Before Your Visit

Credentials for Florida State home games are issued to accredited members of the media only. Working space along press row at the Tucker Center is limited and seats are expressly reserved to those working on deadline, with no exceptions. Children and other non-workers are not allowed in the press area. Requests for credentials should be made in writing on letterhead stationery to Chuck Walsh, associate director of sports information. If it is convenient to FAX your request, you are welcome to do so. The FAX number in the Sports Information office is (850) 644-3820. If you would rather e-mail your request, please do so. The e-mail address is cwalsh@mail.fsu.edu. These requests are accepted from sports editors and sports directors only. Credential requests are carefully screened to insure proper working conditions in the press area. When time permits, a working press pass and a parking pass will be mailed. When mailing is not possible, they will be left at the Press Will Call entrance near the bottom level at the Elephant Doors located in the southwest corner of the arena. The Press Will Call is located near the television trucks and directly opposite the Florida State Basketball Training Center. Media Will Call is located at this entrance and is open 90 minutes prior to tip-off.

Photography Credentials

Photographers, too, should make their credential requests at least one week in advance. Strobe lights may be installed in the Tucker Center; arrangements must be made through the Civic Center at least two weeks prior to gameday. Space for strobe lights is available on a first come, first served basis. Arrangements may be made by calling Roger Englert at (850) 487-1691.

The NCAA has an established policy to control congestion within photography areas on the basketball court. Only photographers on assignment will be issued photo passes along with members of the working television media. Admission to the court and photo boxes is by photo pass only. Photographers, both still and electronic, must shoot from the baselines at the Northwest (visiting bench press row side) or Southeast (Florida State bench) corners of the court. Photographer's floor access is governed by Atlantic Coast Conference and NCAA policy. Please note, only game photographers, no runners, assistants, or producers will have access to the photography areas. Photographer positions are at the complete discretion of the basketball game officials and the Sports Information office at ALL TIMES.

Parking

Parking for media covering the Seminoles at the Tucker Center is available on a very limited basis. The media parking lot is located in the main Tucker Center parking lot. Access is via media parking pass only. Vehicles should enter the Tucker Center lot from Pensacola Street. They will then be directed to the appropriate area. Please contact the Sports Information in plenty of time to request a parking pass to be mailed or left at your hotel.

Media Services

Weekly Interview Schedule: The Sports Information office will, in conjunction with head coach Leonard Hamilton, establish a weekly interview schedule throughout the 2010-11 season. The schedule, which will vary in accordance with the Seminoles' practice and game schedule, is established to assist the media in their coverage of the Seminoles. The interviews will take place in the Florida State Basketball Training Center and will provide the media with an opportunity to speak with Coach Hamilton as well as various Seminole players. All interview requests must be made in advance and must be made with at least a 24 hours notice. Player's individual phone numbers will not be given to the media and game day interviews will not be granted until the end of each game. Players will return phone calls at a mutually convenient day and time. Media requests for specific players to be made available should be made to associate sports information director Chuck Walsh.

ACC Coaches' Teleconference

Media members wishing to speak with Head Coach Leonard Hamilton are encouraged to call the Atlantic Coast Conference's weekly coaches' teleconference. Each of the 12 ACC coaches will be featured each Monday from 11:00 a.m. to 12:50 p.m. beginning January 8 and concluding March 5.

Each coach will be available for comments and the field questions for 10 minutes beginning with Skip Prosser of Wake Forest and concluding with Al Skinner of Boston College. Florida State's Leonard Hamilton is available from 11:50 - 12:00. The weekly press conference can be accessed by calling (913) 312-0942.

GAME DAY SERVICES

Media Room

The media room at the Tucker Center is located beneath the west side of the arena in Meeting Room B.

Phones

A limited number of phones are available in the Tucker Center press room (calling card or reversed charges required). Members of the media may order their own phone lines for the media room or at courtside through Sprint of Tallahassee. Call Sprint at (866) 366-2500 to arrange for service.

Visiting Radio

Phone lines are reversed for both the Florida State and visiting radio network on the court level of press row. The broadcast rights to the game are granted to visiting radio stations on a reciprocal basis. Phone lines are available through an ACC agreement. Please contact Chuck Walsh of the Sports Information Office for the details.

Press Meals

A buffet dinner is available in the Seminole Spirit Room to members of the media with a meal ticket attached to their credential. Television crews may be provided with meal tickets to accommodate talent and producers. Any catering needs for television crews should be addressed to Roger Englert of the Tucker Center (850) 487-1691.

Postgame Press Conference

Postgame interviews with the respective head coaches are held in the media room at the conclusion of the game. The head coach of the visiting team will be brought to the interview room immediately after the game. He will be followed by Seminole head coach Leonard Hamilton. The Florida State locker room is open to credentialed media for a brief period after Coach Hamilton concludes his comments to the team. This is in accordance with ACC rules. The visiting team's locker room access policy is determined by officials of that school. On the road, the Florida State players will be available in the locker room after Coach Hamilton concludes his remarks to the team and has left for the interview room. No live television shots, except those by the network televising the game live, will be allowed until after Coach Hamilton and the players have fulfilled their usual post game interview responsibilities.

Postgame Statistics

Statistical packets, including running play-by-play, first half and final box scores and postgame quotes, are compiled and available to the media at press row and in the press room following each game.

SEMINOLES POISED FOR DEEP POSTSEASON RUN

There was a time when FSU basketball fans would have been satisfied with just getting the call to the big dance, but 20 or more wins in four of the last five seasons and back-to-back NCAA appearances have raised the goals and expectations of the program.

The Seminoles traveled to upstate New York for a first round NCAA Tournament matchup against perennial bracket-buster Gonzaga and the 67-60 final score that ended FSU's season left a dejected FSU locker room.

FSU will enter this season boasting a roster with both experience and size, which really is another testament to the overall strength of the program. Most schools would be scrambling to replace a pair of NBA players, but the bigger task for the Seminoles may be finding which new lineup will suit them best.

"We're especially excited about our team this year because we have some veterans that seem to have a grasp of our shortcomings and the things that we came up a little short on last year," said head coach Leonard Hamilton. "To their credit, they've worked extremely hard over the summer, playing and trying to correct all of their individual skill issues."

FSU returns six of its top eight scorers and rebounders from last year's 22-10 team and it is the return of the best defensive player in the ACC that is perhaps the strongest reason for optimism. Junior forward Chris Singleton (10.2 ppg, 7.0 rpg) spent all summer working out against the best players in the country and basketball insiders will tell you that his stock is jumping off the charts. Coaches may need to lean on their talented star to be more involved in the FSU offense, but it seems clear that defense, which is where FSU has hung their hat under coach Leonard Hamilton, will be strong again

this year.

"Anytime you have the opportunity to play against the highest level of competition in the world, then it shows you how you have to work if you want to be one of those players," said Hamilton about Singleton's summer vacation. "I think it was a great learning experience. I am sure it will give Chris a level of confidence and knowledge what he needs to do individually to reach that potential. But Chris is such an unselfish player and he has illustrated that since he has been here, and I think he will bring the positive back share it with his teammates and come back and play with that attitude and a lot of his teammates will be able to benefit from his experience and can help us become a better team."

Also returning to the starting five are seasoned point guard Derwin Kitchen (8.1 ppg, 4.9 rpg) and talented shooting guard Michael Snaer (8.8 ppg, 2.7 rpg) who is in just his second season at FSU.

"Derwin has worked as hard since the end of last season as any player I have ever coached," said Hamilton. "He has gotten himself in shape both physically and mentally and he should be ready for a breakout season. We need him to be our leader and we feel that he has accepted that role. We are excited about how well we think Derwin is going to play for us this season."

Hamilton and his staff are also excited about returning All-American candidate Michael Snaer.

"Michael began to display his extraordinary ability at the end of his freshman season," said Hamilton. "He is such a hard worker and such a talented young man who has only scratched the surface of where he is going to be one day as a basketball player.

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Michael will be very exciting to watch this season.”

Xavier Gibson (5.5 ppg, 2.8 rpg) played in all 32 games last year and started three. He will be counted on to counter both the offensive and particularly defensive losses FSU suffered with the departure of NBA draft picks Solomon Alabi and Ryan Reid. Also ready to supply help on the front line is sophomore forward Terrence Shannon (1.7 ppg, 1.1 rpg) who showed no reluctance to mix it up last year, but should be fully recovered from a high school knee injury that clearly limited him in his rookie season.

“Xavier is another one of our talented players who is only beginning to realize what kind of potential he has as a basketball player,” said Hamilton. “We are very excited about Xavier and what he can do around the basket, away from the basket and on defense – in every phase of the game really.”

Hamilton will also look to Shannon to give the Seminoles’ a lift on both offense and defense.

“Terrance is so much further along in his development this season as compared to last season,” said Hamilton. “He was injured during the early part of last season and did not develop anywhere close to how he is developing this season. The extra time on the court for Terrance is a blessing; he is going to improve so much more this season as he continues to gain more of a feel for our system.”

Hamilton should have a lively preseason camp with 22-game starter Deividas Dulkys (8.7 ppg, 2.3rpg) and crafty point guard Luke Loucks (4.4 ppg, 2.5 rpg) ready to take over starting roles as well. Both are experienced players who know how to win in the ACC.

“Deividas and Luke have grown into our system so well and they fit perfectly into the focus of our team,” said Hamilton. “Both players are upperclassmen and we need them to be team leaders each time we step on to the court. The both add so much to our roster and are going to be exciting to watch throughout the season.”

As for the four newcomers, they will certainly give coaches the option of a big lineup to go to again this year. 6-10 forward Bernard James was a second team JUCO All-American who will get a long look in the pre-season. 6-8 Okaro White averaged nearly 10 rebounds a game at Clearwater High and 7-0 junior center Jon Kreft will be able to contribute as well. Ian Miller is the only guy who will have to look up to these guys as the 6-3 freshman brings a reputation as a terrific ball-handler to the class.

If the flexibility to go with a front line of 7-0, 7-0, 6-11 or a even a three-guard option is not reason enough for excitement, the Seminoles recent history should be. A third place finish (10-6) last year in the ACC could have been even better and that came on the heels (no pun intended) of an ACC Championship game appearance the year before. In fact Florida State is the ACC’s fourth winningest program over the last five years trailing only Duke, North Carolina and Maryland.

“I think our schedule is set up perfectly for us because we need those challenges early,” said Hamilton. “We need to be successful but it will give us a clear picture early. I think our schedule will be a barometer for what it will take us to and where we want to be by the end of the season.”

Florida State has a chance to do something the program has not done since the early ‘90s and that is to make three straight trips to the NCAA Tournament. And if the Seminoles can get there, they will be determined to make it a longer stay.

Leonard Hamilton, the 20th all-time winningest coach in ACC history, has led the Seminole to the NCAA Tournament in each of the last two seasons, to the ACC Championship game in 2009 and to a school record five consecutive postseason tournament appearances. He was named the National Coach of the Year by Basketball Times and the ACC Coach of the Year by the Atlantic Coast Sports Media Association in 2009 and is the only coach to be named the ACC and the Big East Coach of the Year during his illustrious career.

Under Hamilton, Florida State is the third winningest program in the ACC in the last three years and is one of only two programs to finish in the top four of the ACC standings in each of the last two seasons. The Seminoles have won 47 games in the last two seasons to tie the school record for wins in a two year period. In addition, the Seminoles were the NCAA statistical champion for field goal percentage defense.

Hamilton's coaching has produced three of Florida State's four All-ACC First Team selections, including two in the last four years. One of those pupils, Al Thornton, was the 14th overall selection in the 2007 NBA Draft - just the second Draft lottery pick in school history. In 2009, Toney Douglas earned All-ACC First Team honors, was the runner-up for ACC Player of the Year and was named the ACC Defensive Player of the Year and selected in the first round of the NBA Draft by the Los Angeles Lakers. Current All-American candidate Chris Singleton was named the ACC Defensive Player of the Year in 2010.

With 20 or more wins in four of the last five seasons, Hamilton, the 20th winningest coach in ACC history with 153 victories during his tenure in Tallahassee, has put the Seminoles on the cusp of becoming the next great program in one of toughest conferences in the nation.

Florida State ranks as the fourth winningest program in the ACC in the last five seasons with a cumulative record of 89-48 for a winning percentage of .650. During the last five seasons, Hamilton has elevated the Seminoles' play in the ACC as he has guided Florida State to a 48-42 record (.533 winning percentage) - tied for the fourth highest win total in ACC play since the start of the 2005-06 season.

Hamilton was rewarded with a new five-year contract which will take him through the 2013-14 season by the University Administration and Director of Athletics Randy Spetman following the 2009 season.

Hamilton is in his ninth season as Florida State's head coach in 2010. He has a career record of 353-3316 (21 seasons as a collegiate head coach) and a 153-106 record at Florida

State.

He is the first coach to lead Florida State to five consecutive post-season appearances as the Seminoles have participated in the 2009 and 2010 NCAA Tournament and played in the NIT in 2006, 2007 and 2008. Hamilton has guided six of his first eight Seminole teams into postseason play as he continues to return Florida State to a program of significance both nationally and in the ACC.

Now in his ninth season as the Seminoles' head coach, he has elevated the program in every way possible. Consider the Seminoles' 22-10 record in 2010 marked the five consecutive season the Seminoles had won at least 19 games. It marked the first time in school history that the Seminoles have won at least 19 games in five consecutive seasons. The Seminoles finished the 2010 season with 10 wins in the ACC play to mark the school-record fifth consecutive season they have won at least seven games in ACC play.

The Seminoles have also earned great success against ranked teams under Hamilton. The Seminoles defeated the No. 1 ranked team (North Carolina in the 2009 ACC Tournament semifinals) to mark the third time in school history they had defeated the nation's top ranked team, with two of those wins coming with Hamilton as the Seminoles' head coach.

