# HEAD COACH BOB BRAMAN

UNIVERSITY OF FLORIDA '80



bob Braman begins his third season as the head cross country coach and will continue to serve as the distance coach on Terry Long's track and field staff. Braman came to

Florida State in 2000 after 17 years of national level success at the University of South Florida.

Braman began coaching in 1983 as a men's cross country assistant. He was promoted to head coach in 1985 and initiated the women's cross country program in 1987. When South Florida began its track program in 1991, Braman assumed head coaching duties for that sport as well. Under Braman's guidance the USF men's cross country team won the last three Conference USA titles while the women's team is the two time defending Conference USA champion. Braman coached the men's and women's cross country teams to a top 30 finish in 1999.

His men's cross country teams also won six-straight conference titles between 1988 and 1993, three were in the Sun Belt Conference and three were in the Metro Conference. During his tenure at South Florida, Braman was honored as Coach-of-the-Year 14 times. His men's cross country teams earned national rankings ten of the last 12 years, including a No. 5 national ranking in 1991, while the women's teams were ranked four of the last six years. Braman has coached 41 national qualifiers in cross country, and 28 national qualifiers on the track, including two-time NCAA champion Jon

Dennis (5000m 1992 and 1993).

Last season Braman helped four Seminole distance runners become national qualifiers. All-American Natalie Hughes recorded the fastest time in the 1500m by any collegiate freshman in the U.S. He also coached the women's cross country squad to their first ever NCAA appearance finishing 28th. Under Braman, Vicki Gill became the first ever Florida State women's cross country member to achieve All-America status en route to a 15th place

finish at nationals in Greenville, S.C.

Braman, 44, is married to the former Debbie Turner and has two sons, Steven (14) and Tyler (12). Braman graduated from the University of Florida in 1980 with a bachelor's degree in broadcasting. He was the captain of the Gator's cross country team for three seasons and garnered All-SEC honors in cross country (1979 and 1980) and indoor track (1979). He was also the University of Florida's record holder in the indoor three-mile run.





# CROSS COUNTRY ASSISTANT COACHES

### DAVID HALLIDAY

GRADUATE ASSISTANT (Florida '94)



pavid Halliday begins his first season as a graduate assistant on the Seminoles' coaching staff after serving as the head track and cross country coach at Columbia High School in Lake

City, Fla. Halliday comes to Florida State with eight years of head coaching experi-

ence at the high school level.

His coaching accolades include being named the 3A Boys Track Coach of the Year in 2002, a two-time *Gainesville Sun* Cross Country Coach of the Year (2000 and 2001) and the *Sun's* 2002 Boys Track Coach of the Year. Under his guidance, the Columbia boys' track team won the state championship in 2002. He also guided the 2001 boys' cross country team to the 3A state finals. Both finishes were the best in school history. In addition, he coached the No. 1 ranked boys 4x800m relay team in the South in 2002.

Halliday's duties include: middle distance recruiting coordinator; meet director for all home competitions in cross country and track; assistant coach for men's and women's cross country including the women's team's first ever qualification to the NCAA meet. Halliday also assists the men's track and field team heading up the middle distance training group.

A 1994 graduate of the University of Florida in exercise and sport sciences, Halliday lettered three years for the Gators' track team. He was named to the SEC Academic Honor Roll Twice (1992-1993). In addition, Halliday is certified by USA Track and Field as a Level 2 Coach in endurance.

Halliday, 30, is married to the former Kim Driskell and has two daughters Darien (5) and Peyton "PJ" (2). He is currently pursuing a master's degree in

sport administration.

## GRETCHEN MEYER

GRADUATE ASSISTANT (Florida State '01)



Fetchen Meyer joins the Seminole coaching staffthis year as a graduate assistant after coaching at Florida High School in Tallahassee over the last four years.

She joined

Florida High in 1999 as an assistant coach and was promoted the following year to head coach for the girls' track team and boys' and girls' cross-country teams. Meyer guided her girls' track team to city, district and regional championships en route to state runner-up status in 2000 and 2002. She coached back-to-back 4X800m state championship relay teams (2000 and 2001), state championship 4X100m relay team (2002) and a two

time 400m state champion. Meyers was named the *Tallahassee Democrat* Girls' Big Bend Track and Field Coach of the Year in all three of her seasons as head coach at Florida High (2000-2002).

A 2001 graduate of Florida State in criminology and history, Meyer began her coaching career at Florida High while a sophomore at FSU and earned a USA Track and Field Level 1 Certification. Meyer is currently pursuing a master's

degree in sport management.

As part of the Seminoles coaching staff, her primary duty is director of the Lady Seminole Striders program. Meyer also assists the women's cross country team. This fall, Meyer aided the women's cross country team to its first ever qualification to the NCAA meet. This spring, Meyer will assist women's track and field with responsibilities pertaining to women's 800m, 1500m, and 5000m event training.

### MATT WHALEY

VOLUNTEER COACH (South Florida '01)



att Whaley begins his second season on the Seminole coaching staff as a volunteer assistant following a successful collegiate career at South Florida where he ran

four years under coach Bob Braman. Whaley's duties include assisting coaching staff in office work, coordinating practices and travel and helping organize the Seminoles' home track meets.

While at USF, Whaley was a threetime NCAA Championship qualifier, a twotime All-Conference USA honoree and an All-South Region member. Whaley's personal best time of 24:36 in the 8K came as a member of the Bulls' cross country team. He graduated from USF in 2001 with a degree in social science.

At Estero High School in Bonita Springs, Fla., Whaley won three individual state championships. He was a two time state champ in the 3,200m run and a champion in the 1,600m run. In addition to his individual achievements, Whaley helped lead his high school cross country team to a state championship.

