pleted his second year at the helm of the Florida State cross country team after 17 years of national level success at

the University of South Florida. In addition to his head coaching duties for the men's and women's cross country teams, Braman also serves as the distance coach on head coach Terry Long's track and field staff.

In only two years Braman has turned Florida State into one of the fastest rising programs in the nation. In 2001, both men and the women achieved national rankings. In addition, both squads placed third at the NCAA South Regional, which were the best finishes in school history. At FSU, Braman has coached three All-ACC honorees, 10 All-South Region honorees and three NCAA National Championship individual qualifiers.

Braman's Seminoles have flourished off the trails, as well. In the classroom, 16 runners were named to the ACC All-Academic Honor Roll in 2000-2001. The Seminoles also made generous

donations in 2001 to charities such as the United Way and the Refuge House of Tallahassee.

Braman began coaching at USF in 1983 as the men's cross country assistant. He was promoted to head coach in 1985 and initiated the women's cross country program in 1987. When South Florida began its track program in 1991, Braman assumed head coaching duties for that sport as well. Under Braman's guidance the USF men's cross country team won the last three Conference USA titles while the women's team is the two time defending Conference USA champion.

Braman coached the men's and women's cross country teams to top 30 finishes in 1999. His men's cross country teams also won six-straight conference titles between 1988 and 1993, three were in the Sun Belt Conference and three were in the Metro Conference.


During his tenure at South Florida, Braman was honored as Coach-of-the-Year 14 times. His men's cross country teams earned national rankings ten of the last 12 years, including a No. 5 national ranking in 1991, while the women's teams were ranked four of the last six years. Braman has coached 38 national qualifiers in cross country, and 28 national qualifiers on the track, including two-time NCAA champion




Jon Dennis (5000 meters 1992 and 1993).

Braman graduated from the University of Florida in 1980 with a bachelor's degree in broadcasting. He was the captain of the Gators' cross country team for three seasons and garnered All-SEC honors in cross country (1979 and 1980) and indoor track (1979). He was also the University of Florida's record holder in the indoor three-mile run.

Braman, 43, is married to the former Debbie Turner and has two sons, Steven (13) and Tyler (11).

assistant coach for the men's and women's cross country team. Spangler came to Florida State after an accomplished career at the University of Alabama. At FSU, he assists in the coaching and recruiting of all distance runners.

After originally walking on at Alabama, he went on to earn a scholarship and numerous honors for the Crimson Tide. Spangler was named to the All-Southeastern Conference and allregion teams in cross country while also recording the fifth-fastest time in the indoor 5000 meter and the 10th-fastest outdoor 10,000 meter in the University of Alabama school history on the track. Spangler also competed at two NCAA cross country national championships. An All-SEC academic team selection, he graduated with a degree in sports management.

A native of Brooksville, Fla., Spangler began his distance career at Hernando High School. He won the state two-mile title as a junior and was the runner-up as a senior. In cross country, he was a two time champion at the conference and district championships and he also earned academic

all-conference honors.

Spangler, 26, is graduated from FSU in 2001 with a masters in sports administration. He continues to train and run competitively.

as the graduate assistant after serving his first year as a volunteer assistant.

Vaughn came to FSU after two year stint as an assistant coach for the Chapel Hill-Carrboro Pacers, a youth running club that competes in the USATF Junior Olympic circuit in North Carolina.

Under Vaughn's guidance 35 athletes have qualified for the national championships in both cross country and track and field, while four of those athletes moved on to earn All-America honors and one won a national cross country championship. Vaughn handles the day to day tasks of team travel planning, compliance issues, as well as maintaining the cross country and track and field programs' website, www.fsutrack.com.

Jamie competed collegiately at the University of North Carolina at Asheville. He was a two time scorer in the 10,000m race at the Big South Conference Outdoor Track and Field Championship. Vaughn earned a bachelors degree in economics at UNCA where was named to the Dean's list several times and earned All-Big South academic honors. He earned a masters degree in sports administration in 2001 and is currently pursuing an MBA.

Whaley's duties include assisting Braman in office work, coordinating practices and travel and helping organize the 2001 Florida State Intercollegiate Championship.

While at USF, Whaley was a threetime NCAA Championship qualifier, a two-time All-Conference USA honoree and an All-South Region member. Whaley's personal best time of 24:36 in the 8K came as a member of the Bulls' cross country team. He graduated from USF in 2001 with a degree in social science.

At Estero High School in Bonita Springs, Fla., Whaley won three individual state championships. He was a two time state champ in the 3,200meter run and a champion in the 1,600meter run. In addition to his individual achievements, Whaley helped lead his high school cross country team to a state championship.



CYNTHIA **CAMPBELL**

GRADUATE **ASSISTANT** FLORIDA STATE '01 Campbell, a former runner on the FSU cross country team,

begins her first year on coach Bob Braman's staff. In addition to her general office duties. Campbell is in charge of coaching the Lady Seminole Striders. The Striders program, which offers expanded opportunities to female cross country runners, began under FSU cross country coach Braman who ran a similar program while coaching at the University of South Florida.

As an undergrad at FSU, Campbell competed on both the cross country and track and field teams. Her best cross country races of her senior year came at the Crimson Classic and Florida Intercollegiate Championship where she finished 16th and sixth, respectively. On the track, she placed eighth at the ACC Championship in the 10,000-meter run posting the seventh-fastest time in FSU history.

Campbell graduated from Florida State in 2001 with a degree in international affairs and is currently working towards a graduate degree in sports administration. During her undergrad studies, she was named to the Dean's List and to the All-ACC Honor Roll.

