


A Look Back at the 2003-2004 Season







In 2003-04, The Seminoles Continued To Build A Foundation As One Of The Nation's Best.

Seminoles Achieve National Ranking

Florida State was ranked 25th in the ESPN/USA Today coaches' poll of Dec. 29 following its victory over No. 24-ranked Maryland in its ACC

opener. It marked the first time since January of 1998 that the Seminoles had earned a national ranking in men's basketball.

The Seminoles were 11-1 at the time of the ranking and played Stetson and Florida as a ranked team for the first time since the 1998 season. At 11-1, the Seminoles were off to the best start in school history since the 1971-72 Seminoles won 16 of their first 17 games. That team, led by Ron King, advanced to the championship game of the NCAA Tournament before falling to UCLA.

Florida State ranked in the top 25 Rank Among of five different statistical categories including 3-point field goals made in the final release of the NCAA

statistics for the 2003-04 season. The Seminoles ranked third in 3-point field goals made for the entire season (296), eighth in 3-point field goals made per game (9.0), 10th for 3-point field goals made in a single game (17 against Stetson, Dec. 28), 14th for single game free throw percentage (.950 against Georgia Tech, Feb. 3) and 21st in field goal percentage defense.





Led by All-America Honorable tion Tim Pickett. Florida State established a

school record with 296 3-point shots made during the 2003-04 season. Pickett made a near school-record 110 shots from long range and fell short of tying the existing school record of 115 by George McCloud by a mere five shots made. Freshman Von Wafer, who finished as Florida State's third leading scorer with a 7.9 points per game average, ranked second on the team with 42 3-point field goals made. Senior Nate Johnson led the Seminoles with a careerhigh .420 3-point field goal shooting percentage. On their way to netting 296 3-point field goals this season, the Seminoles established a single season school record with an average of 9.0 long-range shots made per game. Pickett led the ACC with a single season career-high 3.33 3-point shots made per game. The Seminoles' school-record 17 3-point shots made in their 87-72 victory over Stetson Dec. 30 ranked as the 10th highest total for a single game in the nation this season. During that victory over the Hatters, Nate Johnson was a perfect six-ofsix from long range for a career-high 19

Seminoles Nearly Perfect From The Free- shooting nights of Throw Line

The Seminoles enjoyed one of the top free throw any Division I team in the nation in 2003-04 when

they made 19 of 20 from the line for a .950 percentage against Georgia Tech Feb. 3, 2004. The Seminoles defeated the Yellow Jackets, 81-65, to hand the national finalists their most lopsided loss of the season (-16 points).

During that game, senior All-America Honorable Mention selection Tim Pickett was a perfect seven-of-seven from the line. The Seminoles' .950 percentage from the line ranked as the 14th best shooting game in the nation during the season.

Seminoles Lead ACC In 3-Point Honorable Field Goals Made

Led by All-America Mention selection Tim Pickett Florida State led the ACC with an

average of 8.9 3-point field goals made per game. The Seminoles made a team-record 296 3-point shots during the season including a single game school record 17 against Stetson Dec. 30. It marked the fifth time since Florida State joined the ACC in 1992 (and second consecutive season) that the Seminoles had led the league in a statistical category. The Seminoles led the league in scoring defense during the 2002-03 season.



Florida State Against Ranked Teams

Florida State defeated four nationally ranked teams during the 2003-04 season including No. 7-ranked North Carolina (90-Sl in overtime, Jan. 22), No. 10ranked Wake Forest (75-70, Jan. 25) and No. 10-ranked Georgia Tech (81-65, Feb. 3) in a span of three consecutive ACC home games. It marked the first time in school history the Seminoles defeated three top-10 teams at home in consecutive games. The Seminoles played a near school record 13 ranked teams during the season to fall only one ranked opponent shy of tving the school record for ranked opponents played in a single season. Florida State played a school record 14 ranked teams during the 1992-93 season when the Seminoles advanced to the Elite 8 of the NCAA Toumament.



2003-04 marked the second year in a row the Seminoles' defense ranked second in the ACC.

Leonard Hamilton's Emphasis On Defense Was A Major Factor In The Seminoles' Resurgence.