# 2002 MEN'S YEAR IN REVIEW

s the 2002 season drew to a close, head coach Bob Braman found his Florida State men's cross country team making strides towards becoming one of the nation's top programs. The Seminoles fielded one of the youngest teams in the nation with only three seniors competing at the ACC and NCAA South Regional meets. Braman, in his third season at FSU, and his Seminoles finished fourth at the NCAA South Region Championships, placed three runners on the All-South Region team, matched their best finish at the ACC Championships and had one competitor individually qualify and compete at the NCAA Championships. These feats became proof that Braman has the Seminoles on the verge of becoming a factor on the national scene.

Sophomore Joep Tigchelaar once again led the harriers in competition. His fourth-place finish at the NCAA South Regional meet was the best ever for a Seminole runner and earned him his second All-South Region team honor. Tigchelaar followed that performance with his second appearance at the NCAA Championships, finishing better than half of the field at 107th place with a career-best 10k mark of 31:10. At the ACC meet, Tigchelaar, the 2001 ACC Rookie of the Year, became the first ever Seminole to earn all-conference honors with a seventh-place finish. In addition, he was FSU's top finisher in four

of the six meets he ran in.

The Seminoles began the season on a positive step by placing fourth at the Mountaineer Open. FSU had four runners finish in the top 20, led by Tigchelaar's 12th-place finish followed by junior Nate Adams in 14th place, senior transfer Giscard Titus in 15th place and freshman Kevin Cook in 19th place. Cook, in his first NCAA competition, showed that he would be a top performer for the Seminoles throughout the season and into his career.

Next was FSU's home meet, the Seminole XC Invitational. The Seminoles took the meet title in a showdown with rival University of Florida following impressive top 10 performances by Titus, Tigchelaar, Adams and Cook. In total, FSU's top seven runners placed 16th or better. Titus, a talented transfer from Auburn University, took the top performance honors for the Seminoles with a career-best 8k mark of 25:43. Rounding out the top 10 for FSU was Tigchelaar (fifth place), Adams (sixth) and Cook (10th). FSU ended with a score of 24 points, 30 points ahead of runner-up Florida.


FSU then traveled to the prestigious Great American XC Festival and finished a respectable 12th place. Tigchelaar placed first for the Seminoles for the second time with a 57th place finish overall. Junior Maarten van den Heuvel turned in his first of four top two finishes for FSU by placing 61st among nearly 200 competitors. Senior

Dave Guerra, a two-time All-South Region team member entering the season, finished 69th. Cook ran fourth for FSU for the third straight meet and placed 70th overall.

It was then on to the all-important NCAA Pre-National meet, which served as a prelude to the upcoming NCAA Championships with the top programs in the nation competing against each other for the first time. FSU held its own by placing 25th despite competing with several sick runners. Van den Heuvel led the way for the Seminoles with career-best 8k performance of 24:52 to finish 53rd. Tigchelaar was second on the team at 95th place against almost 250 runners. Rounding out the scorers for FSU was Guerra (130th), Adams (157th) and Titus (216th).

The Atlantic Coast Conference Championships was the next stop on the schedule for FSU. The Seminoles proved to be one of the most improved programs in the conference by matching their best ever finish from the 2001 season with a fifth-place finish. Tigchelaar led the Seminoles with his All-ACC, season-best and team-best 8k performance of 24:48.7 to finish seventh. Van den Heuvel crossed the line second for the Seminoles and 25th overall. Adams, who emerged in 2002 as one of FSU's top runners, came in next at 26th with his career-best time of 25:36. Senior Zach Heissner ran fourth in 30th place with Guerra rounding out the scorers in 35th place. Tigchelaar, who is the school's only All-ACC performer, made school history by earning all-conference honors for a secondstraight year.

In what would turn out to be the season's final meet, the Seminoles were edged out of the NCAA Championships at the NCAA South Region Championships with a fourth place finish. FSU ran neck-and-neck with champion Tennessee, runner-up Alabama and third place Florida to just miss a top two finish to earn an automatic bid to the national championships. Tigchelaar turned in the best finish at the regional meet in school history by placing fourth overall at 32:22.7 for the 10k course. Although, the team would not run at the NCAA Championships, Tigchelaar's finish earned him an automatic bid as an individual competitor. Van den Heuvel earned his second All-South Region team honor by finishing 14th at 32:58.7. Joining Tigchelaar and van den Heuvel on the all-region team was firsttime honoree Adams, who placed 21st at 33:06.2. Guerra just missed his bid to become FSU's first ever three-time allregion honoree with a 30th-place finish.

# DAVE GUERRA


Sr. • Vallejo, Calif. (Vallejo Senior)

third consecutive NCAA All-Region honors. His clutch running will be missed next season."

Guerra ends his career at FSU with the honorable distinction of becoming the first ever two-time NCAA All-South region team member in Seminole history. Guerra has been a proven leader throughout his career on what has been a relatively young squad due in part to his



experience and maturity. In his final year at FSU, Guerra scored points for the Seminoles in four of the five races he competed in. In addition, he turned in a personal-best time of 25:35 in an 8k course at the NCAA Pre-National meet. Before enrolling at FSU, he served a tour of duty in the US Air Force, where he was an aircraft mechanic. As a California preprunner, he ran 9:21 for 3,200 meters and 4:18 for 1,600 meters. Guerra is currently working towards a master's degree in sport administration.

## ZACH HEISSNER

Sr. • Tallahassee, Fla. (Jupiter)




"Zach battled back from early season injuries to become a top five scorer for

us at the ACC Championships. Like his fellow senior steeplechase partner Dave Guerra, Zach's experience and leadership will be missed next season."

