


Review

Utah State visited Tallahassee in the second round and the Seminoles rolled to a 66-55 win to advance to the tournament's semifinals in Madison Square Garden in New York. Thompson scored 16 points and Baker added 14 in the win.

FSU's second round win also proved to be a landmark as it vaulted the Tribe back into the AP Top 25 for

AP Top 25 for the first time since the

since the 1993-94 season. The Seminoles were ranked 25th heading into its Preseason NIT semifinal showdown with No. 11

Connecticut before a national television audience on ESPN. Thompson led four Florida State players in double figures with 13 points and FSU was tough on defense, allowing UConn to hit just 31.3 percent (20-of-64) from the field in a 67-60 win that was the 50th of Robinson's coaching career.

The Tribe's semifinal win opened eyes nationally and also set up an intriguing match-up in the championship game. Florida State versus No. 2 Kansas. Robinson against his long-time boss and mentor, Roy Williams.

FSU showed no fear early on as they took control of the game in the opening 10 minutes and led by as many as 13 points in the first half. The Seminoles took a 28-20 halftime lead and held a 45-42 advantage with 10 minutes to go before Jayhawk All-Americans Paul Pierce and Raef LaFrentz took over. The twosome combined to score 20 points in the final 10 minutes (36 in the second half), after being held to just four in the first half, and Kansas was able to



pull away for a 73-58 win. Jackson led Florida State with 15 points and both he and Kerry Thompson earned All-Tournament honors.

The loss did not damage FSU's psyche though, as after bringing the runner-up trophy back to Tallahassee, the Seminoles responded by winning four straight games.

The Tribe opened the streak with a 90-52 thrashing of Florida Atlantic. Baker scored 20 points in 21 minutes and Karim Shabazz posted the first double-double of his career with 13 points and 11 rebounds.

A date with Jacksonville and former Seminole player and head coach Hugh Durham – now the Dolphins' head coach – was next. Florida State's defense was dominating, setting a pair of school records. FSU scored 35 of the game's first 41 points and held JU to 10 points and three field goals in the first half, both Seminole school records. In all, Florida State held Jacksonville to 27.9 percent shooting (17-of-61), forced 19 turnovers and had 11 players score in the 74-44 win.

One of the most dramatic games of the season was next as the Seminoles took on state rival Florida in the Milk Challenge in Orlando. No. 16 FSU won its third straight against the Gators when Jackson hit a layup with threetenths of a second left, giving the Tribe an 83-81 win. Baker continued his fine early season play with 18 points and Greer nearly posted a triple-double, finishing with 10 points, 11 rebounds and eight assists.

FSU tuned up for its conference opener against North Carolina by holding UNC Asheville to 29.0 percent shooting (20-of-69) and forcing 22

turnovers in a 77-60 win. Baker led the Tribe with 18 points and eight rebounds.

One of the toughest two-game stretches in Seminole history came next. The top-ranked Tar Heels visited the Leon County Civic Center on Dec. 20 in the ACC opener for both teams, then defending national champion and fifth-ranked Arizona came to town three days later.

Against UNC, 10.027 Seminole fans packed the Civic Center as their team went to-to-toe with the Tar Heels. FSU trailed 44-38 at intermission and rallied several times in the second half but North Carolina answered each time to turn back the Tribe 81-73. Florida State got to within 66-65 with 6:30 to go and 75-73 with 1:28 left, but could not get over the hump. Greer led the Seminoles with 17 points.

SU had little time to regroup as Arizona came calling on Dec. 23. The defending national champions, led by Mike Bibby's 22 first half points, took a 46-41 lead at intermission. But one of Robinson's adjustments at halftime – having Baker defend

Bibby – turned the game around. Baker held Bibby to just four points in the final 20 minutes while scoring 18 for the game. Greer capped a career night by burying a pair of three-pointers in the final two minutes to give the 17th-ranked Seminoles an 84-79 win. Greer finished with 26 points on 11-of-13 field goal shooting and earned ACC Player of the Week honors for his performance.