Hamilton won his 300th career game as he guided Florida State over Virginia on January 23, 2008. He then coached his 600th career game as he led the Seminoles past Wake Forest in the first round of the ACC Tournament on March 13.

As he continues to build his program into one of the nation's best, he annually attracts the nation's top talent to Tallahassee and helps those players reach their goals of not only playing at the next level, but of excelling academically and earning their degrees.

Hamilton's players have also succeeded at a high level on the court since his arrival at Florida State.

He was at the 2007 NBA Draft to watch as Al Thornton - one of his prized pupils -- became only the second Draft Lottery selection in school

history as he was picked with the 14th overall selection by the Los Angeles Clippers. In 2007, Thornton earned All-America Third-Team and All-ACC First-Team honors and was the runner-up choice as the ACC Player of the Year. Hamilton has coached two of the three players (Thornton and Tim Pickett in 2004) who have earned All-ACC Honors in school history. Last season, he coached guard Toney Douglas who earned All-ACC Third Team honors, was named to the All-ACC Defensive Team and led the ACC in steals.

He was with 2009 NBA First Round selection Toney Douglas when his name was called by the Los Angeles Lakers. Douglas earned All-America Third Team and All-ACC First Team while being named the ACC Defensive Player of the Year and finishing as the runner-up for ACC Player of the Year honors.

Hamilton then saw two of his prized pupils - Solomon Alabi and Ryan Reid - selected in the 2010 NBA Draft and currently have five of his former Seminoles playing in the NBA at the start of the 2010-11 season.

Florida State has had at least one player selected in six of the last seven NBA Drafts. All-ACC guard Tim Pickett was a second round selection of the New Orleans Hornets in 2004, guard Von Wafer was a second round selection of the Los Angeles Lakers in 2005, forward Alexander Johnson was the second round selection of the Indianapolis Pacers in 2006, All-American forward Al Thornton was the first round pick of the Los Angeles Clippers in 2007, All-American guard Toney Douglas was the first round pick of the Los Angeles Lakers in 2009 and Solomon Alabi (Dallas Mavericks) and Ryan Reid (Indianapolis Pacers) were chose in the 2010 NDA Draft.

Florida State is one of only three teams in the ACC with at least seven players selected in the last six NBA Drafts. Only North Carolina (with 13 selections) and Duke (with nine selections) have more NBA Draft choices since 2004 than Florida State.

Florida State has also become a fixture in the national statistics since Hamilton's arrival. Florida State finished first nationally in the field

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goal percentage defense category in 2010, ninth in the nation in field goal percentage defense in 2009 and finished fifth in the nation (and as the ACC leader) in free throw percentage during the 2007-08 season after ranking ninth in the same category during the 2006-07 season. The Seminoles ranked eighth in the nation in 3-point field goals made per game in 2003-04 and in the nation's top-25 in field goal shooting percentage during the 2005-06 season and in field goal percentage defense during the 2003-04 season.

Hamilton was hired on March 19, 2002 to return the Seminole men's basketball program to the glory it had earned when it played for the 1972 national championship and regularly competed for, and won, conference championships during the 1980's and early 1990's.

Hamilton was the Washington Wizards' head coach in 2001 and the head coach at the University of Miami for from 1991-2000 when he became the seventh head coach in Florida State men's basketball history.

In his final season at Miami, Hamilton guided the Hurricanes to their second straight 20-win season, a share of the Big East regular season championship and the school's first trip to the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament. The Hurricanes finished 23-11, including a 13-3 conference record, and were ranked 23rd in the nation in the final Associated Press poll and 20th in the final USA Today/ESPN poll. Miami's 23 wins matched the team's 1998-99 total and, at the time, tied the school record for victories in a season.

Under Hamilton's leadership, Miami became one of the nation's top programs, advancing to postseason play five times in his final six seasons including three consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances from 1998-2000. Miami's winning records in his final six seasons meant the Hurricanes joined Syracuse and Connecticut as the only Big East schools to have an overall winning record from 1995-2000. The Hurricanes' 48-22 Big East mark over his last four seasons tied Connecticut for the best conference record over that period. Over his last two seasons, Miami registered a league-best 28-6 conference record for an .824 winning percentage.

In his final season with Miami, Hamilton's Hurricanes recorded three wins over ranked teams including a 74-70 home win over No. 18 St. John's, marking the sixth straight season Miami had defeated a ranked opponent in the Miami Arena.

In the 40 seasons prior to Hamilton's arrival, the Hurricanes reached the post-season just four times including one NCAA tournament appearance (1960). In his ten seasons at Miami, Hamilton led the Hurricanes to five postseason appearances.

Along with the rise of the Hurricanes' program, Hamilton's players also continued to develop and win individual awards. In 1999-2000, guard Johnny Hemsley earned All-Big East Second-Team honors while center Mario Bland earned All-Conference Third-Team honors.

In 1998-99, Hemsley and forward Tim James earned All-Big East First-Team honors. The Hurricanes joined Syracuse (eight times), Georgetown (twice), Pittsburgh, St. John's and Villanova as

the only schools to have two players earn All-Big East First-Team honors in the same season. In ten seasons under Hamilton, the Hurricanes had 13 All-Conference selections.

In 1998-99, Tim James was named Big East Co-Player of the Year, along with Connecticut's Richard Hamilton, and Johnny Hemsley was selected as the league's Most Improved Player.

Miami's rise began in 1994-95 when Hamilton led the Hurricanes to the greatest single season turn-around in Big East history. Picked to finish at the bottom of the Big East Conference standings, Hamilton guided the Hurricanes to a fifth-place finish and a berth in the National Invitational Tournament – Miami's first postseason appearance in 31 years.

Miami set a Big East record in 1995 for the greatest single-season improvement in league history. The Hurricanes' nine-win conference win increase tied Louisiana Tech for the best in the nation. Miami's eight-win overall improvement tied for the third best single season increase in school history.

At the conclusion of the 1995 season, Hamilton was named the United Press International National Coach of the Year. His peers also recognized Hamilton as the league coaches tabbed him Big East Conference Coach of the Year for the first time.

Hamilton took home even more hardware at the end of the 1999 season. He was named Big East Coach of the Year for the second time joining Jim Calhoun, Lou Carnesecca, Jim Boenheim, John Thompson, P.J. Carlesimo and Al Skinner as the only coaches to win the award more than once. Hamilton was later honored as the Eastern Basketball Coach of the Year. In 2000, he was named the Black Coaches Association (BCA) Coach of the Year.

Hamilton understands that defense wins championships. Under his tutelage, the Hurricanes became one of the nation's top defensive teams. Miami ranked nationally in field goal percentage defense in each of his last four seasons including a No. 1 national ranking in 1997-98. In his final season, the Hurricanes ranked 22nd in the nation in field goal percentage defense holding teams to 39.4 percent shooting. In 1998-99, the Hurricanes ranked 13th in the nation, holding teams to 38.4 percent shooting. Since his arrival at Florida State, the Seminoles have become the toughest team to score against and led the league in scoring defense in 2003. The Seminoles led the league in scoring defense and field goal percentage defense in 2009.

The 1997-98 Hurricanes ranked No. 1 in the nation in field goal percentage defense holding opponents to 37.9 percent shooting from the floor. The 1996-97 Hurricanes ranked No. 6 in the nation in field goal percentage defense holding opponents to just 38.0 percent shooting.

For his work both on and off the court, Coach Hamilton was honored as one of four finalists for the 2000 Coach Wooden "Keys to Life" Award. The award is given annually to a coach who best exemplifies Coach John Wooden's philosophy of emphasizing the fact that impacting the life of a student is more significant than any winning percentage. He was named one of Tallahassee's

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Top 33 citizens in 2004 by the Tallahassee Democrat and inducted into the Gaston County (N.C.) Hall of Fame in 2007.

The induction into the Gaston County Hall of Fame marked a monumental occasion for Hamilton who earned induction into his fourth collegiate Hall of Fame. In addition to being honored by his hometown in 2007, he is also a member of athletic Hall of Fame at the University of Miami, the University of Tennessee at Martin where he received his bachelor's degree and served as the captain of the basketball team as an undergraduate player and at Austin Peay State University where he began his coaching career and served as an assistant coach for the Governors. Hamilton helped lead Austin Peay to two Ohio Valley Conference Championships and recruited and coached James "Fly" Williams who is still the only two-time All-American in school history.

Hamilton arrived at Miami from Oklahoma State where he spent four years rebuilding the Cowboys' program. He led them to consecutive appearances in the NIT, the first back-to-back postseason appearances for OSU since 1953-54. While at Oklahoma State, he recruited and coached current Florida State assistant coach Corey Williams.

Prior to his tenure at Oklahoma State, Hamilton was on the staff at the University of Kentucky where he spent 12 seasons with one of the top programs in the country. From 1974-80, he served as an assistant coach, and in 1980 he was honored by being named the first associate head coach in Kentucky basketball history.

During his 12 seasons at Kentucky, the Wildcats registered a 296-83 (.781) record, won eight SEC regular season championships, two SEC tournament titles, went to three Final Fours and won the national title in 1978.

Hamilton's coaching career began at Austin Peay State University where he served as a graduate assistant from 1971-73 and then as a full-time assistant from 1973-74. The Governors won back-to-back Ohio Valley Championships in Hamilton's last two seasons at the school. Hamilton recruited and coached James "Fly" Williams, the 1974 conference Player of the Year and two-time all-conference selection. Williams was a two-time consensus All-America in 1973 and 1974, the only two-time All-America in school history. The Governors won the OVC Championship and played in the NCAA Tournament in 1973.

Hamilton's legacy extends across the nation as seven of his former assistant coaches have moved on to become head coaches at the Division I level. Included on the list are Tim Carter (South Carolina State), Dwight Freeman (Norfolk State), Randy Lee (Maine Machias), Dickey Nutt (Arkansas State), John Phillips (Tulsa) and Bill Self (Kansas).

He played at Gaston (NC) Community College where he set a school record by scoring 54 points in a game, and later at the University of Tennessee-Martin where he is a charter member of the school's Hall of Fame. At both schools, he served as a team captain. Additionally, while at Tennessee-Martin, Hamilton received both the team Most Valuable Player Award and the Best Defensive Player award his senior season.

He earned his bachelor's degree in physical education from Tennessee-Martin in 1971 and received a master's degree in physical and health education from Austin Peay State in 1973.

Ninth Season at Florida State

Leading a team to NCAA tournament appearances in consecutive seasons is no simple task, but that is exactly what Stan Jones has done at Florida State in the past two seasons. Now entering his ninth season as the associate head coach for the Seminoles, Jones has used his nationally-recognized recruiting expertise to bring in highly ranked players, and over 20 years of coaching knowledge and experience to create a foundation for immediate and future success. In returning the Florida State program to national prominence, Jones has helped the team earn two tournament victories in the Global Sports Classic and the prestigious Old Spice Classic. In perhaps the most competitive conference in all of college basketball, Jones has led Florida State to the third best record in the ACC in the last three seasons, and in 2009 led the Seminoles to their first ever ACC tournament championship game appearance.

NATIONAL RECOGNITION

As one of the top coaches in all of college basketball, Jones has been recognized several times for his achievements. As recently as 2009, he was selected as part of the elite group of assistant coaches from the input of more than 450 head and assistant coaches from around the nation. In 2008, FoxSports.com named Jones one of the top 20 assistant basketball coaches in the country. As proof of his enduring success, in 2004, he was recognized as one of the top coaches in the country by Rivals.com.

TEAM SINCE JOINING

Since joining the Florida State coaching staff, Jones has helped produce results on the court that haven't been realized in years. In his tenure, the Seminoles have now made two consecutive NCAA appearances for the first time since the 1992 and 1993 seasons, appeared in the ACC championship game for the first time in school history, won at least 19 games in six of his eight seasons and at least 20 games in four of eight seasons, and have won 15 more conference games than the eight years prior to him taking the job at FSU. Since joining the team in 2002, the Seminoles have averaged over 19 wins per season and have advanced to postseason play in all but two years of his tenure.

RECRUITING

In eight years of coaching at Florida State, Jones has put his recruiting prowess on display, having brought in 17 National Top 100 recruits. The 2008 and 2009 classes that he worked to bring in are considered to be some of the best in school history and figure to pave the way for success in the near future for the Seminoles' program. In 2010, Jones helped build even further upon that success by hauling in another top class, which consisted of two top players, rated #18 and #55 by Scout.com, and a top junior college player.

ALL SELECTIONS

Since joining the ACC, Florida State has produced four first team all-conference selections, and

Jones has helped produce three of them – Tim Pickett, Al Thornton and Toney Douglas. In total, he has seen six all conference selections under his tutelage, with two second team All-ACC selections and a third team All-ACC selection on top of the three first team selections.

DRAFT PICKS

Jones has now coached seven NBA draft choices in his eight years at Florida State. With their second round selections in the 2010 NBA draft, Solomon Alabi and Ryan Reid became the first Seminole duo to be drafted in the same year since Doug Edwards and Sam Cassell were both chosen as first round selections in 1993. Thornton was only the second NBA Draft Lottery selection in school history as he enjoyed one of the top all-around seasons in school history in 2007. Douglas was the ACC Player of the Year runner-up as a senior and was drafted by the Los Angeles Lakers in 2009. Pickett, who earned All-America Honorable mention and All-ACC First-Team selection during his two-year career at Florida State, was a second round pick of the New Orleans Hornets in 2004, while Von Wafer was a second round pick of the Los Angeles Lakers in 2005. Alexander Johnson was an All-ACC pick and was selected in the second round of the 2006 NBA draft by the Indiana Pacers. The Seminoles were one of only two ACC teams to have at least one player drafted each year from 2004-07, and in 2010 were one of two ACC teams (Georgia Tech) to have two players selected in the same draft.