YEAR IN REVIEW

n only his second season at the helm of the Florida State men's cross country team, head coach Bob Braman led his squad to one of the best seasons in school history. Following a successful first year, Braman's goal in 2001 was to build off that success and qualify the men in the NCAA National Championship. At the NCAA South Region Championship, Braman and his men finished third, only one point behind Tennessee, and an automatic berth to the NCAA.

Despite a strong season on the trails and defeating top-ranked competition, the Seminoles just missed an at-large bid to the national meet. However, newcomers Joep Tigchelaar and Kim Bergdahl both finished with individual qualifying places for the NCAA national meet.

Tigchelaar, a freshman from Macharen, Netherlands, had one of the most successful and decorated freshman campaigns in school history. Tigchelaar's accolades include NCAA All-South Region honors and being the first Seminole ever to earn All-Atlantic Coast Conference and ACC Freshman of the Year honors. In addition, Tigchelaar was the top finisher for the Seminoles in their final three meets, including a 71st-place finish at the NCAA National Championship.

Not to be outdone, Bergdahl, a junior transfer from Kokkola, Finland, also earned All-South Region in his first year with the Tribe. Bergdahl was the top finisher for FSU in his first three meets, including a season-best third-place finish at the Florida State Intercollegiate Championship. Hampered by an Achilles injury at the NCAA championship, Bergdahl finished 208th.

The Seminoles began their season in Boone, N.C., placing second overall at the Appalachian State Invitational. Junior Zach Heissner led the Seminoles, who were without the services of Bergdahl, with a 15th-place finish at 25:22 over the 8K course. Fellow junior, Nick Stuart, placed 17th for the Tribe with a time of 25:24.

On September 22, the Seminoles played host to their only home meet of the season, the Florida State Intercollegiate Championship. The Tribe placed second out of ten Florida schools on the 8K course at the Miccosukee

Greenway, which would be their highest finish as a team in 2001. Bergdahl, in his first meet of the season, proved how valuable he would be to the squad with a third-place finish at 24:38. The Seminoles' second-highest finisher was Tigchelaar's fifth-place finish. This would mark the first of five consecutive meets in which Bergdahl and Tigchelaar would finish first and second for FSU. Stuart placed seventh while Tommy Kunish, the team's lone senior, placed 10th.

Next on the schedule for the Seminoles was the Auburn Cross Country Invitational. FSU placed fourth out of 31 teams in the 8K course. Leading the way for the Tribe was Bergdahl, who finished ninth with a time of 24:50, and Tigchelaar placing 16th. In the end, the Seminoles placed five runners in the top 50.

FSU's next challenge came at the NCAA Pre-Nationals in Greenville, S.C. The Seminoles were impressive against the strong field of competition, placing 13th out of 38 teams. In addition, they defeated the University of Florida for the first time since 1981. Bergdahl was the top finisher for FSU for the third-straight meet, placing 24th in the 8K race with a time of 24:59. In a field consisting of the top talent in the nation, the Seminoles placed four runners in the top 100. The strong showing led to a national ranking of 30th for FSU.

Full of confidence, the men headed to Clemson, S.C. for the Atlantic Coast Conference Championship. This season's championship meet turned out to be the best ever for the Seminoles since joining the ACC in 1991, placing fifth overall in spite of not having the services of their number three runner Maarten van den Heuvel. Tigchelaar finished sixth with a time of 24:36 over the 8K course to lead FSU for the first time. His sixth-place finish was the highest ever for a FSU runner and led all freshmen. Tigchelaar became the first Seminole to earn All-ACC honors and ACC Freshman of the Year honors. Bergdahl placed 12th, crossing the finish line at 25:03. In addition, the Seminoles placed five more runners in the top 50: Dave Guerra (34th), Kunish (42nd), David Johnson (47th), Danny Fritz (48th) and Andrew Bautel (49th).

The final meet of the season, the NCAA South Region Championship in Tuscaloosa, Ala., would turn out to be the most heartbreaking event of the season for the men. The Seminoles had high hopes of placing in the top two in order to receive an automatic bid to the NCAA National Championship. However they fell short, placing third, only one point behind second-place Tennessee. The third-place finish was the best ever for the men. Tigchelaar finished the 10K course at 31:00, good enough for fifth-place and All-South Region honors. Bergdahl placed right behind Tigchelaar in seventh, completing the race in 31:17 and earning All-South Region honors. Both Tigchelaar's and Bergdahl's places were good enough to earn them an invite to run in the NCAA championship meet. Guerra (20th) and Maarten van den Heuvel (21st) also earned all-region honors. This marked the second year in a row that Guerra was an all-region honoree.

Albertson is an excellent addition

to the Seminoles. He is a highly decorated prep runner from Pine Forest High School and was the 800-meter state champion his senior year. He was also named the Northwest Florida Runner of the Year both his junior and senior year in high school and earned all-state honors 10 times during his prep career. In his first year as a Seminole, Albertson's top individual finish was 16th overall at the Florida Intercollegiate Championship with a season best time of 25:41. He graduated from high school with high academic honors and is majoring exercise science.

Bautel is another

highly coveted recruit from Florida. As a prep runner at Vanguard High School, he earned numerous all-state honors in both cross-country and track and field. He was named the Marion County Runner of the Year in both 1999 and 2000 and was also named the Marion County Track Athlete of the Year in 2001. In his first year as a Seminole, he competed at the ACC Championships and ran a personal-best time of 26:02 at the Appalachian State Invitational. Bautel is an excellent student who

graduated cum laude and was on the honor roll all four years in high school.


KIM BERGDAHL JR, Kokkola, Finland (Svenska Handleshogskolan)

finishes in the ACC and NCAA
Regions will attest."