Seminoles Among The League Leaders scoring defense In Scoring Defense

Florida State ranked second in the ACC in as it allowed 65.1 points per game, the fifth lowest scoring

average allowed by the Seminoles in school history. It marked only the sixth time in school history the Seminoles have allowed fewer than 66 points per game in a single season. Florida State held four teams to 50 points or less, 13 teams to 60 points or less and only allowed 15 teams to score more than their average of 65.1 points per game. The Seminoles established a new school record for fewest points allowed at a neutral site when it held Chicago State to 42 points during the third round of the University of Pittsburgh Holiday Hoops Classic at the University of Pittsburgh's Pederson Events Center Dec. 20, 2003.

Florida State Stingy Under Hamilton

Under Leonard Hamilton, Florida State owns the best scoring defense in the ACC. The

Seminoles have allowed an average of 65.8 points per game during the first two years of the Hamilton era.

Seminoles Among National Leaders 2003-04 sea-In Field Goal Defense

Florida State finished the son ranked 21st in the nation and second in the ACC

in field goal percentage defense. It marked the second consecutive season the Seminoles have ranked among the nation's top 25 and second in the ACC in the category. The Seminoles ranked seventh in the nation and second in the ACC during the 2002-03 season. Florida State head coach Leonard Hamilton led his 1998 Miami team to the nation's No. 1 ranking in field goal percentage defense.

Seminoles Stealing At An Alarming Rate

Florida State finished third in the ACC and came within 32 steals of establishing the all-

time single season school record for steals with 291 during the 2003-04 season. Tim-Pickett led the way with 82 steals and eight other players had at least 20 steals during the season. It marked only the third time in school history the Seminoles had totaled 290 or more steals in a single season.

Hamilton Has Steals Rate On The Rise

Florida State averages 9.1 steals per game during the twoyear tenure of head coach

Leonard Hamilton. The Seminoles ranked second in the conference statistics in 2002-03 with a 9.4 steals per game average and fifth with an 8.8 steals per game average in 2003-04. Florida State's 291 steals this season is the second highest single season team total in school history. Under Hamilton in the last two seasons, the Seminoles have recorded two of the top six single season totals in school history.

Guard Tim Pickett Capped A Stellar Two-Year Career, Garnering All-America Honorable Mention Honors.

Pickett Farns All-America Honors

Senior guard Tim Pickett earned All-America Honorable Mention honors from the Associated Press for his

outstanding play during the 2003-04 season. Pickett averaged 16.5 points, 2.5 steals and made 110 3-point shots as he led the Seminoles to a 19-14 record and an appearance in the second round of the National Invitation Tournament.

Pickett is the first Seminole to earn All-America Honorable Mention accolades since Bob Sura earned the honor following both the 1993-94 and 1994-95 seasons. Pickett earned his bachelor's degree in sociology in April. He led the Seminoles in scoring (16.5 ppg), steals (2.5 spg) and 3-point field goals made (110) while ranking second in rebounds (4.5) this season.


His 543 points this season ranks as the 22nd highest single season scoring total in school history while his 82 steals are tied for the second highest single season total in school history. Pickett came within five 3point field goals made of tying the all-time single season record of 115 by George McCloud during the 1989 season.

Pickett finished his career with 1,038 points and a 16.7 points per game scoring average for his 62-game Seminole career. He is ranked 33rd on Florida State's all-time scoring list while his 16.7 ppg average is tied for the 16th best career average in school history.

Senior quard Tim Pickett, who point field goals made (110), second

in steals (82) and fourth in scoring (16.5), was named to the All-Atlantic Coast Conference First-Team as voted on by the Atlantic Coast Sports Media Association. Pickett finished third in the voting and is the second player in Seminole men's basketball history to earn All-ACC First-Team honors. Bob Sura, currently a nine-year pro playing with the Atlanta Hawks of the NBA, was the first Florida State player to earn the honor in 1994. Pickett was joined on the All-ACC First-Team by Rashad McCants of North Carolina, Julius Hodge of NC State, Chris Duhon of Duke and Justin Gray of Wake

Forest. It marked the second consecutive season Pickett has earned All-ACC honors; he was an All-ACC Second-Team selection as a junior in 2002-03.

Ranked Teams Defeated at Home. Florida State defeated four top-ranked teams at home in 2003-04, including No. 24 Maryland, No. 7 North Carolina, No. 10 Wake Forest and No. 10 Georgia Tech.

ACC Wins. For the first time since 1999-2000, the Seminoles won six Atlantic Coast Conference

Consecutive Wins to Start the Season. The Seminoles won their first ten games of the 2003-04 season, establishing a school record for consecutive wins at the outset of a season.

