he up-tempo style of basketball that has become a Seminole hallmark under Pat Kennedy has also become a media favorite. Primarily regional in scope, FSU basketball was rarely seen on television prior to Kennedy's arrival.

So dramatic has been the increase, and regularity, of television coverage that the most frequent question to athletic department phones has switched from "which games are going to be televised" to complaints when the rare game is not on the air.

A record 19 Florida State basketball regular season games have been earmarked for TV this season. Already one of the nation's most popular athletic programs, the Seminoles find themselves as one of college basketball's most publicized teams, covered by one of the country's largest media contingents.

o coach in the 48 year history of Florida State

basketball has accomplished what Pat Kennedy has achieved in his nine years at the helm of the Seminole program. To acquire an appreciation of the impact Kennedy has had on the FSU program, consider where the program was prior to his arrival, 10 years ago.

Consider. Before Kennedy came to Tallahassee, FSU had received just four invitations to the NCAA Tournament.

Fact: Under Kennedy the Seminoles have been to the "Big Dance" five times in the last nine years, including a string of three consecutive appearances.

Consider. Only three Seminoles had ever been selected in the first round of the NBA draft.

Fact: Bob Sura's selection as the 17th overall pick in the 1995 NBA draft made him the fourth Seminole taken in the draft's first round in the last three years. All total Kennedy has seen five FSU players chosen in the opening round.

Consider. In the 39 year history of the program prior to his hiring, Kennedy's four predecessors had combined for seven 20-plus win seasons.

Fact: Kennedy has seen his Seminoles compile four 20-plus win seasons under his guidance and has twice fallen one "W" shy by registering 19 wins.

Consider. Florida State had never won a conference championship tournament.

Fact: In 1991 Florida State won its first ever Metro Conference championship and an automatic NCAA bid

with a 76-69 triumph over Louisville propelling FSU into NCAA post season play for the third time in four vears.

Consider. Only once had a Florida State team advanced beyond the second round of the NCAA Tournament.

Fact: Kennedy led his troops to within one win of a Final Four berth in 1993 after advancing to the Sweet 16 the year prior.

Consider. Primarily regional in scope, the program was rarely scope on television and seldom garnered the attention of the nation's top high school recruits.

Fact: The up-tempo style of basketball that has become a Seminole hallmark under Kennedy After rebuilding programs at Iona and Florida State, Kennedy's success and strive for perfection have not gone unnoticed.

When coaching vacancies arose at Tennessee, UNLV, St. Johns and Seton Hall his name was pegged for each university's short list. But before the schools could court Florida State's head man out of town, Kennedy showed how deep Garnet & Gold blood runs through him by squelching rumors and stating his determination to put FSU among the basketball elite.

It was 10 years ago that Kennedy transplanted his family from a cozy situation at Iona College in New York to Florida's capital city. Kennedy said he had a gut feeling about FSU, citing the potential of the program as a draw. And when others have come calling, he has shown his dedication saying, "Pat Kennedy is the coach here and he will be for a long time."

At 28, Kennedy took over the rebuilding job at Iona after the departure of Jimmy Valvano to NC State. He would lead the Gaels to four consecutive 20-plus win seasons and two NCAA Tournament appearances before accepting the bigger challenge at Florida State.

"Somehow I knew that the situation was right at Florida State," said Kennedy. "When I got here, the

is slated for 19 television appearances this season, including nine on national networks. Kennedy's brand of basketball captures the attention of the top recruits in the country as the Coach has signed three McDonald's All-Americans over the last two years, three prepsters who garnered state Mr. Basketball honors and has the opportunity this season to start a lineup that features four high school All-Americans.

This is but a small sampling of the success Kennedy has used to put a "football crazed" town on the basketball map. When Kennedy led Florida State into the Atlantic Coast Conference in 1991 many thought the program would serve as doormat in the nation's toughest basketball conference. Not one to shy away from a challenge, Kennedy's troops took the league by storm with consecutive second place regular season finishes. Along the way Kennedy set new ACC marks for most road wins (6) and victories (11) by a first year coach. His accomplishments did not go unrecognized as he was named ACC Coach of the Year for his efforts.

He has brought excitement, exposure and national recognition to Florida State basketball with a combination of aggressive, full-court style of play; top notch scheduling and highly acclaimed recruiting classes.

atmosphere was even better than I thought it would be. And since then, I have had attractive offers to leave and, again, I just felt that this was the right place. Good things were about to happen. And it just turns out my instincts have been right."