Bergdahl is an experienced runner who lends leadership and front running ability to the Seminoles. He is a junior transfer from Finland who is an excellent steeplechaser on the track. Before coming to FSU, he won the Finnish Senior Steeplechase National Championship two years in a row. Owns a

personal record of 8:35 in the 3000meter steeplechase. In his first year as a Seminole, Bergdahl immediately put his name as one of the top distance runners in FSU history. He finished as the Seminole's first or second runner in every meet he ran this season. He placed 12th overall at the ACC Championships with a time of 25:03 for 8,000 meters. Two weeks later he placed seventh at the NCAA South Region Championships. At the regional meet he earned All-South region honors and an individual berth to the NCAA Championships at Furman University, where an Achilles injury slowed him and he placed 208th overall. Bergdahl is majoring in business.

Fritz is an outstanding steepclechaser on the track. He scored at the 2001 ACC Track and Field Championships. Fritz is a redshirt sophomore from Ohio. He continues to improve and lends depth to the Seminoles. In his second year competing as a Seminole, he competed at the ACC Championships and placed 48th overall. He ran his best time of the year, 25:50, at the Appalachian State Invitational In high school he was named all-state twice, and named all-conference eight times. Fritz has been named to the Dean's List every semester at FSU, possesses a 3.9 grade point average and his major is marketing.

Guerra is a junior who has turned in bigtime performances when the Seminoles needed him. His maturity and experience allows him to take on a leadership role. He is the only Seminole to ever be a twotime NCAA All-South region honoree. He placed 20th in 2001 and 22nd in 2000 at the regional meet. Guerra ran an outstanding time of 32:01 for 10,000 meters on a difficult University of Alabama course. Before he came to FSU, he served a tour of duty in the US Air Force where he was an aircraft mechanic. As a California prep runner, he ran 9:21 for 3,200 meters and 4:18 for 1600 meters. Guerra's major is public relations.

DAVID JOHNSON JR, Tifton, GA (Tift County)

country season, as he cracked our top five."

Johnson is a junior transfer from Auburn University. He is an excellent middledistance runner who had not run cross country since high school. He was asked to move up in distance to lend depth to the team. In his collegiate cross country debut at the Auburn Invitational, Johnson ran an outstanding time of 25:44 for the 8000-meter course to place 44th. At the NCAA Pre-National meet, he finished in the top 100 overall and top five for the Seminoles. In addition, he competed at the ACC and NCAA South Region championships. While at Auburn, he earned numerous All-America honors in the Distance Medley Relay and 800-meter run. In high school he was a Georgia state champion in both cross country and track and field. He is majoring in business.

At the Florida Intercollegiate, he recorded a season-best time of 25:22 for 8,000 meters. Kunish came to FSU as a highly decorated preprunner. He won the state 1600 championship his senior year and earned numerous all-state honors.

Best performance of the season came at the Florida Intercollegiate Championships where he placed 20th overall and was the sixth man for the Seminoles in a time of 25:51 for the 8000meter race. In high school, Patterson was named to the all-state team and won conference and regional championships in both track and field and cross-country. As a freshman, he was named to the all-ACC academic team. Patterson is a business major and was named an FSU academic merit scholar. Came to FSU as an academic standout as well and graduated Suma Cum Laude from high school.

Stuart is a three-year top five runner for the Seminoles. He has competed at the ACC and South Region Championships every season he has been a Seminole. Placed 35th overall at the NCAA South Region Championship in a time of 32:22 for 10,000 meters. He recorded his season best time of 25:04 for 8000 meters at the Florida Intercollegiate Championship. In his sophomore year he was the top runner for the Seminoles in all but two meets. In high school, he was named all state numerous times. He also won several conference and regional titles as a prep runner. He has been named to the All-ACC academic team and was an honor role student in high school. Stuart is now majoring in business.

simply brilliant this season, finishing in the top six of both the ACC and the South Region."

Tigchelaar is by far the most decorated freshman runner in Seminole history. In his first cross country campaign at FSU, Tigchelaar placed sixth overall at the ACC Championship and earned Freshman of

the Year honors in a personal best time of 24:36 for the 8000-meter race. He is the first Seminole to ever earn that honor. At the NCAA South Region Championship, he placed fifth overall and was the top freshman finisher, earning an individual bid to the NCAA Cross Country Championship. He placed 71st at the national meet and set a new personal record time of 30:38 for the 10,000-meter course. At both the ACC and NCAA South Region Championships, Tigchelaar was the top Seminole finisher. Before coming to FSU from the Netherlands, he competed at the World Junior Cross Country Championships in 1999 and ran in the European Junior Cross Country Championships in 1998, 1999, and 2000. In addition, he ran the 10,000-meter run at the 1999 World Junior Track and Field Championship. Owns a personal record of 29:42 for 10,000 meters on the track. Tigchelaar is majoring in multinational business and marketing.

Before he came to FSU, he was a three time Dutch junior national champion in the 800-meter run, which he owns a personal-best time of 1:48.8. In addition, he placed second at the Dutch National Junior Cross Country Championship. He is majoring in exercise physiology.

YEAR IN REVIEW

he second season under Coach Bob Braman produced some dramatic results, including an All-ACC team honoree, three All-South Region honorees, two ACC Performers of the Week, their first win over Florida in 17 years, first-ever national ranking (31st), highest-ever NCAA South Region ranking (1st) and taking third place overall at the NCAA South Region Championship.

Consistency was the hallmark of the women's team early on, as the Lady Seminoles took second place in each of their first three meets, including the Appalachian State Invitational, the Florida Intercollegiate Championships, and the Auburn University Invitational. The Seminoles used strong performances from junior Allison Lind and iunior transfer Vicky Gill to earn second place finishes at their first three meets. Lind was the squad's top runner at both the Appalachian State Invitational and the Florida State Intercollegiate Championships. Her time of 18:26 at the Appalachian State meet was good for sixth overall, and she earned fourth overall at the Florida State Intercollegiate meet, earning ACC Performer of the Week honors.