A two-game road trip to close out the 1997 portion of the schedule came next. Baker (23 points, 11 rebounds) and Louis (13 points, 10 rebounds) both posted double-doubles as FSU beat Southwestern Louisiana 80-71. Louis then dominated DePaul and former Florida State head coach Pat Kennedy with 16 points, 12 rebounds and five blocked shots in a 66-55 Seminole win.

Entering the new year, the Seminoles were 11-2 and ranked 15th nationally. It was the first time in program history that FSU had won at least 10 games before the new year.

Florida State's first game of 1998 was a conference match-up at NC State. Baker led the Tribe with 22 points as FSU won its first league game of the season 68-55

With a 12-2 record and now ranked 13th, its highest ranking since late in the 1992-93 season, the Seminoles faced a difficult three-game stretch with games at Maryland and Clemson sandwiched around a home date with Duke.

At Maryland, Florida State was on the verge of a big win but fell apart early in the second half. The Seminoles led 41-33 at halftime, scored the first four points of the second half to open up a 12-point lead and had the Cole Field House crowd out of the game. But the Terrapins went on a 26-6 run to take control of the game and win 81-74.

FSU's next assignment was not an easy one either – No. 2 Duke. When the Blue Devils came to town, the Seminole faithful got behind their team. A sellout crowd of 12,231 packed the Civic Center and provided an outstanding atmosphere for college basketball.

Duke jumped out to a 10-point advantage at halftime and led by as many as 12 early in the second half before Florida State made a run. The Tribe got to within 61-58 with just under five minutes to play, but the Blue Devils closed the game with a 14-5 run to win 75-63.

At Clemson, the Seminoles losing streak reached three with its worst performance to that point in the season. FSU committed 24 turnovers and allowed the Tigers to shoot 51.8 percent (29-of-56) in an 86-65 loss.

With a 12-5 record, but just a 1-4 mark in ACC play, the Seminoles were in a must-win situation when they ventured out on to the road again at Georgia Tech. This time the road was kind as Florida State got 22 points and seven rebounds from Jackson in a 70-67 win over the Yellow Jackets.

FSU made it back-to-back victories with one of its most impressive wins of the season, an 83-59 rout of Wake Forest at home. Ten Seminoles scored, led by Jackson's 19 points and eight rebounds. The 24-point margin of victory was Florida State's fourth largest in an ACC game since joining the league for the 1991-92 season.

As good as the Tribe looked in beating Wake Forest, nobody would have expected the outcome of FSU's rematch at North Carolina two nights later. The Seminoles were never in the game and lost 103-55, the second largest margin of defeat in school history.

Florida State showed some resilience as the second half of the ACC schedule opened at home against NC State. The Tribe gave a workman-like performance in a 64-52 win over the Wolfpack to raise its mark to 15-6, 4-5 in the ACC.

FSU went outside the ACC for the last time during the regular season next at South Florida. The 23rd ranked Seminoles trailed most of the way and were upset 70-68 when Oliver Simmons' short follow from the lane was no good at the buzzer.

Florida State's win one, lose one, theme continued at Virginia when the Tribe looked good again in a 71-63 win to open February. Baker led FSU with 17 points and Corey Louis posted a double-double (11 points, 11 rebounds) and broke the 1,000-point barrier for his career.


But the rest of February was not as kind. With a 16-7 record overall, the Seminoles needed just a couple of more wins to lock up an NCAA Tournament berth. But what happened next was unimaginable – Florida State lost the next five games.

The skid started at home against No. 23 Maryland. FSU led most of the way until a late Terrapin rally handed the Tribe a 68-62 setback.

Florida State traveled to Cameron Indoor Stadium and played secondranked Duke. The Seminoles' sevenyear winless streak in Durham continued in an 86-72 loss.

lorida State faced a mustwin situation at home against Clemson next but would be without its top two scorers. Baker returned home to New Jersey to be with his sick mother while Jackson sat out the contest with a strained lower abdominal muscle. Without those

two, the Seminoles lack of offensive punch was evident. Clemson held FSU without a field goal for more than 14 minutes to open the game and limited them to just two in the first half on the way to a 78-49 win. It was the Tribe's worst home loss in school history.

Baker and Jackson both came off the bench in Florida State's next game but it did not help. Matt Harpring scored a career-high 31 points to lead Georgia Tech past FSU 72-59.