Keen instincts have gotten the 43-year old Kennedy a long way in a short period of time, but it is his desire and determination which have propelled him to the top of his profession.

It is an intense desire to succeed that drives Pat Kennedy. He demands a great deal of himself and his program and expects the hard work to pay dividends.

"I had said when we first joined the ACC that it would takes us five years to rebuild the program so it could consistently compete with the league's upper-tier," said Kennedy. "When I first came here our goal was to become competitive nationally. We've done that. Now our goal is to be among the elite in the conference every year. We now have the nucleus in place to do that.

"There are basically three stages to a program. Building it up to be an NCAA Tournament-level team; maintaining it with NCAA Tournament-level teams; then being good enough to win a national championship. I believe this program can get to the third stage."

Kennedy heads into his 16th year of coaching seven victories shy of 300 career wins. His overall record stands at 293-165 (.639). Along the way, Kennedy has amassed eight 20-win seasons during his 15 year coaching career. His FSU record stands at 169-105 (.616), and includes a 104-26 (.800) mark on the Seminoles' home court in the Tallahassee-Leon County Civic Center.

Kennedy's tenure has meant more than wins. Florida State drew more than 100,000 fans for the first time ever in his first season and has repeated the feat in all but one subsequent season. Three years ago, the Seminoles set new records for average (9,191) and total (137,863) attendance.

A more dramatic beginning could not have been written for the Kennedy era at Florida State as he opened the 1986-87 season against rival Florida in front of the largest crowd ever to witness a college game in the state. 13,300 looked on as Kennedy shouted, cheered, screamed, stomped, encouraged and inspired his underdog Seminole squad to a delirious 80-76 win over the nationally ranked Gators. Kennedy has not looked back since.

His first season was a 19-11 effort, culminating in a

that gave FSU its first ever Metro Conference Championship and an automatic bid to the NCAA Tournament for the third time in four years.

The 1991-92 season showed Seminole fans what the program was capable of under Kennedy's leadership. In its first season in the prestigious Atlantic Coast Conference, Florida State surprised the nation with its ability to contend for the conference crown in its inaugural season. Kennedy's Seminoles won six ACC road games, including a stunning win at North Carolina in their league opener, and finished 11-5

overall; good enough for second place behind eventual national champion Duke. That team later advanced to the Sweet 16.

The 1993 team, the best yet under Kennedy and the second most successful in school history, would oneup the '92 squad. The Seminoles proved their lofty preseason predictions were correct, finishing just one win away from a trip to the Final Four after losing to Kentucky in the Southeast Regional final, FSU posted

bid to the National Invitational Tournament (NIT). The post-season appearance was FSU's first since the 1984 season and only the second in the 1980s.

With but one starter and three players who had ever donned the garnet and gold, Kennedy's 1987-88 team won 19 games, finished second in the Metro Conference and went to the NCAA Tournament. All this after opening the season to predictions of a sub .500 season and conference cellar-dweller status.

The 1988-89 season, however, was proof of the basketball rebirth in Tallahassee. Florida State entered the year ranked among the preseason Top 20 for only the second time in school history. The Seminoles remained in the polls throughout the entire regular season, reaching a peak at No. 7 after a landmark win over Louisville in Freedom Hall. Kennedy's third season resulted in the Seminoles' second regular season metro Conference title, a 22-8 record, and a second consecutive trip to the NCAA Tournament. Back-to-back NCAA appearances had occurred just one other time in school history.

Five years ago, Florida State cleared its final hurdle in its last year in the Metro Conference. Never had the school won the tournament crown, but the Tribe ended that jinx with a stunning comeback win against Louisville

a 25-10 record and a second place finish in their second year in the ACC.

The last two seasons have proved to be rebuilding years for the Seminoles. For the first time in his coaching career, consecutive Pat Kennedy led teams have finished with sub .500 records.

A native of Keyport, New Jersey, Kennedy attended Kings College in Wilkes-Barre, PA, on a basketball scholarship. After two years as a player, while boarding the team bus for a game at the Palestra in Philadelphia, his coach grabbed his arm and said, "Pat, I'd like for you to scout our next opponent tonight. Here's a ticket and directions."

With that, Kennedy's career changed completely. He became head junior varsity coach, finishing the year with a 17-4 record. He was elevated to the school's top varsity assistant coach as a senior.

