President Champion

For 108 years Florida State University has been holding classes on the original campus. First as the coeducational Seminary West of the Suwannee, then for 42 years as Florida State College for Women and finally, since 1947, as Florida State University, the institution has developed a long academic tradition. Since the changeover to a co-educational university 18 years ago Florida State has gained a name for itself as one of the more dynamic univer-

sites in the South and nation. There are now more than 13,000 students.

The University presently is organized in eight divisions and a Graduate School. The divisions are the College of Arts and Sciences and the Schools of Education, Home Economics, Music, Library Work, Social Welfare, Business, Nursing and Engineering Science. The Graduate School alone enrolls more than 2,000 students and more than 100 doctorates are conferred yearly. Much of the advanced research and instruction is undertaken in such institutes as those for Molecular Biophysics, Oceanography, Human Development, Human Learning, Social Research and Governmental Research.

Director of Athletics VAUGHN MANCHA

A former Alabama football great and Florida State assistant coach, Vaughn Mancha became Director of Athletics in 1959.

Mancha entered, Alabama in 1944; four years of varsity football and selection to the All-SEC and All-America teams followed. In 1945, the Tide had a 10-0 record behind Mancha




and Harry Gilmer. Mancha starred at center in the '45 and '47 Sugar Bowl games (he was named to the all-time Sugar Bowl team), and the '46 Rose Bowl.

After graduation he played a year for the Boston Yanks (the franchise later became the NFL Baltimore Colts), while earning his BS and MA at 'Bama.

In 1949, he became head coach at Livingston (Ala.) State College and in three years there dominated Alabama small college football.

In 1952, Mancha came to FSU as an assistant. He left in 1957 for Columbia University where he coached, taught, and completed all work towards the doctorate except the dissertation.

Married to the former Sybil Little of Birmingham, he is the father of three children: Clare, 16; Nan, 14; and Dit, 6.

Head Basketball Coach

JESSE K. (Bud) KENNEDY

Bud Kennedy is beginning his eighteenth year as Florida State's head basketball coach, Only Adolph Rupp (35 years at Kentucky) and Lyles Alley 19, Furman) can boast longevity records topping Kennedy's.

FSU first fielded athletic teams in 1947-48, and Kennedy was hired to fulfill the dual role of Athletic Business Manager and assistant basketball coach. He replaced Don Loucks as head coach the following year.

By 1954-55 Kennedy fielded a team that went 22-4; in 1956-57 he attacked Florida State's first big-time schedule, moved into 4500-seat Tully Gym, and first met rival Florida. On Dec. 3, 1960, Florida State defeated Kentucky 63-58 in Lexington, a moment Kennedy remembers with pride. Then Jan. 29, 1964, Florida State defeated Alabama 95-77 for Kennedy's 200th FSU victory.

Born into an athletic setting, Kennedy is the son of Dr. A. R. "Bert" Kennedy, who as head football coach at Kansas in 1904-1910 gave the Jayhawks their only undefeated grid season to date in '07. (Dr. Kennedy, now 89, still practices dentistry in Lawrence.)

Bud attended Kansas, Baker, and Kansas State Teachers, graduating from the latter in 1932. He played football, basketball, and ran track at each school. He spent two years as playing coach of the San Diego, Calif., Athletic Club during those years. He formed lasting friendships with other well-known basketball figures such as Rupp, a KU player while Bud was playing at Lawrence High; Forrest "Phog" Allen, the KU coach, and Dr. James A. Naismith, founder of the game who was a physical education instructor at Kansas in Kennedy's college days.

After graduation, Kennedy coached basketball, baseball, and track for two years at Warrensburg, Mo., High School, followed by six years of service in the Kansas City school system. He supervised Physical Education in elementary schools and Westport High School.

He was then appointed Assistant Recreation Director for the city of Madison, Wisconsin. He was there for three years, then entered the U. S. Navy for three years, coaching basketball teams at the Naval Training Station at Purdue University and while overseas at Tubabo, Philippine Islands. His association with Florida State began at the end of his naval service.

Kennedy and his charming wife, Laura, have two sons, Hugh, 33, and Bob, 31, and seven grandchildren. All the grandchildren, five boys and two girls, and their families are residents of Tallahassee.