Lind's race at the Appalachian State Invitational capped a strong team performance, as the Tribe placed five runners in the top 20 overall in what proved to be a tight field. Senior Brooke Bastien's 11th-place time of 18:29 was just three seconds off Lind's sixth-place time. Junior Misty Harper took 12th place, freshman Laura Melindez finished 13th, and freshman Natalie Hughes claimed 19th place Improving on the squad's strong showing at the Appalachian meet could have been difficult, but the Lady Seminoles responded, placing five runners in the top 15 at the Florida Intercollegiate Championships. As added inspiration, the Seminoles were facing the University of Florida, a team that had not beaten in 17 years. That streak fell by the wayside as the Seminoles placed three runners in the top ten. Leading the way for the second straight meet was Allison Lind, whose time of 21:47 was best on the team on good for fourth overall. Misty Harper finished sixth with a time of 22:01, and Brooke Bastien took ninth, with a final time of 22:16.

The Auburn University Invitational was up next for the Seminoles. Junior transfer Vicky Gill came out of nowhere, taking first overall with a time of 16:18.30. Gill's strong effort, along with solid runs from Allison Lind and Natalie Hughes paced the women's squad to their third consecutive second-place finish. The awards kept coming for the Seminoles, as Gill's impressive run earned her ACC Performer of the Week honors.

The Seminoles went up against a

strong field in the NCAA Pre-Nationals meet, and FSU held their own, placing 20th in the field of 37 teams. Vicky Gill followed her extraordinary run at the Auburn Invitational with another strong performance, finishing 30th overall with a time of 21:47. Katie Jeffrey finished second for the Lady Seminoles, with teammate Misty Harper close on her heels. Allison Lind and Natalie Hughes rounded out the top five for FSU.

The Lady Seminoles' next meet was the ACC Championships, where Vicky Gill continued her hot streak. Gill's first-place finish for FSU was good for fifth overall, which was the best-ever individual finish for the Lady Seminoles at the conference meet, earning her All-ACC honors. Hughes' effort was good enough for a second-place finish on the team and 27th overall. The performance of their top finishers was indicative of the field, as the Lady Seminoles had five runners in the top 50 and placed seventh overall at the meet.

The final team meet of the season came at the NCAA South Region Championships, where Vicky Gill and Natalie Hughes once again turned in strong performances to close out the season. Gill once again led FSU, improving one spot to fourth overall, while Hughes' second-place finish for FSU was good for ninth overall, giving the Seminoles two runners in the top ten. Katie Jeffrey and Misty Harper followed with top-30 finishes, followed by Allison Lind, Brooke Bastien and Andrea Dulmage.

Despite the strong runs from all Lady Seminoles, the team finished in third place, missing an automatic bid to the NCAA Championships by just 11 points. Gill, Hughes and Jeffrey brought home All-South Region honors. This marked the third-straight year Jeffrey was named to the all-region team.

Despite the Lady Seminoles' heartbreaking miss at the regional meet, FSU was represented at the NCAA Championships. Vicky Gill's torrid running was good enough to earn her an invite to Greenville, South Carolina, to compete in the NCAA National Championships. In a field of 249 of the top runners in the NCAA, Gill's time of 22:20 earned her 122nd place overall.

Gill has the potential to be the greatest female distance runner in FSU history. She transferred to FSU from St. Andrews University in Scotland and immediately demonstrated that she would be a force. Competing unattached at the Florida Intercollegiate and won the race in an incredible time of 20:46 for the 6000-meter course. In her first race as a Seminole at the Auburn Invitational, she ran one of the fastest 5,000-meter times in the nation this year completing the course in 16:18. She was named ACC Performer of the Week for that effort and became the second Lady Seminole to earn that honor. At the ACC Championship, she finished fifth overall in a time of 21:22 for the 6,000-meter course. Her placing was the highest ever for an FSU harrier and earned her All-ACC honors. She is only the second FSU runner ever to earn that honor. At the NCAA South Region Championship, Gill placed fourth overall with a time of 21:20 for the 6000-meter course. 



TRAIL AHASSEE

allahassee is home to some of the best running trails in the Southeast United States. Combined with the ideal climate of North Florida, Tallahassee is regarded as one of the top training sites for distance runners in the South.


The capital city is home to over 200 miles of running trails. Within a 10-minute drive from campus one can visit various training sites that range from single-track trails to large carriage trails. The wide varieties of training options are idea for distance training. If you are looking to do a long trail run or a hard tempo run over hilly terrain, Tallahassee has what you're looking for.

• Miccosukee Greenway: Florida State University's home cross country course has been regarded by collegiate and high school coaches as one of the best courses in the Southeastern United States. The greenway includes two 30-acre fields situated on rolling hills and surrounded by forest trails on all sides. One can run approximately 12k without overlapping other sections of the park. An ideal place for intervals, tempo runs or just an easy long run.

- St. Marks Wildlife Refuge: Located 40 minutes south of Tallahassee on the Gulf of Mexico, St. Marks Wildlife Refuge is a favorite among visiting teams. The refuge holds close to 40 miles of trails atop dikes. But beware alligators call the refuge home and you are guaranteed to see a few on the trails.
- Wakulla Springs: Located just a short drive from campus, Wakulla Springs is a great place for your long distance training runs. Over 10 miles of trails intersect the park, which also includes a natural spring and diving platform. The water is a constant 65 degrees that is refreshing after the hard week of training.
- Lake Jackson: Included in the Lake Jackson Park are a variety of training options. Over 15 miles of wide carriage trails run throughout the park. The hilly terrain surrounding Lake Jackson makes it ideal for tempo runs. Intersecting many of the carriage trails in Lake Jackson is a vast network of single-track trails. These picturesque trails run through ravines and natural streams that blanket the park.
- Capital City Country Club: Called C-4 by members of the cross-country









team Capital City Country Club sits on some of the hilliest land in Florida. The golf course's soft footing makes it an ideal site for hill training and tempo running.