After graduating in 1975, Kennedy was named assistant coach at Lehigh University. In 1977, Iona head coach Jim Valvano asked Kennedy to join his staff and a longtime friendship between the two was born. When North Carolina State lured Valvano away from the New Rochelle, NY, school after the 1979-80 season, Iona wasted little time in naming Kennedy to the post.

While at Iona, Kennedy's teams made a name for themselves. A 23-8 record in 1984 led to Kennedy's selection as the New York Metro Area Coach of the Year. He followed the year with a 26-5 record and was the recipient of

the Heineken Award which recognized excellence in college coaching. Kennedy followed Valvano, Lou Carnesseca and Dean Smith as winners of the prestigious award.


Overall, the Kennedy record shows ten postseason appearances, seven of those in the NCAA Tournament, and six conference championships in 15 years of coaching. He became only the fourth Division I coach in NCAA history to win 100 games in his first five years as a head coach.

A high level of achievement, both in academic and athletic arenas, made Kennedy an easy choice when Florida State began looking for a head coach following the 1985-86 season. "We were

Kennedy's academic commitment is strong. Over 95 percent of his recruits at lona graduated - a fact recognized by USA Today, which cited lona College and Kennedy's program for one of the most outstanding graduation rates in all of college athletics. His "no-bend" philosophy on academics has carried over to Florida State where he is raising the graduation rate and the scholastic health of his student-athletes.

Kennedy coached student-athletes have enjoyed great success after their basketball careers were finished. Investment counselors on Wall Street, several law school students and numerous business leaders in Fortune 500 companies found their start in Kennedy's basketball programs. "A lot of coaches may pay lip service to academics and its importance," Kennedy said, "but our staff does something about it. If a guy wants to play basketball for us, he better also want to go to class and get a degree, because that's what he should be here for. We tell our recruits that from day one."

Recruiting talented student-athletes is one of his specialties. Kennedy's first class at Florida State was ranked among the five best in the country. His last two rank among the best-ever in school history. Each of his Florida State recruiting classes have been among the



wo keys to Kennedy's success have been his press relations and outstanding recruiting.
Always known as a good interview, Kennedy's relaxed style has allowed him to function well in the public eye.
When it comes to recruiting, the Seminole coach has not only attracted the cream of the crop to Florida State, but developed a reputation for being able to take unrecognized talem and make it shine. Two of the better known cases are those of Bob Sura last year and George McCloud in 1987. Both players ended up in the NBA.

impressed with wins over some of the nation's top programs and high graduation rates. Coach Kennedy's commitment to a well-rounded program and his desire to develop our players emotionally, academically and athletically," said then-FSU president, Dr. Bernard F. Sliger.

The confidence the selection committee displayed in Kennedy comes from its belief it hired not only an outstanding coach, but a man who understands education should come first to the student-athlete.

Top 25 in the nation. His lona groups were on the list of Top 15 classes in the East for five straight years.

Off the court, and away from the recruiting trails, Kennedy is a man who has both a keen sense of public relations, a deep belief in becoming part of his community and a strong believer in the family. In addition to his youth camps, Kennedy serves as the state's honorary chairman for the Special Olympics, a cause he and his wife Jeannie have championed for many years. In 1984,

he was named Special Olympics' Man of the Year. Pat and Jeannie are the proud parents of a son, Joey (12), and two daughters, Kimberly (8) and Kathryn (4).

Kennedy also possesses a strong background in administration, serving five years in the dual role of head basketball coach and associate athletic director at Iona. He was president of the MAAC Coaches' Association and was a member of the NCAA Tournament Selection Committee for the Eastern Region. At present he is the Executive Director of the Pat Kennedy Day Camps, one of the largest of its type in the nation, and a consultant to the Nike Corporation.

The Pat Kennedy Era

Before Pat Kennedy arrived at Florida State, the school received just four invites to the NCAA Tournament. Under Kennedy, the Seminoles have become regulars to the big dance, with five dates in nine years.

avid Zimroth has played a large role in Florida State's return to national prominence. Zimroth, widely recognized as one of the top recruiters in the nation, has consistently lured some of the nation's most talented high school seniors to Florida State.

Assistant Coach, Florida State '78

hen Pat Kennedy came to Florida State he knew he needed someone to direct recruiting that could bring in the caliber of player to take the Seminoles to the next level. Charged with maintaining the lifeblood of the Florida State basketball program is assistant coach David Zimroth. Entering his 10th season at FSU, Zimroth has been with Pat Kennedy since he took over in 1986. He is widely credited with helping to rebuild the Seminole program and for putting Tallahassee on the college basketball map.

