season with 33 receptions for 557 yards and seven touchdowns. His 16.9 yards per catch average led the nation, and he was second nationally in touchdowns scored by a tight end. He became FSU's career-record holder for touchdown catches by a tight end with 11 and earned third-team All-America honors.

O'Leary won the Mackey Award as a senior and was a Consensus All-American. He ranked second on the team in receptions (48), yards (618) and receiving scores (6) and became the Seminoles' all-time most productive tight end. He helped lead Florida State to the 2013 National Championship with a win over Auburn in the BCS National Championship game played at the Rose Bowl and to the national semifinals at the Rose Bowl against Oregon in 2014.

O'Leary played five years in the NFL with the Bills, Dolphins and Jaguars.



JACE PARDON BEACH VOLLEYBALL 2012-2016

Jace Pardon, a three-time American Volleyball Coaches Association (AVCA) All-American and CCSA Conference Pair of the Year selection, is the first beach volleyball athlete to be voted into the FSU Athletics Hall of Fame. She led the Seminoles to the inaugural NCAA Beach Volleyball Championships and a runner-up finish in 2016.

As a freshman in 2012, Pardon and Jekaterina Stepanova advanced to the semifinals of the AVCA National Championships and had a 45-6 record.

Pardon earned All-America honors as a sophomore after a 3-1 record at the AVCA National Championships before losing to the eventual champions.

Pardon repeated as an All-American as a junior in 2014, playing as the No. 1 pair with fellow All-American Aurora Davis. The pair posted an impressive 41-4 record that included 26 consecutive wins without dropping a set. Pardon helped lead the Seminoles to their first-ever AVCA National Championship final.

After an injury forced a redshirt in 2015, Pardon had a sensational 2016 season in which she led FSU to the NCAA National Championship match. She earned AVCA All-America recognition and teamed with Julie Brown to sweep the CCSA season awards and posted a 28-5 dual match record.

Pardon finished as the school's all-time leader in matches played (190), overall wins (155) and dual-match victories (85), while ranking second all-time in tournament victories with 62.



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BJOERN WERNER FOOTBALL 2010-2012

The ACC Defensive Player of the Year as a junior in 2012, Bjoern Werner earned Unanimous All-America honors that season and a place among the all-time greats in Florida State history.

An exchange student from Berlin, Germany, Werner played in all 14 games as a true freshman in 2010. He finished his rookie season with 20 tackles, including six tackles for loss and 3.5 quarterback sacks.

Werner started all 13 games as a sophomore for an FSU defense that ranked second in the nation against the run, fourth in scoring defense and sixth in total defense. He was selected as one of the team defensive Most Valuable Players after ranking second on the team in pass break-ups (8), passes defended (9) and tackles for loss (11) along with seven quarterback sacks.

His final season at FSU was one of the best ever. He ranked third nationally and first in the ACC with 13 quarterback sacks while also ranking 14th in the NCAA in sacks per game. He led the nation in yards accumulated on tackles behind the line of scrimmage (134), and only fellow FSU Hall of Famer Peter Boulware recorded more sacks over their first three seasons in FSU history.

Werner played three years in the NFL for the Colts and has become the NFL's top liaison in Europe.



KATRINA YOUNG DIVING 2011-2015

Katrina Young is the first female diver elected to the FSU Athletics Hall of Fame. A two-time Olympian, the Shoreline, WA native began diving at the age of 9 after first participating in gymnastics. Her talent quickly led her to compete at the national and international levels while still a junior athlete.

Young had immediate success at FSU, earning All-ACC honors as a freshman in 2011. She would go on to make the All-ACC team in each of her four competitive seasons with FSU.

Young earned her first All-America honor as a sophomore, placing fourth on the platform at the NCAA Championships in 2012. She became a two-time All-American on the one-meter board as a senior.

Young, who did not compete in 2013 due to an injury, was a three-time ACC Champion. She won the platform at the ACC in 2012 and 2014, and the one-meter as a senior in 2015.

Following her success at FSU, Young earned a spot on the U.S. Olympic Team in the 10-meter platform event for the 2016 Olympic Games in Rio de Janeiro. She earned a second Olympic berth for the Tokyo Games in 2020. She won numerous international honors, including a silver medal in synchronized platform diving at the 2022 World Aquatics Championships.
