# Review

harging head-on into a schedule rated the second toughest in the nation last season, Florida State looked to make a mark in the toughest college basketball conference in the country - Atlantic Coast Conference - with one of the program's youngest teams in recent memory.


Hard work, patience and perseverance became catch phrases for Florida State head coach Steve Robinson.

"I learned a great deal about patience this year,"
Robinson said in the moments after the Seminoles ended
their season with a loss to No. 5 Maryland at the ACC
Tournament. "We had a lot of things to fight through
during the course of the season. I am proud of our guys
for the fight they showed. No doubt, this was the hardest
working team in the history of Florida State basketball."

Robinson's second season as the Seminoles' head coach ended in a 13-17 record but could have easily finished the same way his first year did - in the NCAA Tournament.

Florida State fired out to a 5-2 record in its first seven ACC games and were in third place in the league behind top-ranked Duke and fifth-ranked Maryland at the midway point before going winless in the second half of the conference schedule. The Seminoles dropped three heart-breakers in its second go-around in the league that could very easily meant an 8-8 ACC record and an appearance in the postseason.

"I really think we headed in the right direction last season," Robinson said. "We may have taken more of a step in the right direction last year than we did in my first season because I was able to get across to our guys the need to compete and fight when things are not going your way." obinson's attempt at pushing the program in the right direction took three big hits before the season was five games old. First, Randell Jackson, a 6-11 forward who would have been a senior on the 1998-99 Seminoles, decided to leave school early and enter the June NBA Draft.

Although he was not selected, Jackson made the Washington Wizards as a free agent

Then, heralded recruit Damous Anderson, a junior college transfer from Metro Atlanta College, was not admitted to school for the fall semester. He would eventually enroll at the end of the fall and join the team midway through December.

Finally, after just five games, starting center Karim Shabazz, at 7-2 the tallest player in the history of the FSU program, left school to be closer to home.

"I didn't expect the loss of Randell," said Robinson, " and then we lost Karim. We had time to build around Randell not being back but a lot of that was spent on building around Karim."

What Robinson did have to work with were some solid perimeter back, the only starter off of

the bench in the postseason and was expected to take a bigger role. Robinson could also count on newcomers Delvon Arrington and Adrian Crawford in the backcourt. A sophomore, Arrington sat out his first season in Tallahassee while Crawford, also a sophomore, was eligible after transferring from Tulsa.

The Seminoles opened their season on November 13 by pounding Sam Houston State 88-51 in the earliest opener is school history. FSU scored the first 16 points of the game and never looked back. Hale led the Tribe with 19 points while Baker added 16.

A home showdown with Florida was next before a sellout crowd in the Civic Center. Florida State trailed by 20 points early before fighting back into the game and cutting the deficit to five midway through the second half. The Seminoles eventually fell 82-66 despite 15 points and nine rebounds from Oliver Simmons.

FSU got back into the win column in its final tuneup before opening ACC play, downing Idaho 70-57 as Baker scored 17 points.

Florida State began to show its perseverance and fight in its leagueopener at Virginia. The Seminoles trailed by 14 points with less than eight minutes to play but Adrian Crawford and Ron Hale keyed a late surge as FSU won 72-69.

A tough two-game non-conference stretch was next. Florida State hosted one of the nation's surprise teams in Auburn before going to preseason top 10 ranked Temple.

Against the Tigers, the Seminoles were down by 22 (60-38) with 14 minutes to go. Baker sparked a 26-10 run to close the gap to 70-64 with 2:15 to go, but FSU missed three straight free throws that could have gotten the deficit down to three. Baker hit six three-pointers and scored 24 points in an 80-68 loss.

Shabazz left the team the week after the game and the Seminoles seemed shorthanded with a trip to Temple upcoming, Again, Florida State showed the determination and fight that Robinson was seeking. FSU led for much of the first half before the Owls closed with a 33-27 lead at intermission. Temple led 60-47 with less than

five minutes to play but the Seminoles fought back to within four (69-65) with less than a minute to play. Crawford hit seven three-pointers and scored 25 points but Florida State fell 75-66.

The Seminoles headed East on 1-10 for a game at Jacksonville next. Baker had 17 points, seven rebounds and six steals to spark a 72-53 win over the Dolphins and former FSU player and head coach Hugh Durham, now the head coach at JU.