With the losing streak at four games, the Seminoles tried to stop the bleeding at Wake Forest. Florida State made more field goals than the Demon Deacons (25-23), outshot Wake (48.1-44.2) and beat them on the boards (32-28). But Wake Forest countered with 10 three-pointers in beating the Tribe 69-68. FSU had two chances to win the

and 11 rebounds while Baker led the Seminoles with 18 points.

Florida State. now 16-12 and 5-10, closed out its regular season at home on Senior Day against Virginia. Juniors Jackson and Baker led the Seminoles with 17 and 15 points respectively in an 88-63 rout of the Cavaliers. The 25point margin was the third largest

ACC victory in FSU history.

Finishing the regular season at 17-12 and 6-10 in the ACC gave the Seminoles a tie for sixth place in the league and the seventh seed in the first round of the ACC Tournament in Greensboro, NC. Florida State would play eighth-seeded NC State, a team the Tribe swept during the regular season.

FSU looked like it was on the way to a much needed win to enhance its NCAA Tournament hopes. The Seminoles opened the second half with a 16-3 run to take a 41-33 lead with 10 minutes to go, but the Wolfpack responded with 18 straight points to go up 51-41. FSU chipped away and got to within 65-63 with six seconds to go, but Thompson had his layup attempt blocked at the buzzer and the Seminoles were eliminated.

The NCAA Tournament selection show and the ensuing celebration followed. Florida State was back in the NCAA Tournament after a four-year absence and would face fifth-seed Texas Christian in the Midwest Regional first round in Oklahoma City, OK. TCU came into the game as the nation's highest scoring team but the Seminoles would beat the Horned Frogs at their own game. Proving they belonged in the tournament, FSU played one of its best games of the season in a 96-87 win. Several players starred in the win. Louis had 20 points and 13 rebounds while Jackson added 20 points. Greer, who joined the program's 1,000-point club, and Thompson added 17 points each while

Hale came off the bench to score 15.

In the second round, the Seminoles met up with Cinderella Valparaiso. Florida State led 75-72 with under a minute to play in regulation but could not finish off the Crusaders. Valpo tied the game but the

Seminoles had a chance to win on their final possession. After a timeout, FSU could not get a shot off and the contest went to overtime.


In the extra session, Florida State's offense went cold and the Seminoles did not make a field goal. The end result was an 83-77 loss and a tough end to a satisfying season.

Robinson's first year in Tallahassee had Seminole fans excited about the hoops program and the NCAA Tournament bid was a great reward for Florida State's senior class -Greer, Louis, Thompson and walk-on Kyle Mulligan.

Louis finished his career ranked 23rd on Florida State's all-time scoring list, ninth in rebounding and second in blocked shots. Greer finished tied for sixth on FSU's all-time games played list and in the top 10 in four other categories (three-point field goals, threepoint attempts, assists and steals). In his two seasons as a Seminole after transferring in from Tallahassee Community College, Thompson finished 10th in career assists and 11th in steals.

Baker proved to be a tough performer and Hale and Shabazz also flashed enormous potential.

The 1997-98 season finished the way it started - in great fashion - and Florida State fans and the city of Tallahassee were talking basketball again. The Seminoles' postseason run gave notice to the nation that the best is yet to come for FSU and basketball truly is back.

Terrell Baker led a balanced attack with 12 points as Florida State opened the Steve Robinson era with a 65-53 road win at Rice. Baker, a junior college transfer, was FSU's only double figure scorer but five other Seminoles scored at least eight points. Florida State held the Owls to 36.5 percent shooting from the floor and forced 20 turnovers. The Seminoles took the lead for good on a basket by freshman center Karim Shabazz with 6:30 to go in the first half and led by as many as 16 points in the second half. Seniors LaMarr Greer, Corey Louis and Kery Thompson each scored nine points while Shabazz and sophomore Ron Hale had eight apiece. The win came in the earliest game in FSU basketball history.