Heissner competed in three meets for the Seminoles in 2002. At the ACC Championships, he finished 30th overall for the Tribe and scored valuable team points. In addition, Heissner ran his fastest 8k mark of the season of 25:45 at the ACC meet. His top finish of the year came at the Gator Invitational where he placed second overall. Heissner ended the season ranked among the top 50 runners at the NCAA South Regional. He is majoring in environmental studies.

nole Invite. He is expected to be a major contributor to the distance squad this track season."

Titus, who transferred from Auburn, proved to be a welcome addition to the Florida State cross country team placing in the top seven for the Tribe in all five races he competed in. His most impressive performance came at the Seminole Invitational where he was the top finisher for the Tribe and third overall in leading FSU to the team victory. His time of 25:43 at the Seminole Invite was a sea-

son-best mark for an 8k trail. Titus finished 41st at the ACC Championships. At the season-opening Mountaineer Open, he ran in 15th overall and was the third finisher for FSU. In high school, Titus won the 3A state championship in cross country in 1998 and then won the 3A state championship in both the 1600m and the 3200m runs in 1999. He is majoring in psychology.

Adams emerged as one of the top runners for FSU compiling top three finishes in five meets and top seven in all six races. He capped off the season by earning NCAA All-South Region honors in his first NCAA South Region meet. At the ACC Championships, Adams ran his best 8k time of 25:36 to place 26th overall. Adamsí top overall finish came at the Seminole Invitational, where he finished sixth to help lead FSU to the team victory. His best team finish of second place came at the Mountaineer Open. Adams earned all-state honors as a prep runner in cross country and track as a junior and senior. He is majoring in physical education.



## MAARTEN VAN DEN HEUVEL



able talents. He earned his second consecutive NCAA All-Region honors and is the sixth highest returning South Region runner for next season."


Van den Heuvel was named to the NCAA All-South Region team for the second consecutive year following an impressive 14th-place performance at the regional meet with a 10k time of 32:58. He was one of the Seminoles' top runners, scoring in every race that he ran in for FSU this past season. Van den Heuvel showed great strides towards the end of the year. He was FSU's top finisher at the NCAA Pre-Nationals, placing 53rd overall, with a season-best 8k time of 24:52. At the ACC Championships, he placed



14th and was the second finisher for the Tribe. In 2001, van den Heuvel emerged as one of the Seminoles top runners. He earned All-South Regions honors while also placing in the top three for FSU in each meet he performed in. In track, he won ACC titles in both the 800m and 1500m runs. Van den Heuvel competed at the 2002 NCAA Track and Field Championships in the 1500m and finished 19th in the nation. Before he came to FSU, he was a three-time Dutch junior national champion in the 800m run, which he owns a personal-best time of 1:48.80. In addition, he placed second at the Dutch National Junior Cross Country Championships. He is majoring in exercise physiology.


Van Veen ran in four meets for the Semi-

State to the team victory. Van Veen came to FSU as a highly regarded prep runner and was named the 2000 Cape Coast Runner of the Year. He was born on May 18, 1982 and is majoring in communications.


## ANDREW BAUTEL So. • Ocala, Fla. (Vanguard)




"Andrew had a super freshman track season and will be a soorer in cross

As a sophomore, Bautel fought off injuries to compete in three races, while finishing in the top seven for FSU in two of the meets, including the ACC Championships. In his first year as a Seminole, he competed at the ACC Championships and ran a personal-best time of 26:02 at the Appalachian State Invitational. Bautel qualified for the Junior Nationals in both the 5k and 10k runs as a freshman. As a prep runner at Vanguard High School, he earned numerous all-state honors in both cross-country and track and field. He was named the Marion County Runner of

Tigchelaar earned the right to compete at the NCAA Championships for the second-straight season, finishing in 107th place, which was higher than half the field competing at the championships. He completed the 10k course with a season-best time of 31:10. He earned his second All-Regional honor after finishing fourth at the NCAA South Regional and was named to the All-ACC team following a seventh-place finish at the conference meet. Tigchelaar's time of 24:48 at the ACC meet was a season-best mark for an 8k course. His performance at the South Regional meet was the best ever by a FSU runner and his is the first Seminole to earn All-ACC honors twice.



His performance at the NCAA Regional meet earned him his second consecutive trip to the national championships. Tigchelaar was the Tribe's top finisher in four meets and was the second-best finisher in two races. In 2001, Tigchelaar finished sixth at the ACC meet, becoming FSU's first ever All-ACC honoree and ACC Freshman of the Year. In addition, he placed fifth at the NCAA South Regional and competed at the NCAA Championships. Before coming to Florida State from the Netherlands, he competed at the World Junior Cross County Championships in 1999 and ran in the European Junior Cross County Champion-ships in 1998, 1999 and 2000. In addition, he ran the 10,000-meter run at the 1999 World Junior Track and Field Championship. Tigchelaar owns a personal record of 28.55 for the 10,000 meters on the track. He is majoring in multinational business and marketing.



# 2002 WOMEN'S YEAR IN REVIEW

t was a year of great accomplishments for the Lady Seminoles cross country team. In fact, the 2002 season had Florida State enjoying one of the most decorated years in the history of the program. The season was capped off by the Tribe's first-ever appearance in the NCAA National Championships, where the Lady Seminoles were able to capture a 28thplace finish. The women were led by a barrage of outstanding runners led by FSU's first-ever All-American, Vicky Gill. Also contributing to the tremendous success were Natalie Hughes, Allison Lind and Misty Harper, all of whom joined Gill in earning NCAA All-South Regional honors.

The Lady Seminoles opened up the season with an attitude of determination as they put together back-to-back third-place finishes at the Mountaineer Open and the Seminole XC Invitational. FSU's B-squad finished ninth at the Gator Invitational, enabling the Lady Seminoles to record top 10 finishes in three of the first four events. The Tribe continued to improve as the season progressed. Florida State went on to better finishes from the previous season at the NCAA Pre-Nationals (19th), ACC Championships (6th) and the NCAA South Regional (2nd).