Anderson's arrival and Hale's first career double-double were the highlights of Florida State's 80-43 win over Georgia Southern. Hale had 24 points and 10 rebounds while Anderson had four points and six rebounds in 18 minutes.

A 10-day round trip followed as the Seminoles played at Butler then went directly to Honolulu for the Rainbow Classic.

FSU was flat at Butler and ended up falling 77-65. Hale was the lone bright spot with 20 points and 11 rebounds

Florida State left Indianapolis at 6:00 a.m. on Christmas eve and, 16 hours later, landed in Hawaii. The team spent Christmas Day in Honolulu and enjoyed sightseeing around the island prior to taking on Princeton in the first round of the tournament.


An ESPN national television audience witnessed the contest as the two teams locked in a low-scoring, defensive battle. The Seminoles trailed by 11 at halftime but began to take control in the second half. FSU took a 46-45 lead with just under six minutes to play but were held scoreless the rest of the way and fell 50-46.


The loss to the Tigers dropped Florida State into the consolation bracket of the event. Thirteen hours after their opener, the Seminoles were back on the floor against Mississippi State.

Hale and Baker sparked FSU to its most complete win of the season to that point in a 69-58 decision. Hale had 19 points while Baker added 16.

The win put the Seminoles into the consolation championship game against Murray State. Baker was the game's dominant player, scoring 29 points, and grabbing nine rebounds as FSU won in overtime 80-76 to claim fifth place.

Senior Terrell Baker capped his career at FSU by scoring 28 points in an ACC tournament win over Clemson

game for a 72-54 win.

The Seminoles best stretch of the season came on the heels of the loss to UNC. Florida State would win four of

its next five, all ACC games, with its lone loss coming at top-ranked Duke.

The streak started with a 75-56 win at Georgia Tech. The victory was sparked by Hale's 24 points and Anderson's 15-point, seven-rebound effort. Arrington quarterbacked the FSU attack with 13 assists, the fourth highest figure in school history. It was the most lopsided road win in the ACC for Florida State and marked the first time in school history that the Seminoles won their first two league road games.

Hale enjoyed the best game of his career in Florida State's next outing, a 70-64 win over No. 25 Clemson, Hale

poured in a career-high 31 points on 10-of-14 shooting while Baker added 20 points and six boards. It would be the Seminoles' only win over a ranked team in 1998-99.

Florida State's date with the No. 1 Blue Devils in Cameron Indoor Stadium was up next. FSU hung tough for the first 18 minutes but a 29-8 run at the close of the first half and start of the second gave Duke a commanding 67-38 lead on the way to a 98-73 win. Anderson showed that he was one of the league's best newcomers with a 23point, nine-rebound game.

The Seminoles came back home for wins over Wake Forest and NC State to push their league mark to 5-2. Hale had 21 points and seven rebounds in the 74-68 win over the Demon Deacons and posted his third career doubledouble with 25 points and 10 caroms against the Wolfpack. Anderson added 19 points as FSU downed NC State 71-59.

Florida State entered its next game at fifth-ranked Maryland tied for second in the conference with the Terrapins behind Duke. Again, FSU hung tough for a half but the Terrapins used their size advantage to wear the Seminoles down in a 107-87 decision.

The start of the second half of the ACC schedule came with the Virginia game in Tallahassee. Florida State led 54-53 with less than five minutes to play but went cold from the field. The Cavaliers meanwhile hit seven second half-three-pointers and won 67-60.

FSU tried to shake off the tough loss with its final non-conference game of the season. Baker scored 21 points and Hale added 16 in a 77-66 win over South Florida at home.

At 5-4 in the ACC, Florida State headed into a stretch with two of its next three games on the road - at No. 12 North Carolina and at Clemson. The Seminoles were not up to the challenge in either of those games, losing 98-64 to the Tar Heels and 78-45 to the Tigers in their worst performances of the year.

