

HEAD COACH

JOE WILLIAMS



After taking Florida State to within one rebound of the NCAA Tournament last season, head coach Joe Williams continues to reach milestones in his coaching career. Already he is just one of three active coaches who have taken three different schools to the NCAA playoffs. Now, Williams continues to build on his victory total. During last year's Metro Conference Tournament, Williams reached his 350th win as a major college coach.

In just over two decades of heading up college basketball programs, Williams has taken seven of his teams to the NCAA playoffs and another to the National Invitation Tournament (NIT). In 1970, while coaching at Jacksonville, his team played in the NCAA final against John Wooden's UCLA dynasty.

Williams became Florida State's fourth basketball coach in 1978 after coaching stops at Jacksonville (1964–70) and Furman (1970–78) where his teams combined for a 234-148 record. It was at those schools where he first earned the trademark of turning sputtering programs into contenders.

Over his seven-year tenure at Florida State, the Mississippi native has chalked up a 117-88 record. His best year was his second campaign (1979-80) when the squad finished second in the Metro Conference race with a 22-9 record, landing a berth in the Midwest Regional. The 1983-84 season also produced excellent results with the team ending third in the Metro with a 20-11 season and a bid to the NIT.

Following college graduation and two years of coaching in the high school ranks, Florida State was Williams's first collegiate coaching assignment. He led the 1962 Seminole freshmen to an 11-7 record while coaching under the late Bud Kennedy. Williams moved to Furman in 1963 as an assistant coach and remained there just a year before taking the head job at Jacksonville University in 1964.

There he began turning the Dolphin program around. In his first season, the Dolphins advanced to the NAIA national playoffs. Five years later the school was

playing against UCLA for the 1970 NCAA Championship. Artis Gilmore, perhaps the most heralded player Williams has coached, was a junior on the 27-2 squad. With a 92-61 six-year record, Williams headed to Furman to attempt another rebuilding project.

Over the ensuing eight-year period, Williams became the school's winningest coach as the Paladins compiled a 142-87 record. Furman won five Southern Conference titles and advanced to the NCAA playoffs in each of those years. Twice Williams led his teams to 22 victories and in 1973, he was named Southern Conference Coach of the Year.

In 21 seasons as a head coach, Williams has experienced only four losing seasons while six times his teams have won 20 games or more. When Florida State advanced to the NCAA playoffs in Williams' second year, he became only the fifth coach to take three different schools to the playoffs. Only

three of those coaches are active in the college game today.

Williams, Louisville's Denny Crum and South Carolina's Bill Foster give the Metro Conference the distinction of having three member coaches who have led their teams to the championship game at the NCAA playoffs.

Williams, 50, played under Abe Lemons (former head coach at the University of Texas) at Oklahoma City University before receiving his bachelor's degree from Southern Methodist in 1956. He worked on a master's degree briefly at Tulane and finished it at Florida in 1968.

Williams recorded his 300th career win, an 89-73 win over St. Louis, on January 23, 1982, while his 100th win as the Florida State coach came on March 3, 1984 over Virginia Tech, 93-79. His career coaching mark stands at 351-236.

Williams and his wife Wendy have two sons, Blake and Braxton.

rex morgan

Assistant Coach

Six-year Florida State assistant coach Rex Morgan returns once again to serve as head coach Joe Williams' right hand man. A former All-American guard at Jacksonville University, Morgan is also the primary cog behind Florida State's recruit-

primary cog perimital Florida States of the sing efforts.

Morgan played at Jacksonville from 1968–70 under present FSU boss Joe Williams, averaging 23 points per game. As a senior in 1979, he and teammate Artis Gilmore led the Dolphins to the NCAA basketball finals against John Wooden's UCLA squad.

An All-American pick in 1969, Morgan was named to the Florida All-Decade team and was selected Florida's Basketball Man of the Year as a senior by the Tallahassee

Tip-Off Club.
Following graduation, Morgan played three seasons (1970-73) with the Boston Celtics before joining Tom Wasdin's staff at Jacksonville for one season. Before his addition to the Florida State staff, he was a sales representative for Champion Products.

Morgan did find time to coach the AAU national team during that time away from college coaching, leading it to a 56-0 record. He also served as a commissioner for the Junior Pro Basketball Association.

At Florida State, Morgan has been credited with the major portion of recruiting many of the athletes who have blossomed into important contributors. A prime example is junior Randy Allen, whom Morgan courted in 1983. Allen is expected to rewrite the Florida State record books before he graduates in several years.

Morgan works closely with head coach Joe Williams and assists him in preparing for practice sessions. During practice, Morgan works with the first team offense.

Morgan and fellow assistant Jackie Pons also keep closely involved with the public. Following all Florida State basketball games, the two host a popular radio ques-

tion-and-answer show at courtside.

familiar face on the sidelines once A again will be sixth year coach Steve Williams. A former college player himself, Williams oversees Florida State's game op-

erations and has additional duties with academics, recruiting, and opponent scouting. His on-the-court duties center around

coaching FSU's defense. Williams joined the Florida State program in 1980 after a successful high school coaching career at Washington High School in Pensacola.

