

THE FLORIDA STATE UNIVERSITY

GENERAL INFORMATION

LOCATION: Tallahassee, the state capital, a city of 55,000 in north Florida. Tallahassee is served by Eastern and National air lines, the Seaboard Airline Railroad, and the Trailways and Greyhound bus lines. The city is located on United States Highways 27, 90, and 319.

HISTORY: In 1851, the Florida Legislature adopted an act establishing a seminary west of the Suwannee River. What had been the Florida Institute was offered as a gift to the State and so became for 50 years the West Florida Seminary. Later this institution was called Florida University, and Florida State College. In 1905 the institution became the Florida State College for Women and so remained until 1947, when by action of the State Legislature it became coeducational and was designated The Florida State University.

THE FLORIDA STATE UNIVERSITY



President Blackwell

One of two senior institutions in Florida's university system, Florida State University has shown spectacular growth since 1947, when it was converted from Florida State College for Women. It has become, for instance one of the foremost centers of graduate education in the South and in 12 years has awarded more than 500 doctorates. The doctorate is offered in 35 fields.

A \$26 million building program is under way, and this school year saw

completion of a \$2.5 million University Union, an air-conditioned residence hall of twin eight-story spires (which houses FSU basketball players), and research buildings for Physchology and Physics. And Doak S. Campbell Stadium was increased to a seating capacity of 40,500.

Besides a main campus of more than 315 acres, Florida State has a University Farm, a nine-hole golf course, and an off-campus apartment village for married students.

Enrollment for the Fall Trimester was 12,137, and is expected to reach 15,000 by 1970. Freshmen enter the Division of Basic Studies in the College of Arts and Sciences, where their instruction is in communication, history, social science, humanities, natural sciences and personal development. As juniors they may continue in Arts and Sciences or specialize in one of eight other schools.

Director of Athletics VAUGHN MANCHA

A former Alabama football great and Florida State assistant coach, Vaughn Mancha became Director of Athletics in 1959.

Mancha entered Alabama in 1944; four years of varsity football and selection to the All-SEC and All-America teams followed. In 1945, the Tide had a 10-0 record behind Mancha




and Harry Gilmer. Mancha starred at center in the '45 and '47 Sugar Bowl games (he was named to the all-time Sugar Bowl team), and the '46 Rose Bowl.

After graduation he played a year for the Boston Yanks (the franchise later became the NFL Baltimore Colts), while earning his BS and MA at 'Bama.

In 1949, he became head coach at Livingston (Ala.) State College and in three years there dominated Alabama small college football.

In 1952, Mancha came to FSU as an assistant. He left in 1957 for Columbia University where he coached, taught, and completed all work towards the doctorate except the dissertation.

Married to the former Sybil Little of Birmingham, he is the father of three children: Clare, 15; Nan, 13; and Dit, 5.

Head Basketball Coach

JESSE K. (Bud) KENNEDY

Bud Kennedy is beginning his seventeenth year as Florida State's head basketball coach. Only Adolph Rupp (34 years at Kentucky) and Lyles Alley (18, Furman) can boast longevity records topping Kennedy's.

FSU first fielded athletic teams in 1947-48, and Kennedy was hired to fulfill the dual role of Athletic Business Manager and assistant basketball coach. He replaced Don Loucks as head coach the following year.

By 1954-55 Kennedy fielded a team that went 22-4; in 1956-57 he attacked Florida State's first big-time schedule, moved into 4500-seat Tully Gym, and first met rival Florida. On Dec. 3, 1960, Florida State defeated Kentucky 63-58 in Lexington, a moment Kennedy remembers with pride. Then Jan. 29, 1964, last year's team defeated Alabama 95-77 for Kennedy's 200th FSU victory.

Born into an athletic setting, Kennedy is the son of Dr. A. R. "Bert" Kennedy, who as head football coach at Kansas in 1904-1910 gave the Jayhawks their only undefeated grid season to date in '07. (Dr. Kennedy, now 89, still practices dentistry in Lawrence.)