Hughes and Anne Clinton helped lead the early charge for the Seminoles at the Mountaineer Open and the Seminole XC Invitational. Hughes was the top runner for the squad as she placed seventh at the Mountaineer Open (18:32.5) and ran to a third-place finish at the Seminole Invite with her best 5k time of the year (18:20.2). Clinton ran her best 5k time of the year (18:43.4) at the Mountaineer Open and her run of 18:44.8 at the Seminole Invite helped the Lady Seminoles to capture third-place team finishes in both events.

The Gator Invitational was the first 6k run of the season for the Lady Seminoles and marked the third top 10 finish of the season for Florida State. Lind, who was returning from an injury, and Rachel Marsh led FSU's B-squad. Lind put together a time of 22:37.8 to place 21st overall while Marsh finished with a time of 23:51.5, which was her best time of the season.

The next meet for the Seminoles was the NCAA Pre-Nationals. The Lady Seminoles, who placed 20th last season, were able to better their performance in 2002 by finishing 19th. Gill was the top runner for the Lady Seminoles and set her personal-best 6k time with a run of 19:55, which was good enough for first-place honors. Hughes (21:54) and Harper (22:19) also contributed strong times as Florida State put together a solid performance.


From there the Lady Seminoles traveled to the ACC Championships, where yet another set of records were outdone. Florida State put together its all-time best finish at the ACC meet (6th) behind a red-hot Gill, who had the schoolís best ever individual finish (21:03.9 2nd) and went on to receive All-ACC honors. Hughes (21:47.7) and Lind (22:22.7) rounded out the top spots for the Lady Seminoles.

It was straight from the ACC Championships to the NCAA South Regional Championships, where the Lady Seminoles came up just short of a shot to go to the National Championship last year. The Tribe once again improved its performance from the previous year by placing second as a team. The Lady Seminoles led throughout the meet, but were caught in the final 100-meters by eventual champions Tennessee. Gill carried the Lady Seminoles and tallied a time of 21:03.9 that allowed her to take home first place honors. Hughes also turned in one of her top performances of the year

as she put together a time of 22:23.0 to finish in eighth place. Lind and Harper helped the Lady Seminole squad to round out the top 25 and guarantee them their first trip to the NCAA National Championships in school history. All four runners — Gill, Hughes, Lind and Harper — went on to receive All-Regional honors.

At their first ever trip to the NCAA Championships, the Lady Seminole put together a strong showing and placed 28th. Gill led the way for Florida State with a finish in the top 25. Her time of 20:07.4 landed her in 15th place and a spot on the All-America team. Lind and Harper continued their outstanding season with respectable finishes at the NCAA Championships. Lind ran a time of 21:48.5 and Harper finished close behind with a time of 21:58.0.

In the program's third year under the direction of head coach Bob Braman, the Lady Seminoles cross-country team enjoyed one of the most successful years in Florida State history.





Gill burst onto the national scene at the NCAA Pre-National meet where she beat eventual NCAA Champion Shalene Flanagan's course record to win the White Division in an outstanding career-best time of 19:54. She finished 15th with an impressive 6k run of 20:07.4 at the NCAA meet following her victory at the NCAA South Region meet. At the ACC Championships, she scored FSU's best women's finish by placing second overall. Throughout the season Gill was the Lady Seminoles top finisher in all five races she competed in. The ACC honored her as the Performer of the Week following the Pre-National meet. Gill's accomplishments this year trump her impressive 2001 campaign as she finished sixth at the ACC meet, fourth at the NCAA Regional and became the first Lady Seminole to compete at the NCAA Champion-





ships. In addition to her success on the trails, Gill was just as impressive on the track, placing 11th in the 10k at the NCAA Championships and setting the school record in the event. As a track runner, Gill owns personal best times of 33:59.67 in the 10k and 16:24.1 in the 5k. She is majoring in social science.





# WELCOME TO "TRAIL" AHASSEE


allahassee is home to some of the best running trails in the Southeast United States. Combined with the ideal climate of North Florida, Tallahassee is regarded as one of the top training sites for distance runners in the South.

The capital city is home to over 200 miles of running trails. Within a 10-minute drive from campus one can visit various training sites that range from single-track trails to large carriage trails. The wide varieties of training options are idea for distance training. If you are looking to do a long trail run or a hard tempo run over hilly terrain, Tallahassee has what you're looking for.

- ida State University's home cross country course has been regarded by collegiate and high school coaches as one of the best courses in the Southeastern United States. The greenway includes two 30-acre fields situated on rolling hills and surrounded by forest trails on all sides. One can run approximately 12k without overlapping other sections of the park. An ideal place for intervals, tempo runs or just an easy long run.
- St. Marks Wildlife Refuge:
  Located 40 minutes south of Tallahassee on the Gulf of Mexico, St.
  Marks Wildlife Refuge is a favorite

among visiting teams. The refuge holds close to 40 miles of trails atop dikes. But beware — alligators call the refuge home and you are guaranteed to see a few on the trails.


- wakulla Springs: Located just a short drive from campus, Wakulla Springs is a great place for your long distance training runs. Over 10 miles of trails intersect the park, which also includes a natural spring and diving platform. The water is a constant 65 degrees that is refreshing after the hard week of training.
- Lake Jackson: Included in the Lake Jackson Park are a variety of training options. Over 15 miles of wide carriage trails run throughout the park. The hilly terrain surrounding Lake Jackson makes it ideal for tempo runs. Intersecting many of the carriage trails in Lake Jackson is a vast network of single-track trails. These picturesque trails run through ravines and natural streams that blanket the park.
- Capital City Country Club: Called C-4 by members of the cross-country team Capital City Country Club sits on some of the hilliest land in Florida. The golf course's soft footing makes it an ideal site for hill training and tempo running.