ALABI

In 2009, Jones helped sophomore center Solomon Alabi achieve all conference status as a third teamer, after earning Freshman All-America Honorable Mention and All-ACC Freshman honors the previous year. Jones was largely responsible for the development of the two-time defending ACC leading shot blocker. The 7-footer came from Nigeria to Tallahassee with seemingly limitless potential and Jones helped Alabi reach that potential in only his first full year of action, en route to earning All-ACC defensive team honors and

becoming only the seventh freshman in league history to lead the conference in blocked shots with 73. Then, in his second full season of action, Jones helped the center reach even greater heights by improving in nearly every category including rebounds per game (5.6 to 6.2), points per game (8.4 to 11.7), blocked shots (73 to 75), and free throw percentage (.680 to .794) – the last three of which Alabi was the team leader. Alabi's development, especially defensively, helped him to become yet another of the NBA draft picks tutored by Jones.

AL THORNTON

Jones is also largely credited with the development of 2007 NBA Lottery Draft pick Al Thornton, who came to Florida State as a little known freshman in 2004 and finished his career as one of the top players in school history. After averaging just 2.8 points and 7.9 minutes played as a freshman, Thornton left Florida State for the NBA as an All-America Third Team and All-ACC First Team selection, the runner-up ACC Player of the Year and the eighth-leading all-time scorer in Seminole basketball history. Thornton was named to the NBA All-Rookie Team in his first professional season. Jones's coaching talents have also been extolled for his work with Tim Pickett, who came to Florida State as a junior college transfer and left as a First Team All-ACC selection and an NBA Draft pick.

FSU YEAR RECORD IMPROVEMENT

Since joining the Florida State bench, the Seminoles have realized marked improvement in play, seen clearly through the teams' record. From the 2006 to 2010 seasons, the Seminoles experienced more 20-win seasons (four) than in the previous 14 seasons (three), and the teams' 20 wins in 2006 marked the first time in a decade that a Florida State team had reached that milestone. The Seminoles 25 wins in 2009 represented the first time since 1993 the team had won that many games, and became only the third time in school history (1972, 1993) the team had managed that feat. Jones impact can be seen on the teams win-

ning percentage, as the Seminoles .651 winning percentage between 2006 and 2010 stands as the highest five-year winning percentage since they averaged .663 between 1989 and 1993.

FSU TEAM STAT IMPROVEMENT

Not only has Jones helped the Seminoles improve their win-loss record, but he has also helped the team become nationally renowned in multiple statistical categories. In 2010, Florida State ranked among the top-25 nationally in four separate categories (1st in field goal percentage defense, 10th in blocks per game, 19th in scoring defense and 25th in rebounding margin), while ranking in the top-50 nationally in two other categories (29th in steals per game and 49th in scoring margin). Florida State's No. 1 ranking in field goal percentage defense marks the first time in school history that the team has ranked first nationally in any category, and the second time in Jones' coaching career, as he led Miami to a No. 1 national ranking in field goal percentage defense in 1998.

WINS OVER RANKED TEAMS

With Jones coaching the Seminoles, the team has been able to produce on the biggest of stages. In his time at Florida State, Jones has led the team to 17 wins against teams ranked in the AP Poll, for an average of over two wins per season versus such teams. As part of the Seminoles recent successful stretch in the ACC, in which they finished fourth in 2009 and third in 2010 in the conference, Jones has also watched his team earn five wins against ranked ACC teams in that span.

FSU CONFERENCE

In Jones' tenure at FSU, the Seminoles have experienced great success in one of the most competitive conferences in all of college basketball. In his eight seasons at Florida State, Jones has helped coach the team to 57 ACC wins (7.125 per season), which is a stark improvement over the 47 conference wins recorded in the previous nine seasons (5.222 per season). In the past two seasons, the Seminoles have recorded double digit ACC wins (10 each) for the first time since Florida State's first two years as members of the conference. After finishing fourth in the ACC in 2009 – the teams' best finish since 1993, when they finished second – Jones helped build upon that success by coaching the Seminoles to a third place league finish in 2010.

FSU POSTSEASON

In 2009, Jones helped the Seminoles return to the NCAA tournament – a position the team had not been in for over a decade. The No. 5 seed in the tournament was also the highest seed earned by Florida State since the 1992-93 season, which earned a No. 3 seed. Then again in 2010, Jones helped the team reach the NCAA tournament, marking the first time since the 1992-93 seasons that the Seminoles have accomplished that feat. Jones has also coached the team to four bids to the NIT tournament, compiling a 4-4 record in NIT games. He also helped Florida State reach the ACC Championship game in 2009 for the first time in school history after defeating the top ranked

and eventual National Champion, North Carolina in the Semifinal game.

POSTSEASON + DRAFT

In his 14 years as a coach at the collegiate level, Jones has helped 11 different teams into postseason play including six into the NCAA tournament. He has also recruited and coached 12 different NBA Draft selections, including four first round picks.

TOP RECRUITING CLASSES


Florida State's vastly improved play in the last seven seasons has coincided with Jones's arrival and tireless recruiting efforts for the Seminole basketball program. His recruiting knowledge and effort has helped attract the nation's top talent to Tallahassee. Jones helped attract seven top-20 ranked recruiting classes to play for Florida State, including the nation's No. 1 ranked class in 2003. Four different college basketball outlets – Rivals.com, the Official College Sports Network, Hoopmasters.com and the Louisville Courier Journal – ranked the Seminoles' recruiting class as the nation's best. It marked the first time in Seminole basketball history that the team had recruited the nation's top ranked class. In recent years, Jones has utilized his recruiting expertise to build a foundation for the future of Seminole basketball, drawing in multiple top ranked classes. According to ESPN.com, the teams' recruiting haul ranked No. 10 in 2008 and No. 16 in 2010, while Scout.com ranks the 2008 class No. 14, the 2009 class No. 24 and the 2010 class No. 20. Not only have his classes been ranked highly, but so have the players recruited as part of them. Since 2007, Jones has helped recruit three McDonald's All-American's (Solomon Alabi in 2007, Chris Singleton in 2008 and Michael Snaer in 2009).

CAREER NCAA TOURNAMENT

Jones has coached six teams and three programs in the NCAA tournament in his 14 years as a coach in the collegiate ranks. Jones led Florida State to the NCAA tournament in consecutive seasons (2009 and 2010) helped coach Miami into the NCAA Tournament during three consecutive seasons (1998-2000) and coached Mississippi State into the NCAA Tournament during the 2002 season. In all three instances, Jones helped the three programs return to the NCAA tournament after lengthy absences. Florida State earned a No. 5 seed in 2009 and a No. 9 seed in 2010, marking the first time the Seminoles reached the NCAA Tournament in ten years, and the first time the team had made the tournament in consecutive seasons in 17 years. In 1998, the Hurricanes made their first tournament appearance since reviving the program in 1985 and had not been to the Tournament since 1960. Mississippi State, which also won the Southeastern Conference Tournament championship in 2002, had not been to the NCAA Tournament since 1996, a span of six years.

MISS ST.

Jones helped lead Mississippi State to a school-best No. 3 seed in the 2002 NCAA tournament. The Bulldogs also captured the school's second



SEC tournament championship with victories over No. 11-ranked Florida and No. 8-ranked Alabama in the title game. That year MSU also recorded the school record for most wins in a single season with 27.

WIZARDS

Jones was also an assistant coach to Leonard Hamilton with the Washington Wizards in 2001.

MIAMI

Jones began his collegiate assistant coaching career at Miami under Hamilton in 1996. During his career at Miami, he helped guide the Hurricanes to a 95-54 record for a .638 winning percentage. The 95 wins (19.0 wins per season) were the most in a five-year period for the program since the 1959 through 1964 seasons. Miami won 23 games in both 1999 and 2000 to mark only the third time in program history (and first time since 1964) that the program had won at least 20 games in consecutive seasons.

MIAMI POSTSEASON

In his final four seasons at Miami, Jones helped guide the Hurricanes to four postseason tournament appearances, a regular season Big East championship and the school's first ever NCAA Tournament "Sweet 16" appearance in 2000. Miami tied the school record, winning 23 games in 1999 on its way to the school's first ever top-10 national ranking. The Hurricanes were ranked No. 10 in the season ending Associated Press poll.

PERSONAL

The 50 year old Jones is married to the former Olga Campos. The couple has a daughter, Shannon (28), a son, Adam (26) and a son-in-law Kass Botini. Shannon and Kass welcomed the family's first grandchild, Kaleb, into the world right after the Seminoles' run in the ACC Tournament championship game and the NCAA Tournament in March of 2009.

Fifth Season at Florida State**

Andy Enfield left the NBA coaching ranks with the goal of helping elevate the Florida State basketball program to national prominence. He has certainly succeeded. In only four seasons as an assistant coach in Tallahassee, Enfield has led the Seminoles to two NCAA Tournament appearances and the first ACC championship game appearance in school history. In addition to those successes, Enfield has also immensely boosted Florida State's recruiting efforts, having drawn three top 25 classes and two McDonald's All-Americans to Tallahassee.

TEAM SINCE JOINING

Since joining the Florida State bench in 2006, Enfield has led the program to new heights, as the Seminoles made their first ever ACC championship game appearance under his watch in 2009. That same season, the Seminoles returned to the NCAA Tournament after an 11 year absence, and finished the season ranked No. 16 in the final AP poll – the highest ranking to end a season since 1989, when the team also finished 16th after an NCAA Tournament appearance. Enfield's ability to recruit and develop players has paid off for Florida State, as in 2010 the team made a return trip to the NCAA Tournament, marking the first time in 17 years a Seminole team had competed in NCAA Tournament in consecutive seasons. Additionally, the Seminoles have won at least 22 games in three of his four seasons on staff. In the always competitive ACC, Florida State has won at least 10 conference games in consecutive seasons for the first time since the teams' first two years in the ACC (1992-93). The Seminoles have won the second highest amount of ACC games in the last two seasons.

TEAM STATISTICAL IMPROVEMENT

Under Enfield's guidance, in 2010, Florida State ranked among the top-25 nationally in four distinct categories (1st in field goal percentage defense, 10th in blocks per game, 19th in scoring defense and 25th in rebounding margin), while ranking in the top-50 nationally in two other categories (29th in steals per game and 49th in scoring margin). Florida State's No. 1 ranking in field goal percentage defense marks the first time in school history that the team has ranked first nationally in any category.

RECRUITING

Enfield's recruiting successes led him to be named as the most visible assistant coach in the nation by Basketball Times for the 2009 recruiting period. His unique NBA experience and proven ability to help players improve at multiple levels makes Florida State an attractive destination for future Seminoles. He has helped recruit ten

national Top 100 high school players including two McDonald's All-Americans, and had a vital role in helping the Seminoles land a nationally ranked Top 10 recruiting class in 2008. In his most recent recruiting class, Enfield helped draw two more Top 40 players including point guard and No. 21 overall recruit Ian Miller and No. 36 ranked Okaro White. In Enfield's time as an assistant coach at Florida State, he has overseen the recruiting of three Top-25 recruiting classes including No. 9 in 2008, No. 24 in 2009 and No. 16 in 2010.

MICHAEL SNAER

Michael Snaer came to Florida State as a top-flight recruit, earning McDonald's All-American honors as a senior in high school and a national recruiting ranking as high as No. 11 overall in the nation. Having helped recruit him to Tallahassee, Enfield was obviously set on turning Snaer into a productive college player, and he did just that, as Snaer earned All-ACC freshman honors in 2010.

IMPACT ON TEAMS

The fifth-year assistant coach has been nationally recognized for his ability to teach the finer points of basketball – particularly on the offensive end. His players have shown remarkable improvement in their shooting percentages, technique and offensive efficiency as the program has gained national prominence during his tenure.

COACHING ACCOLADES

Enfield's success at Florida State was recognized by the editors of ESPN The Magazine during the 2008-09 season when he was featured as one of five super assistant coaches in college basketball.

FREE THROW SHOOTING

Florida State has become one of the top free throw shooting teams in the nation since Enfield's arrival at Florida State. The Seminoles have set the school record for team free throw shooting percentage twice in his four seasons, including the current mark of .773 in 2008. Florida State ranked fifth in the nation in 2008 and ninth

in 2007 in the category. In Enfield's first three seasons on the job in Tallahassee, the Seminoles were the eighth best free throw shooting team in the nation. Under Enfield's watchful shooting eye, former Seminole post players 6'9 Uche Echefu and 7'1 Solomon Alabi improved their free throw shooting percentages from just over 50 percent as freshman to better than 80 percent at the conclusion of their careers. Uchefu led the ACC in free throw shooting in conference games as a senior with a 90.9 percent mark while Alabi ranked in the ACC's top 10 by shooting 80 percent from the free throw line.

TONY DOUGLAS

Enfield worked closely with All-American and All-ACC First Team selection Toney Douglas throughout his three-year career at Florida State. The two arrived at Florida State in 2006 (Douglas red-shirted his first year in Tallahassee) and Enfield helped Douglas lead the ACC in scoring with a 21.5 points per game average as a senior. He shot a career-high 38.5 percent from the 3-point line as a senior in 2009. Douglas finished his career with 1,655 points in three seasons which ranks as the fifth-highest career point total and is the most ever by a player who only played three years at Florida State. Enfield improved Douglas' scoring productivity each year in Tallahassee as the guard averaged 12.7 points per game as a sophomore and 15.4 points per game as a junior before winning the conference scoring title in his last year with a 21.5 points per game scoring average. In his final season as a Seminole, Douglas finished runner up in ACC Player of the Year voting and won ACC Defensive Player of the Year honors. Douglas was drafted in the first round of the 2009 NBA Draft by the Los Angeles Lakers.