Apalachicola National Forest:

Located just 5 minutes south of town, Apalachicola National Forest covers over 550,000 acres of land stretching from Tallahassee to the Gulf of Mexico. Included in this vast area are many trails and unmapped forest roads. Apalachicola Forest also is home to a section of the Florida Scenic Trail, which stretches across the entire state of Florida covering close to 1000 miles.

- Fern Trail: The Fern Trail runs through the heart of Tallahassee taking you from the center of town to the outskirts of the city. The Fern Trail intersects Tom Brown Park and the Lake Lafayette Trail covering close to 10 miles from point to point. An ideal site for a nice easy long run, the Fern Trail is a local favorite amongst the running community.
- Leon Sinks: Preserved, as a geological park Leon Sinks is a single-track trail that runs past many of the natural sinkholes that blanket the park. Some of the sinkholes are filled with water and are close to 100 feet deep. The majority of the trail is hard packed dirt with the exception of a section of boardwalk which cuts through the swamp that is located in the park.
- Lafayette Trail: The most recently discovered of all the trails in Tallahassee is Lafayette Trail. It is a combination single-track trail and carriage trail


that sits on some of the most picturesque land in Florida. Cypress trees line the landscape that one passes on a run past Lake Lafayette. If you're lucky you'll see an alligator or deer on your run. Lafayette Trail intersects Tom Brown Park and the Fern Trail totaling over 10 miles from end-to-end.

- Lake Overstreet: Located adjacent to Lake Jackson, Lake Overstreet consists of a five mile figure eight carriage trail ideal for tempo and fartlek workouts. Also included is a vast network of single-track trails nicknamed the "Blair Witch Trail" by the local runners.
- Munson Sand Hills: Located about 10 minutes from campus, Munson Sand Hills encompasses close to 10 miles of moderately hilly single-track trails. A map of the trails is a must since many runners have been known to get lost in the network of trails.
- St. Marks Trail: The St. Marks Trail is the reminiscent of the old railroad that begins at the entrance of Munson Sand Hills. The trail follows the old railroad line close to 20 miles, stretching to the Old seaside Town of St. Marks.

World-Class Training Environment

In addition to the many great offroad training opportunities, FSU's Track & Field complex, along with Tallahassee's outstanding climate, make for a fantastic training environment for distance runners. During FSU's academic year, the training weather is absolutely ideal.





TALLAHASSEE

mong low, rolling hills, down moss-draped canopy roads, within picturesque historical districts, and across seas of flowering azaleas lies a magical part of the Sunshine State-Tallahassee, Florida's capital city. With its intriguing combination of power-play politics and classic character splashed with a twist of Southern beauty and charm, Tallahassee is a side of Florida few expect to find.

With the Gulf of Mexico just 25 miles south and the Georgia border only 14 miles north, Tallahassee rests between the foothills of the Appalachian Mountains and the juncture of Florida's panhandle and peninsula in an area known as "The Big Bend." Nearer in miles to Atlanta than to Miami, Tallahassee more closely resembles its Georgia neighbor than Florida in topography,

climate and lifestyle.

Tallahassee Like the city itself, the story of how Tallahassee was chosen as the state capital is rich in history. In 1823, two explorers set out - one on horseback from St. Augustine and the other by boat from Pensacola — to establish a permanent, central location for the seat of government. The two met at a beautiful site that the Creek and Seminole Indians called "tallahassee" derived from the words "talwa," meaning town, and "ahassee," meaning old. This historic meeting place remains Florida's capital today.

Boasting more than 145 properties listed on the National Register of Historic Places, Tallahassee is a living showcase of Florida history and heritage. The crowning jewel of Florida's

historic "Capitol Hill" is the Old Capitol, beautifully restored to its 1902 splendor complete with the red-and-white striped awnings, a dome adorned with stained glass, antique furnishings and political memorabilia. The 22nd-floor observatory of the New Capitol Building offers a breathtaking view of this surprising Southern city, awash in flowering azaleas, snowy dogwoods, towering pines, fragrant magnolias, and hundreds of lakes, springs, swamps, rivers and sink holes.

Charming downtown historic districts graced with lush linear parks lead visitors to the Knott House Museum, The Columns, First Presbyterian Church, John G. Riley House Museum and Old City Cemetery. Free walking tours and replica turn-of-the-century street cars carry passengers to antebellum mansions, picturesque churches and other downtown delights. Minutes from downtown lies the lush 52-acre natural habitat and 1880s farm of the Tallahassee Museum of History and Natural Science, home to the rare Florida panther and other furry "natives."

The area surrounding Tallahassee reveals numerous other historic and archaeological treasures, such as De Soto State Archaeological and Historical Site, Lake Jackson State Archaeological Site, Mission San Luis, Natural Bridge Battlefield and San Marcos de Apalache. Visitors can explore prehistoric Florida at the Museum of Florida History, where they are greeted by a giant 12,000-year-old mastodon pulled from nearby Wakulla Springs.

On the shores of Wakulla Springs, alligators still laze under the watchful eyes of "snake birds" perched on twisted cypress trees. The site of many underwater scenes in "Tarzan" movies, it's one of the world's deepest freshwater springs.



TALLAHASSEE

In 1823, the first civilian governor, William Pope DuVal, desired a central location for the legislature to meet. He sent one explorer on horseback from St. Augustine and another by boat from Pensacola — their rendezvous point was declared Florida's capital. Nestled among the rolling foothills of the Appalachian Mountains and located in a region of the Gulf of Mexico known as the Big Bend, the Capital region is known for its Southern characteristics, gracious hospitality and lush topography.