Sandwiched between the two losses was one of the most exciting games the Leon County Civic Center has seen in recent memory. Georgia Tech jumped out to an early 20-point lead only to see FSU battle back. The Seminoles sent the game into overtime when Crawford hit a runner from the lane with 4.5 seconds to go to knot the game at 91. Five Seminoles eventually fouled out, including four starters, so it was up to the bench to come through. Sophomore reserve Ronald Thompson did just that in the first extra session. scoring all eight of his career-high points in the period as it ended tied at 103. The Yellow Jackets size finally wore down Florida State on the way to a 111-108 double overtime win. FSU almost forced a third overtime but a Thompson three-pointer was off the mark with 10 seconds to go. After a wild scramble, the ball ended up in the hands of Crawford, whose 30-footer

went in then rolled out at the buzzer. Baker had 26 points while Hale added 24.

The Seminoles' final two home games of the season were against No. 1 Duke and No. 5 Maryland. Duke again exerted its size to down Florida State 85-59. Maryland meanwhile fought off FSU 84-75.

Florida State's last two road games of the year were also memorable. At Wake Forest, the Tribe held a 57-38 lead with eight minutes to play but squandered it and lost 67-65. Arrington hit a 15-footer that would have forced overtime but officials ruled that the shot came after the buzzer.

In its road finale, Florida State played the regular season game in storied Reynolds Coliseum on the NC State campus. The Seminoles trailed by 12 at intermission and by 18 with 14:20 to play but rallied to whittle the deficit down to four. FSU could get no closer and was dealt a 71-64 defeat.

Florida State's ACC Tournament troubles became a memory as the Seminoles' opened up the tourney with an 87-85 overtime win over Clemson. marking the program's first conference tournament victory since 1992. In a game eerily similar to the double overtime loss to Georgia Tech just three weeks earlier, FSU found a way to win five players (four starters) fouled out. Baker scored 28, Crawford had 20 and Anderson added 18, but it was freshman forward Antwuan Dixon that was the difference-maker. He scored all five of his points in overtime and collected five rebounds in 10 minutes.


The Seminoles' season came to an end the next day with a 93-69 loss to fifth-ranked Maryland. Anderson led FSU with 14 points.

Despite its final record, Robinson was pleased with his team's effort.

"We had the chips stacked against us on many nights," Robinson said, "but we never gave up. We fought as long and as hard as we could,"

The development of Hale, who led Florida State and ranked among the AGC's leaders in four categories, was a bright spot. As was the play of Anderson, Arrington and Crawford.

"We learned a lot and fortunately most of those guys are back in 1999-2000 to show what they have learned."



## Sam Houston State



Florida State scored the first 16 points of the game and never looked back as it opened the 1998-99 season with a 88-51 win at home over Sam Houston State. The Seminoles held the Bearkats without a field goal for the first 7:20 and Icd 42-20 at halftime. Ron Hale led FSU with a career-high 19 points and six rebounds while Terrell Baker added 16 points and sophomore Delvon Arrington, playing in his first college game, added 14 points. The Seminoles hit 51.7 percent from the floor (31-of-60) and beat the Sam Houston 45-20 on the boards. The win was the FSU's ninth straight on opening night and came in the earliest game in program history.

Greg Stolt came off the bench to hit five three-pointers, all in the second half, as Florida held off an early second rally by Florida State and beat the Seminoles 82-66. The Gator's raced to a 36-16 lead only to watch 'FSU close the first half with a 16-4 run to cut the deficit to 40-32 at intermission. Florida State got to within five points at the 15-minute mark (46-41) but Stolt hit three straight three and LaDarius Halton added another - all within 1:50 - to key a 16-3 run that boosted Florida to a 62-44 lead. Oliver Simmons led the Seminoles with a career-high 15 points and nine rebounds. Adrian Crawford and Terrell Baker each scored 13 and Karim Shabazz posted a double-double with 11 points and 13 rebounds. FSU forced 26 Gator turnovers but hit just 25-of-75 from the field (33.3 percent), including only 4-of-24 from three-point range (16.7 percent).

# Idaho Vade

Terrell Baker came off the bench to score 17 points, pull down eight rebounds and had four steals to lead Florida State to a 70-57 win over Idaho at home. The Seminoles, who led by as many as 11 points in the first half and held a 31-25 lead at intermission, opened at 12-point lead (39-27) in the early moments of the second half. But Gordon Scott scored five points and former FSU guard Avery Curry buried a three-pointer to cap a 14-1 run that gave the Vandals a 41-40 lead with 13 minutes to play. Baker responded with a three-pointer on Florida State's next possession and seven points in a 20-6 Seminole run that put the game away. Four other FSU players were in double figures: Delvon Arrington (11), Karim Shabazz (11), Oliver Simmons (11) and Adrian Crawford (10). Florida State held Idaho to 33.3 percent shooting from the floor (18-of-54) and forced 21 turnovers.