THORNTON/ECHEFU

Enfield also played a big role in the offensive breakout of Al Thornton during his senior season at Florida State. Thornton shot a career-high .530 from the field (fifth in the ACC), a career-high .790 from the free throw line (seventh in the ACC) and a career-high .444 from the 3-point line in averag-

ing a career-high and ACC leading 19.7 points per game. Thornton was an All-America Third-Team and All-ACC First-Team selection and finished as the runner-up for the prestigious ACC Player of the Year award. Thornton was named to the NBA All-Rookie First-Team in his first professional season. Additionally, Enfield worked with Uche Echefu who realized one of the most remarkable free throw shooting percentage improvements during his career as a Seminole. As a freshman he shot 54.5 percent from the line; with Enfield's tutoring, he raised his shooting percentage to 84.8 percent as senior and led the ACC with an incredible 90.9 percent mark from the line in conference play.

NBA EXPERIENCE

Prior to joining the Seminole staff and Leonard Hamilton, Enfield was an assistant coach for the Boston Celtics and the Milwaukee Bucks and was a consultant for numerous other NBA teams.

BOSTON CELTICS

Enfield was an assistant coach with the Boston Celtics of the NBA from 1998-2000 - a time during which he worked with head coach Rick Pitino in building the franchise into a play-off contending team. While in Boston, Enfield worked closely with five-time All-Star Paul Pierce, the Celtics first round draft choice in 1998. Pierce was named to the NBA All-Rookie team as he averaged 16.5 points and 6.4 rebounds. With Enfield on the staff during the 1999-2000 season, the Celtics were the most improved free throw shooting team in the league.

MILWAUKEE BUCKS


Enfield also worked as an assistant with the Milwaukee Bucks from 1994-96 as they, too, drafted well and began a growth period that helped the franchise return to the playoffs. During his first season in Milwaukee, the team showed a 14-game improvement from the previous season and found itself in the hunt for a spot in the playoffs until late in the season. Enfield tutored Glenn Robinson (the No. 1 overall selection in the 1994 NBA Draft) and four-time All-Star forward Vin Baker. Robinson averaged 21.9 points and Baker 17.7 as they formed one of the highest scoring and best shooting duos in the league that season.

ALL-NET BASKETBALL/CLINICS

Enfield is the president of All Net Basketball, one of the top basketball instructional programs in the United States. He has coached over 100 NBA players on shooting and offensive development. He was a guest clinician on the topic of shooting at the NABC Coaches' Clinic at the 1998 and 2005 NCAA Final Fours. He has been hired as a coaching consultant for NBA teams such as the Chicago Bulls and Washington Wizards as well as numerous college basketball programs across the country. He has also been an invited clinician for basketball programs overseas and professional teams as far away as China.

PLAYING RECORDS

Enfield set the all-time NCAA career free-throw percentage record with a mark of 92.5% (431 of 466). He still holds nine career records at Johns



Hopkins and was inducted into the school's Athletic Hall of Fame in 2001. His 2,025 career points are nearly 500 more than any other player has scored for the Blue Jays. Enfield led his team in scoring during all four seasons of his playing career and also holds the two highest single-season point totals in school history, with 606 points in 1990 and 610 points in 1991.

ACADEMIC ACCOLADES

Enfield's accomplishments in the classroom were just as impressive as his exploits on the basketball court at Hopkins as he earned First Team GTE Academic All-America honors as a senior and second team honors as a junior. He was the first basketball player at Johns Hopkins to earn an NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship and was named the scholar-athlete of the year by the NABC in 1991.

BUSINESS SUCCESS

Enfield relied on his educational and business

background to help develop TractManager, Inc. into the most successful document imaging and contract management company within the Health-care and Real Estate markets. As part of the initial investment group and one of three key executives in the start up company, Enfield helped transform TractManager, Inc. into a very successful and profitable company.

EDUCATION

Enfield earned his bachelor's degree in economics from Johns Hopkins in 1991 and a master's degree in business administration from the University of Maryland in 1994. He earned a 3.5 grade point average as an undergraduate.

PERSONAL

Enfield and his wife Amanda, have two daughters: Aila (4) and Lily (3).

COREY WILLIAMS

ASSISTANT COACH

Oklahoma State, 1992

Fourth Season at Florida State

As a player in college, Corey Williams helped his team make two consecutive NCAA tournament appearances. In only three seasons as an assistant coach at Florida State, he has already led the Seminoles to the NCAA Tournament twice. A premier recruiter, Williams has helped bring two McDonald's All-Americans to Tallahassee – Chris Singleton and Michael Snaer – and multiple other top-ranked recruits as well. Having coached for ten years, Williams' extensive coaching knowledge and recruiting expertise have helped bring Florida State's program to the forefront of college basketballs elite.

ACC SINCE JOINING

Since joining the Florida State bench in 2008, Williams has helped produce teams that have risen to the top of perhaps the most prolific conference in all of college basketball. In the past three seasons, the Seminoles have compiled the third best record of any ACC team (66-35 overall, 27-21 in conference) and in 2009, beat No. 1 North Carolina in the ACC tournament en route to their first ever ACC championship game appearance.

TEAM SINCE JOINING

In his three seasons on staff, Williams has helped restore a winning tradition to the Seminoles program. Through his leadership, the Seminoles have now made consecutive NCAA tournament appearances for the first time in 17 years, appeared in the ACC championship game for the first time ever in school history, won at least 10 conference games in consecutive seasons for the first time since the inaugural two years in the ACC, won at least 22 games in two of his three seasons and averaged a winning percentage of .653 – the best three year team winning percentage since the Seminoles posted a .686 mark between the 1991-93 seasons.

FSU POSTSEASON

In 2009, Williams' second year on the Seminole staff, he led Florida State to defeat the top ranked and eventual National Champion, North Carolina in the ACC tournament semifinal game en route to the schools' first ever ACC Championship game appearance. To cap off the special season that was 2009, Williams returned the Seminoles to the NCAA tournament after an 11-year absence. The No. 5 seed awarded in the NCAA tournament was also the highest seed earned by a Florida State team since earning a No. 3 seed in the 1993 season. In 2010, Williams proved his previous seasons' work to be no fluke as he again helped the Seminoles reach the NCAA Tournament, marking the first time since 1992-93 that Florida State had made consecutive tournament appearances. Williams also coached the Seminoles to an NIT tournament bid in his first season as an assistant coach.

FSU TOURNAMENTS AND VS RANKED

In only three seasons on Hamilton's staff, Williams has helped the Seminoles earn two tournament victories in the Global Sports Classic and the esteemed Old Spice Classic, in which Florida State defeated Iona, Alabama and Marquette en route to the tournament crown. Williams also helped lead the Seminoles to seven wins against ranked teams in that time, for an average of 2.33 wins against such teams per season. Two of those wins have been against top-10 ranked teams, including defeating No. 1 North Carolina in the 2009 ACC tournament semifinals game.

FSU TEAM IMPROVEMENT

Williams has had a profound impact on the Seminoles' success since his arrival, as indicated by win-loss record and statistical improvement. In the last three years since Williams arrived, the team has averaged 22 wins per season as opposed to 18 wins in the three years prior to his arrival. In that three year span of conference play, the improvement has been remarkable, as the Seminoles have gone 27-21 in the ACC with Williams on staff, while they went 20-28 in the three years before he arrived in Tallahassee. In fact, the team has won more conference games (27) in Williams' three year tenure than they did in the four years prior to his arrival (26). In 2010, Florida State ranked among the top-25 nationally in four separate categories (1st in field goal percentage defense, 10th in blocks per game, 19th in scoring defense and 25th in rebounding margin), while ranking in the top-50 nationally in two other categories (29th in steals per game and 49th in scoring margin). Florida State's No. 1 ranking in field goal percentage defense marks the first time in school history that the team has ranked first nationally in any category, and the first time in Williams' 10-year coaching career than he has helped a team accomplish this feat.

RECRUITING

Nationally renowned as a great recruiter, Williams has managed to do nothing but impress in that regard in his time at Florida State. As one of the

primary recruiters of 2010, No. 18 national recruit Ian Miller, Williams helped pull a class in 2010 that ranks as high as No. 16 nationally and also includes No. 36 ranked recruit, Okaro White. In 2009, Williams helped recruit two more highly rated players, including McDonald's All-American and No. 11 nationally ranked Michael Snaer. In addition, Williams helped assemble the Seminoles' 2008 recruiting class, which is considered to be one of the best in school history. After only one year on Leonard Hamilton's staff, he helped the Seminoles land one of the top groups of recruits in school history – one that was ranked as high as No. 8 in the nation and No. 3 in the ACC. Florida State's 2008 recruiting class contains two top 75 players and two more who were rated in the top 15 in the nation at their positions.

WORKING WITH THE GUARDS

A former teammate of Michael Jordan, Williams has utilized his basketball knowledge and helped develop the Seminoles backcourt during his first three seasons in Tallahassee. Under Williams' tutelage, FSU's point guards improved their assist totals drastically between the 2009 and 2010 seasons, with Derwin Kitchen nearly doubling his 2009 total of 65 to 122 in 2010, and Luke Loucks increasing his 2009 total of 73 to 90 in 2010. On top of the point guard play, Williams also helped McDonald's All-American Michael Snaer earn All-ACC freshman honors in 2010 as he averaged 8.8 points (third on the team) and shot .348 from three point range (third on the team). He also worked closely with All-American, ACC Defensive Player of the Year and All-ACC First Team selection Toney Douglas. Douglas graduated Florida State as one of the ACC's most decorated guards, leading the conference in steals in 2008, in scoring in 2009, earning ACC Defensive Player of the Year honors as a senior and was the ACC Player of the Year runner-up. Douglas also steadily increased his minutes, assist:turnover ratio, and rebounding numbers under Williams. Douglas was drafted in the first round of the 2009 NBA First-Year Player Draft by the Los Angeles Lakers.

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WHAT WILLIAMS BRINGS TO FSU

Williams was an assistant coach at Oral Roberts from 2000-07 and a player under Leonard Hamilton at Oklahoma State during his playing career from 1989-1992. He had returned to his alma mater for a short period of time before joining the Florida State coaching staff in June of 2007. Williams brings a wealth of recruiting success and very deep recruiting roots with him to the Seminoles' program.

COACH/PLAYER

An NBA champion, Williams helped lead Oral Roberts to a pair of NCAA Tournament appearances as a coach and led Oklahoma State to consecutive NCAA Tournament Sweet 16 appearances as a player.

ORAL ROBERTS

Williams was an assistant coach for eight seasons at Oral Roberts, where he helped lead the Golden Eagles to an average of 18 wins per season, including 20 or more wins in each of the last three seasons, and appearances in the NCAA Tournament in each of the last two seasons. Oral Roberts finished with a 23-11 record and won the Mid-Continent Conference Tournament championship in 2007. Among its 23 wins during the 2007 season was a victory over No. 3 Kansas on the road at Allen Fieldhouse in Lawrence, Kan.

ORAL ROBERTS RECRUITING

As Oral Roberts' chief recruiter during his tenure there, Williams is credited with assembling the recruiting classes that allowed the Golden Eagles to become one of the top teams in the nation. Among the players he is credited with recruiting are Caleb Green, a two-time All-American and the first three-time Player of the Year in the Mid-Continent Conference, and 2006 Mid-Continent Tournament Most Valuable Player Ken Tutt. Williams helped attract a majority of the players that dotted the Golden Eagle's roster and the Mid-Continent All-League teams.

WILLIAMS AT OKLAHOMA STATE

Williams played collegiately at Oklahoma State from 1989-1992. He is the 15th all-time leading scorer in school history with 1,320 career points. Williams played two seasons under Hamilton at Oklahoma State and helped lead the Cowboys to consecutive NCAA Tournament Sweet 16 appearances under Eddie Sutton in 1991 and 1992. The Cowboys were ranked 14th in the final Associated Press poll of the 1991 season and 10th in the final coaches' poll following the 1992 season.

WILLIAMS PLAY DURING CAREER

With Williams in Oklahoma State's line-up for 128 games during his four-year varsity career, the Cowboys ranked as one of the top teams statistically in the nation. The Cowboys ranked fourth nationally in scoring defense in 1992, 12th in the nation in average margin of victory in both 1991 and 1992 and 20th in the nation in winning percentage in 1992. He scored 1,320 career points and averaged 10.3 points and 3.2 rebounds in leading his team to winning records in his final two seasons.



OKLAHOMA STATE PLAY DURING CAREER

Oklahoma State went to four consecutive post-season tournaments (two NIT and two NCAA tournaments) and averaged 21.5 victories per season during his career. The Cowboys finished 24-8 and 10-4 in the Big 8 in 1991 and 28-8 and 8-6 in conference play in 1992. Oklahoma State was ranked as high as No. 2 in the nation and defeated five nationally ranked teams during the 1992 season. They earned victories over No. 3 Missouri and No. 2 Kansas on their way to the Sweet 16 in 1992.

NFL DRAFT

Williams was drafted by both the Chicago Bulls of the NBA and the Kansas City Chiefs of the NFL. He was drafted by the Chiefs despite the fact that he had not played football since junior high.

PLAYING CAREER

Williams chose basketball over football and spent two very productive years with the Bulls. While a member of the Bulls in 1992-93, Williams helped Chicago win its third straight NBA Championship. He also played with the Minnesota Timberwolves during his NBA career. Williams spent the majority of the 1994 season with the Oklahoma City Cavalry of the Continental Basketball Association. He returned to Oklahoma State as a student assistant in 1994 and was a member of the Cowboys' staff during their 1994 Final Four season. Williams played professionally overseas in Taiwan, from 1995-98.

PERSONAL

Williams, 40, earned his bachelor's degree in education from Oklahoma State in 1992. He and his wife Nicole have two children: Jourdan (11) and Corey, Jr. (7).

Jacob Ridenhour, director of operations, has 16 years of collegiate experience and a relentless work ethic. He brings knowledge in marketing, management, and community service. Ridenhour played an instrumental role in creating and direction the FSU Basketball Camps.