Apalachicola National Forest: Located just 5 minutes south of town, Apalachicola National Forest covers over 550,000 acres of land stretching from Tallahassee to the Gulf of Mexico. Included in this vast area are many trails and unmapped forest roads. Apalachicola Forest also is home to a section of the Florida Scenic Trail, which stretches across the entire state of Florida covering close to 1000 miles.

Fern Trail: The Fern Trail runs through the heart of Tallahassee taking you from the center of town to the outskirts of the city. The Fern Trail intersects Tom Brown Park and the Lake Lafayette Trail covering close to 10 miles from point to point. An ideal site for a nice easy long run, the Fern Trail is a local favorite amongst the running community.

Leon Sinks: Preserved, as a geological park Leon Sinks is a single-track trail that runs past many of the natural sinkholes that blanket the park. Some of the sinkholes are filled with water and are close to 100 feet deep. The majority of the trail is hard packed dirt with the exception of a section of boardwalk which cuts through the swamp that is located in the park.

Lafayette Trail: The most recently discovered of all the trails in Tallahassee is Lafayette Trail. It is a combination single-track trail and carriage trail that sits on some of the most picturesque land in Florida. Cypress trees line the landscape that

one passes on a run past Lake Lafayette. If you're lucky you'll see an alligator or deer on your run. Lafayette Trail intersects Tom Brown Park and the Fern Trail totaling over 10 miles from end-to-end.


Lake Overstreet: Located adjacent to Lake Jackson, Lake Overstreet con-sists of a five mile figure eight carriage trail ideal for tempo and fartlek work-outs. Also included is a vast network of single-track trails nicknamed the "Blair Witch Trail" by the local runners.

Munson Sand Hills: Located about 10 minutes from campus, Munson Sand Hills encompasses close to 10 miles of moderately hilly single-track trails. A map of the trails is a must since many runners have been known to get lost in the network of trails.

Trail is the reminiscent of the old railroad that begins at the entrance of Munson Sand Hills. The trail follows the old railroad line close to 20 miles, stretching to the Old seaside Town of St. Marks.

## WORLD-CLASS TRAINING ENVIRONMENT

In addition to the many great offroad training opportunities, FSU's Track & Field complex, along with Tallahas-see's outstanding climate, make for a fantastic training environment for dis-tance runners. During FSU's academic year, the training weather is absolutely ideal.



# THIS IS TALLAHASSEE

mong low, rolling hills, down moss-draped canopy roads, within picturesque historical districts, and across seas of flowering azaleas lies a magical part of the Sunshine State — Tallahassee, Florida's capital city. With its intriguing combination of power-play politics and classic character splashed with a twist of Southern beauty and charm, Tallahassee is a side of Florida few expect to find.


With the Gulf of Mexico just 25 miles south and the Georgia border only 14 miles north, Tallahassee rests between the foothills of the Appalachian Mountains and the juncture of Florida's pan-

handle and peninsula in an area known as "Tallahassee to Atlanta than to Miami, Tallahassee more closely resembles its Georgia neighbor than Florida in topography, climate and lifestyle.

Like the city itself, the story of how Tallahassee was chosen as the state capital is rich in history. In 1823, two explorers set out — one on horseback from St. Augustine and the other by boat from Pensacola — to establish a permanent, central location for the seat of government. The two met at a beautiful site that the Creek and Seminole Indians called

"tallahassee"
— derived from the words "talwa," meaning town, and "a h a s s e e," meaning old. This historic meeting place remains Florida's capital today.

#### **TALLAHASSEE**

In 1823, the first civilian governor, William Pope DuVal, desired a central location for the legislature to meet. He sent one explorer on horseback from St. Augustine and another by boat from Pensacola — their rendezvous point was declared Florida's capital. Nestled among the rolling foothills of the Appalachian Mountains and located in a region of the Gulf of Mexico known as the Big Bend, the Capital region is known for its Southern characteristics, gracious hospitality and lush topography.

#### PHYSIOGRAPHY

Tallahassee's rolling landscape, typical of regions further north, is unique among the major cities of Florida. Some areas of the county, including the downtown ridge encompassing the Capitol complex, City Hall and the County Courthouse, exceed elevations of 200 feet. The highest elevation in Leon County is 288 feet, found in the northern part of the county. To the south of the city, the hills yield to the flat terrain that is typical throughout the peninsula of Florida.



145 properties listed on the National Register of Historic Places, Tallahassee is a living showcase of Florida history and heritage. The crowning jewel of Florida's historic "Capitol Hill" is the Old Capitol, beautifully restored to its 1902 splendor complete with the red-and-white striped awnings, a dome adorned with stained glass, antique furnishings and political memorabilia. The 22nd-floor observatory of the New Capitol Building offers a breathtaking view of this surprising Southern city, awash in flowering azaleas, snowy dogwoods, towering pines, fragrant magnolias, and hundreds of lakes, springs, swamps, rivers and sink holes.

Charming downtown historic districts graced with lush linear parks lead visitors to the Knott House Museum, The Columns, First Presbyterian Church, John G. Riley House Museum and Old City Cemetery. Free walking tours and replica turn-of-thecentury street cars carry passengers to antebellum mansions, picturesque churches and other downtown delights. Minutes from downtown lies the lush 52-acre natural habitat and 1880s farm of the Tallahassee Museum of History and Natural Science, home to the rare Florida panther and other furry "natives."

The area surrounding Tallahassee reveals numerous other historic and archaeological treasures, such as De Soto State Archaeological and Historical Site, Lake Jackson State Archaeological Site, Mission San Luis, Natural Bridge Battlefield and San Marcos de Apalache. Visitors can explore prehistoric Florida at the Museum of Florida History, where they


are greeted by a giant 12,000-year-old mastodon pulled from nearby Wakulla Springs.