PHYSIOGRAPHY

Tallahassee's rolling landscape, typical of regions further north, is unique among the major cities of Florida. Some areas of the county, including the downtown ridge encompassing the Capitol complex, City Hall and the County Courthouse, exceed elevations of 200 feet. The highest elevation in Leon County is 288 feet, found in the northern part of the county. To the south of the city, the hills yield to the flat terrain that is typical throughout the peninsula of Florida.



Glass-bottomed boat tours across these mystical waters are available.

Other sightseeing favorites include the floral masterpiece of Alfred B. Maclay State Gardens; Bradley's Country Store; FAMU Black Archives; and the Tallahassee Antique Car Museum. Nearby small towns offer fascinating excursions to places such as Pebble Hill Plantation, Florida Caverns State Park, Monticello Opera House and St. George Island.

Tallahassee is almost as rich in cultural treasures as it is in history. A widely-acclaimed collection of art, science and history museums and galleries, year-round festivals and nonstop entertainment at the 14,000-seat Tallahassee-Leon County Civic Center, feed a variety of cultural appetites.

Visitors with a hunger for the great

outdoors will find Tallahassee ideal for all types of outdoor recreation-from canoeing down dark, cypresslined rivers and biking up steep slopes to exploring backcountry wildernesses and hunting for bobwhite quail. Area lakes, rivers, ponds and the Gulf - just 30 minutes away offer a paradise for boating and fishing. Lakes Jackson and Talquin are

bass fishing world for yielding the "big ones." Local wild life areas, such as the St. Marks National Wildlife Refuge and Apalachicola National Forest, are perfect spots for camping, picnicking, swimming, biking and exploring.

And while Tallahassee also features eight golf courses and plenty of places to raise a racquet, it's a wild array of spectator sports that leave the crowds screaming for more. The Florida State Seminoles and Florida A&M Rattlers provide collegiate action while the Tallahassee Thunder is the city's featured arena football team. And always a sure bet are the nearby greyhound races.

For another favorite "sport" shopping — two large regional malls and many specialty centers offer an array of "playing options," from popular chains to curiosity and antique shops. Unique shopping locales include downtown parks, lakeside cottages and small Southern towns. Tallahassee serves a scrumptious selection of tantalizing restaurants ranging from fast food to fivestar. Local specialties include homemade country sausage, melt-in-your-mouth steaks, wild game and succulent seafood fresh from the Gulf.

From luxury to economy, accommodations are plentiful and include restored bed and breakfast's, rustic "gentlemen" lodges, beachside escapes and comfortable chain hotels. For those who choose to follow in the footsteps of early travelers, Tallahassee also boasts 15 beautiful campsites. Continuous air service, Amtrak and four major highways make it easy for visitors to get to Tallahassee. But no matter how you arrive, the history and hospitality of Tallahassee make it difficult to ever leave for long.



The museum features a 52-acre natural habitat zoo, nature trails, authentic 1880s farmstead, hands-on Discovery Center, birds of prey aviary, reptile exhibits, annual events and more!




TALLAHASSEE'S AN ALL-AMERICA CITY!



These trees and others often extend their branches over the roadway to create a canopied effect, a feature that is held in high esteem by local residents and visitors.

FLÖRIDA STATE

lorida State University, a graduate research institution, stands among the nation's elite in both academics and athletics, as it celebrates its sesquicentennial anniversary in 2001.

Located on the oldest continuous site of higher education in Florida, the university is situated in the heart of the state's capital city. The university's main campus blends Jacobean Revival and modern styles of architecture with the oaks, pines, dogwoods and azaleas of North Florida.

As the university has progressed and grown — from its pre-Civil War beginnings as the Seminary West of the Suwannee, to the Florida State College for Women and, finally, returning to coeducational status as a university in 1947 — it has developed into an acclaimed research institution, a top-


ranked competitor in intercollegiate athletics and as a standard-setter in the basic sciences and the performing arts.

The university has entered the 21st century with excellence in all areas of its mission — teaching, research and public service, including such milestones as:

In June 2001, NBC Nightly News anchor Tom Brokaw donated more than 5,000 collections of World War Il memorabilia that had been sent to him as the result of his three-book series on "The Greatest Generation" to the FSU Institute on World War II and the Human Experience. FSU created the institute in 1998 to "save the memories of those who saved the world" by collecting letters, diaries, memoirs and photos from participants in the war effort, in order to preserve the materials for classroom teaching, scholarly research and public viewing.

graduate students from nine FSU colleges and schools to be human rights advocates and be placed with international human rights organizations.

- In the blackenterprise.com 2001 "Top Fifty Colleges for African Americans" rankings, FSU was rated 23rd in the nation, up from 26th in 1999.
- ◆ In the March-April 2001 issue of National Jurist that rated the nation's "most wired" law schools, the FSU College of Law was ranked 13th.
- The FSU School of Motion Picture, Television and Recording Arts was named among the nation's top 12 film schools in the fall 2000 "special showbiz issue" of Entertainment Weekly magazine.
- ◆ During the fall of 2000, FSU had 243 National Merit Scholars, 77 National Achievement Scholars and 28 Hispanic Scholars enrolled.
- ♦ In 2000, the Florida Legislature placed under FSU's control the Ringling Center for the Cultural Arts in Sarasota, which includes the John and Mable Ringling Museum of Art, the state art museum of Florida.
- ◆ In 2000, FSU bought the most powerful university-owned supercom-puter in the world. The IBM RS/6000 Supercomputer can perform 2.5 trillion calculations per second. Located in the School of Computational Science and Information Technology, the supercomputer will be used by FSU researchers to predict hurricanes and compare DNA sequences as complex as those of the human genome.
- ◆ The Challenger Learning Center of Tallahassee, a project of the FAMU-FSU College of Engineering, is scheduled to open in March 2002. The center, to be built on Kleman Plaza in downtown Tallahassee, will feature a space mission simulator common to all of the centers, and a 300-seat IMAX theater and a domed planetarium laser theater. It will serve middle schools in a 66-county area of North Florida, Southeast Alabama and South Georgia.
- ◆ In 2000, the doctoral program in the College of Business had the highest



minority enrollment of any Ph.D. business program in the United States. In recent years, it has graduated more minority doctoral students than any other Ph.D. granting institution.