Home Victories. Florida State's 15 victo-5 ries at home in the Tallahassee Leon County Civic Center tied the school record for victories at home during a season. The Seminoles also won 15 games at home in 1974-75, playing in Tully Gymnasium.

Season Victories. Florida State won 19 games during the 2003-04 season – its highest victory total since the 1007 victory total since the 1997 season, when the Seminoles finished the season with a 20-12 record.

Pickett's plethora of 20-point games allowed him to surpass the 1,000 career points scored plateau and score 543 points as a senior with the 22nd highest single season total in school history.

ninth in total steals with 82, 10th with a 3.3 3point field goals made per game average and 18th with a 2.5 steals per game average. Pickett was one of only two players nationally to rank in the top 10 in steals and 3-point shots made during the 2003-04 season.

Galloway Improves His Numbers As A Sophomore


A look at sophomore point guard Todd Galloway's numbers from his sophomore season as compared to his freshman season

showed that he did an outstanding job of taking care of the basketball in his second season as a Seminole. He dramatically cut down on his turnover per game average while raising his assist:turnover ratio. Galloway averaged one turnover fewer per game and had a 1.72:1 assist:turnover ratio in 2003-04 as compared to 2002-03. In addition, Galloway averaged more than one full turnover fewer as a sophomore (1.3) than he did as a freshman (2.4).

In 2003-04, Hamilton And His Staff Continued To Build The Seminoles Into A Program Of Significance In The ACC And Nationally.

Florida State In Non-Conference Games Under Leonard Hamilton

Florida State was 13-4 against non-conference opponents in 2003-04 and 10-3 against non-ACC opponents in 2002-03 for a twovear total of 23-7 and a winning percentage of .767. The Seminoles won their first 10 non-conference games of the 2003-04 season with their only losses coming at Pittsburgh and at Florida. Florida State's only two nonconference losses during the 2002-03 season came at Florida and against Boston University in the University of Arizona Tournament. The Seminoles have won 16 of their last 19 games (.842) heading into the 2004-05 season against teams who don't call the ACC home.


Junior Anthony Richardson tied a Florida State men's Tallahassee Leon County Civic Center record as he scored 25 points in the

Former point guard Ryan Lowery also earned his undergraduate degree during the spring of 2004. The men's basketball team is a perfect 10-of-10 in scholarship seniors earning their degrees under Hamilton

Led by Anthony career-high and team-leading .815 free throw shooting percentage, the Seminoles shot .686 from the freethrow line as a

Florida State finished sixth in the ACC to mark the second consecutive season the team finished in the sixth spot in the conference statistics. TALLAHASSEE, Fla. – A strong defensive performance led to plenty of offensive opportunities as the Florida State University men's basketball prevailed in an 83-68 exhibition win over Global Sports All-Stars. Three different Seminoles reached double figures in the scoring department with every player scoring at least two points. Leading the way offensively for Florida State was junior Anthony Richardson who led all scorers with 19 points. Just two points behind Richardson was senior guard Nate Johnson as he added 17 points, including a perfect five-for-five from 3-point range. Many of Florida State's baskets came in transition thanks to a stifling defense that limited Global Sports to just 35.8 percent shooting (24-of-67). The Tribe stepped up the defense even more behind the arc, holding the visitors to six-of-26 (23.1 percent). Florida State's defense also forced Global Sports into 15 turnovers. The strong defense was key for the Seminoles during the midway point of the first half when the hosts made their run to take the lead. Holding onto a 20-19 advantage with 13:07 remaining in the stanza, the Seminoles kept Global Sports off the scoreboard for nearly six minutes as the one-point margin turned into a 12-point gap (31-19). During that stretch, Michael Joiner scored six of his eight points and treshman guard Von Wafer nailed a 3-pointer to cap the run. Playing in his first collegiate game, Wafer was third on the squad with 14 points off six-of-nine shooting. Fellow rookie Alexander Johnson also chipped in with six points and tied for the team lead for five rebounds. After Florida State established the double-digit lead, the margin only dipped below ten points once the remainder of the first half. The Seminoles went into the locker room with their largest advantage of the break.