On the shores of Wakulla Springs, alligators still laze under the watchful eyes of "snake birds" perched on twisted cypress trees. The site of many underwater scenes in "Tarzan" movies, it's one of the world's deepest freshwater springs. Glass-bottomed boat tours across these mystical waters are available.

Other sightseeing favorites include the floral masterpiece of Alfred B. Maclay State Gardens; Bradley's Country Store; FAMU Black Archives; and the Tallahassee Antique Car Museum. Nearby small towns offer fascinating excursions to places such as Pebble Hill Plantation, Florida Caverns State Park, Monticello Opera House and St. George Island.

Tallahassee is almost as rich in cultural treasures as it is in history. A widely-acclaimed collection of art, science and history museums and galleries, year-round festivals and non-stop entertainment at the 14,000-seat Tallahassee-Leon County Civic Center, feed a variety of cultural appetites.

Visitors with a hunger for the great outdoors will find Tallahassee ideal for all types of outdoor recreation-from canoeing down dark, cypress-lined rivers and biking up steep slopes to exploring backcountry wildernesses and hunting for bobwhite quail. Area lakes, rivers, ponds and the Gulf — just 30 minutes away — offer a paradise for boating and fishing. Lakes Jackson and Talquin are renowned in the bass fishing world for



yielding the "big ones." Local wildlife areas, such as the St. Marks National Wildlife Refuge and Apalachicola National Forest, are perfect spots for camping, picnicking, swimming, biking and

exploring.

And while Tallahassee also features eight golf courses and plenty of places to raise a racquet, it's a wild array of spectator sports that leave the crowds screaming for more. The Florida State Seminoles and Florida A&M Rattlers provide collegiate action while the Tallahassee Thunder is the city's featured arena football team. And always a sure bet are the

nearby greyhound races.

For another favorite "sport" - shopping - two large regional malls and many specialty centers offer an array of "playing options," from popular chains to curiosity and antique shops. Unique shopping locales include downtown parks, lakeside cottages and small Southern towns. Tallahassee serves a scrumptious selection of tantalizing restaurants ranging from fast food to five-star. Local specialties include homemade country sausage, melt-in-your-mouth steaks, wild game and succulent seafood fresh from the Gulf.

From luxury to economy, accommodations are plentiful and include restored bed and breakfasts, rustic "gentlemen" lodges, beachside escapes and comfortable chain hotels. For those who choose to follow in the footsteps of early travelers, Tallahassee also boasts 15 beautiful campsites. Continuous air service, Amtrak and four major highways make it easy for visitors to get to Tallahassee. But no matter how you arrive, the history and hospitality of Tallahassee make it difficult to ever leave for long.

Tallahassee has the mild, moist climate characteristics of the Gulf States and experiences a subtropical summer similar to the rest of Florida. In contrast to the Florida peninsula, however, the panhandle, of which Tallahassee is a part, experiences four seasons.






## TALLAHASSEE'S AN ALL-AMERICA CITY!

Located on the oldest continuous site of higher education in Florida, the university is situated in the heart of the state's capital city. The university's main campus blends Jacobean Revival and modern styles of architecture with the oaks, pines, dogwoods and azaleas of North Florida.

As the university has progressed and grown - from its pre-Civil War beginnings as the Seminary West of the Suwannee, to the Florida State College for Women and, finally, returning to coeducational status as a university in 1947 it has developed into an acclaimed research institution, a top-ranked competitor in intercollegiate athletics and a standard-setter in the basic sciences and the performing arts.

The university has entered the 21st century with excellence in all areas of its mission — teaching, research and public service, including many noteworthy miledents first-hand experience observing and working with professional meteorologists. In April 2002, WFSU-TV was among nine public television stations praised for their involvement with the PBS Ready To Learn service and early childhood literacy by President George W. Bush and First Lady Laura Bush dur-

ing a White House ceremony. In February 2002, Florida Gov. Jeb Bush announced the creation of a \$2.5 million FSU center that will develop the best methods to teach reading, to be headed by Joseph K. Torgesen, the FSU Robert M. Gagne Professor of Psychology and Education who is the nation's leading expert on how children learn to read. The center, which will collaborate with the University of Central Florida, will train teachers in what works.

In October 2001, FSU began its second capital campaign for private funds. The \$600 million FSU Connect campaign surpassed the halfway mark with \$306 million in May 2002. The university's first capital \$301 million, surpassing its original \$200 million goal.

From October to November 2001, Pulitzer Prize-winning author Robert Olen Butler, an FSU Francis Eppes Professor who holds the Michael Shaara Chair in Creative Writing, was the first author ever to write a short story live on the Internet. Butler allowed the world to watch him write an original short story, keystroke for keystroke, two hours a day for 19 days.


During the fall of 2001, FSU had 257 National Merit Scholars, 88 National Achievement Scholars and 232 His-

panic Scholars enrolled.

In June 2001, NBC Nightly News anchor Tom Brokaw donated more than 5,000 collections of World War II memorabilia that had been sent to him as the result of his three-book series on "The Greatest Generation" to the FSU Institute on World War II and the Human Experience. FSU created the institute in 1998 to "save the memories of those who saved the world" by collecting letters, diaries, memoirs and photos from participants in the war effort, in order to preserve the materials for classroom teaching, scholarly research and public viewing.

In the blackenterprise.com 2001 "Top Fifty Colleges for African Americans' rankings, FSU was rated 23rd in the nation, up from 26th in 1999.

In the March-April 2001 issue of



College of Law was ranked 13th.

At more than \$343.7 million, FSU's endowment has been ranked 127th in the nation by the National Association of College and University Business Officers, the benchmark of higher education fundraising success, in 2001.

