FLORIDA STATE UNIVERSITY

"A University, like its athletic teams, must call its signals on the basis of teamwork and tested strategies, and yet be unafraid to try a new approach when — or even before — an old one fails," says Florida State's President Stanley Marshall.

Thus, Florida State is an ever-changing institution — proud of its past, influential in its present form, confident in its future — and, above all, actively concerned about each of the more than 20,000 students it is serving in 1975.


As one of nine institutions in the State University System, and the second oldest, Florida State's traditions date back to its founding in 1857, as the Seminary West of the Suwannee. Yet its vision encompasses the needs of mankind in the 21st Century. The University's faculty and administrators are alert to both the immediate and long-range problems of society which require solution and educational assistance.

Academically and athletically, Florida State continues to be a contender for top ranking among the nation's leading universities.

Although Seminole athletics can be traced back to the first decade of the 20th Century, the University's history includes a number of years when it was known as the Florida State College for Women (1905-47). The dynamic growth of intercollegiate athletics, since co-education and university status came to the campus in 1947, has paralleled the phenomenal physical and enrollment growth of the institution in the last two and one-half decades.

Supported by major grants from the National Science Foundation, the University has attained national prominence in physics, statistics, chemistry, and psychobiology. In athletics, the last decade has seen Seminole teams earn major bowl and tournament appearances and several bona fide All-America titles. In academics, the same period of time has seen two Nobel Laureates added to the faculty — one on a full time, the other on an annual winter quarter basis.





A pioneer in the field of oceanography for many years, Florida State is making marine studies (including the U.S. Sea Grant Program) one of its strong points of emphasis in the decade ahead. Facilities for oceanographic research are located both on the campus and in the Ed Ball Marine Laboratories on the Gulf of Mexico, south of Tallahassec.

Balancing its prestige in the sciences with academic achievements in the arts and humanities as well, Florida State is the home base for the State Theater, State Opera and State Symphony of Florida. Its role as an artistic and cultural pacesetter is long-standing and international in scope in art, music and theater.


Artists-in-residence this year will include two internationally known composers, Australian Malcolm Williamson and the Polish composer Kryzysztof Penderecki. In recent years students have had an opportunity to study under such talents as composer Carlos Menotti and writer-in-residence, Dr. E.R. Braithwaite, author of the best selling, "To Sir, With Love."

The John MacArthur Center for American Theatre, a \$19.4 million project, announced last year, is envisioned as a home for American theatre, a focal point for the development of the art at both the educational and professional levels. Though still in the planning stages, the Center has already attracted major donations and promises to establish Florida State's preeminence in collegiate theatre.

At the undergraduate level, Florida State students have a choice of more than 87 different baccalaureate fields of study; and at the graduate level, a choice of more than 85 master's degree areas and 58

doctoral programs.

Rounding out the University's research resources are two nuclear accelerators, a million-book library and special research facilities in geophysical fluid dynamics, educational research and technology, molecular biophysics social research, political research, psychobiology and pscyhology.



DR. STANLEY MARSHALL President, Florida State University

An active sportsman himself, Florida State's President Stanley Marshall is the University's most energetic and enthusiastic Seminole fan. He frequently plays as hard as he works, and that's saying something for a president whose daily agenda is often one that runs from 7 a.m. to midnight.

Nevertheless, according to his lovely wife Shirley, he still finds time to swim, to play tennis and touch football with friends, and ride horses on their farm in


Quincy, their nearby retreat from the formal presidential home on West Tennessee Street. Dr. Marshall's family shares his interest in frequent athletic activities — Sue Ellen, 21; David, 25; John, 12; Kimberly Ann, 6; and Drew, who was 5 in July.

Dr. Marshall attended Pennsylvania State Teachers College at Slippery Rock until the middle of his junior year in February, 1943, whereupon he entered the U.S. Army. During his military duty he was a member of the Army Specialized Training Program. He then served in the European Theatre of World War II until his discharge in 1946. He received the master's and doctor's degree from Syracuse University in 1950 and 1956, respectively, both in the area of science education.

In 1963, Dr. Marshall was invited by the Ford Foundation and the Turkish Government to direct the National Science Project of Turkey in which he and other American educators undertook the establishment of a national science high school for gifted students in Ankara.

Dr. Marshall is the co-author of three professional books and a widely used series of elementary science textbooks. He served as editor of the JOURNAL OF RESEARCH IN SCIENCE TEACHING from 1962-66 and as a member of the editorial board of Science World from 1962-65.