Bud attended Kansas, Baker, and Kansas State Teachers, graduating from the latter in 1932. He played football, basketball, and ran track at each school. He spent two years as playing coach of the San Diego, Calif., Athletic Club during those years. He formed lasting friendships with other well-known basketball figures such as Rupp, a KU player while Bud was playing at Lawrence High; Forrest "Phog" Allen, the KU coach, and Dr. James A. Naismith, founder of the game who was a physical education instructor at Kansas in Kennedy's college days.

After graduation, Kennedy coached basketball, baseball, and track for two years at Warrensburg, Mo., High School, followed by six years of service in the Kansas City school system. He supervised Physical Education in elementary schools and Westport High School.

He was then appointed Assistant Recreation Director for the city of Madison, Wisconsin. He was there for three years, then entered the U. S. Navy for three years, coaching basketball teams at the Naval Training Station at Purdue University and while overseas at Tubabo, Philippine Islands. His association with Florida State began at the end of his naval service.

Kennedy and his charming wife, Laura, have two sons, Hugh, 32, and Bob, 30, and seven grandchildren. All the grandchildren, five boys and two girls, and their families are residents of Tallahassee.

HUGH N. DURHAM, Assistant Basketball Coach



Probably the finest guard in Florida State's basketball history, Hugh Durham has served as Assistant Coach since 1961. The 27-year-old Kentuckian is beginning his tenth year at FSU, four as a player and six as a member of the coaching staff.

A three-time collegiate All-Stater for the 1956-59 teams, Durham scored more than 500 points twice and finished with 1381 points in 73 games. (See "1000 Point Club," page 25.)

Durham's career began with a 509point output as a sophomore in 1956-

57. His 43 points against Stetson that year is a school record shared by Dave Fedor (vs. Miami in '60). Slowed by injury, Durham scored 368 points as a junior, but closed his career with 504 as a senior, when he served as team captain and made several All-America lists.

Named to the Dean's List, Gold Key, and Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities, Durham graduated in 1959 with a degree in Business Administration. He served as freshman coach for one year, compiling a 9-1 record that is still best in the school's history. He received his Masters degree and was appointed a full-time assistant coach in 1961.

Hugh is married to the former Malinda Dixon of Jacksonville, and they have two sons, David, 4, and Doug, two months.

As a standout athlete at Eastern High in Louisville, Ky., Durham earned four letters in both basketball and baseball, and three each in track and football. He took two third places at the state track meet, in the 440 and 880 yard runs, and turned down college football scholarships to play basketball at Florida State.

Hugh is still an avid sportsman. He took up golf two years ago and now shoots in the 70's. In the Spring he serves as FSU's Golf coach. He is also the city badminton champ.

RUFUS C. ASHWORTH,





A standout playmaker and defenseman on three FSU teams (1959-62) and coach last year at Edison High School, Miami, Rufus Charles Ashworth is FSU's new freshman coach, replacing Lake Kelly. Kelly was named assistant coach at Loyola of New Orleans in

Ashworth is now working toward a graduate degree at Florida State. Last season he taught the patented "Seminole Shuffle" as a metropolitan head coach in Miami.

Ashworth, 24, graduated from Florida State in April, 1963, with a degree in Science Education. He is a native of Miami, where he prepped at Coral Gables High School. He is a bachelor.

RONALD MELTON, Athletic Business Manager

A 1953 graduate of Florida State, Melton became Athletic Business Manager in 1959 after five years as assistant, and assistant baseball coach.

An outstanding local athlete at Leon High School (as a 140-pound football guard he blocked 17 punts as a senior, four in one game, and made all-state in baseball), he was a baseball standout at FSU. Melton hit safely in 17 consecutive games in 1950, batting .361.

Supervises ticket distribution, travel arrangements, budgeting, and other vital tasks.