TALLAHASSEE, Fla. – An 18-4 run to start the second half paved the way for a 75-65 exhibition victory over Team Nike by the Florida State University men's basketball team. The Seminoles shot 66.7 percent (20-of-30) from the floor in the second half to overcome a 13-point halftime deficit. Two Florida State players reached double digits, led by senior guard Tim Pickett. The Preseason All-ACC selection topped the Seminoles with 23 points, including five-of-nine from behind the 3-point arc. He added seven boards, three assists, one steal and a block. Also getting into double-digit action was rookie forward Alexander Johnson as he added 11 points off the bench. Double figures were put up in the rebounding column by forward Anthony Richardson who pulled down 11 rebounds while adding six points. A cold shooting first half by the hosts, combined with good shooting and rebounding from Team Nike, led to a 40-27 halftime advantage by the visitors. Florida State shot just 11-of-37 (29.7 percent), while being out-rebounded 28-19 in the first stanza. The tables were turned during the second 20 minutes as the Seminoles held a 23-13 rebounding advantage while holding Team Nike to just 30 percent shooting in the final stanza. Florida State picked up its perimeter defense in the second half, limiting the visitors to one-of-14 in the second half after Team Nike went nine-of-30 from behind the arc to start the game.



TALLAHASSEE, Fla. – Anthony Richardson scored 25 of a career-high 27 points in the second half to lead Florida State to a 71-53 victory over Northwestern. Richardson, whose previous career high was 20 points, hit 10 of 13 shots, including four of five from 3-point distance. Tim Pickett added 21 for the Seminoles, who had runs of 24-9 and 18-3 in the second half when they outscored the visitors 45-22. Jitim Young led Northwestern with 17 points while teammates T.J. Parker and Evan Seacat added 12 each. Northwestern led 31-26 at halftime and built its advantage to 34-26 before Richardson keyed the 24-9 run that put Florida State into a 50-43 lead. PITTSBURGH, Pa. – Mark McCarroll scored 13 points and No. 16 Pittsburgh dealt Florida State its first loss of the season, 63-56 in the championship game of the Pittsburgh Holiday Hoops Classic. Carl Krauser led Pitt with 17 points and McCarroll had six points during a pivotal 10-2 run that started the second half and gave the Panthers a 38-30 lead. Chevon Troutman, riding a stationary bicycle behind the Panthers bench to stay loose while out of the game, shook off a scoreless first half to get nine points down the stretch and help Pitt open leads of as many as 10 points. Florida State failed to match a 33-year-old school record of 11 consecutive victories set during the Dave Covens era, despite Tim Pickett's 14 points and highly recruited freshman Von Wafer's 13. Nate Johnson added 12 points. Wafer got the Seminoles within 56-50 with a jumper from the wing with just over a minute left but, after a Pitt turnover, he missed a jumper that would have cut it to four. Jaron Brown added 10 points and 10 rebounds for Pitt, which has held six of its last seven opponents to 56 points or fewer.

CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va. – Devin Smith scored all 21 of his points after halftime, including the first five in overtime and Virginia defeated Florida State, 76-67. Todd Billet added 26 points for Virginia which avoided its first 0-4 start in league play since they went 0-5 in 1998-99. Pete Gillen's first season as head coach. 

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. – Jake Sullivan and Marcus Jefferson each hit two free throws in the final eight seconds to give lowa State a 62-59 victory over Florida State in the second round of the NIT. Florida State had pulled within two, 58-56, on a pair of free throws by Tim Pickett with 51.1 seconds left. Jefferson's two free throws put Iowa State ahead by four points with eight seconds left, but Andrew Wilson's 3-pointer made it 60-59 before Sullivan iced the game with his two free throws in the final second. Florida State fell behind early and trailed by as many as 14 points at 35-21 in the second half, but caught up to tie once, at 47-all, on Wilson's first 3-pointer. Iowa State led 33-20 at the half as Florida State shot only 23.2 percent, making only one of its final 17 attempts before halftime. Sullivan, who finished with a game-high 19 points, put Iowa State ahead 16-12 with 11 early points, including three straight 3-point shots. His 3-point play, a layup and free throw, broke the 47-all tie and Iowa State never trailed. Adam Waleskowski led Florida State with 14 points and 10 rebounds and Alexander Johnson added 12 points. Pickett scored seven points and made only one of 13 tries from 3-point range.

ACC BASKETBALL: "TRADITION OF EXCELLENCE"

The Tradition

Consistency. It's the mark of true excellence in any endeavor.

However, in today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency.

Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds. Now in its 52nd year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation. And that is not mere conjecture, the numbers support it.

Since the league's inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured 91 national championships, including 47 in women's competition and 44 in men's. In addition, NCA4 individual titles have gone to ACC student-athletes 116 times in men's competition and 57 in women's action.