He is a member of 13 national or state professional organizations and has been recognized by inclusion in WHO'S WHO IN AMERICA and AMERICAN MEN OF SCIENCE. He is a fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, a member of the Board of Regents of the National Library of Medicine, and president of the Southern Association of State Universities and Land-Grant Colleges.





JOHN BRIDGERS Athletic Director

John Bridgers brought many years of administrative and coaching experience with him when he assumed Florida State's Athletic Directorship in the spring of 1973.

A veteran coach in both collegiate and pro ranks, Bridgers came to the Seminoles from South Carolina where he served as an associate to Head Goach and Athletic Director Paul Dietzel.

A native of Birmingham, Ala., Bridgers feels a large part of his responsibility is to

establish and maintain strong bonds with university faculty, staff, alumni and students as well as the other friends of the athletic program.

"Florida State has one of the nation's finest all-around athletic programs," said Bridgers. "It is our aim to see that it maintains its outstanding reputation and continues to move up among the country's top teams in all sports.

"To accomplish this will take the hard work, effort and dedication of all those associated with the university."

Prior to his association at South Carolina, Bridgers was head coach and athletic director at Baylor and an assistant coach at both Baltimore and Pittsburgh in the NFL.

A veteran of World War II and Korea, Bridgers received his Bachelor of Science degree from Auburn University in 1947. Following his graduation, he continued at Auburn as an instructor of economics.

He was accepted to the Yale Law School, but a service commitment forced him to turn it down. Following his two-year Army tour in Korea, in which he enrolled as a private and was discharged as a captain, he began his coaching career.


Bridgers' early coaching experience included tenures at the University of the South Sewanee, Tenn., and at Johns Hopkins, where he coached both football and track.

In 1957, he joined the staff of the Baltimore Colts and was a coach on the 1958 club which defeated the New York Giants, 23-17, in the now famous "sudden death" game.

He moved to Baylor in 1959 and for 10 years held the Athletic Director and Head Football Coach positions with the Bears. During this time he led the Bears to three bowl games and the third best won-loss record in the Southwest Conference behind Texas and Arkansas.

Following the 1968 season Bridgers left Baylor and was named offensive backfield coach for the Pittsburgh Steelers. He joined Dietzel's staff at South Carolina in 1970.

Bridgers is married to the former Frances Young of Florence, Ala. They have two sons, John Dixon and Donald Hamilton.



BILL ROWE Assistant Athletic Director

Bill Rowe joined his former coaching associate John Bridgers on the Seminole administrative staff last spring, after a long and successful stint as an assistant under Paul Dietzel.

His duties with the Seminoles include the overseeing of Florida State's physical facilities and their operations.

A native of Pennsylvania, he received an appointment to the U.S. Military Academy at West Point, N. Y., where he lettered three seasons as a center and

linebacker. He received honorable mention All-America recognition and was voted Army's outstanding lineman his senior season. He played for the North in the North-South game in December 1958, and graduated in the spring of 1959, with a BS degree in Engineering.

In 1964, Rowe returned to West Point as an assistant coach. In 1966 he moved to South Carolina and from 1970-72, served as defensive coordinator.

A member of the Fellowship for Christian Athletes, Bill is married to the former Mary Lou Beittel of Carlisle, Pa. They have four children.



CLAUDE THIGPEN Athletic Business Manager

Claude assumed his new position in the spring of 1974, after nearly two decades of working with the Athletic Department as accountant and ticket manager.

The Greenville, Fla., native continues to head the Seminoles' complex ticket operations as he has for more than 12 years, but has added new responsibility for budget and fiscal control.

The veteran member of the athletic department has organized the ticket

operation into a smooth functioning unit and is constantly on the alert for new ideas for more expedient operation of the department's overall business dealings.

LONNIE BURT Sports Information Director


Coordinating press and public relations and promoting Florida State's Athletic Program in general fall under Lonnie's far-ranging duties.

HUGH DURHAM Head Basketball Coach

In just eight years, Florida State Basketball Coach Hugh Durham has established a record that is the envy of all but a few coaches. Since 1966, Durham has compiled a 151-65 record giving him the nation's 10th best winning percentage (.699) over that period.

When Durham took the reins of the Seminole program, following the death of Bud Kennedy in 1966, he set three goals: to be consistently ranked among the nation's top clubs, to play in the NCAA

Tournament and to win the National Championship.