Kerry Thompson scored 16 points and Terrell Baker added 14 as Florida State downed Utah State 66-55 in the second round the Chase Preseason NIT. The win gave FSU a berth in the tournament's Final Four in New York's Madison Square Garden and sent Seminole head coach Steve Robinson there for the second straight season. He guided Tulsa to a third place finish in the tournament during the 1996-97 season. Thompson scored nine first quarter points as Florida State opened a 16-point lead during the period but the Aggies cut the lead to five at halftime after holding FSU to six second quarter points. The Seminoles hit 54.4 percent from the floor while limiting Utah State to 40.4 percent shooting. Baker led FSU in rebounding with eight and had four steals.



The game marked the home debut of FSU first year coach Steve Robinson and was the Seminoles 30th consecutive home season-opening win. Three other Florida State players finished in double figures. Ron Hale came off the bench to score 15 while Terrell Baker added 15 and Kerry Thompson had 10. The Seminoles limited the Greyhounds to 37.5 percent shooting from the floor and forced 21 turnovers. FSU shot 50.8 percent from the field.

Kerry Thompson scored 13 points to lead four Seminoles in double figures and Florida State used a suffocating defense to down No. 11 Connecticut 67-60 in the semifinals of the Chase Preseason NIT. FSU fell behind 5-0 in the opening minutes but used a 22-4 run to open a 13-point lead early in the second quarter and was in control throughout. The Seminoles forced the Huskies into 31.3 percent shooting (20-of-64). Terrell Baker, Randell Jackson and Karim Shabazz all added 10 points for FSU. The win was the 50th in Florida State head coach Steve Robinson's career.

The Seminoles hit just 42.9 percent from the field (24-of-56) but held the Blue Demons to 34.9 percent from the floor (22-of-63). The game was a reunion of sorts as DePaul head coach Pat Kennedy guided the Seminoles for 11 seasons from 1986-97.

Obinna Ekezie scored 18 points and grabbed 11 rebounds as Maryland rallied from a 12-point deficit early in the second half to knock off 13th-ranked Florida State 81-74 in Cole Field House. FSU limited the Terrapins to 36.4 percent shooting from the field (24-of-66) but committed 21 turnovers and were outrebounded 49-37. Maryland also hit 32-of-42 from the free throw line while Florida State connected on just 9-of-17. FSU used a 17-7 run to close the first half with a 41-33 lead. The Seminoles scored the first four points of the second half to take a 45-33 lead with 19 minutes remaining but Maryland answered by outscoring Florida State 26-6 over the next 12 minutes to take control of the game. Terrell Baker led FSU with 17 points. LaMarr Greer added 15 and Kerry Thompson scored 11.

Roshown McLeod scored a career-high 25 points to lead second-ranked Duke to a 75-63 victory over No. 13 Florida State before a sellout crowd of 12.231, the 12th largest in FSU basketball history. The Blue Devils led by 10 points at intermission (41-31) after shooting 59.4 percent (19-0f-32) in the first half and survived a cold shooting final 20 minutes (9-0f-32, 28.1 percent) to hand the Seminoles' their second consecutive loss. Florida State opened the second half with a 14-5 run and pulled to within 61-58 with 4:28 remaining on a jump hook by Corey Louis. But Duke put the game away by outscoring FSU 14-5 to close the contest. Randell Jackson led the Seminoles, who shot just 40.7 percent (24-0f-59), with 18 points and LaMarr Greer added 14 and nine rebounds. Louis finished with nine points and 10 rebounds.



The Seminoles hit 54.7 percent (29-of-33) from the field and outrebounded the Demon Deacons 40-31, FSU led by eight points (46-38) with 14:30 remaining but Jackson, Baker and Corey Louis, who finished with 14 points, keyed a 23-6 Seminole run to put the game out of reach. Jackson scored 10 points in the spurt while Baker and Louis had five apiece. The 24-point margin of victory was Florida State's third largest in an ACC game since entering the league in 1991-92.

No. 2 North Carolina got 24 points from Antawn Jamison and 22 from Shammond Williams in a 103-55 dismantling of No. 20 Florida State. The Tar Heels shot 60.6 percent from the floor (40-of-66), including a blistering 77.4 percent (24-of-31) in the first half while opening a 58-28 lead at intermission. Corey Louis led FSU with 14 points. The loss was the second worst in Seminole history and was the seventh largest margin of defeat in an ACC game.