Adrian Crawford scored a career-high 22 points and Ron Hale matched his with 19 as Florida State opened the road and Atlantic Coast Conference portion of its schedule with a 72-69 come-from-behind win at Virginia. The Seminoles trailed by 14 points (61-47) with less than eight minutes to play but Hale scored seven points and Crawford added six in a 19-4 run over the next six minutes that gave FSU the lead at 66-65, its first since the 9:13 mark of the first half. After the Cavaliers tied the game at 69, Karim Shabazz hit one of two from the line with 23 seconds to go to give Florida State a 70-69 lead. Shabazz then blocked a Donald Hand shot on UVa's ensuing possession and Hale provided the final margin with a pair of free throws. The Seminoles hit 47.1 percent from the field (24-of-51) and outrebounded Virginia 37-31.

# Auburn 45

Chris Porter scored 21 points and Auburn held off a pair of Florida State rallies in the second half as the Tigers beat the Seminoles 80-68. FSU trailed 36-23 late in the first half, but scored 11 straight points at the end of the period and to start the second half to come within 36-34. Auburn responded though, with a 24-4 run over the next six minutes to stretch its lead to 22 at 60-38. Florida State fought back with a 26-10 run of its own to get to within 70-64 with 2:15 to play, but the Seminoles missed three straight free throws that could have got them within three points. FSU outshot Auburn 47.9 percent to 45.5 but the Tigers owned a 44-29 advantage on the boards and forced the Tribe into 19 turnovers. Terrell Baker led Florida State with a career-best 24 points and hit six three-pointers. The Seminoles hit 11-of-20 from three-point range (55.0 percent) but connected on only 11-of-24 from the foul line (45.8 percent).



# Murray State Dec. 30



Damous Anderson established season-highs with 15 points and seven rebounds and two other Seminoles scored in double figures: Terrell Baker (13) and Oliver Simpons (12), FSU held the Jackets to 36.2 percent shooting (21-of-58) and forced 24 turnovers. The win marked the first time Florida State had won its first two ACC road games and equalled the Seminoles' best start in conference play.







bench.



Adrian Crawford scored nine of his 20 points in overtime and Antwuan Dixon scored all five of his points in the extra session as the Seminoles willed their way to an 87-85 win over Glemson in the first round of the ACC Tournament, FSU's win was not cemented until a Terrell McIntyre three-point attempt bounced off the rim at the final horn. Florida State led  $67\mbox{-}51$  with seven minutes to play in regulation but had to withstand a furious Tiger rally to win in overtime. Clemson closed the game with a 20-4 run that forced the extra session. Andrius Jurkunas tied the game at 71 with a pair of free throws with 52 seconds to go. FSU never trailed in overtime. Damous Anderson took the opening tap and scored on a dunk six seconds in then Crawford buried a threepointer to stretch the Florida State margin to five (76-71). Terrell Baker led the Seminoles with 28 points, the most ever by an FSU player in an ACC Tournament game, before fouling out, Baker, one of five Florida state players to foul out, scored the Seminoles' first 11 points of the game and accounted for its first 17 (13 points, two assists). Anderson chipped in with 18 points and six rebounds. The win was the Seminoles' first in an ACC Tournament game since beating NC State in the 1992 quarterfinals, FSU's first ever tournament game.







# The Atlantic Coast Conference: The Tradition Continues

#### THE TRADITION

Consistency. It's the mark of true excellence in any endeavor.

However, in today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency.

Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds. Now in its 47th year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive inter-collegiate conferences in the nation. And that is not mere conjecture, the numbers support it.

Since the league's inception in 1953, AGC schools have captured 75 national champion-ships, including 38 in men's competition and 37 in women's. In addition, 115 men and 26 women have earned the coveted title of NCAA champion.