It did not take the Florida State graduate and 1,000-point club member long to prove he meant what he said. After an injury-riddled first year in which the Tribe went 11-15, the Seminoles have reeled off records of 19-8, 18-8, 23-3, 17-9, 27-6, 18-8 and 18-8.

The 1967-68 squad gained a NCAA tournament bid and since then the Seminoles regularly have ranked among the top 25 clubs. The 1971-72 season was Durham's most successful since the Seminoles went to the NCAA finals. The Tribe battled past Kentucky, Minnesota and North Carolina before dropping a five-point decision to UCLA in the championship game.

Durham has been associated with the Florida State program for 18 years as a player and coach. He is a native of Louisville, Ky., where he

lettered a total of 14 times in four sports.

He is considered one of the finest guards in Seminole history, scoring 1,381 points in three varsity seasons. Durham had two 500-plus seasons and received All-America mention. His 1,381 points placed him fifth on the Seminoles' all time scoring list.

Also while at Florida State, he was a member of the Gold Key Honorary Fraternity and was named Who's Who Among American

Colleges and Universities.

Following graduation he became freshman coach and posted a 9-1 record that still stands as Florida State's top one-year frosh mark. In 1961 he was named Kennedy's full time assistant.

During those four years as assistant, Durham doubled as Florida State golf coach and his teams were no less successful, winning 48 of 54 matches. Hubert Green, recruited by Durham, was voted rookie of the year in 1971 by the Pro Golfers Association.

A winner off the court as well as on, Durham is an avid racketball player and captured both the state singles and doubles championships

in 1973.

Durham has sent several players into pro basketball, the most notable being 6-9 Dave Cowens, the NBA's Most Valuable Player in 1972-73. Boston Goach Tom Heinsohn called Cowens "the best prepared rookie that I have ever seen." Cowens and teammate Willie Williams led the Seminoles to a 23-3 record in the 1969-70 season.

Durham graduated from Florida State with a Bachelor of Science and Master's degree in Business. He and his wife Melinda have three

children, David 14, Doug 9 and Jim 6.



Assistant Basketball Coach


Morris McHone is beginning his sixth year as a Seminole aid including a season as graduate assistant.

LARRY GAY Assistant Basketball Coach


Although this will be Larry's first year as an assistant coach, he certainly is no stranger to Hugh Durham's basketball program.



1974-75 OUTLOOK

Florida State's Hugh Durham, who has the nation's 10th best coaching percentage record over the past eight seasons with a 151-65 mark, views the 1974-75 basketball campaign with guarded optimism.

With seven of 11 lettermen returning following the Seminoles' second straight 18-8 record and 17 home games as plusses, Durham sees the lack of two experienced big men as a drawback.

"We have Greg Grady (6-9) back and he had a good year last season for a sophomore," said Durham. "Greg averaged 10.6 points and 9.8 rebounds and to me that's a good season for a sophomore.

"Our other big man is John Harrison (6-10), a transfer from Houston. He really hasn't been given the opportunity to play a lot so his contribution next season is one of uncertainty. However, he has the quickness, speed and jumping ability and that always helps.

"I have a lot of confidence in Zack Perkins (6-7). He fulfilled all expectations last season as a sophomore and he should have another outstanding year. Bob Chassee (6-5) also made a contribution in 1973-74 and he will improve.

"Actually, the pressure will be on Harrison, Chassee plus an incoming freshman, Harry Davis (6-7, 220 pounds) to give us depth at the post position."

On the wings, Durham is pleased. Returning are junior Larry Warren (6-4) who led the Seminoles in scoring last season with a 16.9 average and sophomore Wayne Smalls (6-2), who as a frosh logged 508 minutes of playing time. "We have some experience here and both are fine shooters," said Durham.

The same can be said of two returning point guards — sophomores Eugene Harris and Carlton Byrd. As Freshmen, these two talented pointmen divided the time directing the attack.

"Once again we'll rely on pressure defense, an area we emphasize," said Durham. We have the quickness to play pressure defense. It takes as much teamwork to play defense as it does offense and with our speed our defense should help our offense. We spend 1 hour and 45 minutes of our 2½-hour practice session on defense so you can see that we think this is important."

Other than Davis, the Seminoles have signed three other players this year. They are all wingmen and include 6-4 Bruce Boyd from Fresno JC in Fresno, Calif.; 6-6 Mark Brodie, Bishop Riley High School in New York City; and 6-5 Hank Mann, Chester, Pa., HS. Davis is from Cathedral Latin HS in Cleveland, Ohio.