In 2000, FSU bought the most powerful university-owned super-computer in the world. The IBM RS/6000 Super-computer can perform 2.5 trillion calculations per second. Located in the School of Computational Science and Information Technology, the super-computer will be used by FSU researchers to predict hurricanes and compare DNA sequences as complex as those of the

human genome.

The Challenger Learning Center of Tallahassee, a project of the FAMU-FSU College of Engineering, is scheduled to open in March 2003. The center, to be built on Kleman Plaza in downtown Tallahassee, will feature a space mission simulator common to all of the centers, plus a 300-seat IMAX theater and a domed planetarium laser theater. It will serve middle schools in a 66-county area of North Florida, Southeast Alabama and South Georgia.


In 2000, the doctoral program in the College of Business had the highest minority enrollment of any Ph.D. business program in the United States. In recent years, it has graduated more minority doctoral students than any other Ph.D. granting institution.

In 1999, FSU created the Center for Advanced Power Systems (CAPS) after recognizing the impact of power electronics, the potential impact of superconductivity and the rapidly changing business environment for power systems. CAPS is part of an Office of Naval Research-funded effort to design the U.S. Navy's next generation, all-electric fleet.

In December 1999, researchers at the National High Magnetic Field Laboratory used a hybrid magnet to conduct the lab's first research in continuous magnetic fields of 45 tesla, or one million times Earth's magnetic field. The magnet lab — the only one of its kind in the Western Hemisphere — was established in 1990 by the National Science Foundation and is run by FSU in partnership with the University of Florida and the Los Alamos National Laboratory.

■ In 1994, the Carnegie Foundation classified FSU as a "Research University I," placing it among the nation's top research universities. In 2000, the distinction was renamed "Doctoral/Research University-Extensive."

Under the leadership of FSU's 13th president, Thomas Kent "T.K." Wetherell,



who took office in January 2003, and its 13member Board of Trustees, the university continues to build on the foundation of its history of excellence in scholarship, research and service. The trustees are: Lee Hinkle, Harold Knowles, J. Stanley Marshall, Jim Smith and Valliere Richard-Auzenne, all of Tallahassee; Emily "June" Duda of Oveido; David Ford of Rosemont, Pa.; Dr. Jessie Furlow of Quincy; Manuel "Manny" Garcia III of Winter Springs; William "Andy" Haggard of Coral Gables; E. Ann McGee of Winter Springs; John Thrasher of Orange Park, and Student Government Association President Michelle Pletch of Aurora, Ill.

A senior member of the State University System, FSU was founded as an institution of higher learning in 1851 by legislative act. It began in Tallahassee with its first class of male students in 1857 and added women in 1858.

FSU's operating budget is \$716 million. Faculty and administrators generate more than \$130 million annually in external funding to supplement state-sponsored research. Three direct-support organizations serve to bolster the university: the Seminole Boosters, the FSU Alumni Association and the FSU Foundation.

The main campus is spread over 463.4 acres in Tallahassee; FSU, which has one of the smallest campuses in the SUS, has been actively acquiring land in the 1990s. FSU encompasses 1,423.2 acres in Leon, Bay, Franklin, Gadsden and Sarasota counties.

Within the state, the university maintains facilities at its 25-acre campus in Panama City, its Marine Laboratory at Turkey Point on the Gulf of Mexico, the Appleton Museum in Ocala and the Asolo Performing Arts Center in Sarasota. The Center for Professional Development and Public Service, housed in the Augustus B. Turnbull III Florida Conference Center on the edge of the campus, provides extensive credit and non-credit continuing education programs statewide.

For years, FSU has reached far beyond Florida through international programs in Switzerland, France, Panama, Costa Rica, Spain, Russia, Vietnam, the Czech Republic, Greece, Croatia, Ireland, South Africa, Ghana and the Caribbean. FSU's student centers in Florence, Italy, and London, England, are considered by many to be the nation's best in Europe.

Florida State offers 300 graduate and undergraduate degree programs through its nine colleges — Arts and Sciences; Business; Communication; Education; Engineering (operated jointly with Florida A&M University); Human Sciences; Law; Medicine; and Social Sciences (which also incorporates the Reubin O'D Askew School of Public Administration and Policy) — and eight schools — Criminology and Criminal Justice; Information Studies; Motion Picture, Television and Recording Arts; Music; Nursing; Social Work; Theatre; and Visual Arts and Dance.

With 1,956 members, the FSU faculty has included 10 National Academy of Sciences elected members, four American Academy of Arts and Sciences members and five Nobel laureates. It is backed by 5,262 administrative and support staff members.

Library holdings at Florida State include 2.4 million book titles and 6.7 million microforms. The main library facility, the Robert M. Strozier Library, is linked by computer to other state university and national research libraries. The Paul A.M. Dirac Science Library is located at the heart of the university's science research complex. FSU also maintains music, library science and law libraries, and the Mildred and Claude Pepper Library.

FSU's 6,317 graduate students pursue advanced degrees in fields as diverse as business administration and theoretical particle physics. A majority of research done at FSU is the direct result of student effort, culminating in numerous books, monographs and journal articles relating to the whole spectrum of intellectual interests and the practical needs of society.

OfFSU's 35,462-student population, 43.6 percent are male; 56.4 percent are female; 23.1 percent are minorities; and 3.8 percent are foreign students.



#### Dr. Tonea Stewart

Dr. Tonea Stewart is a professional actress, tenured Professor and Director of Theatre Arts at Alabama State University. As an actor, Dr. Stewart is best known for her recurring role in "In the Heat of the Night" as Aunt Etta Kibbe. Dr. Sewart also had roles in John Grisham's film "A Time To Kill" protraying Samuel L. Jackson's wife. She won an NAACP Image Award nomination as best supporting actress in 1997. Dr. Stewart was the first African American female to receive a doctorate from the FSU School of Threatre and the first McKnight Doctoral Fellow in Theatre Arts.