At Florida State, Ridenhour responsibilities

include management of the program, office and team fiscal matters, all aspects of travel, academic development, contracts and team community service projects. He is the primary liaison with University and Athletic Administration, educators, fan groups and schools. Ridenhour is also director of the Florida State Basketball Camps; his responsibilities include organizing, marketing, and operating the camps. Ridenhour has created and instituted the highly successful Florida State Team Camp with over 75 teams participating annually including multiple state champions from the southeast - the largest of its kind at Florida State, and brought in annual sessions of the prestigious Five-Star Basketball Camp to Tallahassee, both providing significant economic and financial impact to the Tallahassee community.

Ridenhour has been integrally involved in the inner workings of two major Division I basketball programs for nearly 16 years. He began his career at Auburn as a team manager in 1993. He later served as the administrative assistant and director of operations at Auburn University for Cliff Ellis, the former Head Coach at Auburn and Clemson, where he created and administered a \$2.5 million budget and was primary contact to University Administration pertaining to the basketball team as well as overseeing player development. Ridenhour was the director of the highly successful Auburn Basketball Camp program from 1996-04.

While at Auburn, Ridenhour was instrumental in the building of the Auburn program, reaching post season play 6 out of his 8 years and two trips to the NCAA Sweet Sixteen including an SEC Championship. He was involved in the fundraising, marketing and management of the Auburn Basketball brand. He was also responsible for the design and development of the Auburn Basketball Museum and was instrumental in the redesign of the office and locker room renovations.

Prior to joining the Seminoles in the summer of 2005, Ridenhour participated in the Basketball Without Borders and traveled with the NBA to Dakar, Senegal and Johannesburg, South Africa. He co-directed the Island Shootout in Nassau, Bahamas in 2004 and 2005.

A native of Salisbury, North Carolina, Ridenhour received his Bachelor's degree in education from Auburn in 1995 and his Master's degree in Sport Administration from Florida State in 2007.

Sam Lunt, the Head Trainer of the men's basketball team, responsibilities revolve around the athletic department's sports medicine and medical operations. This year marks his 27th season with the Seminoles and throughout these seasons he has been the associate director of sports medicine. Lunt oversees the team's medical

needs, maintains all emergency action plans and is in charge of purchasing for the sports medicine department, as well as continues to teach courses in sports medicine curriculum.

Lunt began working with the men's basketball team in 1988 and is the longest tenured member of the Florida State basketball staff. The Seminoles have appeared in six NCAA Tournaments, four NIT tournaments and won the 1991 Metro Conference tournament with Lunt on the sidelines. He has been the trainer for both of Florida State's NBA Draft Lottery selections: Al Thornton in 2007 and George McCloud in 1989 and worked extensively with Toney Douglas who was selected in the first round of the 2009 NBA Draft.

Lunt came to Florida State in 1983 after receiving his bachelor's degree in athletic training from the University of Miami. While at Miami, he worked as a student trainer in the Hurricane athletic department and served as an assistant trainer with the Miami Dolphins of the NFL during the summer of 1982. As a graduate assistant at Florida State, Lunt worked with the Seminole football team while earning his master's degree in sports psychology. During the 1985 spring football season, he worked for the Jacksonville Bulls of the USFL.

Lunt was a member of the training staff at the 1989 World University Games in Duisburg, Germany, the 1987 U.S. Olympic Festival and 1991 AAU Junior Olympics that were held in Tallahassee.

Lunt was named the Professional Outreach Athletic Trainer of the Year by the Athletic Trainers' Association of Florida in 2004. He became the first recipient of the award given by the ATAF to the trainer who has done their best to advance the profession and the association.

Lunt, 49, is married to the former Agnes Bundick. The couple has three children: Ryan, (13) and 10-year old twins, Sean and Erin. He is a certified member of the National Athletic Trainers Association

Along with Head Coach Leonard Hamilton, Bradley brings knowledge and immense energy in maintaining high performance levels in the weight room. He has commitment

and dedication with the basketball team in the Basketball Training Facility which keeps the Seminoles as an elite Division 1 Program.

Bradley helped the Seminoles reach the 2009 NCAA Tournament (for the first time since 1998) and the championship game of the ACC Tournament for the first time in school history.

Bradley designed and equipped the state-of-the-art weight room in the Seminoles' Basketball Training Facility that opened in 2002. The weight room is considered to be one of the best and most complete in all of Division I sports.

Bradley also worked at the University of Miami under Hamilton from 1995-98 where he worked with eight teams, which included one NCAA Tournament and one NIT appearance by the men's basketball team.

Bradley came to Florida State from Stanford where the athletes he worked with achieved tremendous success in the weight room and on the field. At Stanford, Bradley worked directly with the men's basketball, men's swimming and field hockey teams. In addition, he assisted with the strength and conditioning efforts for the nationally ranked football, women's basketball, women's swimming and softball teams. During his four-year tenure at Stanford, the Cardinal won the Sears' Directors' Cup as the nation's top overall program in Division I athletics four times.

Stanford played in the NCAA Tournament each of the four years Bradley worked with the men's basketball team. In 2002, the Cardinal was 31-3 and led the nation in victories. He has also worked at the U.S. Military Academy (1994-95), South Carolina (1993-94), and Southern Methodist (1990-93) and was an assistant football coach at UC Santa Barbara (1989-90).

Bradley has worked with five postseason tournament teams in his first seven seasons and five NBA Draft selections (Tim Pickett, Von Wafer, Alexander Johnson, Al Thornton and Toney Douglas) during his first seven years at Florida State.



Derwin Kitchen is one of the top returning guards in the ACC for 2010-11 season who has been a starting guard on two NCAA Tournament teams, one ACC Tournament championship game team and who has started 48 career games entering his senior season as a Seminole. He is one of only four returning guards in the ACC (also Larry Drew III of North Carolina and Biko Paris and Reggie Jackson of Boston College) who ranked in the top 10 in both assists and assist:turnover ratio during the 2008-09 season. Kitchen earned a career-high 1.8:1 assist:turnover ratio (seventh in the ACC) and averaged a career-low 3.9 assists per game (10th) as he ranked among the leagues top guards as a junior. He has started 48 of the last 57 games for the Seminoles at one of the guard positions for Florida State the last two seasons including 29 of the last 32 ACC games. Kitchen played in each of the Seminoles' final 26 games of the 2008-09 season, was a starter in 17 of the final 19 games of the year and started 31 of the 31 games he played in as a junior.

AS A JUNIOR (2009-10)

- Averaged a career-high 8.1 points (fifth on the team), a career-high 3.9 assists (first), a career-high 1.5 steals (second) and a career-high 4.9 rebounds (third) as he played in 31 of the Seminoles' 32 games, including all 16 of Florida State's ACC games. He started 31 of the Seminoles' 32 games as he ranked among the team leaders in games played as we tied for third with his career-high 31 starts.
- Was Florida State's starting point guard as the Seminoles advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the second consecutive season and finished in third place in the ACC standings with a 10-6 record. With Kitchen in the starting line-up in the last two seasons, the Seminoles have finished in third and fourth place with identical 10-6 conference marks. The Seminoles have won 20 games and have a winning percentage of nearly 65 percent in the ACC with Kitchen in the starting line-up in the last two seasons.
- In addition to leading the Seminoles to the NCAA Tournament for a second consecutive year, he helped lead Florida State to the championship of the prestigious Old Spice Classic with wins over Iona, Alabama and Marquette.
- Scored his career-high of 29 points as the Seminoles played host to Maryland in Tallahassee (Feb. 4) – his point total was the highest of any Florida State player in a single game during the 2009-10 season.
- Was Florida State's leading scorer in four different games during the season -- 15 at Florida (Nov. 24), 16 vs. Iona (Nov. 26), 29 vs. Maryland; 8 vs. Clemson (Feb. 28) – and the Seminoles were 2-2 in those games.
- An exceptionally strong rebounder for a point guard who led Florida State in rebounding six times as a junior -- 6 vs. Alabama (Nov. 27), 5 vs. Miami (Feb. 6), 8 at Virginia (Feb. 17), 7 vs. Clemson, (Feb. 28), 6 at Miami (March 6,) and 11 vs. NC State (March 12) in the ACC Tournament.
- Enjoyed his best season from the free throw line as he shot a career-high .707 to rank as one of only two Seminoles who shot better than 70 percent from the line for the season.
- With 122 assists and his career-high 3.9 assists per game average, he totaled nearly twice as many assists (122-65) and averaged nearly 1.5 assists more (3.9-2.5) as a junior as compared to his sophomore season. He dished out a career-high 10 assists in two different games – 10 in the Seminoles' victory over Alabama A&M (Dec. 31) and at Duke (Jan. 27). He became the first Seminole point guard to earn 10 assists in a single game since former Seminole guard Nate Johnson earned 10 assists in the Seminoles' 80-67 victory over Iowa on Dec. 2, 2002 in the ACC/Big Ten Challenge. Kitchen's 10 assists against Alabama A&M and Duke allowed him to earn double figures in assists in multiple games in a single season since Delvon Arrington had double digits in assists in four games during the 2001-02 season.
- Biggest shot of his junior season and in the first two seasons of his career came against Boston College in the final minute of the Seminoles' win in Chestnut Hill. He hit a 3-point shot from the left elbow with 44 seconds remaining in the game and the outcome still hanging in the balance. his trifecta made the score 57-54 and allowed the Seminoles to take and hold the lead and win the game. Scored all five of his points for the game the final 44 seconds of the games in the Seminoles' 61-57 lead.
- Helped Florida State rank first in the nation and first in the ACC in field goal percentage defense, as well as first in the ACC in scoring defense.
- Averaged 7.0 points, 7.0 rebounds and 3.0 assists in two games against Boston College. Was Florida State's second leading rebounder against Boston College with 14 total rebounds – only five behind Chris Singleton's team leading 19 rebounds and 9.5 rebounds per game average.
- Averaged 16.5 points, 3.0 rebounds and 2.0 assists in two games against NCAA Tournament participant. He shot .583 from the field, 600 from the 3-point line and was perfect from the free throw line in the two games against Maryland. He scored his career high of 29 points on a career-high 12 made field goals as the Seminoles played host to Maryland in Tallahassee. Totaled a game-high 29 points on 12 made field goals, a perfect three of three shooting from the 3-point line and a perfect two of two shooting from the free throw line as the Seminoles had the game taken from them in a 71-67 loss in Tallahassee.
- Scored 13 points, pulled down seven rebounds, was credited with six assists and earned three steals in the Seminoles only game of the season against NIT participant North Carolina. He was Florida State's third leading scorer, its third leading rebounder and tied for its team high in assists as the Seminoles won at the Dean E,

Smith Center for the first time under head coach Leonard Hamilton.

- Averaged 9.5 points, 6.5 rebounds, 4.0 assists and 2.5 steals in two games against NIT participant NC State and was a perfect four of four from the free throw line in the two games against the Wolfpack. Kitchen scored 15 points and was credited with four assists and three steals as NC State defeated Florida State, 88-81 in Tallahassee. His 15 points allowed him to rank as one of five Seminoles to score in double figures.
- Scored 11 points, pulled down four rebounds, added three assists and one steal in Florida State's only game of the season against NIT participant Virginia Tech. Was seven of 10 from the free throw line as he established career highs for free throws made and free throws attempted

AS A SOPHOMORE (2008-09)

- Averaged 7.9 points (fifth on the team), 4.6 rebounds (fourth), 2.5 assists (third) and 1.2 steals (third) while playing in 26 of the Seminoles' 35 games in his first season as a member of the Florida State basketball team.
- He finished the season as Florida State's fifth highest scorer and with its third highest assist total despite playing in only 26 games.
- Finished third on the team with a 25.7 minutes played per game average and was one of only three players on the team who averaged more than 25 minutes played per game.
- Played the first game of his Seminole career at Georgia State (Dec. 13) when he scored two points in six minutes of play as the Seminoles defeated the Panthers, 62-57. His two points came on two free throws with four seconds left to up Florida State's lead to 62-57 and seal the important road victory for the Seminoles.
- His career-high scoring game of 19 points came in a victory at Virginia Tech (Feb. 21) as his 19 points against the Hokies were one of nine times he scored in double figures in his first season as a Seminole. In addition, 16 points came in his first career ACC game against Duke at home in Tallahassee (Jan. 16) while 11 points came in the Seminoles' ACC Tournament semifinal victory over No. 1 North Carolina.
- The biggest basket of his first season at Florida State came against Georgia Tech in the quarterfinals of the ACC Tournament (March 13). He took an inbounds pass from guard Luke Loucks and made a reverse lay-up to put Florida State ahead, 63-62, was fouled on the play and made the free throw to give the Seminoles their 64-62 margin of victory.
- Scored 14 points, pulled down five rebounds and was credited with three assists in the Seminoles' only game of the 2008-09 season against NCAA Tournament participant Boston College. His 14 points ranked as his second highest scoring total against an ACC opponent during his first season as a Seminole.

in the Seminoles' 63-58 win in Tallahassee (Jan. 16). He played big from the free throw line late in the game as Virginia Tech closed as much as a 14 point Florida State lead to as little as two. The win by the Seminoles in January over the Hokies in the fourth ACC game of the season allowed the Seminoles to earn the first tiebreaker over Virginia Tech to earn the third seed in the ACC Tournament to mark the second consecutive season the Seminoles have earned a top four seed and a bye in the first round of the conference championship tournament.

- Totaled seven points, five assists, four rebounds and four steals in the Seminoles' game against Gonzaga in the NCAA Tournament.
- Averaged 12.7 points, 4.7 rebounds and 3.0 assists in helping lead the Seminoles to the

assists in two games against NCAA Tournament participant Clemson. He scored one point, pulled down four rebounds, earned one steal and one assist in the Seminoles' monumental, season-changing, come-from-behind victory over No. 10/10 Clemson, 65-61, on the road in Clemson, S.C. (Feb. 7). The Seminoles trailed by as many as 19 in the second half but rallied to win the game.

- Made his ACC debut against Duke with a 16-point, five rebound and five steal performance against the Blue Devils in Tallahassee (Jan. 10).