The loss was Florida State's worst at home in school history and marked the fewest points the Seminoles have scored in the Leon County Civic Center since moving into the facility for the 1981-82 season. The Tigers jumped to leads of 10-1, 21-7 and 34-14 on the way to a 42-17 halftime advantage. FSU missed its first 16 shots from the floor, hit 2-of-20 in the first half and 11-of-41 for the game. The two first half field goals set a school record for fewest in a half and the 11 tied the mark for fewest in a game. Karim Shabazz scored 10 points and grabbed eight rebounds to lead Florida State, who played without its top two scorers. Terrell Baker returned home to New Jersey to be with his sick mother while Randell Jackson sat out with a strained lower abdominal muscle.

Harpring responded by nailing back-to-back three-pointers and Dion Glover had a dunk in an 8-0 run as the Yellow Jackets regained control at 40-33. Florida State closed to within 57-54 on a three-pointer by LaMarr Greer at the 3:51 mark but missed an opportunity to tie the game on its next possession. Greer led FSU with 15 points, but the Seminoles hit just 30.0 percent from the field (21-of-70), including just 5-of-25 (20.0 percent) from three-point range.

Robert O'Kelley scored 26 points and hit five three-pointers and Wake Forest survived two last second shots by Florida State as the Demon Deacons edged the Seminoles 69-68. LaMarr Greer missed a chance to win the game for FSU when his 10-foot baseline jumper was short. Corey Louis followed with a tip attempt that fell off the rim as time expired. The game was tied at 63 when Tony Rutland and O'Kelley buried back-to-back three-pointers with 2:06 to play. Terrell Baker, who led Florida State with 18 points, cut the margin to 69-65 on a fall away jumper at the 1:43 mark. Then, after forcing an O'Kelley turnover, Baker drew the Seminoles within 69-68 with a three-pointer with 1:06 to play. Florida State made more field goals than Wake (25-23), outshot the Deacons (48.1-44.2) and controlled the boards (32-28), but Wake Forest countered with 10 three-pointers. Louis had his fifth double-double of the season with 16 points and 11 rebounds for FSU.


Terrell Baker scored 18 points, but FSU's comeback fell just short in a 69-68 loss to Wake Forest.

Junior Randell Jackson scored 17 points and classmate Terrell Baker added 15 as Florida State celebrated Senior Day with an 88-63 whipping of Virginia in its regular season finale. The Seminoles never trailed in snapping a five-game losing streak. LaMarr Greer buried back-to-back three-pointers and scored eight points during a 25-9 run midway through the second half as FSU pulled away. Florida State shot 52.5 percent from the field (32-of-61), 94.1 percent from the line (16-of-17) and hit a season-high eight three-pointers while committing a season-low nine turnovers. The Seminoles also limited the Cavaliers to 37.7 percent shooting (23-of-61) and forced 15 turnovers. Seniors Greer, Corey Louis, Kyle Mulligan and Kerry Thompson played the final home game in their Seminole careers. Louis and Thompson led the seniors with 13 points apiece while Greer added 10.



The Seminoles trailed by 10 points (51-41) with 6:30 left but closed to within 64-63 on a LaMarr Greer three-pointer with nine seconds to go. After NC State's Kenny Inge hit a free throw with six seconds remaining, Thompson raced the length of the court but had his layup attempt swatted away by Wells as time expired. FSU was down 30-25 at halftime but opened the second half with a 16-3 run to take a 41-33 lead. But the Wolfpack scored the game's next 18 points - nine by C.C. Harrison and seven by Benjamin - to take control. Florida State outshot NC State 42.1-37.8 and outrebounded the 'Pack 37-32 but committed 17 turnovers and was outscored 28-10 at the free throw line. The loss was FSU's seventh straight at the ACC Tournament.