If success is best measured in terms of winds and losses, then the ACC is unrivated in NCAA annals. With Maryland's victory over Indiana in the 2002 NCAA title game, ACC teams have captured nine NCAA basketball championships, including five over the last 14 years.

No conference has posted a better NCAA Tournament record than the ACC since the NCAA's inaugural tournament in 1938. The 11 current conference members have posted an NCAA Tournament-best mark of 315-164 for a sterling. 658 winning percentage against the nation's tournament the properties.

nation's toughest competition.

A year ago, the ACC had two teams –
Georgia Tech and Duke – in the Final Four for
the second time in four years and fifth time
overall. In the 20 years of the 64-team field, the
ACC has produced 20 Final Four teams, an
average of one per year and seven more than
any other conference.

Since 1985, when the NCAA Tournament was expanded to 64 teams, ACC teams have been even more impressive compiling a 203-96 (.679) NCAA record, including 56 "Sweet 16" appearances and 20 Final Four berths. Since 1985, 56 of the 102 ACC teams receiving NCAA berths have won at least two NCAA Tournament games.

Since 1990, the ACC – with a 181-173 record – is the only conference with a winning record against ranked nonconference foes.

North Carolina and Duke lead all ACC schools with three NCAA championships each. NC State has two national titles to its credit and Maryland one. The Tar Heels captured NCAA titles in 1957, 1982 and 1993 while the Blue Devils won their third title in 2001, following back-to-back championships in 1991 and 1992. The Wolfpack walked away with the coveted crown in 1974 and 1983 while the Terps claimed the 2002 national title.

The stature of ACC basketball is no where

The stature of ACC basketball is no where more clearly defined than by its regional and national television exposure as an all-time high 172 televised games involving ACC teams headline the league's 2004-05 schedule, including a record-setting 261 appearances. ACC teams are slated to make 132 appearances on national television networks and 79 of the league's 88 regular season conference games, including 36 on national television networks are scheduled to be televised.

This past year the ACC posted a 14-6 mark in NCAA Tournament play with the six losses by a total of 21 points. For the second time in league history, eight ACC teams took part in postseason play and six of the nine league teams were ranked in the final AP and coaches' polls. League teams were 107-24 (.816) against nonconference opponents, 13-12 versus ranked teams, including a 3-0 mark against No. 1-ranked teams. The ACC finished the 2003-04 season with the highest regular season RPI rating ever accorded a conference.

2003-04 in Review

The 2003-04 academic year concluded with the league pocketing three more national team titles and six individual NCAA crowns. In all, the ACC has won 48 national team titles over the last 14 years.

The ACC's 2003-04 national champions were Wake Forest in field hockey, North Carolina in women's soccer and Virginia in women's lacrosse. Overall, 66 ACC teams took part in postseason play compiling a 101-66-4 (.591) record.

A total of 169 student-athletes from the ACC earned first, second or third-team All-America honors this past year. In addition, the ACC produced nine national Players of the Year, two national Pookies of the Year and three national Coaches of the Year recipients.

The ACC placed at least one team in the top 10 nationally in 17 sports. In all, 31 ACC teams finished their season with a top 10 ranking.

A History

The Atlantic Coast Conference was founded on May 8, 1953, at the Sedgefield Inn near Greensboro, N.C., with seven charter members – Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, North Carolina State, South Carolina and Wake Forest – drawing up the conference bylaws.

The withdrawal of seven schools from the Southern Conference came early on the morning of May 8, 1953, during the Southern Conference's annual spring meeting. On June 14, 1953, the seven members met in Raleigh, N.C., where a set of bylaws was adopted and the name became officially the Atlantic Coast Conference. On December 4, 1953, conference officials met again at Sedgefield and officially admitted the University of Virginia as the league's eighth member. The first, and only, withdrawal of a school from the ACC came on June 30, 1971, when the University of South Carolina tendered its resignation. The ACC operated with seven members until April 3, 1978, when the Georgia Institute of Technology was admitted. The Atlanta school had withdrawn from the Southeastern Conference in January of 1964.

The ACC expanded to nine members on July 1, 1991, with the addition of Florida State University.

The conference expanded to 11 members on July 1, 2004, with the addition of the University of Mlami and Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University. On October 17, 2003, Boston College accepted an invitation to become the league's 12th member starting with the 2005-06 academic year.