- ◆ In 2000, the National Geographic Society and FSU started the Florida Geographic Alliance to bolster geographic education among Florida school children by preparing and equipping Florida's K-12 teachers with better information and tools.
- In 1999, FSU was selected by the U.S. Department of Energy to become one of the research institutions to operate the Oak Ridge National Laboratory (ORNL), a multiprogram science and technology laboratory in Oak Ridge, Tenn., headed by the University of Tennessee-Battelle. The five-year management and operations contract is valued at about \$2.5 billion. FSU was invited to join ORNL because of its strong faculty research activities in material sciences, structural biology, computational sciences and magnet technologies.
- At more than \$287.4 million, FSU's endowment has been ranked 150th in the nation by the National Association of College and University Business Officers, the benchmark of higher education fundraising success, in 2000. Since 1994, FSU's endowment ranking has surpassed 156 other institutions.
- ◆ In December 1999, researchers at the National High Magnetic Field Laboratory used a hybrid magnet to conduct the lab's first research in continuous magnetic fields of 45 tesla, or one million times Earth's magnetic field. The \$100 million magnet lab, which was established in 1990 by the National Science Foundation, is run by FSU in partnership with the University of Florida and the Los Alamos National Laboratory.
- ◆ In 1994, Florida State was classified a "Research University I" by the Carnagie Foundation, placing it among the nation's top research universities. In 2000, the distinction was renamed "Doctoral/Research University-Extensive."

Under the leadership of the university's 12th president, Talbot "Sandy" D'Alemberte, who took office in January 1994, FSU continues to build on the foundation of its history of excellence in scholarship, research and

service.

A senior member of the State University System, FSU was founded as an institution of higher learning in 1851 by legislative act. It began in Tallahassee with its first class of male students in 1857 and added women in 1858.


FSU's operating budget is \$656 million. Faculty and administrators generate more than \$116 million annually in external funding to supplement state-sponsored research. Three direct-support organizations serve to bolster the university: the FSU Foundation, which raised \$301 million in private gifts during the university's first capital campaign, Seminole Boosters and the FSU Alumni Association.

The main campus is spread over 463.4 acres in Tallahassee; FSU, which has one of the smallest campuses in the SUS, has been actively acquiring land in the 1990s. FSU encompasses 1,422.7 acres in Leon, Bay, Franklin, Gadsden and Sarasota counties.

Within the state, the university maintains facilities at its 25-acre campus in Panama City, its Marine Laboratory at Turkey Point on the Gulf of Mexico, the Appleton Museum in Ocala and the Asolo Performing Arts Center in Sarasota. The Center for Professional Development and Public Service, housed in the Augustus B. Turnbull III Florida Conference Center on the edge of the campus, provides extensive credit and non-credit continuing education programs statewide.

For years, FSU has reached far beyond Florida through international programs in Switzerland, France, Panama, Costa Rica, Spain, Russia, Vietnam and the Caribbean. FSU's student centers in Florence, Italy, and London, England, are considered by many to be the nation's best in Europe.

Florida State offers 294 graduate and undergraduate degree programs through its nine colleges — Arts and Sciences; Business; Communication; Education; Engineering (operated jointly with Florida A&M University); Human Sciences; Law; Medicine; and Social Sciences (which also incorporates the Reubin O'D Askew School of Public Administration and Policy) — and eight schools — Criminology and Criminal Justice; Information Studies; Motion Picture, Television and Recording Arts: Music; Nursing; Social Work; Theatre; and Visual Arts and Dance. With 1,897 members, the FSU faculty has included nine National Academy of Sciences elected members, 10 American Academy of Arts and Sciences fellows and



five Nobel laureates. It is backed by 3,136 administrative/professional and support staff.

Library holdings at Florida State include 2.3 million book titles and 6.6 million microforms. The main library facility, the Robert M. Strozier Library, is linked by computer to other state university and national research libraries. The Paul A.M. Dirac Science Library is located at the heart of the university's science research complex. FSU also maintains music, library science and law libraries, and the Mildred and Claude Pepper Library.

FSU's 6,367 graduate students pursue advanced degrees in fields as diverse as business administration and theoretical particle physics. A majority of research done at FSU is the direct result of student effort, culminating in numerous books, monographs and journal articles relating to the whole spectrum of intellectual interests and the practical needs of society.

Of FSU's 34,477-student population, 43.8 percent are male; 56.2 percent are female; 22.3 percent are minorities; and 3.7 percent are foreign students.

ATLANTIC COAST CONFERENCE

THE TRADITION

Consistency. It's the mark of true excellence in any endeavor.

However, in today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency.

Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds. Now in its 49th year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation. And that is not mere conjecture, the numbers support it.

Since the league's inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured 82 national championships, including 40 in men's competition and 42 in women's. In addition, 120 men and 31 women have earned the coveted title of NCAA champion.