TEXAS CHRISTIAN TOTAL CLASS CHRISTIAN CHRIST

Corey Louis and Randell Jackson each scored 20 points to lead Florida State to a 96-87 NCAA Tournament Midwest Regional first round victory over Texas Christian. FSU beat the Horned Frogs at their own game as they posted a season-high in points and held the nation's top scoring team 10 points below their average. The Seminoles led by as many as four points in the first half but TCU outscored the Tribe 23-14 to take its largest lead at 44-39. FSU responded with a 7-2 run to close the half as Ron Hale scored four points and the game was tied at 46 at intermission. Florida State was in control most of the way in the second half and trailed just once in the final 20 minutes (50-49 at the 17:18 mark). Jackson scored 16 points in the second half. Louis posted his sixth double-double of the season, adding 13 rebounds, and the Seminoles used a balanced scoring attack with five players hitting for at least 15 points (LaMarr Greer 17, Kerry Thompson 17 and Hale 15). FSU shot 53.8 percent (35-of-65) from the floor, limited TCU to 44.1 percent shooting (30-of-68) and outrebounded the Horned Frogs 44-34. The win was Florida State's fourth straight in the first round of the NCAA Tournament.

Florida State led 75-72 after Kerry Thompson hit a jumper from the lane with 52 seconds remaining. Zoran Viskovic cut the margin to one at 75-74 with a pair of free throws then, after Thompson missed the front end of a one-and-one, Bill Jenkins hit one of two free throws to tie the game with 30 seconds to play. 1997-98 Florida State Basketball Accolades

- The Seminoles returned to the NCAA Tournament for the first time in five years (1992-93), upset fifth-seeded Texas Christian in the first round and advanced to the round of 32 for the fourth time in the 90's.
- Florida State was ranked amond the Associated Press Top 25 for eight consecutive weeks during the season, which tied for the fifth longest run in school history. It marked FSU's first appearance in the rankings since the 1993-94 season.
- FSU was ranked as high as 13th in the Associated Press and ESPN/USA Today Coaches Polls. It marked the highest the Seminoles were ranked during the regular season since peaking at No. 6 in the AP Poll on Feb. 22, 1993.
- The Seminoles played 10 games on national television seven on ESPN and three on CBS. Florida State played 27 games that were televised.
- FSU Head Coach Steve Robinson became the first, first-year coach in Seminole history to lead his team to the NCAA Tournament. Robinson also made his third NCAA Tournament appearance in three years as a head coach. His three-year run marks the ninth longest stretch of consecutive tournament appearances by an active head coach.
- According to the Ratings Percentage Index (RPI), Florida State played the nation's sixth toughest schedule. FSU's schedule was the country's second toughest according to the Sagarin Computer. The Seminoles played 14 games against teams that appeared in the NCAA Tournament and 22 versus teams that played in the postseason.

- The Seminoles were the only team in the country to play all four
 of the NCAA Tournament's No. 1 seeds (North Carolina, Duke, Kansas
 and Ariziona). They were one of just three teams to defeat a No. 1 (Arizona)
 and No. 2 seeded team (Connecticut).
- The Leon County Civic Center sold out for FSU basketball on Jan. 10 when 12,231 atteneded the Duke game. It was the first sellout prior to gameday in Seminole basketball history.
- Florida State's 17 regular season wins were its most since winning 22 in 1992-93.
- The Seminoles' 84-79 win over defending national champion and No. 5 Arizona on Dec. 23 equaled the highest ranked team ever defeated by FSU at home. It also marked Florida State's first Top 10 non-conference win since beating eighth-ranked Alabama on Dec. 6, 1986.
- FSU limited its opponents to 40.7 perent field goal shooting during the season, the third lowest figure in school history.
- Florida State set two school records in the first half of its 74-44 win over Jacksonville on Dec. 6. JU scored just 10 points and was held to three field goals.

The Atlantic Coast Conference: A Tradition of Excellence

THE TRADITION

Consistency. It's the mark of true excellence in any endeavor. However, in today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency.

Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds. Now in its 46th year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation. And that is not mere conjecture, the numbers support it.

Since the league's inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured 62 NCAA and AIAW championships, including 27 in men's competition and 35 in women's. In addition, 100 men and 24 women have earned the coveted title of NCAA champion.

If success is best measured in terms of wins and losses, then the ACC is unrivaled in NCAA history. ACC teams have captured seven NCAA basketball championships, including three straight between 1991 and 1993.