He totaled eight points, three rebounds and five assists in the Seminoles' 64-62 victory over Georgia Tech in the quarterfinals of the ACC Tournament.
- Averaged 7.5 points, 6.0 rebounds and 4.0 assists in two games against ACC regular season champion and NCAA National Champion North Carolina. After falling to the Tar Heels by three points on a buzzer beater in Tallahassee the Seminoles defeated the No. 1 ranked Tar Heels in the semifinals of the ACC Tournament. The victory over the Tar Heels in the ACC tournament was the third ever over the nation's No. 1 ranked team in school history and propelled the Seminoles into the championship game of the ACC Tournament for the first time in school history. Kitchen recorded a near double-double as he scored 11 points, pulled down nine rebounds and earned four assists in a career-high 38 minutes in the Seminoles' thrilling 73-70 ACC Tournament victory over the Tar Heels.
- Averaged 12.5 points, 4.5 rebounds, 2.0 assists and 2.0 steals as the Seminoles' defeated NIT participant Virginia Tech twice during the regular season. Scored his career-high of 19 points to go along with six rebounds, three assists and three steals in the most complete all-around performance of his first season as Florida State went into Blacksburg and came away with a

championship of the prestigious Old Spice Classic at the Disney/ESPN Wide World of Sports in Lake Buena Vista, Fla. He was Florida State's second leading scorer, shot .500 from the field, .556 from the 3-point line and .750 from the free throw line in leading the Seminoles to victories over Iona (54-49, Nov. 26), Alabama (60-51, Nov. 27) and Marquette (57-56, Nov. 29). Kitchen scored a team and game-high 16 points to go along with three rebounds and two assists in the Seminoles first round victory over Iona.

- Led Florida State with 15 points, four rebounds and four steals in the Seminoles' only game against NCAA Tournament participant Florida..



67-65 win (Feb. 21). Kitchen led Florida State with 13 of his 19 points in the first half of the game to lead the Seminoles to a 43-33 lead at halftime. Among his career-high 19 points was an acrobatic 3-point shot that was named as the No. 6 Play of the Day on ESPN's SportsCenter following the game.

- Averaged 6.3 points, a team leading 5.7 rebounds and a team-leading 4.3 assists in helping lead the Seminoles to the championship game of the ACC Tournament for the first time in school history. He led (or was tied for the team lead) in both assists and steals in two of the Seminole's three games (five assists and three steals against Georgia Tech; six assists and three steals against No. 1 North Carolina) and was tied for the Seminoles' lead in assists in the championship game against Duke.
- Scored six points and pulled down a game-high and team-leading eight rebounds as the Seminoles played Wisconsin in the NCAA Tournament. The Badgers rallied to force overtime and rallied again to defeat the Seminoles, 61-59, in overtime in the first round game played at the Taco Bell Arena in Boise, Idaho.





Deividas Dulkys is one of the top 3-point shooting threats in the ACC for the 2010-11 season who is well on his way to becoming one of the all-time best long range shooting specialists in school history. He has made 100 3-point shots and is shooting .361 during the first two years of his career as a Seminole and enters his third season ranked 16th all-time in school history for a career 3-point field goals made while his career 3-point shooting percentage of .361 is ranked tied as the 16th highest career mark in school history. Dulkys has been an integral part of the Seminoles' increased success in his first two seasons as a Seminole. With 47 wins and two NCAA Tournament appearances on his resume, the Seminoles are one of the winningest teams in school history with Dulkys on the roster. The Seminoles have played in two consecutive NCAA Tournaments (2009 in Boise, Idaho and 2010 in Buffalo, N.Y.), the 2009 ACC Tournament championship game and won the championship of both the 2008 Global Sports Classic and the 2010 Old Spice Classic.

AS A SOPHOMORE (2009-10)

- Averaged a career-high 8.7 points (fourth on the team), a career-high 2.3 rebounds (eighth), a career-high 1.1 assists (sixth) and a career-high 1.0 steals (fourth) while leading the team with a single-season career-high 71 3-point field goals made.
- He ranked second in the ACC in 3-point field goal percentage (.379) behind only Adrian Thomas of Miami and third in total 3-point field goals made (71) behind only Jon Scheyer and Kyle Singler of Duke. His per game average of 2.2 3-point field goals made per game led the team and ranked second in the ACC behind on Scheyer.
- His 71 3-point field goals made ranks as the 11th highest single season total in school history while his .397 shooting mark from the 3-point line is tied for the 17th highest single season shooting mark in school history.
- He made at least one 3-point field goal in 25 of 32 games as a sophomore including 12 of 16 ACC games, the Seminoles' ACC Tournament game against NC State and Florida State's NCAA Tournament game against Gonzaga and made multiple 3-point shots in 22 of 32 games during the season and hit three or more in 14 of 32 games. He made his career-high of five 3-point field goals in four different games – wins over Florida International (Dec. 6), Alabama A&M (Dec. 31), Texas A&M Corpus Christi (Jan. 4) and at North Carolina (Feb. 24).
- On fire to begin the season with three consecutive double figure scoring games – 11 against Jacksonville (Nov. 16), 13 against Stetson (Nov. 18) and 14 at Mercer (Nov. 21) as he averaged 13.0 points per game as Florida State jumped

- out to a 3-0 record. He scored in double figures in his career high of six consecutive games – 14 against Auburn (Dec. 17), 12 at Georgia Tech (Dec. 20), 10 against UT Martin (Dec. 22), 19 against Alabama A&M, 17 against Texas A&M Corpus Christ and 15 at Maryland (Jan. 10) and averaged 14.5 points as the Seminoles won five of the six games at the end of the non conference schedule and the beginning of the ACC schedule.
- Scored in double figures in a career-high 15 games including six ACC games and the Seminoles' game against Gonzaga in the NCAA Tournament.
- His career-high of 19 points came twice – in the Seminoles' victories over FIU and Alabama A&M.
- Averaged 11.5 points, 2.0 rebounds and 1.5 steals in two games against NCAA Tournament participant Georgia Tech. He was Florida State's third leading scorer with 23 points in the two game sweep of the nationally ranked Yellow Jackets during the season. He scored 12 points, pulled down two rebounds and was credited with one assist and one steal in Florida State's 66-59 overtime victory over Georgia Tech in Atlanta (Dec. 20). He totaled 11 points, two rebounds, two steals and one assist in the Seminoles' 68-66 victory over Georgia Tech in Tallahassee (Jan. 24).
- Scored 17 points on five made 3-point field goals to go along with two rebounds, one assist and one steal in the Seminoles' only game of the season against NIT participant North Carolina. The Seminoles defeated the Tar Heels, 77-67, in Chapel Hill (Feb. 24) for their first victory at the Dean E. Smith Center under head coach Leonard Hamilton. He led a Seminole barrage of 11

- 3-point shots with his ACC career-high of five in the Seminoles' victory and scored 14 points on four made 3-point shots in the first half to lead the Seminoles to a commanding 48-33 lead at halftime.
- Scored 13 points, pulled down three rebounds and earned two steals in the Seminoles' only game against NIT participant Virginia Tech during the 2009-10 season. He shot .500 from the field (four of eight) and .750 from the free throw line (three of four) as the Seminoles took the 63-58 win in Tallahassee (Jan. 16). The Seminoles' victory over the Hokies proved to be one of the biggest wins of the season as it was the first tiebreaker at the end of the season that allowed Florida State to earn the No. 3 seed and a bye through the first round of the ACC Tournament.
- Scored a team-high 14 points to go along with two rebounds and one steal against Gonzaga in the NCAA Tournament. He made a game high four 3-point field goals as he tied for the team high with five field goals made. He scored 11 of his 14 points in the second half as the Seminoles outscored the Bulldogs, 41-32, as they made a valiant attempt to get back in the game.
- Averaged 7.0 points, 1.3 rebounds and 1.7 assists in three game of the Old Spice Classic in helping lead Florida State to the championship of the event with victories over Iona, Alabama and Marquette of the Big East. He was Florida State's fourth leading scoring in the event which saw the Seminoles outscore their opponents by an average of 5.0 points per game in winning their second in-season tournament in the first two seasons on Dulkys' career.

- He finished his first collegiate season with an .833 free throw shooting mark as he made 10 of his 12 shots from the line during the season including the final seven of the season.
- His 28 3-point field goals ranked as the fifth highest single-season total by a freshman in school history.
- Ranked fourth in the ACC among all league freshmen in 3-point field goals made during the 2008-09 season. He trailed only Seminole teammate Chris Singleton (34), Virginia's Sammy Zeglinski (33) and Georgia Tech's Iman Shumpert (32) in the ACC statistics for freshmen.
- Earned playing time in Florida State's victories over No. 21/23 Florida (Dec. 7), its monumental come-from-behind victory on the road against No. 10/10 Clemson (Feb. 7), its victory over No. 12/13 Clemson at home (Feb. 28) and its win over No. 1 ranked North Carolina in the semifinals of the ACC Tournament. The Seminoles' victory over No. 1 ranked North Carolina was only the third time in school history the Seminoles had defeated the No. 1 ranked team in the nation and the first time it had done so in post season play.
- Finished his first season as a Seminole with 18 steals (0.6 spg) to rank as one of nine Florida State players who earned double figures in steals during the 2008-09 season.
- Played extremely well in the ACC Tournament as he averaged 4.7 points scored in the three games as the Seminoles advanced to the ACC Tournament championship game for the first time in school history.
- Averaged 2.8 points and 1.3 rebounds while helping Florida State to the championship of the Global Sports Classic. The Seminoles' victories over Cincinnati (NIT) and Cal (NCAA) in the Global Sports Classic came against two teams that played in post season tournaments.
- Made back-to-back 3-point shots and eight total points in the first half in helping the Seminoles recover from as much as a 12-point first half deficit to defeat Western Kentucky in the Orange Bowl Classic at the Bank Atlantic Center in Sunrise, Fla. (Dec. 28). All eight of his points against the Hilltoppers came in the final six minutes of the first half as the Seminoles rallied from a 16-4 deficit to take a 37-34 lead at the intermission.
- Averaged 5.0 points and 2.0 assists in two games against NCAA Tournament participant Clemson. Scored three points and added one assist and two steals as Florida State earned one of the most incredible come from behind victories of the year in all of college basketball in defeating the Tigers, 65-61, on the road (Feb. 7).

The Tigers led by as many as 19 in the second half before the Seminoles came crashing back to silence the sold out crowd at Littlejohn Coliseum. His only made field goal of the game came in the first half with 6:58 left before intermission.

- Scored two points in eight minutes played as the Seminoles traveled to play at Cameron Indoor Stadium in Durham for the first time in his career. The Seminoles fought valiantly but fell in the final seconds 84-81 in Durham (March 3).
- Averaged 4.0 points and 2.0 assists in two games against Georgia Tech as the Seminoles defeated the Yellow Jackets during the regular season and again in the quarterfinals of the ACC Tournament. He totaled two points and one assist in the Seminoles' 64-62 victory over Georgia Tech in the ACC Tournament at the Georgia Dome (March 13).
- Averaged 5.5 points, 1.0 assists and 1.0 steals in two games against NIT participant Miami. He scored six points to go along with one rebound, one assist and one blocked shot as the Seminoles traveled to play at Miami (Jan. 18).
- He scored five points and was credited with one assist and two steals in leading the Seminoles past the Hurricanes, 80-67, in Tallahassee (Feb. 18). Was one of the Seminoles main defenders against Miami's All-ACC First Team selection Jack McClinton in an effort that held the star to only 13 points.
- Tied his career-high with nine points in the Seminoles' 73-70 victory over No. 1 ranked North Carolina in the semifinals of the ACC Tournament -- the victory propelled the Seminoles into the ACC Tournament championship game for the first time in school history. He scored six of his nine points in the second half as the Seminoles led for much of the final 20 minutes in taking their first ever ACC Tournament victory over the Tar Heels.
- Scored nine points, pulled down four rebounds and earned two steals in the Seminoles' only game against NC State during the 2008-09 season. All nine of his points came in the second half as the see-saw game tilted the Seminoles way for the victory. Was nearly unstoppable in the final 3:24 of the game with six points and three rebounds to help the Seminoles retain the lead and win the game.
- Averaged 7.5 points and shot .556 from the 3-point line in two games against Virginia as the Seminoles swept the regular season series with wins in both Charlottesville and Tallahassee. All five of his made baskets against the Cavaliers were from the bonusphere. He scored six points, pulled down one rebound and added one assist as Florida State won 73-62 at Charlottesville (Jan. 24) and tied his ACC and career scoring high with nine points -- all on 3-point shots -- in the Seminoles 68-57 victory over Virginia in Tallahassee (Feb. 10).

- Averaged 4.7 points, 1.7 assists and 13.0 minutes played in three games during the ACC Tournament played in the Georgia Dome in Atlanta (March 13-15) as he helped the Seminoles to victories over Georgia Tech in the quarterfinals (64-62, March 13) and No. 1 ranked North Carolina (73-70, March 14). The victories over the Yellow Jackets and the Tar Heels advanced the Seminoles to their first appearance in the ACC Tournament championship game in school history. He scored two points and added one assist against Georgia Tech, totaled a career-high tying nine points and two assists against North Carolina in the semifinals and had three points and two assists against Duke in the championship game.
- Scored three points and pulled down one rebound in six minutes of playing time as Florida State played their only game of the season against NIT participant and in-state rival Florida. Florida State won the game, 57-55, in Tallahassee (Dec. 7) to mark their third consecutive victory in the series over the Gators. His first career 3-point basket against a ranked team came in the first half and gave Florida State a 15-8 lead with 7:52 remaining before halftime.
- Earned the Mr. Hustle Award from the Seminole coaching staff at the annual Honors Banquet in 2009.