In his first year at Washington (1976). Williams led the school to a 17-12 record. He followed up with a 29-5 report card and a semi-final berth in the state championships. Bridesmaid status was again the Pensacola school's fate in both 1978 and 1979 when his teams finished 22-11 and 25-3. But in 1980, Williams' squad won the state AAAA crown with a 23-7 record. Two players Williams coached at Washington— Michael Johnson and Ronnie Watson— went on to play at Florida State.

Williams' first coaching assignment following his college graduation from Florida in 1974 was Newberry (Fla.) High school where he guided the team to a 12-12 record while establishing himself as the school's

youngest basketball coach in history.
Williams first made a name for himself in the state when he was voted to the All-Southeastern Conference freshman team and earned MVP honors for the Gators. He repeated as an All-SEC sophomore and concluded his career by making the allconference defensive team. As a senior captain, Williams received Florida's Don Fleming Award.

Steve and his wife, Harriet, have a daughter, Dionne and are expecting a sec-ond child in November.

Jackie Pons Assistant Coach

Jackie Pons returns to the Florida State staff for his third year as an assistant. He first joined the staff during the 1982–83 season as a volunteer assistant coach

Pons helps coach the offense during Seminole practice sessions and concentrates his efforts with the second team unit. Additional duties include heading up Florida State's scouting operation as well as organizing FSU's yearly basketball coaching clinic. He also serves as director of FSU's summer basketball camps.

Pons also finds time to co-host a radio talk show with assistant Rex Morgan follow-

ing each Seminole basketball game.
Pons returned to his alma mater following a highly successful three-year coaching stint at Robert Munroe High School. During those years, he coached his teams to an 80-14 record and two district tournament wins. The Bobcats placed third in the 1981–82 Capital City Classic, a tournament that featured the top 16 teams in the state. Pons saw five of his players named to the all-state team and five received college scholarships during his tenure. He was named Gadsden County Coach of the Year

Prior to his work at Munroe, the 28-yearold coached one year at North Florida Christian School in Tallahassee.

He has also coached the state AAU team from District III.

The Tallahassee native played basketball at William Carey College in Mississippi for two years before transferring to Florida State where he finished his degree in physical education in 1978.

Jackie and his wife, Kay, have a daughter, Jacqueline.

RUSSELL COTTON Graduate Assistant Coach

ussell Cotton, a Florida State basketball manager for the past three years, joins the coaching staff for the 1985-86 season.

Tallahassee native, Cotton attended local Maclay High School where he was co-MVP of the basketball team as a senior in 1980. He was also a member of the 1979 class A state championship team.

Following high school graduation, he accepted a scholarship to Berry College in Rome, Ga., where he played one year. He then transferred to Florida State, picking up his bachelor's degree in movement sciences and physical education in 1985. Currently, he is working on a master's in physical education and administration.

A young man who lists his career goal as becoming a Division I head basketball coach, Cotton has benefited by working at the Florida State summer basketball camps

for the past four years.

He is the son of Bill Cotton, a starter on FSU's 1960-61 team that upset Adoph Rupp's Kentucky club in Lexington, and is married to the former Tammy Briley.

irst year basketball trainer Kent Knisley adds a new dimension to Florida State's athletic training staff. Not only is Knisley a certified NATA trainer, but he is also a licensed physical therapist in the state of Florida. He brings a wide variety of experience to FSU.

A 1984 graduate of Florida A&M's School of Physical Therapy, Knisley is not a stranger to the staff, however. He worked on the FSU student training staff for over a year while attending Florida A&M.

A 1976 graduate of Bradenton's South-east High School, Knisley first attended the University of Dayton for a year where he played offensive guard on the school's football team. Following an injury, he returned to Bradenton and received his Associate of Arts degree from Manatee Junior College in 1979. While continuing to take pre-physical therapy classes through 1982, he worked as an assistant trainer at Southeast and later at Manatee. From June until August of 1982, he served as the trainer for the Pittsburgh Pirates' rookie league in Bradenton before moving to Tallahassee to attend Florida A&M.

Knisley worked with the 1982 Rattler football team but in January of 1983, joined the Florida State training staff as a special student. After receiving his degree from A&M in August of 1984, he continued to work part-time at FSU while also working part-time as a staff physical therapist at Tallahassee Memorial Regional Medical Center.

In April 1985, Knisley became the interim athletic trainer at Valdosta State. Three months later, he accepted his current position at FSU

In addition to serving as the head bas-ketball trainer, Knisley is the trainer for all spring sports and works as the rehabilitation physical therapist for the football program.

DR. BERNARD SLIGER University President

r. Bernard F. Sliger, Florida State University's 10th president, is an avid sports fan who believes that a top quality athletic program enhances—rather than hurts—a university's academic program.

Since assuming the FSU presidency on Feb. 7, 1977, Sliger has become increasingly visible on the national level. In February 1984, he was appointed to the executive committee of the Universities Research Association, which is comprised of 80 major research universities in the United

The American College Testing Program elected Sliger vice chairman of the Board of Trustees in December 1983. He has been on the 15-member board since 1981. He is also a member of the prestigious Federal Reserve Board of Atlanta.