HUGH N. DURHAM, Assistant Basketball Coach



Probably the finest guard in Florida State's basketball history, Hugh Durham has served as Assistant Coach since 1961. The 27-year-old Kentuckian is beginning his tenth year at FSU, four as a player and six as a member of the coaching staff.

A three-time collegiate All-Stater for the 1956-59 teams, Durham scored more than 500 points twice and finished with 1381 points in 73 games. (See "1000 Point Club," page 25.)


Durham's career began with a 509point output as a sophomore in 1956-

57. His 43 points against Stetson that year is a school record shared by Dave Fedor (vs. Miami in '60). Slowed by injury, Durham scored 368 points as a junior, but closed his career with 504 as a senior, when he served as team captain and made several All-America lists.

Named to the Dean's List, Gold Key, and Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities, Durham graduated in 1959 with a degree in Business Administration. He served as freshman coach for one year, compiling a 9-1 record that is still best in the school's history. He received his Masters degree and was appointed a full-time assistant coach in 1961.

Hugh is married to the former Malinda Dixon of Jacksonville, and they have two sons, David, 5, and Doug, one year.

RUFUS C. ASHWORTH,





A standout playmaker and defenseman on three FSU teams (1959-62) and coach last year at Edison High School, Miami, Rufus Charles Ashworth is FSU's new freshman coach, replacing Lake Kelly. Kelly was named assistant coach at Loyola of New Orleans in June.

Ashworth is now working toward a graduate degree at Florida State. Last season he taught the patented "Seminole Shuffle" as a metropolitan head coach in Miami.

Ashworth, 24, graduated from Florida State in April, 1963, with a degree in Science Education. He is a native of Miami, where he prepped at Coral Gables High School. He is a bachelor.

CHARLIE M. LONG,



Assistant Freshman Basketball Coach

Captain of the 1962-63 Seminoles and outstanding forward for three years, Charles Madison Long joins the F.S.U. basketball family as assistant coach to former teammate Rufus Ashworth.

The Louisville, Ky., native graduated in April of 1963 and earned a strong reputation playing for numerous service All-Star teams. He is a bachelor, taking graduate courses here at Florida State.


DON BIGGS (No. 3)


moved to forward where his lack of weight is not as great a handicap . . . More aggressive rebounding and more confidence in his shooting ability could win him a starting role.





FIRST ANNUAL TAMPA INVITATIONAL TOURNAMENT

Tampa, Dec. 20, 21

Florida State plays host to the First Annual Tampa Invitational Tournament in Tampa's new Curtis Hixon Convention Hall. It will be the first major basketball attraction at the new hall and the Cigar City hopes to develop it into one of the best holiday tournaments in the country.

The Seminoles will face Virginia Military Institute in the second game of the tournament while Auburn and Columbia tangle in the 7 p.m. opener. Winners meet in the championship contest around 9 p.m. on the next night with the losers in the consolation game at 7 p.m.

V. M. I., State's first game opponent, returns six lettermen from last season's 8-13 team. Coach Gary McPherson regards forward Charlie Schmaus as one of the better players in the country. However, the 6-3 senior needs rebounding help expected to come from senior Jack Hartung, a 6-8 center and 6-6 sophomore Steve Powers. At guard the Keydets are strong with 5-10 sharp shooter Robin Porter and 6-3 Bobby Ayers. Other important frosh additions include 6-5 foraward Bob DeVos and 5-10 guard John Kemper who scored 26.6 points per game.

Columbia finished sixth in the Ivy League and had a 7 and 15 mark, but Coach Jack Rohan is "cautiously optimistic" about the 1965-66 Lions. The big reason is big indeed—he's 7'1/4" sophomore Dave Newmark, one of the most famous high school basketball players in New York City history. The Lions have tremendous height in sophs 6-7 John Harms and 6-6 Larry Borger but veteran Jack Dema is a probable forward starter. The strength isn't only in the frontcourt for 6-0 guard Stan Felsinger averaged 20.5 points per game last season and has playmaking partner 5-9 Kenny Benoit (10.3).

If Auburn and Florida State are in the winners' bracket, the Tigers will play F.S.U. twice in a row since they play the Seminoles on December 27. Auburn does not have a player over 6'5" and Lee DeFore, an outstanding forward, may be forced to play center. Junior Jimmy Montgomery and sophs Alex Howell and Randall Walker are the only men in the 6'4" class and they must come through for Auburn to match last years line 16-9 record. As for guards, the Tigers have four good lettermen.