Luke Loucks is a multi-talented guard who is in his third year in the program and who has the proclivity for completing accurate passes through heavy traffic while possessing the penchant for making clutch baskets that have the Seminoles on the precipice of playing in their third consecutive NCAA Tournament for the first time since the 1991, 1992 and 1993 seasons. He has played in each of the Seminoles' 67 games the last two seasons and helped the team to a 47-20 record – a mark which ties the school record for wins in a two-year period. Loucks has started three games during his career (two as a freshman and one as a sophomore) and the Seminoles have won two of those three games. With Loucks in the line-up the Seminoles have achieved tremendous success as they have played in two NCAA Tournaments, one ACC Tournament championship game, won the championships of two in season tournaments and finished in the top four of the ACC standings with consecutive 10 win seasons. Loucks has played in six wins over ranked teams in the first two seasons of his career including two ranked Georgia Tech teams during his sophomore season: No. 22/15 Georgia Tech (Dec. 20, 2009; 66-59 in overtime) and No. 18/19 Georgia Tech (Jan. 24, 2010; 68-66) while playing in four victories over ranked teams during his freshman season – No. 21/23 Florida (Dec. 7, 2008, 57-55), at No. 10/10 Clemson (Feb. 7, 2009, 65-61), No. 12/13 Clemson (Feb. 28, 73-66) and against No. 1/1 North Carolina (March 14, 2009, 73-70)

AS A SOPHOMORE (2009-10)

- Averaged a career-high 4.4 points (ninth on the team), a career-high 2.8 assists (second), 0.8 steals (fourth) while making a career-high 24 3-point shots (third) and playing in all 32 games for the Seminoles during his second season as a member of the team.
- He averaged a career-high 19.8 minutes played per game as he played both guard positions while concentrating mostly on the point guard position. He played well in ACC games as he increased his scoring average (5.3 points per game in 16 ACC games vs. 4.4 points per game for the entire season) with four double figure scoring games in ACC play and established career-highs for field goals made (47), field goals attempted (123), 3-point field goals made (24), 3-point field goals attempted (79), free throws made (23), free throws attempted (39), defensive rebounds (71), total rebounds (79), average rebounds per game (2.5), assists (90), total points (141) and points per game average (4.4).
- Was in the Seminoles' starting line-up for their victory over FIU that allowed them to raise their early season record to 7-2. He scored six points and was credited with a career-high seven assists in the victory over the Golden Panthers.
- Totaled a single-season career-high 90 assists – which were 17 more assists in three fewer games than he accumulated as a freshman and cored in double figures a career-high five times as a sophomore including four ACC games – he

scored in double figures only twice as a freshman with one coming in an ACC game.

- In ranking second on the team in assists, he earned at least four assists in 12 different games, totaled his career-high for assists with seven against Florida International (Dec. 6) and seven against UT Martin (Dec. 22).
- He ranked third on the team in steals and totaled multiple steals in six different games including his career-high of four steals in the Seminoles' early season win at Mercer and ranked third on the team with a career-high 24 3-point field goals made including three in both games against Miami during the regular season.
- He averaged 10.0 points, 3.0 rebounds and a team leading 4.0 assists in two games against NCAA Tournament participant Clemson. He was tied for the Seminoles' scoring lead with a 10.0 points per game scoring average with All-ACC honoree Solomon Alabi as he shot .583 from the field (seven of 12), .400 from the 3-point line (two of five) and .800 from the free throw line (four of five).
- Averaged 5.5 points and 2.5 assists in two games against NCAA Tournament participant Maryland. He led the Seminoles in assists during the two game regular season series against Maryland with five.
- Averaged a team-leading 16.0 points, 3.5 rebounds and 3.5 assists in two games against Miami. He shot .714 from the field (10 of 14),

.600 from the 3-point line (six of 10) and .750 from the free throw line (six of eight) while adding seven assists, two steals and one blocked shot as he led Florida State to the regular season sweep of the Hurricanes.

- Scored his career-high of 19 points in leading the Seminoles to the victory at home and added 13 points as the Seminoles won on the road. His career game of 19 points (on five of seven shooting from the field), five rebounds, three assists, one blocked shots and one steal in the Seminoles' 71-65 victory over Miami in Tallahassee (Feb. 6). He earned team high scoring honors and tied for team high rebounding honors in 25 minutes of play in the Seminoles' 17th victory of the season. Scored what proved to be the game-winning basket with 14:46 left in the game as he scored on a 3-point shot to give Florida State a 40-37 lead. Also scored the game-winning basket to give Florida State the 61-60 victory over Miami in Coral Gables (March 6). His 3-point basket gave Florida State the 61-60 lead with 1:52 and proved to be the last and game-winning basket of the game. Florida State had led virtually the entire game before the Hurricanes took their first lead of the game with 2:04 remaining in the game. Loucks put Florida State back into the lead and gave the Seminoles their 10th win of the ACC season.
- Scored 11 points, pulled down four rebounds, was credited with four assists and one steal in

the Seminoles only game of the season against Virginia. Florida State trailed only briefly in winning their seventh ACC game of the year, 69-50, in Charlottesville

- Totaled two points, three rebounds, three assists and one steal in the Seminoles' only game of the season against NCAA Tournament participant Wake Forest. He was perfect from

the free throw line (two of two) as the Seminoles defeated the Demon Deacons, 51-47, in Tallahassee (March 3). Florida State's victory allowed the Seminoles to up their conference record to 9-6 with one game remaining in the regular season and virtually insured them of their second consecutive NCAA Tournament appearance.

- Scored seven points, pulled down three

rebounds, was credited with four assists and one steal as the Seminoles played Gonzaga in the NCAA Tournament. His four assists ranked as the second highest total in the game behind teammate Derwin Kitchen and all seven of his points came in the second half as the Seminoles outscored Gonzaga, 41-32.

AS A FRESHMAN (2008-09)

- Averaged 3.1 points (eighth on the team), 2.1 assists (second) and 0.9 steals (third) while playing in all 35 games for the Seminoles. He earned two starting assignments (against Western Kentucky and at Wake Forest) which made him one of only two true Florida State freshmen to earn a starting role during the 2008-09 season.

- He ranked third among all freshmen in the ACC with a 2.1 assists per game average. He averaged 16.9 minutes played per game (eighth on the team) and played a total of 593 minutes in his first season as a Seminole while finishing fifth on the team with 16 3-point field goals made.

- Averaged 7.5 points and shot .588 from the field (10 of 17) in helping lead Florida State to the championship of the Global Sports Classic with victories over Coastal Carolina (Nov. 22, career-high 14 points), Western Illinois (Nov. 24, .500 shooting from the field), Cincinnati (Nov. 28, four points and two rebounds) and NCAA Tournament participant Cal (Nov. 29, seven points and three rebounds).

- Scored in double figures twice during his freshman season with 14 points in the Seminoles' come-from-behind victory over Coastal Carolina (Nov. 22) and their overtime victory over Maryland (Jan. 17) while his career high of six assists came in the Seminoles' victory over Coastal Carolina.

- Multiple assists in 18 of the Seminoles' games and assists in 32 of Florida State's 35 games with double figure minutes played coming in all but five games

- He played a career-high of 28 minutes in the Seminoles' victory over Cal.

- His 73 assists during his freshman season rank as the seventh highest total by a freshman in school history while his 31 steals was the eighth highest total by a Seminole freshman.

- Averaged 1.5 points in two games against NCAA Tournament participant Clemson and had better than a 2:1 assist:turnover ratio with seven assists and three turnovers (2.3:1) as the Seminoles took two wins over a ranked Clemson team in both games – in Clemson and in Tallahassee. His biggest shot of the season – a 3-pointer – came in the Seminoles' 65-61 come-from-behind victory over the Tigers. The Seminoles were down by as many as 19 points including 15 with just under nine minutes re-

maining when they made their incredible run to victory. Loucks had one basket and three assists in the second half to help key the comeback. It was a 3-pointer by Loucks that tightened the score to a one point deficit at 59-58. From there, the Seminoles outscored Clemson 7-2 to win the game

- Scored six points, pulled down three rebounds and was credited with one assist as the Seminoles played Duke in the championship game of the ACC Tournament in the Georgia Dome (March 15). It marked the first time the Seminoles played in the ACC Tournament championship game in school history.

- Averaged 3.0 assists and 2.0 rebounds while earning six assists in two games against Georgia Tech. The Seminoles defeated the Yellow Jackets during the regular season in Tallahassee and defeated Georgia Tech in the quarterfinals of the ACC Tournament in the Georgia Dome in Atlanta. The Seminoles' victory over the Yellow Jackets in the ACC Tournament was their first step in advancing to the ACC Tournament championship game for the first time in school history. Loucks was not credited with an assist but had the biggest pass of the day for the Seminoles as he inbounded a pass to Derwin Kitchen who took the pass and scored on a reverse lay-up with 7.7 seconds remaining in the game to give the Seminoles the lead at 63-62.

- Scored his ACC career-high of 10 points and was credited with two assists in the Seminoles' overtime victory over Maryland in their only game against the NCAA Tournament participant Terps during the 2008-09 season. Scored on back-to-back long range shots (both on run outs after missed Maryland field goal attempts) and forced Maryland to take a timeout to slow the Seminoles onslaught. Earned two minutes of playing time in the overtime period and sealed the game with a steal of Dave Neal with one second left in the game -- his steal changed possession and did not allow the Terps to take a potential game-tying shot.

- Averaged 2.0 points and 2.5 assists in two games against NCAA National Champion North Carolina. He earned five assists and three steals as the Seminoles were 1-1 with a victory over the No. 1 ranked Tar Heels in the semifinals of the ACC Tournament. 



Xavier Gibson is an incredible athletic talent who has earned the opportunity to display his abilities and to perform as one of the top big men in the ACC during his junior season. He has played in 64 games during the first two years of his career and will look to vault himself into the upper stratosphere of big men in the nation's top baseball league and among the top players in all of college basketball. Head coach Leonard Hamilton has called Gibson the player in the Seminoles' roster with the most upside and a player who has yet to scratch the surface of his potential despite his success in the first two years of his career. Gibson is one of the Seminoles' top shooters from the field who has a career field goal shooting percentage of .546 and who has shot .528 and .555 from the field in the first two seasons of his career — he ranks 14th in school history with his .546 career field goal shooting mark. He has an incredible ability to position himself well for offensive rebounds and earns many of his points on dunks and put backs because he is in great position when rebounds come off of the rim and backboard.

AS A SOPHOMORE (2009-10)

- Averaged a career-high 5.5 points (seventh on the team), a career-high 2.8 rebounds (fifth) and a career-high 0.8 blocked shots per game (third) as he led the team with a career-high .555 field goal shooting percentage.
- He played in a career-high tying 32 games as a sophomore and averaged a career-high 12.8 minutes played per game as he nearly doubled his playing time from his freshman season
- Displayed his ability to play among the top players in the ACC as he scored in double figures seven times and helped lead the Seminoles to their second consecutive appearance in the NCAA Tournament and to a third place finish in the ACC standings.
- With Gibson in the line-up the Seminoles won 47 games and average 10 wins in the ACC in his first two seasons (23.5 wins per season). Florida State finished in third place in the ACC standings with a 10-6 record in 2010 and in fourth place in the league standings with a 10-6 record in 2009 -- the back to back double figure wins in conference play rank as the first time since the 1992 and 1993 seasons that Florida State has earned double figure wins in league play.
- Scored in double figures a career-high seven times including his career-high of 17 points in Florida State's victory over Alabama A&M. He totaled three consecutive double figure scoring games to begin the season against Jacksonville (12 points, Nov. 16), Stetson (11 points) and Mercer (12 points, Nov. 21) to earn an average of 11.7 points per game as Florida State as the Seminoles opened with a 3-0 record. He also earned consecutive double figure scoring games

against UT Martin (12 points) and Alabama A&M (career-high 17 points) for a 14.5 points per game scoring average as the Seminoles closed out the calendar year with two victories.

- Averaged 3.0 points and 1.0 rebound in two games against Boston College during the regular season. He shot .600 from the field and blocked two shots in the two victories over the Eagles that allowed the Seminoles to sweep the season series from Boston College for the first time in school history. Additionally, the Seminoles' victory over Boston College in Chestnut Hill marked the first time the Seminoles had defeated the Eagles at the Conte Forum on the BC campus
- Totaled six points and four rebounds in 13 minutes of play in the Seminoles' only game of the season against NCAA National Champion Duke. All six of his points came in the first half as the Seminoles' played neck and neck with the Blue Devils for most of the first half. Gibson scored on a jumper at the 13:38 mark of the first half pulled the Seminoles to within one at 12-11 and ...scored four points in a span of 1:06 to pull Florida State to within two at 28-26 with 5:21 left before intermission.
- Averaged 2.0 points, 4.0 rebounds and 1.0 assists in two games against NCAA Tournament participant Georgia Tech as he helped the Seminoles defeat the nationally ranked Yellow Jackets in two games during the regular season for the series sweep. ...

The victory over the Tar Heels, 77-67, gave the Seminoles their first victory for head coach Leonard Hamilton in the Dean E. Smith Center (Feb. 24). His six points came on three field goals with two coming in the second half as the Seminoles built a commanding 48-35 lead going into the intermission and held on to a comfortable lead in the second half as he scored on one basket.
- Totaled 10 points, pulled down four rebounds and blocked two shots in the Seminoles' only game of the season against Virginia. His 10 points against the Cavaliers in Charlottesville tied his ACC career and season scoring high and helped the Seminoles to the 69-50 victory (Feb. 17). Gibson was outstanding from the field as he made four of seven shots (.571) including a perfect one of one from the 3-point line and a perfect one of one from the free throw line.

- Averaged 3.7 points and 3.3 rebounds in three games during the Old Spice Classic in helping lead the Seminoles to the championship of the prestigious event. The Seminoles' defeated Iona, Alabama and Marquette of the Big East to win their second in-season tournament championship in as many seasons with Gibson on the roster.
- Scored four points and pulled down four rebounds in the Seminoles' only game of the year against Florida. He totaled two points in each half as Florida defeated the Seminoles, 68-52, in Gainesville.