If success is best measured in terms of wins and losses, then the ACC is unrivaled in NCAA history. ACC teams have captured seven NCAA basketball championships, including three straight between 1991 and 1993.

Since the NCAA's inaugural tournament in 1938, no conference has posted a better record than the ACC. The nine current conference members have posted an NCAA Tournament-best mark of 268-143 for a sterling .652 winning percentage against the nation's toughest competition.

In the decade of the 90's, the ACC success story is even more impressive as league teams have compiled a 105--48 (.686) NCAA mark, including 28 "Sweet 16" appearances.

North Carolina, the nation's second win-ingest team with 1.699 wins, captured NCAA championships in 1957, 1982 and 1993, N.C. State walked away with the coveted crown in 1974 and 1983 while Duke won back-to-back titles in 1991 and 1992.

Over the years, ACC basketball teams have gained global recognition through their NCAA Tournament and national television exposure. Last year the ACC became the first conference in college basketball history to have each of its conference games (72 in all) televised live on a national or regional basis.

The ACC had an NCAA best 107-30 (.781) mark against one of the nation's toughest non-league schedules a year ago. In the decade of the 90's, ACC teams are a combined 994-263 (.791) versus outside opponents. Over the past two years, the ACC is an impressive 26-20 against non-league AP-ranked teams.

The Conference set a single-season attendance mark in 1997-98 drawing 1,569,207 fans, an increase of 28,484 from the 1996-97 season. The league averaged 11,209 over 135 regular season, NIT home games and five ACC Tournament sessions.

#### 1998-99 In Review

The 1998-99 academic year concluded with the league pocketing three more national team titles and seven individual NCAA crowns. In all, the ACC has won 32 national team titles the last nine years. This past year, the ACC was the only Division I-A conference to have a team play in the national championship game in men's and women's basketball, football and baseball.

The ACC's 1998-99 national champions were Maryland in women's lacrosse, Virginia in men's lacrosse and Duke in women's golf. In addition the ACC had seven other teams participate in national title games - Florida State in football. Virginia in women's lacrosse, Duke in men's and women's basket-ball. North Carolina in women's soccer. Florida State in baseball and Virginia in rowing, Overall, ACC teams posted a 70-47-1 (.597) mark in NCAA Tournament play.

The ACC placed at least one team in the Top 10 nationally in 15 of the 24 sports sponsored by the league. Other records of note during the 1998-99 sea-

son include 76 teams competing at NCAA Championships, five bowl teams and  $28\ \mathrm{Top}\ 10\ \mathrm{showings}.$ 

Seven ACC teams, in seven different sports, representing six of the nine member institutions, earned a No. 1 ranking during the course of the past academic year.

#### THE CHAMPIONSHIPS

The conference will conduct championship competition in 25 sports during the 1999-2000 academic year - 12 for men and 13 for women.

The first ACC championship was held in swimming on February 25, 1954. The conference did not conduct championships in cross country, wrestling or tennis during the first year.

The 12 sports for men include football, cross country, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, wrestling, baseball, tennis, golf and lacrosse, Fencing, which was started in 1971, was discontinued in 1981.

Women's sports were initiated in 1977 with the first championship meet being held in tennis at Wake Forest University. Championships for women are currently conducted in cross country, volleyball, field hockey, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, tennis, golf, lacrosse, softball and rowing.

#### A HISTORY

The Atlantic Coast Conference was founded on May 8, 1953, at the Sedgefield Inn near Greensboro, N.C., with seven charter members - Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, North Carolina State, South Carolina and Wake Forest - drawing up the conference by-laws.

The withdrawal of seven schools from the Southern Conference came early on the morning of May 8, 1953, during the Southern Conference's annual spring meeting. On June 14, 1953, the seven members met in Raleigh, N.C., where a set of bylaws was adopted and the name became officially the Atlantic Coast Conference.

On December 4, 1953, conference officials met again at Sedgefield and officially admitted the University of Virginia. The first, and only, withdrawal of a school from the ACC came on June 30, 1971, when the University of South Carolina tendered its resignation.

The ACC operated with seven members until April 3, 1978, when Georgia Tech was admitted. The Atlanta school withdrew from the Southeastern Conference in January of 1964.

The ACC expanded to nine members on July 1, 1991, with the addition of Florida State.