Born Sept. 30, 1924, the native of Trout Creek, Mich., holds three degrees—a B.A. ('49), M.A. ('50) and Ph.D. ('55)—from Michigan State University, all in economics; he has done postdoctoral study in mathematical economics at the University of Minnesota on a sabbatical leave. He has taught at Florida State, Michigan State, Louisiana State and at Southern University in Baton Rouge, La., and began his educa-tional career as an instructor in Michigan's Interior Township Schools in 1947

Sliger joined Florida State University's administration on May 15, 1972, as executive vice president. He assumed the additional duties of chief academic officer and further served as director of the University's London Student Center during the fall quarter, 1975.

Formerly executive director of the Louisiana Coordinating Council for Higher Edu-cation, Sliger's background as an educator includes 19 years as a faculty member and administrator at Louisiana State University. Dr. and Mrs. Sliger (Greta) have four

Athletic Director

ecil Ingram, known to most of his friends and associates as simply "Hootie", has headed Florida State's athletic department for the past five years. He came to the position in January of 1981 after serving as associate commissioner of the Southeast Conference.

Since his arrival in Tallahassee, Ingram

has initiated a \$10 million dollar building program for athletic facilities. The Moore Athletic Center that houses administration, coaches and ticket personnel, went from the blueprint stages under Ingram to reality when it opened in 1983.

The Seminole Baseball Stadium was completed during Ingram's second year at FSU while further improvements to Doak Campbell Stadium, the Bim Stults Aquatic Center, and Mike Long Track were also completed.

In June, Ingram was named to the pres-tigious NCAA Council, after serving as a member of the nominating committee for two years.

A native of Tuscaloosa, Ala., Ingram played football for the Crimson Tide from 1951 through 1954. He was All-SEC as a sophomore when he led the nation in pass interceptions. The '53 Alabama team

played in the Orange Bowl and the '54 squad in the Cotton Bowl.

After an Army stint, Ingram turned to coaching. He started as an assistant at Bradenton (Fla.) Manatee High School and was later head coach at Tuscaloosa High School for three years.

He later moved into college coaching and had assistant coaching assignments at Wake Forest, Virginia Tech, Georgia and Arkansas. His only college football head coaching job began in 1970 at Clemson. Three years later he joined the SEC as assistant commissioner.

During his eight-year tenure with the SEC, his duties included supervision of football and basketball officials, rules interpretations and eligibility.

Ingram and his wife, Toni, have a son and

two daughters.


Faculty Athletic Committee Chairman

A Professor of Law at Florida State Uni-versity since 1967, Charles W. Ehrhardt

of the FSU Athletic Committee.

Ehrhardt served on the committee from 1969–71, and was reappointed to the board in 1983. He succeeded Dr. James Jones as chairman in 1984, and became Florida State's representative to the NCAA with the appointment.

A native of Elkader, Iowa, Ehrhardt received a bachelor's degree from lowa State University in 1962. Two years later he

earned his law degree from the University of Iowa and went on to become an Assistant United States Attorney in that state before

coming to Tallahassee.

A widely-respected expert in the field of Evidence, Ehrhardt holds the Florida State position as the Ladd Professor of Evidence. He wrote the Florida Evidence Code. passed by the state legislature in 1976, which deals with the admissability of evidence in court trials. Ehrhardt is also the author of a book on evidence, first published in 1977 and scheduled for a second edition soon.

Ehrhardt is frequently called on for lec-tures and speaking engagements. He is also asked to do private consultations with lawyers and judges nationwide on evi-

dence matters

In the spring of 1984, he was voted President of the Metro Conference, a position which makes him chief representative of the league in dealings with the NCAA. Ehrhardt and his wife, the former Judy

Sutton, have three children.

BOB GOIN Associate Athletic Director

Bob Goin has been the associate ath-letic director at Florida State since July of 1981. He assists athletic director Hootie Ingram in day-to-day operations of the athletic department. A large portion of responsibilities for football, basketball and baseball game day operations are also under his leadership.

Goin is well-experienced both as an administrator and coach. He came to Florida State after serving two years as athletic director of California (Pa.) State College. Prior to taking the California post, he was assistant director of athletics at West Virginia. Between 1960 and 1976, he served in various capacities at Bethany (W. Va.) College. Included among his Bethany duties were coaching responsibilities in football, basketball and baseball.

Immediately prior to moving to West Virginia, Goin served Bethany as associate professor and chairman of physical education and athletics. That assignment lasted for four years (1972-76). Goin was Bethany's football coach between 1963 and

Goin received a bachelor's degree from Bethany ('59) and a master's from West Virginia ('62).

A 1969 graduate of Florida State, Pendleton returned to his alma mater in 1973 as graduate assistant football coach. 1974, he became a full-time member of the Tribe family when he was hired as an assistant football coach. The next year, he

Academic Athletic Advisor's Association. He has also been a member of the American Alliance for Health, Physical Education and Recreation