## Norm Thagard

Former NASA Astronaut, Norm Thagard was a mission specialist on STS-7 in 1983 on Orbiter Challenger, the flight engineer on STS-51B in 1985, also aboard Challenger and STS-30 in 1989, on Orbiter Atlantis. He also served as the payload commander on STS-42 in 1992, aboard the Shuttle Discovery and was the cosmonaut researcher on the Russian Mir 18 mission in 1995, which required he live and train at the Gagarin Cosmonaut Training Center at Star City, Russia for more than one year prior to the mission. He logged over 140 days in space during five space flights.

### DeLane Matthews

DeLane Matthews is an actress best known for her role as Beth Barry on "Dave's World" a television sitcom that aired on CBS 1993-1997. She has worked in regional theatre, on the New York Stage, in film and in television. DeLane has also appeared in the daytime soaps, "Guiding Light" and "Ryans Hope" for five years. Some of her other roles have included: "The Fugitive" (2001), Evasive Action (1998),"From the Earth to the Moon" (1998), "Every Woman's Dream" (1996).

#### 2001-02 IN REVIEW

The 2001-02 academic year concluded with the league pocketing three more national team titles and six individual NCAA crowns. In all the ACC has won 42 national team titles over the last 12 years.

The ACC's 2001-02 national champions were North Carolina in men's soccer, Maryland in men's basketball and Duke in women's golf. Overall, 97 ACC teams took part in post-season play compiling a 94-57-1 (.622) record.

A total of 188 student-athletes from the ACC earned first, second or third-team All-America honors this past year. In addition

the ACC produced eight national Players of the Year, two national Rookies of the Year and eight national Coach of the Year recipients.

The ACC placed at least one team in the top 10 nationally in 15 of the 25 sports sponsored by the league. In all, 36 ACC teams

finished their season with a top 10 ranking.

For the 2001-2002 campaign, all nine ACC schools finished in the Top 50 of the final Sears Directors' Cup ranking. At least six of the nine ACC schools have been positioned in the final Top 50 of the ranking since the inception of the award in the 1993-94 academic year. The Sears' Directors Cup, awarded annually by the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA), honors the top institution maintaining a broad-based athletic program, achieving success in many sports.

The ACC Academic Honor Roll record was broken for the 17th-straight year in 2001-2002 as 1,731 student-athletes were

recognized for their work in the classroom.

#### THE CHAMPIONSHIPS

The conference will conduct championship competition in 25 sports during the 2002-2003 academic year — 12 for men and 13 for women.

The first ACC championship was held in swimming on February 25, 1954. The conference did not conduct championships in

cross country, wrestling or tennis during the first year.

The 12 sports for men include football, cross country, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, wrestling, baseball, tennis, golf and lacrosse. Fencing, which was started in 1971, was discontinued in 1981.

Women's sports were initiated in 1977 with the first championship meet being held in tennis at Wake Forest University. Championships for women are currently conducted in cross country, volleyball, field hockey, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, tennis, golf, lacrosse, softball and rowing.

#### ATHLETICS DEPARTMENT MISSION STATEMENT


# FSU & ACROSS THE STATE RELAY



elping the community has always been a priority for Florida State University athletics and under the leadership of head coach Bob Braman, community service and charity donations have become a staple of the FSU cross country program. In 2002, the Seminoles did their part in being a positive contributor to the local Tallahassee community by raising \$5,000 for two area charities. On September 21, 2002, the Seminoles conducted their second annual "Across The State Relay," which is a 140-mile run

across the state of Florida, which spanned from Daytona Beach to Crystal River.

"Being able to raise and donate money, particularly to youth charities, is one of the fun and wonderful thing about this program," FSU head coach Bob Braman said. "The 'Across the State Relay' is a neat thing and it's a bit unusual, because we are doing a great thing and having a great time doing it. We are able to help out our community, and at the same time, the event itself is a real teambuilder. As athletes, we get the opportu-



The athletes were paired off during the relay and each duo ran between four and eight miles before reaching their final destination. Prior to the run, the runners secured sponsors that pledged money toward the effort so that the event could be a fund-raiser for local charities. Following the event, the team voted on which charities in which to make its donations.

This year's recipients of the Seminoles' dedication and hard work were two United Way charities, the Dick Howser Center for Childhood Services, Inc. and Capital City Youth Services. Members of the Florida State cross country program, including the student-athletes and the coaches themselves, made visits to each organization and presented checks for \$2,500. At the presentations, athletes had a chance to meet and greet those who the donations would go towards helping.

The Dick Howser Center, named after the former FSU baseball coach, is a nonprofit agency dedicated to providing services for children and individuals with disabilities and their families. The Howser Center began operation in 1974 as a small parent group in Tallahassee and now serves most communities in the Big Bend area. To date, the agency operates developmental preschool centers in Gadsden, Leon, Jefferson and Wakulla counties.

These centers are licensed childcare facilities that offer developmental intervention as well as therapy and other healing arts services. In addition, the Howser Center offers community based support such as respite care and personal care assistance for both children and adults with developmental disabilities. The Leon Center, located at 240 Mabry Street in Tallahassee, can be reached at 850/574-3906.

Capital City Youth Services is a non-profit shelter in Tallahassee that provides a nurturing home primarily for runaway children and teens. In addition, it offers services to youths who have been victims of abuse or who are in other troublesome situations. CCYS also provides an extensive counseling program to the youth that they serve as well as the families that they come from. The center serves over 1,000 young people a year from Leon County and the surrounding counties. For more information on the center and its services can be found on its website at www. ccys.org.