No conference has posted a better NCAA tournament record than the ACC sine the NCAA's inaugural tournament in 1938. The nine current conference members have posted an NCAA Tournament-best mark of 261-140 for a .651 winning percentage.

In the decade of the 90's, the ACC success story is even more impressive as league teams have compiled a 98-45 (.685) NCAA mark, including 27 "Sweet 16" appearances.

North Carolina, the nation's second winningest team with 1,709 wins, captured NCAA championships in 1957, 1982, and 1993. N.C. State walked away with the coveted crown in 1974 and 1983, while Duke won back-to-back titles in 1991 and 1992.

Over the years, ACC basketball teams have gained global recognition through their NCAA Tournament and national television exposure. Every conference game in 1998-99 will be on television, a first for the league, as well as the conference's four-day, eight game ACC Tournament. ACC teams will have more than 150 television appearances during the course of the 1998-99 regular season.

The ACC also stands at the forefront of intercollegiate athletics in terms of academic accomplishments of its' student athletes. Twelve times over the past 18 years, an ACC member school has claimed the CFA Academic Achievement Award which is awarded to a CFA member institution with the highest graduation rate among members of its football team. This past year, Duke captured the award for the ninth time with a perfect 100% graduation rate.

1997-98 IN REVIEW

The 1997-98 academic year concluded with the league pocketing three more national team titles and six individual NCAA crowns. In all, the ACC has won 29 national team titles in the last seven years.

The ACC's 1997-98 national champions were North Carolina in women's soccer and field hockey and Maryland in women's lacrosse. Overall, the ACC posted a 77-58 (.570) mark in NCAA tournament play.

The ACC placed at least one team in the Top 10 nationally in 16 of the 24 sports sponsored by the league. Other records of note during the 1997-98 season include 85 teams competing at NCAA Championships, four bowl teams, and 19 Top 10 showings.

Eight ACC teams, in six different sports, representing five of the nine member institutions, earned a No. 1 ranking during the course of the past academic year.

The ACC Academic Honor Roll record was broken for the 12thstraight year in 1996-97 as 1,410 student-athletes were recognized for their work in the classroom.


THE CHAMPIONSHIPS

The ACC conducted championship competition in 24 sports during the 1997-98 academic year – 12 for men and 12 for women.


The first ACC championship was held in swimming on February 25, 1954. The conference did not conduct championships in cross country, wrestling or tennis during the first year.

The 12 sports for men include football, cross country, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, wrestling, baseball, tennis, golf, and lacrosse. Fencing, which was started in 1971, was discontinued in 1981.

Women's sports were initiated in 1977 with the first championship meet being held in tennis at Wake Forest University, October 6-8, Conference championships are currently conducted in cross country, volleyball, field hockey, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, tennis, golf, lacrosse, and softball.

A HISTORY

The Atlantic Coast Conference was founded on May 8, 1953, at the Sedgefield Inn near Greensboro, N.C., with seven charter members – Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, North Carolina State, South Carolina, and Wake Forest – drawing up the conference by-laws.

The withdrawal of seven schools from the Southern Conference came early on the morning of May 8, 1953, during the Southern Conference's annual spring meeting. On June 14, 1953, the seven members met in Raleigh. N.C., where a set of bylaws was adopted and the name became officially the Atlantic Coast Conference.

On December 4, 1953, conference officials met again at Sedgefield and officially admitted the University of Virginia. The first, and only, withdrawal of a school from the ACC came on June 30, 1971, when the University of South Carolina tendered its resignation.

The conference operated with seven members until April 3, 1978, when Georgia Tech was admitted. The Atlanta school withdrew from the Southeastern Conference in January of 1964.

The ACC expanded to nine members on July 1, 1991, with the addition of Florida State.

N.C. State – Charter member of the Southern Conference in 1921, charter member of the ACC in 1953.

Virginia – Charter member of the SIAA in 1894, charter member of the Southern Conference in 1921, resigned from the SC in December 1936, joined the ACC in December, 1953.

Wake Forest – Joined the Southern Conference in February, 1936, charter member of the ACC in 1953.