B. J. SAVAGE, JR., Academic Counselor

Jeff Savage performs an invaluable service as a full-time member of the Department, guiding FSU athletes in their studies. He counsels players, keeps a close watch on grades, and supervises distribution of textbooks.

A native of Germanton, N. C., he holds a BS and MA in history and physical education from Appalachian State Teachers College in Boone, N. C.

Internship coordinator for three years in the School of Education before assuming his present role, Savage has taught football, basketball, and baseball in the public schools of North Carolina and Florida.

DON FAULS, Head Trainer

Once a trainer in the farm system of the St. Louis baseball Cardinals, Fauls is in his tenth year with the Seminoles.

A native of Ithaca, N. Y., he attended Ithaca College, graduating in 1948 with a degree in Physio-therapy.

Fauls began professional work with a V.A. hospital in Bath, N. Y. In 1951 he joined the Greensboro, N. C., Patriots of the Carolina Baseball League as team trainer. After two years there, he moved to Omaha in the Western League, then a Class A club in the Cardinals' system.

The popular Fauls was Trainer for the U. S. team in the 1963 Pan American Games.


GEORGE BRADLEY, Equipment Manager



His dad played basketball for Ohio U. and is now Principal of Dunedin High. . . . Dick scored 1369 points at Clearwater, and took down 1100 rebounds, 43 in one game. . . . In one high school game he scored 50 points, and ended his last season with a three-year 1683 total.





TWENTY-NINTH ANNUAL ALL-COLLEGE TOURNAMENT

Oklahoma City, Dec. 28, 29, 30

Florida State, Louisiana State, DePaul, and Brigham Young will participate for the first time in the All-College, oldest holiday tournament in the nation and older than the NCAA and NIT. Returning to this year's meet are Creighton, Oklahoma City, Rice, and Xavier. Each team plays three games with the championship at 9 p.m. Wednesday night.

An all-time team was chosen for the All-College in 1960 after 25 tournaments. It included Bob Kurland, Elgin Baylor, Arnold Short, Bill Russell, Slater Martin, Win Wilfong, Cab Renick, Frank Selvy, Charlie Black, and Hub Reed. Stars since then include Boo Ellis, Nate Thurmond, Howie Komives, Dave Stallworth, Bud Koper, Gary Hill, Jerry Harkness, and Bennie Lenox. Four times All-College winners have won NCAA championships: Oklahoma State in 1945 and 1946, San Francisco in 1955, and Loyola of Chicago in 1963. Wichita won last year's tournament, and sellouts the last two nights helped set a tourney attendance record.

The 1964 field promises more greatness. Xavier returns 6-0 Steve Thomas, who scored 29.9 points a game last year; LSU has Dick Maile (20.7) back; Brigham Young returns its top six scorers and three sophs who averaged 20-plus as freshmen; Creighton's Jay Warhaftig averaged 32.4 as a freshman; NCAA 1st round team Oklahoma City returns five of its top seven players; and DePaul, 1st round NIT last year, returns three starters. Pairings for the tournament will be announced.

FSU IN TOURNAMENT PLAY

ROBERT TULLY GYM

HOME OF THE FIGHTING SEMINOLES

Completion of Robert Tully Gym in 1956 marked the beginning of one era of FSU basketball and the beginnings of a greater one. Previous Seminoles teams had played their games at "West Campus," a collection of makeshift classrooms at the old Dale Mabry Field five miles south of the campus.

A modern, ample plant for physical education, Tully Gym seats 4,500 for home basketball games and has floor space

for three basketball courts. The dimensions are 125' x 250', or 32,200 square feet of maple flooring. There are six practice goals for basketball. Initial cost of construction was \$879,716.58 and the building was occupied by athletic and physical education classes in September, 1956. The Seminoles played their first game in the gym on Dec. 13, 1956, against Texas A & M.

The structure is named for a former Florida State footballer, Robert Tully, who died of cancer on May 14, 1954.