Recognized as one of college basketball's top recruiters Zimroth criss-crosses the country in pursuit of the nation's best talent. His efforts have not gone unnoticed as in 1993 he was named one of the top recruiters in the country by Sports Illustrated. A tireless worker, eight of his nine recruiting classes have been ranked among the nation's Top 20.

In addition, "Coach Z," as he is affectionately called, is an integral part of the FSU "brain-trust." His coaching duties have included working with the Seminole guards after spending many years helping fellow assistant Tom Carlson develop post players. Zimroth is also responsible for charting opponents' offensive and defensive schemes and tendencies during games.

Over the last two years Zimroth has helped ink three McDonald's All-Americans. In 1994, Zimroth landed Corey Louis returned back to Miami-Dade North for another two-year stint. During his four years at the JC level, Miami-Dade went 116-15. He developed three players who were chosen in the NBA draft.


In 1984, Zimroth was named head coach at Miami Beach High where he stayed for two years before accepting Pat Kennedy's invitation to join his staff in 1986.


Zimroth's coaching credentials also include working an impressive number of clinics conducted by

some of the top coaches in the collegiate game. He also served as a member of the Team Florida AAU coaching staff for three years.

Graduated in 1974 from North Miami Beach High, Zimroth scored over 1800 points during his high school career. He received a basketball scholarship to Miami-Dade North Community College where he earned his Associate of Arts degree in 1976. Zimroth then transferred to FSU, graduating with a bachelor's in health education and minor in coaching in 1978. He has completed work toward a master's degree.

Zimroth, 39, is married to the former Mary Elizabeth Koch of Strongsville, Ohio.





and LaMarr Greer in what is widely considered the best class ever brought into Florida State. The addition of Randell Jackson to this year's class assured FSU of another outstanding Top 20 recruiting year.

Because of his efforts Florida State has been able to establish a stronghold on prep talent in the South signing two Florida Mr. Basketball honorees and a Georgia Player of the Year winner. The Miami, FL, native has established an extensive contact system within the region.

In 1988, Zimroth landed Florida's "Mr. Basketball," Doug Edwards, widely considered the state's top prospect of alltime. Zimroth again brought the state's Mr. Basketball to Florida State in 1993 by signing Jacksonville's James Collins. In 1989, he inked Georgia 3A Player of the Year Chuck Graham.

Zimroth is also responsible for bringing some of the nation's top junior college talent to Tallahassee. Sam Cassell honed his skills while playing his last two years at Florida State. He also signed Tony Dawson in 1987, widely considered the top Juco player in the country that year.

Having coached at every level in his home state, Zimroth's coaching career began by refurning to his alma mater, North Miami Beach High, after his graduation from Florida State. He stayed there for a year before moving on to Miami-Dade North Junior College. Two years later he left the junior college ranks to join Hugh Durham's staff at the University of Georgia. He

ntering his tenth season as a member of the Florida State basketball staff is assistant coach Tom Carlson. Long acknowledged as a talented bench tactician, the 46-year old Keansburg, NJ, native is responsible for the preparation and implementation of Florida State's game plans and scouting reports

Having been a part of Pat Kennedy's coaching staff since Kennedy's arrival at FSU in 1986, Carlson can often be found out on the recruiting trail. Prior to last season, it was added to his list of responsibilities. Carlson joined Kennedy's staff after establishing a

reputation as one of the state's top high school coaches.

Carlson's roots run deep in the capital city. From 1972-74, while still a student at Florida State, Carlson served as an assistant coach at Tallahassee's Rickards

He received his undergraduate degree in physical education from FSU in 1974 and enrolled in graduate school the following year. He served as a graduate assistant coach on Hugh Durham's 1974-75 FSU squad which finished the year with an 18-8 record. Carlson performed nearly every job in the department that season with responsibilities in scouting and conditioning as well as serving as head junior varsity coach and as a teacher in the University's physical education department.

With a master's in physical education, Carlson took over the reins at Maclay in 1976 and three years later led the team to the state high school basketball championship. For his efforts, he was recognized as the Coach of the Year by the Florida Athletic Coaches' Association. Carlson was the Big Bend (Tallahassee Area) Coach of the Year in 1979 and 1982 and he led