AS A FRESHMAN (2008-09)

- Averaged 2.3 points (11th on the team), and 1.4 rebounds (eighth) while shooting .528 from the field (second) and blocking 11 shots in 32 games played during his freshman season.
- Was a potent scorer despite playing limited minutes with his points coming in bunches and at very opportune times for the Seminoles.
- Among the Seminoles' three true freshmen, Gibson played in the third highest total number of games (32) behind only Chris Singleton and Luke Loucks who played in all 35 games during the 2008-09 season for the Seminoles.
- Scored his career-high of 11 points against Charleston Southern (Dec. 18) and scored his ACC career-high of six points at Miami (Jan. 21) and in the Seminoles' win at home against Clemson (Feb. 28).

His free throws came during a very productive stretch of the second half and helped the Seminoles climb back into the game after trailing by as many as eight points to gain the 65-61 win.


Chris Singleton is an All-American candidate as the reigning ACC Defensive Player of the Year who begins his junior season as one of the nation's top candidates for the Henry Iba Award as the top defensive player in all of college basketball and the John R. Wooden and the James Naismith Awards as the top player in the nation. He earned All-ACC Third Team and ACC All-Defensive Team honors in 2010 as he led the ACC in steals and finished fifth in blocked shots to become only the fifth player in the history of the ACC to rank in the top five in both the steals and blocked shots categories. Singleton was a member 2010 USA Select Team that trained with the USA National Team in July of 2010 and was a camp counselor at the Kevin Durant and LeBron James Skills Academies during the summer of 2010. Singleton has helped lead the Seminoles to the NCAA Tournament and into the national rankings in both of his first two seasons as a Seminole. Florida State played in the 2009 and 2010 NCAA Tournaments and advanced to the championship game of the 2009 ACC Tournament for the first time in school history with Singleton in the starting line-up.

AS A SOPHOMORE (2009-10)

- Averaged a career-high 10.2 points (second on the team), a career-high 7.0 rebounds (first), a career-high 2.2 steals (first), a career-high 1.5 blocked shots (second) and a career-high 2.2 assists per game (third) in leading the Seminoles to the NCAA Tournament for the second consecutive season in 2010.
- The ACC Defensive Player of the Year and named to the ACC All-Defensive Team as he received the most votes among the five players on the All-Defensive team. He was named to the ACC All-Defensive team as selected by both the coaches and the media. Earned All-ACC Third Team honors as he ranked in the top 12 of five different categories: steals (first, 2.2 spg), blocked shots (fifth, 1.5 bpg), defensive rebounds (eighth, 4.9 rpg), minutes played (10th, 31.4 mpg) and rebounding (12th, 7.0 rpg).
- Became only the fifth player in ACC history to finish in the top five in the conference statistics in both blocked shots and steals in the same season in 2009-10... Singleton joined Wake Forest's Josh Howard (2002-03), Duke's Shane Battier (1999-00 and 2000-01) and Duke's Christian Laettner (1990-91) as the only players in ACC history to finish in the top five in both statistical categories in the same season.
- The Seminoles' leading rebounder as a sophomore and he established career-bests for field goals made (117), field goals attempted (284), 3-point field goals made (35), 3-point field goals attempted (118), free throws attempted (115), offensive rebounds (66), defensive rebounds (157), total rebounds (223), rebounds per game (7.0 rpg), assists (70), blocked shots (48), steals (71),

total points (326) and points per game (10.2 ppg).

- His defensive effort keyed the Seminoles' defense that led the nation and the ACC in field goal percentage defense (.377) and was first in the ACC in both scoring defense (60.4 points allowed per game) and blocked shots (6.3 bpg).
- The second consecutive Florida State player to be named the ACC Defensive Player of the Year as he followed in the defensive footsteps of All-American Toney Douglas who earned the award in 2009.
- Averaged 11.0 points and 9.5 rebounds in two games against Boston College as Florida State swept the season-series against Boston College for the first time in school history.
- Scored 14 points, pulled down nine rebounds, blocked three shots and was credited with two steals in the Seminoles only game of the season against NCAA National Champion Duke as he came within one rebound of his third double-double of the season in ACC play. His 14 points tied for team-high scoring honors on the road in Cameron Indoor Stadium.

- Averaged 15.0 points, 7.7 rebounds and 3.0 steals and was named the Most Valuable Player in leading Florida State to the championship of the prestigious Old Spice Classic at the Milk House at Walt Disney World in Orlando, Fla. He shot .516 from the field (16 of 31) and .667 from the 3-point line (six of nine) in leading the Seminoles to victories over Iona of the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference, Alabama of the SEC and Marquette of the Big East for the Seminoles' second in-season tournament championship during Singleton's career.
- Scored 14 points and pulled down four rebounds in the Seminoles' only game of the season against NCAA Tournament participant Florida. was a perfect four of four from the free throw line to go along with two blocked shots against the Gators.

- The Seminoles' leader with four games of 10 rebounds or more (17 at Jacksonville, Nov. 15, 2008; 10 vs. Stetson, Nov. 20, 2008; 10 vs. California, Nov. 29, 2008; 10 vs. Florida, Dec. 7, 2008), ranked third on the team as the Seminoles' leader in rebounds 10 times and tied for second on the team with two double-doubles (12 points and 17 rebounds at Jacksonville, Nov. 15, 2009; 10 points and 10 rebounds vs. Stetson, Nov. 20, 2008).


points came in the first half and helped Florida State jump to a 33-27 lead.

Of his eight points, six came in the first half and two in the second as he gave Florida State its first lead of the game with a 3-point shot that ranked as the Seminoles' first basket of the game to give the Seminoles a 3-2 lead.



Pierre Jordan is a very knowledgeable guard who has worked hard to put himself in position to earn increased playing time in his third season as a member of the Florida State basketball team. He has three full seasons of eligibility remaining at the beginning of the 2010-11 season after playing in only six games and taking a medical redshirt in his first season as a member of the team. He will compete for extended playing time at the point guard position alongside returning starter Derwin Kitchen and his primary back-up Luke Loucks and has gained tremendous experience in his first two seasons in the program and is a tremendous asset to the team as a standout point guard and an excellent teammate. Jordan has been a member of two consecutive NCAA Tournament teams (2009 and 2010) as his worked has helped the Seminoles reach the tournament in consecutive years for the first time since the 1992 and 1993 seasons and was also a member of the Seminoles' 2009 team that advanced to the championship game of the ACC Tournament for the first time in school history.

AS A REDSHIRT FRESHMAN (2009-10)


- Averaged a career-high 1.3 points (tied for 11th on the team), a career-high 0.9 rebounds (11th) and 0.6 assists (10th) while playing in a career-high 15 games and averaging 5.9 minutes played per game.
- Played in nearly half of the Seminoles' 32 games including seven ACC games, their game against NC State in the ACC Tournament, and in one game during their run to the championship of the prestigious Old Spice Classic.
- Scored his career-high of six points in the Seminoles' victory at Mercer as he made all three of his field goal attempts in game. All six of his points came in the second half and helped the Seminoles to the 89-50 victory on the road. Jordan established career-bests for points (six) and field goals made (three) in the victory over the Bears
- His career-high of two assists came in victories over Jacksonville and UT-Martin which gave his a single season career-high 10 assists on the season. He had at least one assists in eight of the 17 games in which he earned playing time
- He earned extended playing time throughout the season with double figure minutes coming in five of his 17 appearances including a career-high 16 minutes played in the Seminoles' victory over Stetson (Nov. 18) and earned playing time of 10 or more minutes in the first three games of the season with 10 minutes coming in the Seminoles' victory over Jacksonville (Nov. 16), his career-high of 16 minutes coming against Stetson and 10 minutes coming on the road at Mercer.

Terrance Shannon is a cornerstone player who the Seminole program will be built around for the remaining three seasons of his career as a Seminole. He is a talented and instinctive player who progressed tremendously after an early season injury slowed his progress to begin his freshman season. Shannon played in 18 of the final 28 games of the season including 10 of 16 ACC games once he became healthy and returned to the Seminoles' rotation. The key to his success will be his ability to continue building on the experiences and successes he enjoyed as a freshman. He helped Florida State earn its second consecutive bid to the NCAA Tournament as the Seminoles have now reached the NCAA Tournament in two consecutive seasons for the first time since the 1992 and 1993 seasons.

AS A FRESHMAN (2010)

- Averaged 1.7 points (10th on the team) and 1.1 rebounds (11th) while shooting .542 from the field (2nd) in 18 games played as a freshman for the Seminoles.
- Averaged 5.2 minutes played per game as he played in seven non-conference games and 10 ACC games during his first season. He also earned playing time in the Seminoles' NCAA Tournament game against Gonzaga.
- Missed the first four games of the season with a scratched cornea on his right eye which he suffered in practice just before the start of the season. The injury set his maturation back at bit as he missed extended practice and conditioning time as well as the first part of the season.

Michael Snaer is one of the rising stars of the Atlantic Coast Conference who is ready to launch himself into the stratosphere of the top players in not only the ACC, but the nation during his sophomore season. He distinguished himself as one of the players to watch closely during the remainder of his career with his play, poise and court presence as he exceeded all expectations in earning All-ACC Freshman Team honors in 2010. The much-hyped Snaer proved himself to be a dedicated and quick learner who earned his way into the Seminoles' starting line-up and helped Florida State earn its second consecutive birth into the NCAA Tournament in 2010. Snaer was named to the All-ACC Freshman Team as he was the fifth leading freshman scorer in the ACC in 2010. He became only the fifth freshman in school history to be named to the ACC All Freshmen team joining Corey Louis (1995), Michael Joiner (2001), Alexander Johnson (2004) and Solomon Alabi (2009) -- both Johnson and Alabi were second round NBA Draft choices as early entry candidates after enjoying outstanding career as Seminoles.

AS A FRESHMAN (2010)

- Averaged 8.8 points (third on the team), 2.7 rebounds (sixth) and 1.3 assists (fourth) while making 23 3-point field goals (fourth) and 57 free throws (tied for third) in becoming only the fifth player in school history to be named to the ACC All-Freshman Team.
- Finished fifth among all freshmen in the ACC with an 8.8 points per game scoring average and 11th among all league freshmen with a 2.7 rebounds per game average. He was also Florida State's third leading scorer in conference games only with a 9.1 points per game average.
- He scored in double figures in seven of 16 ACC games and in 14 of 32 games (both 44 percent) in his first season and was Florida State's leading free throw shooter in ACC games only with a team leading .765 shooting percentage.
- Named the ACC Rookie of the Week on Feb. 15, 2010 for his performances against Clemson (10 points and four rebounds) and Boston College (18 points and two assists) as he averaged 14.0 points in the two games.
- His 282 points are tied for the eight highest total by a freshman in school history, his 230 field goal attempts are tied for ninth in school history among freshman, his 23 3-point field goals are tied for 10th, his 66 3-point field goal attempts are tied for seventh, his 57 free throws are tied for sixth and his 87 free throws attempted are tied for eighth.
- Started the final 10 games of the season for the Seminoles as he helped the Seminoles' last season run to a 10-6 record and a third place finish in the ACC and their second consecutive NCAA Tournament appearance. He helped Florida

State to a 6-2 record in its final eight ACC games of the season to move the Seminoles from a sixth place standing with a 4-4 record into third place with a 10-6 mark.

- His exciting play helped Florida State to finish in the top four of the ACC standings for the second consecutive season and for the fourth time in school history.
- Scored his career-high of 18 points for the first of two times in Florida State's victory over UT Martin (Dec. 22) and followed that performance with a 10-point total in the Seminoles' win over Alabama A&M (Dec. 31) and scored 10 points in his national debut against Ohio State on the road in the ACC/Big Ten Challenge (Dec. 2).
- Scored in double-figures (12 points against NC State) in his third career ACC game and scored in double figures in consecutive ACC games twice (at Duke and at Boston College as well as at Clemson and against Boston College) and was Florida State's leading scorer in four games: against UT Martin, against Boston College (Feb. 14) against Clemson (Feb. 28, 2010) and against Wake Forest (March 3).
- Totaled a career-high eight assists in the Seminoles' 61-60 win over Miami (March 6) -- a win that closed out the regular season with the Seminoles' second consecutive 10-win league record.
- Averaged 14.0 points, 2.5 assists and 2.0 rebounds in two games against Boston College and was Florida State's leading scorer against the Eagles as the Seminoles' swept the two-game regular season series for the first time in school history. Snaer helped the Seminoles with 10

points off of the bench as Florida State won on the road in Chestnut Hill for the first time in school history and totaled game-high 18 points as a starter as the Seminoles also won in Tallahassee.

- Averaged 9.0 points, 3.5 rebounds and 1.0 steals in two games against NCAA Tournament participant Clemson. He scored 10 points in his first ACC road start at Clemson as the Seminoles fell to the Tigers (Feb. 10).
- Scored 13 points, pulled down three rebounds and earned one assist in the Seminoles' only game of the season against NCAA National Champion Duke. He came off the bench in his first appearance in the famed Cameron Indoor Stadium with all 13 of his points came in the second half as Florida State worked to get back into the game after falling behind by 10 at halftime.
- Averaged 8.5 points and 2.0 rebounds in two games against NCAA Tournament participant Maryland. He scored eight points to go along with one rebound, one assist and one steal as the Seminoles lost at College Park
- Scored 11 points to go along with four assists and one rebound in the Seminoles' only game of the season against NIT participant North Carolina. He made one of two 3-point shots and was perfect from the free throw line (two of two) as the Seminoles won in the Dean E. Smith Center for the first time under head coach Leonard Hamilton. Snaer was a major part of the Seminoles' first half barrage from the 3-point line with three points on a shot from the bonusphere to help the Seminoles to a commanding 48-33 lead at halftime.