The ACC also stands at the forefront of intercollegiate athletics in terms of the academic accomplishments of its student-athletes. Since 1983, 321 women's basketball players have received ACC Academic Honor Roll recognition. The 2000-01 academic year included 29 selections. In addition ACC basketball players have earned first-team Academic All-America honors six times. In 1997 NC State's Jennifer Howard was tabbed GTE CoSIDA Academic Player of the Year after posting a 4.0 grade point average throughout her career. 11 players have earned ACC Postgraduate scholarships, while three others were named NCAA Postgraduate Scholars.

2000-01 IN REVIEW

The 2000-01 academic year concluded with the league pocketing three more national team titles and four individual NCAA crowns. In all, the ACC has won 39 national team titles over the last 11 years.

The ACC's 2000-01 national champions were North Carolina in women's soccer, Duke in men's basketball and Maryland in women's lacrosse. Overall, ACC teams posted a 73-56 (.566) mark in NCAA Tournament play.

The ACC placed at least one team in the Top 10 nationally in 15 of the 25 sports sponsored by the league. Other records of note during the 2000-01 season include 98 teams competing at NCAA Championships, five bowl teams and 43 Top 10 showings.

The ACC Academic Honor Roll record was broken for the 14th-straight year in 1999-2000 as 1,664 studentathletes were recognized for their work in the classroom.

A HISTORY

The Atlantic Coast Conference was founded on May 8, 1953, at the Sedgefield Inn near Greensboro, N.C., with seven charter members — Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, North Carolina State, South Carolina and Wake Forest — drawing up the conference bylaws.

The withdrawal of seven schools from the Southern Conference came early on the morning of May 8, 1953, during the Southern Conference's annual spring meeting. On June 14, 1953, the seven members met in Raleigh, N.C., where a set of bylaws was adopted and the name became officially the Atlantic Coast Conference.

On December 4, 1953, conference officials met again at Sedgefield and officially admitted the University of Virginia. The first, and only, withdrawal of a school from the ACC came on June 30, 1971 when the University of South

Carolina tendered its resignation.

The ACC operated with seven members until April 3, 1978, when Georgia Tech was admitted. The Atlanta school withdrew from the Southeastern Conference in January of 1964.

The ACC expanded to nine members on July 1, 1991, with the addition of Florida State.

Seminole Striders Provide A Chance to Keep Running By Bill Mayville, FSU Sports Information Student Assistant

heir names do not show up in the headlines, nor do they receive full scholarships to continue competing at the intercollegiate level. What the Lady Seminole Striders do get, however, is a chance to keep running.

The program, which offers expanded opportunities to female cross country runners, began under FSU cross country coach Bob Braman, who ran a similar program while coaching at the University of South Florida.

Through the Lady Seminole Striders, female runners who may feel for whatever reason that they cannot compete at the intercollegiate level, have a chance to suit up and run with the FSU Cross Country team. However as Coach Braman is quick to point out, the Lady Seminole Striders is a running club, or an intermediate activity. The cross country team treats these runners the same as any other runner on the team, which means they have to attend practice everyday, do community service, do fundraising, and maintain their academics.

For FSU's part, the runners are treated exactly the same — they are given all the perks associated with being athletes, given equipment and coaching, and are allowed to compete in cross country meets.

"In cross country we have a unique opportunity where you can put an unlimited amount of people at the starting line," Braman explained. "It's not like most sports where you have a limited number of positions, and you would just be putting more people on the bench.

"In cross country, we literally can put them into action. They can go out and train and compete."

To help maintain the concept that there are no differences between the Striders and the scholarship runners, the team budgeted for extra equipment to outfit the extra runners. The team also budgeted for and structured competition for the Striders.

"There are cross country races that are unlimited in size, such as the FSU Invitational, which we host," Braman said. "We took them down to the Disney Invitational, which was an

overnight meet, and we also took them to the Stetson Invitational, where they finished third overall and took home a team trophy, which was great."

Another benefit of the program is that it isn't much more difficult to coach additional athletes in cross country, as it may be in other sports.

"It's a fitness and conditioning oriented sport, so everybody's conditioning and running and training," Braman noted. "You still have the fine tunings you do with your elite athletes, but we can condition maybe as many as 50 athletes.

"Our goal is to get up around 50, and we have about 35 right now."

An example of the opportunity the Striders provides is senior Karen Daigle. The 33-year-old Daigle is a graduate student coming off military service who didn't even think she would be eligible to participate. Her military service provided her with a loophole for the eligibility requirements, and because of the Striders program she is able to compete at the college level for her final year of eligibility.

Daigle noted the program is great for those runners who still want to develop at the next level.

"It's a great opportunity for runners to develop to their full potential," Daigle noted. "If anyone has any desire as a runner to continue to develop and compete, I would definitely recommend the Striders."

Since the Striders receive constant training and coaching, many improve dramatically, as in the cases of Anne Clinton and Misty Harper. Harper and Clinton both joined the Striders, and developed to the point where Clinton earned a spot in the Seminoles' top nine and varsity-travel squad. Harper's performances this season nearly landed her on the All-South Region team.

Despite the lack of fanfare surrounding the program, the Striders are not a well-guarded secret. The coaching staff has promoted the program in high schools throughout the state of Florida, by preparing a brochure, running clinics, and putting the program up on the track and field website.

As part of the deal to expand the

roster, FSU Athletic Director Dave Hart and Associate Athletic Director Charlie Carr wanted to ensure the Striders had a leader, and that the cross country coaching staff wasn't stretched out. Coach Braman and the athletic department wanted to use a female graduate assistant who had come out of the FSU program, and former cross country runner and FSU graduate student Cynthia Campbell was selected to watch over the Striders.

The benefits of the program are evident on both sides. From the standpoint of the FSU athletics department, the program extends the number of opportunities for female athletes, without having to break the bank starting up a new program.

The female runners who participate in the program also get a lot out of it. They have the chance to continue to participate in the sport they love at the intercollegiate level, receive top-level coaching, and can continue to develop as runners.
